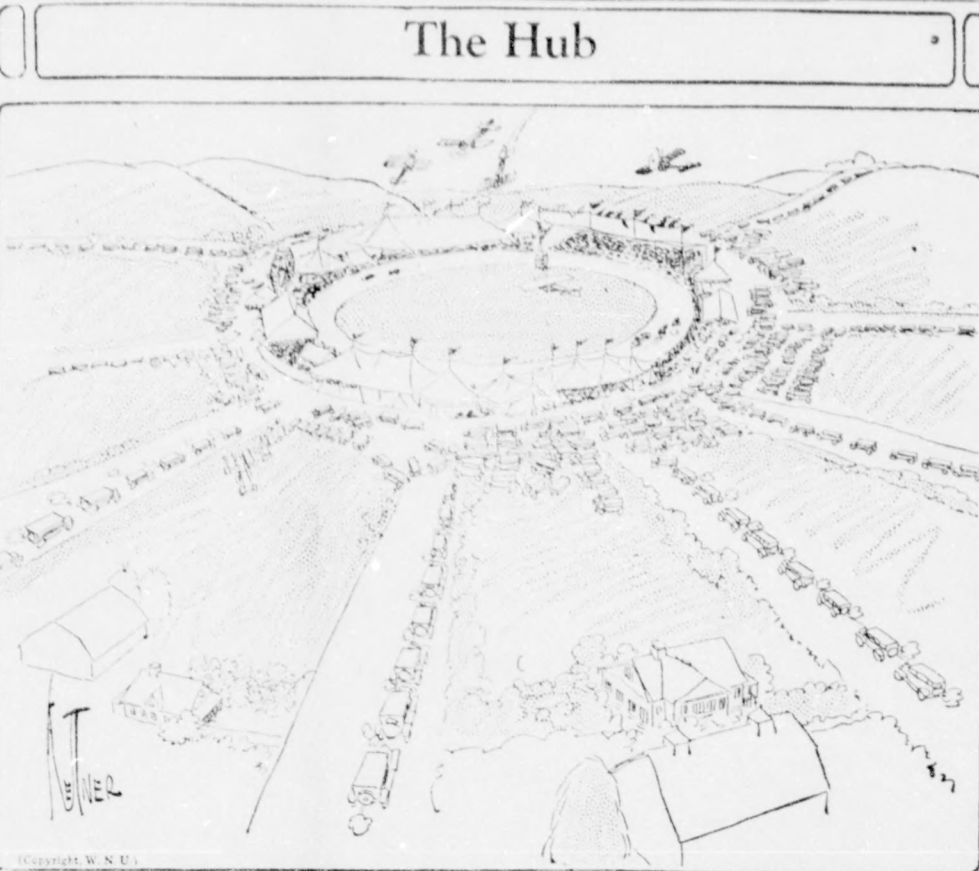
## Fair Edition of The Advertiser

## NO BETTING ON PONIES IF BECKHAM IS WINNER

Kentucky Democratic Nominee Foe of Race Track

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 16.—The bitter political battle waged in the Kentucky election campaigns in both Republican and Democratic parties, involving pari-mutuel betting, were not settled by the nomination of former Gov. Beckham as the Democratic candidate for governor and the selection of Judge Sampson as the Republican nominee.

Party lines have been rent by the moral issue, Republicans opposing what is commonly called "legalized race-track gambling," are aligning themselves with the Beckham forces while "sporting element" of the Democratic organization is talking about bolting the ticket.

Mr. Beckham, an attorney of Louisville, has promised to sign a bill repealing the pari-mutuel law if it is passed by the General Assembly. Judge Sampson is regarded as the candidate of the Kentucky Jockey Club. There is much talk that the jockey club, a week before the primary, realized it could not defeat Mr. Beckham for the Democratic nomination with Robert T. Crowe of LaGrange, the state administration candidate, and then threw its strength to Sampson to avoid being caught without a candidate.

With race track letting the main issue between the candidates, efforts are being made to force declarations from nominees in 19 senatorial and 100 legislative district races. Senators in the remaining 19 districts are hold-overs.

The House of Representatives passed a bill repealing the pari-mutuel law at the 1926 session, but the Senate killed the bill by a majority of four votes. Charges made during the primary campaigns are still circulated and discussed. Circuit Judge Thurman of Springfield accused the Jockey Club of spending \$300,000 to defeat Beckham. He charged that \$75,000 was given Desha Breckinridge of Lexington, editor of the Lexington Herald and stockholder in the club "for publicity," and the remainder to Maurice Galvin, Covington, Republican "boss," and Tony Carrell of Louisville as "attorneys' fees." He posted a certified check for \$5,000 payable to the American Red Cross if the Jockey Club would turn over its books and papers for examination and the charges were found to be untrue.

Robert H. Lucas, collector of internal revenue, who opposed Sampson for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, reiterated Judge Thurman's accusations and added that the Jockey Club spent \$75,000 against him.

Many upsets were noticeable in the election returns. Beckham carried Woodford county, home of former Senator Johnson N. Camden and president of the Jockey Club, by 47 votes. Woodford is a race horse breeding county. Beckham carried Lyon county, home of Seldon Glenn, chairman of the state tax commission, and Nelson county, home of Ben Johnson, chairman of the state highway commission and his old political foe, by 1,200 in each county.

Hamilton and Kenton counties, near the Latonia race track, gave a total of 6,000 majority for Crowe, and Fayette county, embracing the Lexington track, gave Crowe a lead of 3,700, but State Senator Arch Hamilton, friend of the pari-mutuels, was defeated in Fayette county.

In Louisville, where Churchill Downs is located, Crowe obtained a majority of nearly 7,000 over Beckham, but Lucas led Sampson by 4,000.

Beckham, when lieutenant governor, became the "boy governor" of Kentucky in 1900 with the assassination of Governor William Goebel. In the special election the following November he was elected to serve out the unexpired term. Under a decision of the Court of Appeals he was held eligible to succeed himself, and re-elected, served until December, 1907.

Besides his widow, he is survived by four children, Mrs. Mazie Gossum, Mrs. Monnett Barber, all of Fulton. Also DeZonia, Claudis and Rupert, one brother, Ira Barber, of near Murray; two sisters, Mrs. J. E. Taylor, of Clinton, Ky.; Mrs. Waver Alderson, of Murray.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist church, Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock, conducted by the Rev. J. W. Freeman. The pallbearers were his associates that he had worked with for many years.

Burial arrangements were in charge of the Fulton Undertaking Co. Interment at Fairview cemetery.

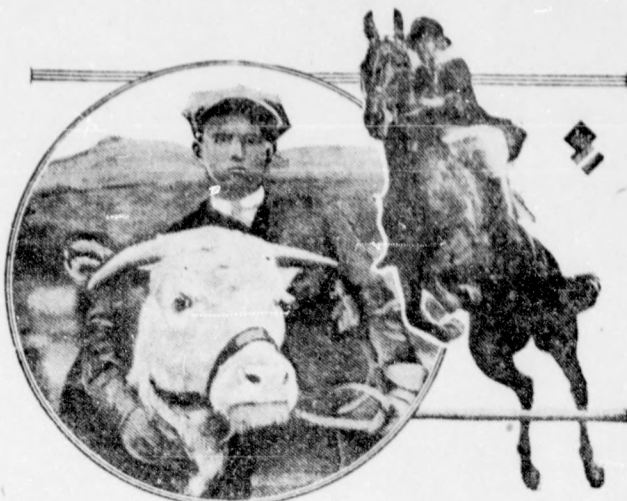

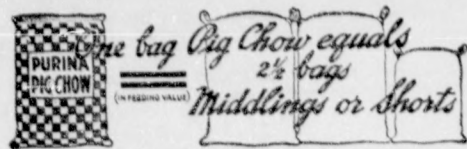

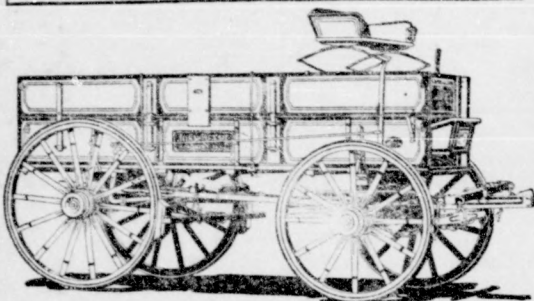

If they went to a party or dance and pushed their way down the center of the room, joshing the guests as they went, treading on their toes, making them jump to avoid collision, and calling to them to get out of their way, they would commonly be called roughnecks.

Yet they do about that thing in a crowded street. The public is so used to such exhibitions that it tolerates them, makes but little complaint, and does its best to jump for safety.

It seems strange that a good many persons who are ordinarily well-mannered, will yet act in this coarse and arrogant way. They seem to think it is everyone's duty to wait for them and get out of their way. If they toot their horns violently, they feel they have done all that is required of them.

The law is doing all it can to correct such violation of the public regulations and of ordinary common sense and courtesy, but community sentiment ought to call upon some of these people to display better manners.

Real gentlemen and ladies will come cautiously down a crowded street, just as mindful of the people in the way as if they were in someone's parlor, glad to stop to let pedestrians pass, preferring to yield a probable right of way rather than show a crowding disposition.

## Embezzlement Charged to 3

Clinton Men Accused of  
Converting Funds  
Intended For Dis-  
abled Vets

Louisville, Aug. 13—Warrents charging embezzlement were issued Friday by United States Commissioner Arthur D. Kirk against J. Kelly Smith, attorney; John M. Bennett and E. B. Samuels, all of Clinton, Ky., who are alleged to have converted thousands of dollars belonging to disabled World war veterans to their own use.

The warrant against Smith and Bennett alleged they entered into a conspiracy to embezzle approximately \$9,000 to \$12,000 compensation payment to Clayton Bennett, disabled veteran, between the years 1918 and 1925. Bennett also was accused in a separate warrant of embezzling a large amount of \$12,000 he had collected for Clayton Bennett, an alleged incompetent for whom he had been appointed a committee.

Samuels, who acted as a committee for John Warner, an incompetent veteran was charged embezzling a large part of \$6,000 he had collected for Warner.

The writs were placed in the hands of United States Marshal F. M. McCain for execution.

J. H. Payne, attorney for the United States Veterans' Bureau here, swore to the affidavits on which the warrants were based. Mr. Payne, it was said, had been investigating the case for several months.

Mayfield, Ky., Aug. 13—John M. Bennett, father of Clayton F. Bennett, resides on Mayfield Route 1, and was committee for his son from February 27, 1920 until June 16, 1925 when H. S. Bennett was appointed committee.

Young Bennett was declared of unsound mind by a jury in county court April 7, 1919. He served his country during the World War.

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 11—The State Highway Commission has \$2,610,299.60 to its credit, deposited there by various counties for road work, Rufus Lisle, auditor of department informed the commission at its regular meeting held Tuesday and Wednesday, minutes of the meeting released today reveal.

The commission at this meeting awarded contracts for road work aggregating \$800,000, but refused a number of bids, saying they were too high.

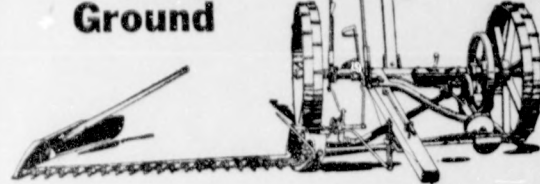

## Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

### Lesson for August 21

#### GOD'S PROMISE TO DAVID

LESSON TEXT—1 Chron. chapter 17.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Thy throne, O God, is forever and ever a sceptre of righteousness as the sceptre of thy kingdom.

PRIMARY TOPIC—God's Promise to David.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—How God Rewarded David.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—How God Gives Us the Better Things.

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—God's Great Promises.

#### I. David Desires to Build a House for God (vv. 1, 2).

Having subdued all his enemies, David sat down in his new and beautiful house to meditate. While thus musing, he is led to see the incongruity of dwelling in a house of cedar while the Lord's place was so common. A truly devout soul cannot be content to dwell in personal ease and luxury while the Lord's work is neglected. David's proposition met with Nathan's approval, but the next day he came with definite instructions from the Lord regarding it.

#### II. David's Desire Denied (vv. 3-8).

While fully appreciating David's motive, the Lord disapproved his plan. The rejection of his plan was not because of his nonappreciation of David, for He had taken him from the lowest walks of life and elevated him to the highest place among men. He assured him also that the cause would not suffer because of this change of plan. Two reasons may be assigned for God's prohibition of David's plan.

1. David was a man of war (1 Chron. 28:3).

Since the kingdom of God is to be a peaceful kingdom, it was not fitting that a man of war should build the capital city. This was not a reproach of David for being a man of war. The enemies of the Lord must of necessity be put down. No peace or rest could be to God's people till the enemies were subdued. It showed, rather, that David had done his work and that the time had now come for another to take it up.

2. The time and circumstances were not fully ripe.

God's house should be a great house, therefore it would require a man's best energies to build it. The nation's treasury was no doubt much depleted by the wars. Since much money would be required, ample time was necessary to enable the people to accumulate funds.

#### III. The Lord Pledged Himself to Do More Than David Proposed (vv. 9-15).

1. David was to have a great name (v. 8).

David's name has gone down in history as one of the great men of the earth. It was a long way from herding his father's sheep to the throne of this great nation.

2. Israel was to be established in a central place (v. 9).

The nation was not again to be moved away, nor to be wasted by the children of wickedness.

3. He was to enjoy God's continued favor and help (v. 10).

All his enemies were to be subdued.

4. Perpetuation of the kingdom in David's line (vv. 11-14).

(1) "Build thee a house."

This means a granting unto him of a posterity, a family line. David proposed to build a temple as a place in which to worship God. God purposed to establish the kingdom in David's line. This was to be perpetuated in David's seed after him.

(2) "Establish his throne" (v. 12).

This means the placing of him in a position of royal authority.

(3) The kingdom was to be perpetual (vv. 13, 14).

He was to be settled in his kingdom forever. Disobedience to God would be visited with chastisement (II Sam. 7:15), but the covenants were not to be abrogated. Chastisement has followed, but David's seed is destined to occupy the throne (Luke 1:31-33; Acts 13:14-17).

#### IV. David's Worship (vv. 16-27).

In his actual worship, note:

1. His humility (vv. 16-18).

Those who really worship God approach Him with great humility.

2. His praise (vv. 19, 20).

Out of a heart of gratitude he praised God for His faithfulness and grace.

3. His gratitude (vv. 21, 22).

He had an appreciation of God's fidelity and expressed his gratitude to Him for it.

4. His petition (vv. 23-27).

All praise and expressions of gratitude but lead up to the offering of definite petitions to God.

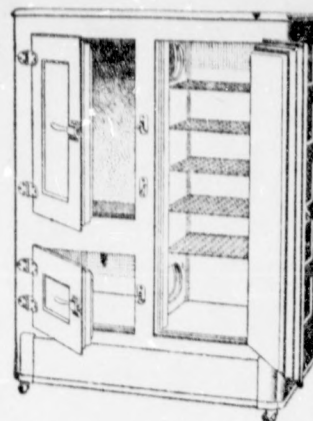
