Ordinance

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BENTON, KENTUCKY, ADOPTING A CERTAIN ORDINANCE WHICH WAS ADOPTED BY THE CITY OF BENTON, KENTUCKY, ON SEPTEMBER 8, 1952, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF "CITY OF BENTON WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BONDS," BY RESOLVING SECTION (2), PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF CERTAIN OUTSTANDING BONDS ON JANUARY 1, 1953, BY AUTHORIZING AND DEDICATING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF SAID OUTSTANDING BONDS AT A LATER DATE, BY PROVIDING INTEREST DURING CONSTRUCTION PERIOD ASIDE FROM BONDS; AND BY AUTHORIZING THE PAYMENT OF AN ADDITIONAL NOTE FROM PROCEEDS.

WHEREAS, at a meeting held on September 8, 1952, the City of Benton, Kentucky, adopted a certain ordinance which is identified by the title or caption as follows: "ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BENTON, KENTUCKY, COMBINE THE EXISTING MUNICIPAL OWNED WATER SYSTEM AND SEWER SYSTEM TO CERTAIN ECONOMIC ADVANTAGES, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$360,000.00 OF "CITY OF BENTON WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BONDS" TO COVER THE COST OF EXTENSIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS TO SAID COMBINED CONSOLIDATED SYSTEM ALSO TO REFINANCE OUTSTANDING BONDS PAYABLE FROM SEWER REVENUES AND WATER REVENUES; PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION, SEGREGATION AND POSITION OF THE REVENUE OF SAID COMBINED CONSOLIDATED SYSTEM; AND PROVIDING FOR SALE OF SAID BONDS AT PUBLIC ADVERTISED SALE," and said ordinance was duly adopted by the Mayor, and is now in full force and effect, and

WHEREAS, provision was made in Section (16) of said ordinance for the selling of said bonds at an advertised public competitive sale and it was contemplated at that time that such sale would be held within a few weeks from and after the adoption of said ordinance, but the sale of said bonds was unavoidably delayed by certain pending litigation involving the right and power of said city to issue said bonds without first obtaining the approval of the voters at an election held for that purpose, and

WHEREAS, said litigation styled "B. L. Trevathan et al v City of Benton" was finally terminated in favor of said city's contentions by the entry of a final judgment by Marshall Circuit Court on or about November 19, 1952, and it is the purpose of the City Council to advertise and offer said bonds for sale in the near future now that bids for the construction of the authorized extensions and improvements to the combined and consolidated municipally-owned water and sewer system have been received, and

WHEREAS, in anticipation of an earlier sale of said bonds, it was provided in Section (2) of the above identified ordinance that the city would redeem and retire on January 1, 1953, all of its outstanding and unpaid "City of Benton Sewer Revenue Bonds" issued under date of July 1, 1947, and all of its outstanding and unpaid "City of Benton Waterworks Revenue Refunding Bonds" issued under date of January 1, 1943, using for that purpose a part of the proceeds of the sale of said new bonds, and

WHEREAS, it is now impossible to advertise and sell said bonds and to deliver the same to the purchaser thereof and receive the proceeds in time for the redemption and retirement of said bonds on January 1, 1953, and in any event, by reason of the circumstances herein described, the required notices were not published 30 days in advance of said date, as set forth in said bonds and in the respective ordinance authorizing the issuance thereof, and

WHEREAS, it is also desirable to amend said ordinance to provide that there shall be set aside from bond proceeds a sum equal to the interest which it is estimated will accrue while under construction, together with a sum to retire an outstanding \$3,000.00 note issued in connection with sewer improvements heretofore completed, and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BENTON, KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The said ordinance which was adopted on September 8, 1952, and which is identified by its title or caption as set forth in the preamble of this ordinance is hereby amended by rescinding, amending and re-enacting Section (2) thereof so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 2. At such time as said City of Benton shall have sold all or a part of the bonds hereinafter authorized by this ordinance and shall have delivered the same to the purchaser or purchasers thereof, and shall have received the proceeds a sum sufficient to provide for the redemption and retirement of all outstanding and unpaid "City of Benton Sewer Revenue Bonds" issued by said City under date of July 1, 1947, and all of the outstanding and unpaid "City of Benton Waterworks Revenue Refunding Bonds" issued by said city under date of January 1, 1943, including interest to the next ensuing interest payment date and any premiums or additional interest incident to the redemption and retirement of said outstanding bonds on the next ensuing interest payment date, shall be set aside from the proceeds of said "City of Benton Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds" and deposited in escrow in Bank of Marshall County as set forth in Section (6) of this ordinance, and the moneys so set aside in escrow shall be applied solely to the redemption and retirement of all of said outstanding bonds on such next ensuing interest payment date."

The City of Benton, Kentucky, hereby elects to and does call in for redemption and retirement on the first interest payment date after receipt by said city of the proceeds of said "City of Benton Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds," all of said outstanding and unpaid bonds of the two series identified in this Section (2) of this ordinance. At the proper time and without further authorization by the City Council, the Mayor and City Clerk shall execute proper notices of the city's election to redeem and retire said outstanding bonds, in such form as the City Attorney may approve and shall cause the same to be published in such manner and in such newspapers or other publications as may be required by the terms and provisions in said outstanding bonds and in the respective ordinance which authorized the issuance thereof.

SECTION 2. Section (6) of said ordinance which was adopted on September 8, 1952, and which is identified by its title or caption as set forth in the preamble of this ordinance is hereby amended by changing the period at the end of the first sentence of said section to a comma, and by adding to said sentence an additional passage as follows:

"together with an additional sum from bond proceeds so that the total amount so deposited shall be equal to all interest which will accrue with respect to bonds numbered 1 to 350 inclusive until November 1, 1953, at the interest coupon rates which are established and made applicable to said bonds when the same are publicly sold."

Said Section (6) is further amended by inserting between the end of the third sentence thereof and the beginning of the fourth sentence thereof, an additional sentence as follows: "Thereafter there shall be paid a certain promissory note of the City of Benton in the sum of \$3,000.00 held by R. E. Gaddie in connection with an unpaid balance of its contract price for sewer improvement work performed in the year 1948, together with accrued and

unpaid interest thereon to the date of payment; such payment to be made simultaneously with the surrender of said note to the City Treasurer who shall thereupon cancel the same."

SECTION 3. In all other respects, said ordinance which was adopted on September 8, 1952, as identified by its title or caption in the preamble of this ordinance, is ratified, confirmed and shall continue in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. In order that the attention of any and all interested parties may be called to the amendatory ordinance, the City Clerk is directed to make a notation on the Ordinance Book adjacent to the title or caption of said ordinance, which was adopted on September 8, 1952, and which is identified by its title or caption in the preamble of this ordinance, such notation to be substantially as follows:

"See amendatory ordinance adopted by the City Council at a meeting held on the 5 day of January 1953."

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption, approval and publication, as provided by law.

Adopted by the City Council at a meeting held on the 5 day of January, 1953, on the same occasion signed in open session by the Mayor as evidence of his approval, attested under seal by the City Clerk, and ordered published in the Marshall Courier in the earliest possible issue thereof.
