Complete wedding plans will be announced at a later date.





Frankfort - All hunters and fishermen are warned that new licenses were due on Jan. 1. Both hunting and fishing licenses are valid for the calendar year and expire automatically on Jan. 1.

The rabbit and quail hunting season does not close until Jan. 18, while the duck season ends on January 10.

Statewide licenses must be held to take this game after Dec. 31. However, the duck stamp is valid throughout the season.

All fishing licenses expire at midnight, Dec. 31, and 1953 licenses must be procured before fishing in the new year.

# OPEN HOUSE JAN. 9, 10

The West Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative wishes to announce they are holding Open House on January 9, and 10, 1953 between the hours of 9:00 a. m. and 4:00 p. m. on both days. This will be held in the new headquarters building which was just completed at 1218 West Broadway, Mayfield, Ky. The General Contractor for the building was Hal Perry of Benton, Kentucky.

The Cooperative was organized in 1938 with the purpose in mind of supplying central station electric service to all the farms and homes in the area served by them. The Cooperative serves the counties of Graves, Carlisle, Hickman, Marshall and Calloway. The Cooperative at present is serving almost 12,000 members in this area. It is the third largest electric cooperative in the State of Kentucky.

At the time the Cooperative was organized, less than ten percent of the rural homes in this section were receiving electric service. Today, approximately ninety percent of the homes and farms in this area are receiving electricity.

Prior to the building of the new headquarters the Cooperative's office was located in an old residence at 305 East Broadway. Due to the increased number of members served, it was impossible to give the type of service the Board of Directors felt our members deserved. A modern headquarters building has been constructed with ample parking space and the public is invited to attend open house.

The directors wished to emphasize that this building belongs to the members who are served by the West Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation. New personnel has been added to the staff to aid the members in better use of electricity in the home and on the farm. We have a full time home economist to assist in kitchen planning and the use of electrical appliances in the home. We also have an electrification advisor to help the members toward better use of electricity in the home and on the farm.




**JAMES B. BRIEN**


