Factory Ready to Take Applications for Jobs

Power Plant Net Is \$15,708

Benton's municipally owned electric power plant had a net income of \$15,708 during the 1952 fiscal year.

This information is contained in an annual report prepared by TVA summarizing the financial operations of its 146 local electric systems for the year ended June 30, 1952.

The report showed the Benton system had assets of \$188,431. Operating revenue for the year amounted to \$77,603 and operating expenses plus taxes and depreciation amounted to \$59,068, leaving a gross income of \$18,535. Net income was \$15,708.

The Benton plant, which has been distributing TVA electricity for seven years, sold 5,491,000 kilowatt hours of electricity during the last fiscal year. Total number of customers now is 1,039.

The TVA's 146 electric systems served 1,226,000 consumers during the year and sold 9,000,000,000 kilowatt hours, which is a new record. Sales last fiscal year were three times more than during the peak year of World War 2.

About 57,000 homes, farms and other consumers were added during the year. Revenue amounted to \$103,000,000 and net income was \$17,400,000.

An Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BENTON, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING THE INTEREST COUPON RATES WHICH SHALL BE APPLICABLE TO \$350,000.00 OF "CITY OF BENTON WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BONDS", BEING A PART OF THE SERIES AUTHORIZED BY AN ORDINANCE ADOPTED ON SEPTEMBER 8, 1952, AS AMENDED BY AN ORDINANCE ADOPTED ON JANUARY 5, 1953.

The City Council of the City of Benton, Kentucky, hereby ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. The 350 Bonds, each of the denomination of \$1,000.00, identified by numbers and maturities in the schedule appearing below, and constituting a part of a series of "City of Benton Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds", as authorized by an ordinance adopted on September 8, 1952, as amended by an ordinance adopted on January 5, 1953, shall bear interest from their date until paid at the following respective coupon rates:

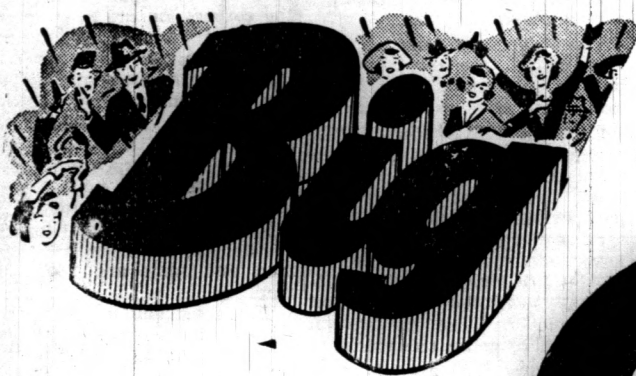

Applications are Available For Tobacco Allotments

Marshall County farmers may now fill out applications for new farm tobacco allotments if they will come to the Marshall County PMA Office on or before Jan. 31, 1953.

To be eligible for a new tobacco allotment, the farm or farmer must meet the following requirements:

1. The applicant must be the bonafide operator of the entire farm.
2. The farm operator shall live on and be largely dependent for his livelihood on the farm covered by the application.
3. The farm covered by the application shall be the only farm owned or operated by either the owner or operator for which an allotment of the type requested will be established for 1953.
4. The operator shall have had at least two years experience in growing the kind of tobacco for which an allotment is requested as tenant, share-

cropper, or as operator during the past five years.

If applicant is a veteran, only one year's experience is required. To qualify under the operator must be a veteran who was in the armed services after Sept. 16, 1940. He must have had at least one year of experience during the five-year period immediately prior to his entry into service or during the five-year period immediately following his discharge from the armed services.

A veteran must file his application within five crop years from the date of his discharge, to qualify under the veterans provision.

5. The final date for filing new grower applications in the PMA Office is January 31, 1953. For additional information, contact your PMA Office.

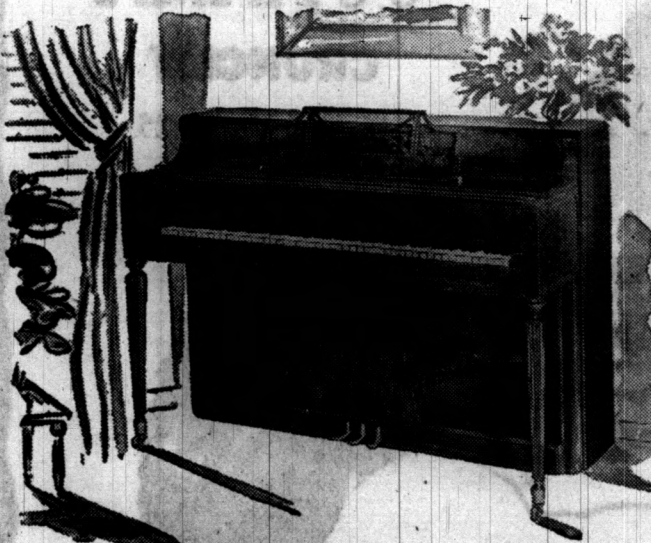

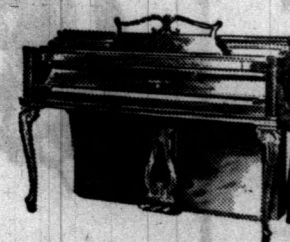

18, March 4, March 18 and April 1. Applications for these seedlings must be received at least two weeks before the delivery date or trees cannot be delivered until a following shipment. The applications may be secured at the PMA and SCS offices as well as the County Agent's office.

If farmers want to get PMA payments for tree planting, they must declare this practice for 1953. The trees will be received free of charge, but no payment for planting can be expected from the PMA unless this has been done.

Mr. Miller also states that the supply of free seedlings is short again this year. He suggests that landowners apply for trees immediately, choosing any of the four dates for delivery.

Paducah Dry Goods Company and the Gladys Shops were destroyed last night in the costliest fire in Paducah's history. Huge flames roared through the two buildings, at 4th St. and Broadway, while the entire fire department fought desperately to keep them from spreading. There was no official estimate of the loss. Theoretical estimates put it at more than \$1,000,000 and including damage to other buildings from heat, smoke and crumbling walls. Only one fireman was injured, although he and four companions narrowly escaped death. Nobody could recall a more costly fire in Paducah. The dry goods company had just finished a \$250,000 remodeling job. The store had 600 remodeling jobs. The store had already stocked a large amount of spring merchandise.

Hot Fudge Pudding
 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup cocoa 1/2 cup boiling water
 1/2 cup milk 2 Tablespoons Fat
 1/2 cup flour 2 Tablespoons water
 all-purpose flour 4 Tablespoons melted shortening
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 Mix 1/2 cup sugar and 2 Tablespoons cocoa in small bowl. Stir in boiling water slowly. When smooth, stir in 1/2 cup milk. Let stand until needed. Sift together into a large bowl the flour, 1/2 cup sugar, baking powder, 2 Tablespoons cocoa and the salt. Fold in nuts. Mix rest of ingredients. Add all at once to flour mixture. Mix quickly but thoroughly. Spread in greased deep 8-inch pie pan. Pour cocoa mixture over top. Do not mix in. Bake 20 minutes on center rack of moderately slow oven (350), or until cake is firm to the touch. Serve warm with the fudge sauce which will be in the bottom of the pan. Makes 4 servings.
