

### County Plans 2 New Structures

The Marshall County Board of Education in session last Saturday voted to place before the voters of the county the proposal to build two new consolidated high schools in the county.

The election was approved Monday by Fiscal Court and will be held March 7.

The building program proposes the erection of two schools, one in the north end of the county and one in the south end. Exact locations for the schools have not been chosen.

The two new schools would cost from \$550,000 to \$800,000. To raise this money taxes would be increased from five to 50 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

Benton Plans New Buildings, Too

The Benton Independent School District also plans a building program. The Benton Board of Education in session Monday night voted to carry a building proposal to the voters of the three precincts of Benton.

The Benton Board of Education wants to spend \$125,000 to \$140,000 to erect a new building which would house a gymnasium, a cafeteria, four new classrooms and a music department. The music department would be located in quarters under the stage of the auditorium.

To raise the building funds, the City Board of Education proposes also an increase in taxes of five to 50 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The Benton election also will be held March 7. The election was approved Tuesday by the City Council.

Tax Situation Is Explained

The Benton tax would apply only to residents of the city and the county tax would apply only to county residents living outside of Benton. Benton Independent School District is a completely separate organization from the county school system.

Site for the proposed Benton building has not yet been chosen, although it is certain to be in the neighborhood of Benton High School.

In both elections, the polls will open at 6 a. m. and close at 5 p. m. These are Kentucky's new voting hours.

Any registered voter may vote in the two school elections. But you must be a registered voter. Each person will vote in the precinct in which he is accustomed to vote.

Benton citizens will vote at the city's three precincts — S. Benton, West Benton and N. Benton.

County citizens will vote at their usual precincts — Olive, Ross, Heights, Birmingham, Briensburg, Scale, Gilbertsville, Calvert City, Little Cypress, Sharpe, Palma, Oak Level, Harvey, Brewers, Hardin, Price and Elva.

Joe Duke, superintendent of Benton schools, explained the city's proposed school building program to members of the Lions Club Tuesday night. Duke will speak to the Rotary Club Friday night.

The county's building proposal calls for each new school building to consist of 11 classrooms, a combination study hall-library, cafeteria, two rest rooms, general office, gymnasium-auditorium, showers and dressing rooms under the bleachers, and music rooms under the stages.

Each building would be identical construction.



## Heavier Trucks on Roads Assailed

The heavier a truck, the more damage it causes to a highway, the Highway Research Council reported recently in summarizing results of a test conducted in Maryland. Cracking of roads under heavy loads increases also, the report stated, with speed.

The Council's conclusions were based upon results of a six month's test over a 1.1 mile strip of concrete highway near La Plata, Maryland, during which trucks of four weights were driven almost steadily over four lanes of roadway.

The loads were 18,000 and 22-400 pounds on a single axle, and 22,000 and 44,800 pounds on tan-

dem axles. Final report of the test showed the 22,400-pound load caused 6.4 times as much cracking of the highway as the 18,000-pound load, while the 44,800-pound load, 12.3 times as much, cracking as the 22,000-pound load.

Thomas MacDonald, U.S. Commissioner of Public Roads, recently estimated more than one-third of the total ton-mileage transported by trucks exceeded the legal weight load limit of the states in which the trucks operated.

Kentucky law permits a maximum weight of 42,000 pounds to be hauled by the giant high-

way freighters, which constitutes too heavy a burden, authorities agree, for the State's many miles of blacktop roads and which, as shown by the Maryland test, is sufficient to break down concrete highways. Enforcement of the law to prevent hauling of illegal loads is much cheaper than building new roads, at \$46,000, or more a mile, or than rebuilding roads which have given away speedily under illegal truck abuse, authorities agree.

### No Favorites

Lesson for February 15, 1953

NOBODY loves a "teacher's pet." No teacher should have one; just as no father or mother should have a "pet" child. We all feel that everybody should be treated alike. And yet, strange to say, when it comes to religion, many a person who wouldn't be a teacher's pet for anything, will believe and hope that he is one of God's pets. All of us have this wish at times. We like to feel that God won't deal with us strictly that he will let down the rules for us a little. We like to think of ourselves as special cases, we like to feel we have the inside track, or the "pipeline to God." But it won't do. God has no special favorites.

#### Fatal Mistake

It is a fatal mistake to think that God is bound to look out for ME, no matter what. In the time of Jesus, the leaders of his people thought God was just bound to give them the front seats in his kingdom. For one thing, those Jewish leaders were proud of their ancestors. On their family tree were men like Abraham, Samuel, Moses, David and Jesus. The aristocrats of Jesus' time thought, "Since we belong to the same family as those who have served God so well, surely God will show US special favors! But God does not grant special privileges merely on account of a family tree. There are people today who will tell you, "Yes, my people for three generations have belonged to this church. My great-grandfather helped to build it. My good old mother just about wore her Bible out. I can show you if I could find it, and somewhere."

But Jesus would hold out any hope that you could secure a seat by the Throne on Abraham's ticket, or your dear old grandmother's, or any one else who happens to be high on your family tree. Then for another thing, those stuffed-shirt Pharisees thought God owed them something because of the positions they held. They had the front seats in the synagogues; every one got up when they came in. They seem to have got the idea that even God would get up when they arrived in heaven. But Jesus gave no encouragement to that notion either.

#### Promises "If—"

Another reason why these prominent men thought they had a sort of first mortgage on the Kingdom of Heaven was that they misunderstood the promises of God. Many promises of blessings, wonderful blessings, had been made to the people of Israel by prophet after prophet. These promises are still to be read in the Old Testament. Where the chief priests and all that crowd made their mistake was at two points. One: they supposed that these were promises "no matter what," promises without conditions, without any strings attached. God would give Israel all these blessings, they reasoned; they belonged to Israel, therefore they would share the blessings.

#### Christ or Chaos

Again these men were mistaken in supposing they could claim God's blessings and yet reject God's Son. The basic trouble with those big men of Jerusalem, and the people they influenced, was that they did not want Jesus. They did not want him, his ideas, his leadership; they had no notion at all of his sacrifice. Living or dying they had no use for him, and so they perished. Those who reject the living Grace of God have to suffer the consequences. Christ is still the test of community and nation. The people who welcome him, live by him, have enduring life. The kind of people who turn him away and try to destroy what he gave his life for, will themselves be destroyed. ## Corn Meal and Molasses Offer Valentine Treat

The versatile corn meal that kept America's colonists alive during their first winter in this country makes a delightful Valentine treat when combined with molasses, or sorghum, cinnamon, ginger and milk to make an Indian Pudding. Topped with vanilla ice cream, it is an attractive and healthful dessert, especially for the youngsters.

Indian Pudding is almost as old as America, itself, for it was another use of corn meal developed by the early settlers. Even early day recipes specified milk as the liquid, and the addition of an egg to increase the healthful qualities of this dessert.

The ice cream, of course, is a more modern touch, but it is an outgrowth of the earlier practice of serving Indian Pudding with cool cream, or a hard sauce, poured over it. This dessert may be served warm or cold, no matter what topping is used.

Men like Indian Pudding with a big scoop of vanilla ice cream. Children will regard it as a special Valentine's Day treat if the ice cream is first shaped in a heart mold.

**Indian Pudding**  
1/2 cup corn meal  
1 quart hot milk  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 egg, well beaten  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1/4 cup light molasses (or sorghum)



1/4 teaspoon cinnamon (optional)  
1/4 teaspoon ginger (optional)  
1 cup cold milk

Add corn meal slowly to scalding milk, stirring constantly. Heat to boiling and boil until thickened, about 10 minutes. Add butter and mix. Combine remaining ingredients except cold milk and mix with corn meal mixture. Pour into a well-buttered 1 1/2-quart casserole and bake 1/2 hour in slow oven, 300° F. Add the cold milk, stir, and continue baking for 2 hours. Serve warm or cold with ice cream, cream, or hard sauce. Yield: 6 servings.
