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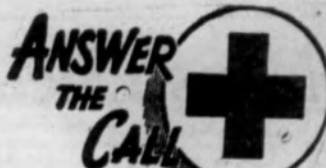

Public Showing of Automatic Baler At Roberts Motor Co.

First public showing of the New Holland Model 66 automatic twine-tying baler will be held Saturday, March 14, at the Roberts Motor and Implement Co., Benton.

Long-awaited by farmers with smaller hay acreages, the Model 66 is a low-cost, compact baler designed particularly for these farmers.

Outstanding feature of the new Model 66 is its pre-compression action, a brand new principle in baling which increases the machine's capacity. Engineers say this is one of the biggest developments in balers since the introduction of the automatic baler in New Holland in 1940.

The Model 66 has been tested in all parts of the country and in all baled crops -- dry, semi-cured and green. It weighs 2,500 pounds and is powered by a 2-cylinder engine. It produces slices of hay measuring 14 by 18 inches and adjustable in length to 30, 36 and 42 inches.

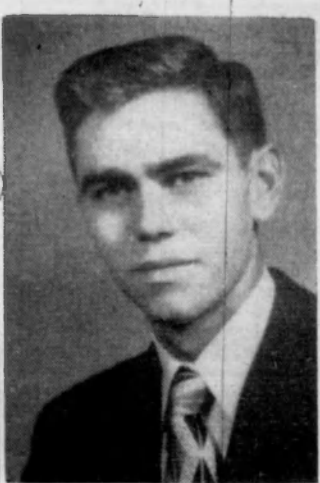


ROSS LENEAVE

Tax Issue Defeated In The County

Benton voters last Saturday approved a special tax for school improvements, but a similar proposal for the county school system was defeated.

The vote in the Benton Independent School District was: For -- 454.

Against -- 170.

In the county the vote was: For -- 745.

Against -- 1,261.

The Benton Board of Education plans to spend \$125,000 to \$140,000 to build a cafeteria, a gymnasium, an auditorium, a band room and four new classrooms.

The county's proposal carried in four precincts, was defeated in 15 precincts and in one precinct there was a tie vote.

Precincts favoring the plan were Gilbertsville, 75 to 24; Little Cypress, 45 to 28; Sharpsburg 74 to 57, and Palma 51 to 34.

The tie vote was at Scale, 40 to 40.

Calvert City opposed the plan 155 to 135. Other precincts voting against it were Hardin, 119 to 43; Brewster 69 to 29; Briansburg 109 to 83; Birmingham 10 to 10; Heights, 68 to 13; Ross, 56 to 29; Olive 116 to 12; Harvey 64 to 10; Price, 31 to 7; Elva, 27 to 4; Oak Level 82 to 6; West Benton 37 to 16; North Benton, 60 to 19; South Benton, 63 to 44.

Plans for the new school building in Benton now are being drawn by Perry Foster, architect.

As soon as possible, bids will be taken and contracts let for construction of the building.

Superintendent Joe Duke says he has hopes of having the building completed by the beginning of the second semester of the 1953-54 school term.

The county proposal had called for the erection of two new consolidated schools to replace the four high schools now operating in the county.

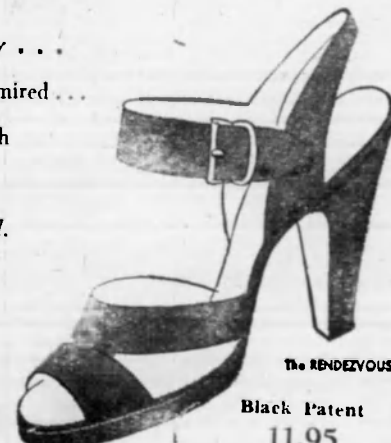

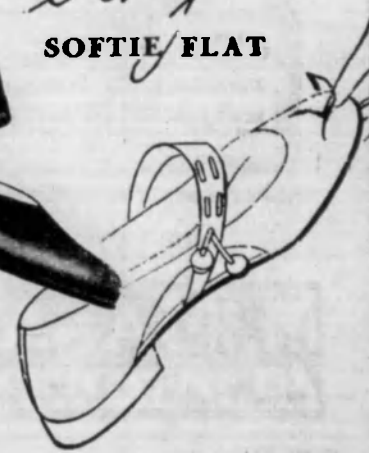

County Soil Conservation Notes

by Herbert Anderson

Quitman Fiser, south of Briensburg, also was lucky enough to get a pond dug last week. The ground was more sticky than English said. "We have always needed a pond over on the south side of the farm. The cattle have done without water rather than walk to the barn to get a drink." The Soil Conservation Service helped him stake the pond on Feb. 16.

Fiser has had several ponds dug before and they would not hold water because of gravel. One leaked because no core trench filled with clay was fixed under the dam.

Raymond Powell west of New Harmony, came into the SCS office and ordered 1,000 bicolor lespedeza and 500 multiflora rose plants. He has about an acre of idle land surrounded by woods where he plans to set them.

Cordie Henson, east of Benton, has ordered 3,000 more bicolor and 500 rose plants. These plants are furnished free by the Department of Fish and Wildlife for the growing of food and cover for wildlife.

Arlie Holland has cleared ten acres of land on his mother's farm, Mrs. Minnie Holland, south of Bethel Church.

The land is steep and eroded, so it will be used for permanent pasture. By fertilizing well and avoiding overgrazing the land can be improved.

Ernest Elrod, on the Symonia road near the Graves County Line, has also used a bulldozer to clear several acres of land. After clearing, the bulldozer pulled a heavy plowing disc over the land to start the preparation of the seedbed.

Land which is cleared to qualify for payment from the PMA must be land which is suited for permanent pasture. Some land is too steep and badly gullied to be cleared. Rather it needs to be left in timber or reset in trees of more value.

Kenneth McGregor, west of Benton on the Oak Level Road, received a land capability map for his farm last month. The map was prepared by an SCS soils scientist. These maps are prepared for all cooperators of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District.

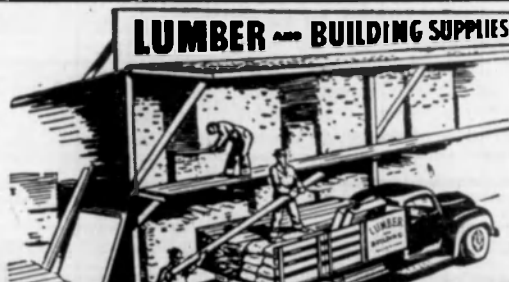
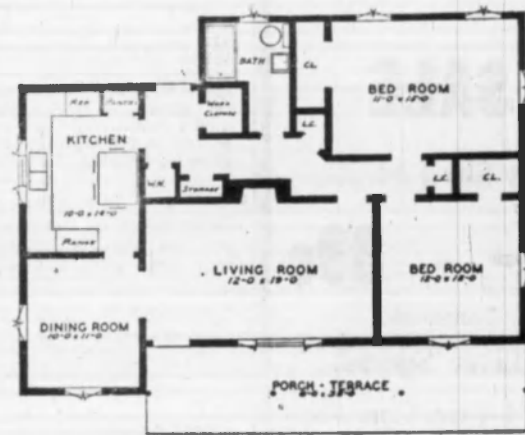
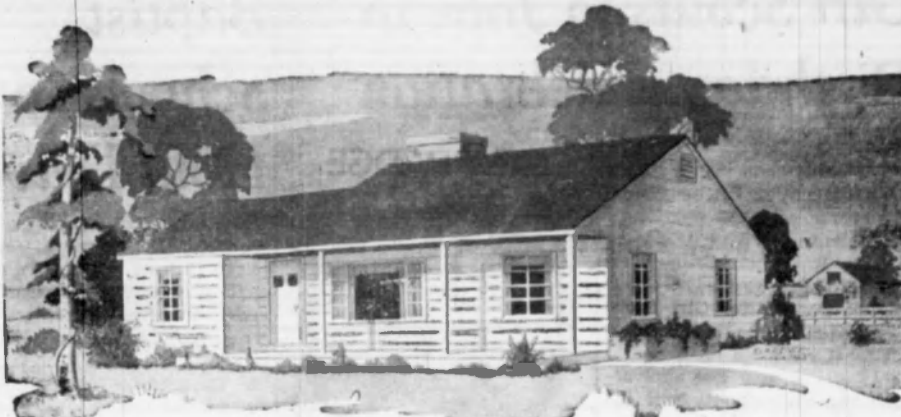

Simplicity in framing and roof means that there is much less effort in laying out the foundations, cutting the framing, etc.

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Cookies Just Right For Evening at 10



Years of public opinion lately noted that television has brought about a fine "back to the home" movement in America, because it now is possible for the whole family to have excellent entertainment in the evenings especially, without leaving the house. This has brought about a new chance for Mother to show her culinary ingenuity, in providing special "snacks" the family can enjoy—Dad, Mom and the youngster—in the mid-evening. A ready solution to the need is given by Mince Meat Cookies, served with milk or hot chocolate, tea or coffee as the various members of the family desire. They're rich in energy-giving fats, tasty, and easy to make and serve. Here's how:

Mince Meat Oatmeal Cookies
 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
 1/2 teaspoon soda
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 cup sugar
 1 egg
 1/2 cup None Such Mince Meat from 28-oz. glass jar
 1/2 cup rolled oats
 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 Sift flour, measure and sift again with soda and salt. Cream shortening. Gradually add sugar, creaming until light and fluffy. Beat in egg. Add nuts alternately with mince meat, stirring after each addition until well blended. Stir in rolled oats and nuts. Drop from teaspoon onto greased cookie sheet, about 2 inches apart. Bake in moderately hot oven (400°) 10 to 12 minutes. Make a dozen cookies.

Accountable to God

Lesson for March 15, 1953

WE all know that "responsible" is a good word, even if we might have a hard time saying exactly what it means. A person feels responsible when he knows that it's up to him to make good, and knows that some one will have the right to ask him: What about it? Somebody knows about this job I am doing, somebody cares, so I will have to give him an account of what I have done. I shall have to satisfy him that I have done my best. If I fail, he will lay me out for it. If I succeed, he will praise me and see that I get my reward.

The Irresponsible

People shift into grades, just as peas or potatoes do, only not on the basis of size. People can be graded according to their sense of responsibility. At the bottom of the human heap are the irresponsible. This doesn't include babies and idiots, who can't help it. The irresponsible who really cause trouble in the world are the people who ought to be responsible, but aren't. They can't be depended on to do any job well, or at all. They never hold any job long. They have no pride in their work, no self-respect. They never carry their end of the log, they neither work nor worry, and they are no good.

Some distance above the irresponsible type are those who will give an accounting only to themselves. They don't like supervision, they don't like to ask if what they are doing satisfies anybody but themselves. They don't want their work or their lives inspected. If they suit themselves that is all they ask. Such persons make good artists, but they are too often undependable and antisocial, because they just don't care what other people think. It is a childish attitude, after all. We all go through this stage; but if we don't pass beyond it we really cannot call ourselves grown up.

"Is He Well Liked?" On a higher level are those whose "boss" is popular opinion. Willy, in "The Death of a Salesman," keeps asking the same two questions about everybody: "Is he liked?" and "Is he well liked?" Willy would feel the world caving in on him if he could not say "yes" to both questions about himself. One thing that makes "Death of a Salesman" one of the most moving tragedies of our time, is that a man can be well liked and still a failure. Popular opinion makes a poor boss.

Above Willy's level are those who feel accountable, not to everybody and anybody, but to the "best people." If they can satisfy a small but select group they are quite contented.

If such a person is an artist, he will crave a good word from perhaps just one discriminating critic. If he is a legislator, he will receive special gifts from special people and he will vote to please those people. These persons may have high standards (it depends on the kind of people they try to please) but they do not often serve the public well, just because they really don't care for the public nor for what people may think.

To God Alone There is after all, one final Judge. There is One whom all men are responsible, to whom we must give an account of ourselves. At the very top grade of humanity are those whose heart's deep prayer is to be pleasing to God. This is the highest form that responsibility can take.

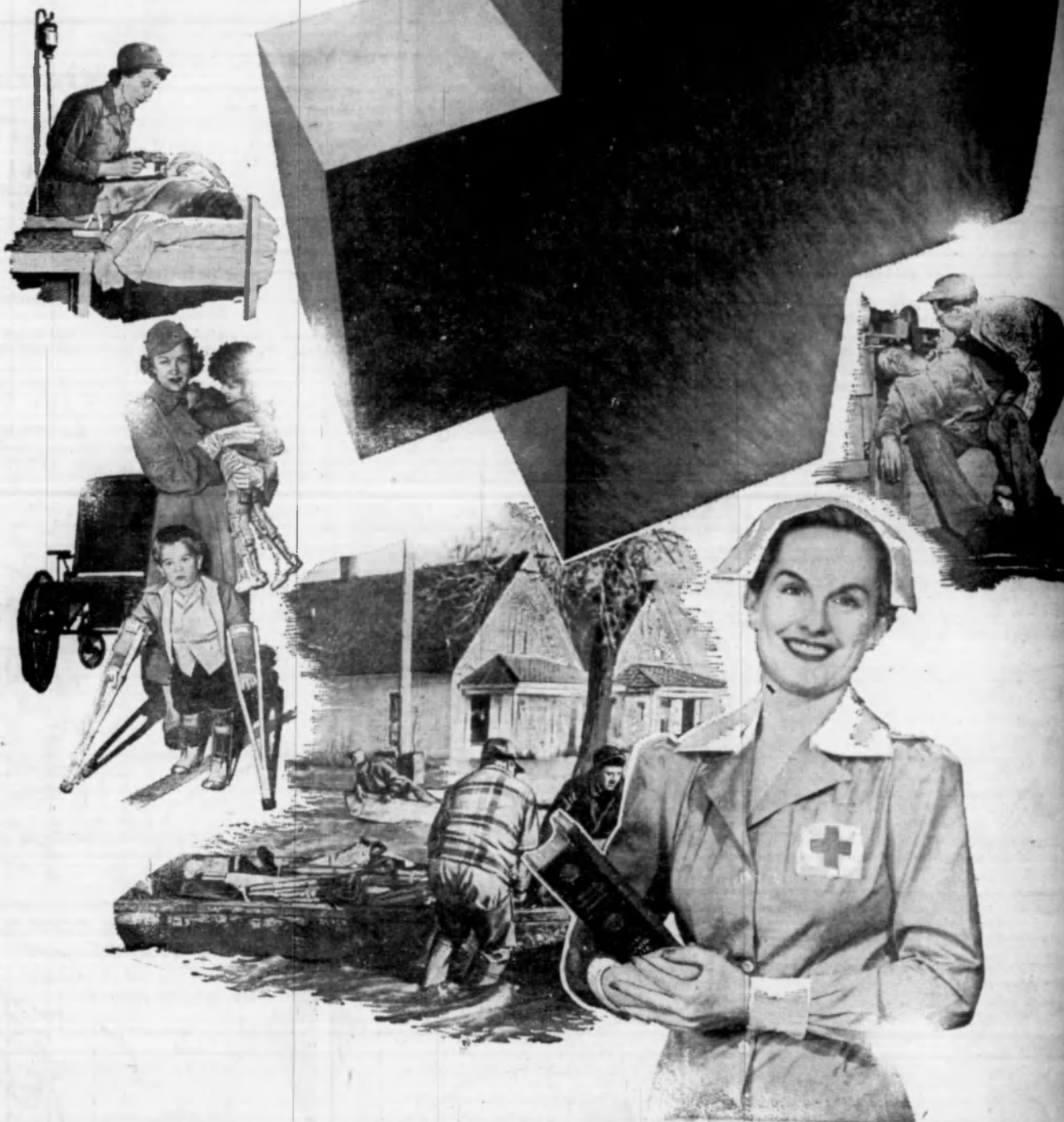
Now this need not be in conflict with accountability to man. Only a stupid hired man would say to the farmer: "I don't care whether you like the way I handle the tractor. I'm working to please God, not you." A person who will not do his best on his job is not likely to please the Lord. Nevertheless, in the long run, it is God's voice we shall all have to hear, and his verdict is what will count. And as Jesus so vividly prophesied, the thing God wants most to inquire about is how we treated our fellow-men.

Humanity is everybody's business. No matter how well we may please our various bosses in this world, or how well we do our particular jobs, we shall not be a success, after all, if we have failed in God's eyes.
