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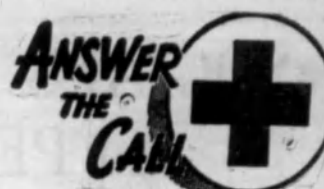

Arrests Halt Wave of Burglaries In County

Van Roberts Family in Car Wreck

Mr. and Mrs. Van Roberts and their son, Mark, narrowly escaped with their lives Tuesday afternoon in a traffic accident on the Mayfield road. The Roberts family had been to visit Mr. Roberts' mother, Mrs. Beulah Roberts, and were returning to Benton at the time of the crash. Mr. Roberts, who was driving, said he pulled out on the highway after leaving his mother's home, and had driven about 1,000 feet when his vehicle was hit from the rear by a heavy dump truck. The Roberts auto did a complete flip, Mr. Roberts said, and landed on its side. The three members of the family were pinned in the vehicle for a time. Mrs. Roberts was x-rayed for injuries at a doctor's office here. Mark received cuts and bruises in the crash. Mr. Roberts swore out a warrant charging the truck driver with reckless driving. The truck was owned by a Mr. Wilson, operator of a fleet of vehicles that haul lime rock. Name of the truck driver was not learned.

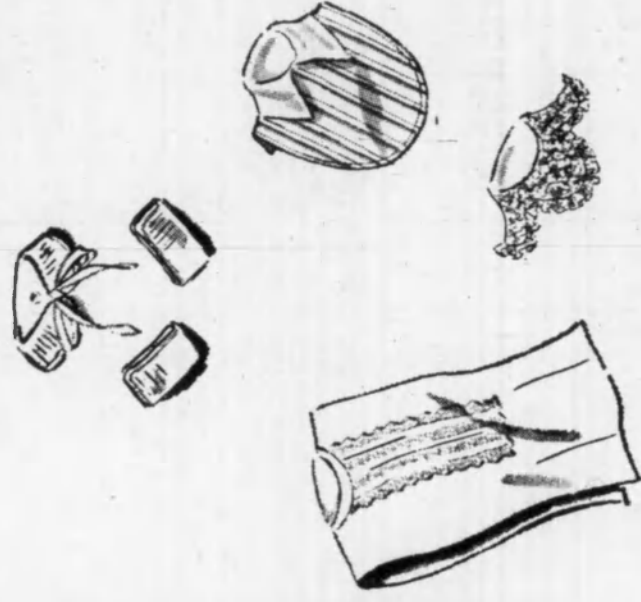

New drug, called Aapresoline, holds out hope to millions of high blood pressure sufferers.

High Blood Pressure Can Be Controlled

One out of four adults in this country has high blood pressure. Dr. Edgar V. Allen of the Mayo Clinic estimates. Next to hardening of the arteries, it is our most serious disease. Up to now, very little could be done to control it. We still do not know its causes. Crisp Sugar Cookies

1 1/2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1/2 cup soft shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup fat
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar

Sift together onto piece of paper the flour, baking powder and salt. Put shortening and vanilla into a bowl. Add 1/4 cup sugar gradually, mixing until light and fluffy. Stir in about 1/2 of flour mixture. Then stir in about 1/2 of the milk. Stir in half of rest of flour mixture. Stir in rest of milk mixture. Add the flour mixture that is left and mix well. Roll 1/4-inch thick on floured board. Cut into rounds with floured 3-inch cutter. Put on greased flat cookie pan. Sprinkle tops with rest of sugar. Bake 10 minutes on rack slightly above center of moderate oven (375°), or until lightly browned. Remove from pan at once. Makes 2 dozen.

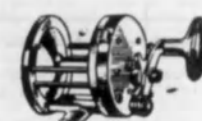

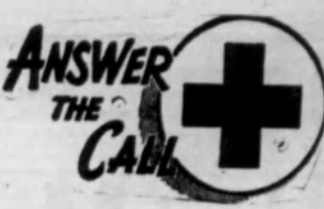

151 Crippled Children in Marshall County Have Received Assistance

Examinations have been given
151 crippled children from Mar-

shall County since the Kentucky
Society for Crippled Children
was organized 30 years ago. Most
of this number have received
definite corrective treatment.

This was announced today by
Dr. S. L. Henson, local chairman
of the Easter Seal Campaign,
which opened March 5 and will
continue through April 5.

The examinations and treat-
ments were given, the chairman
explained, by the medical staff
of the Kentucky Crippled Chil-
dren Commission, official state
agency.

The commission was establish-
ed by the Legislature in 1924,
largely through influence of the
Society, at that time only one
year old itself.

The initial state appropriation
of \$10,000 for this purpose has
been increasing steadily, as a
result of continued efforts by
the Society; and state appor-
tations now are matched by
federal appropriations.

Still, a considerable portion
of the cost must be borne by the
Society, which in turn raises the
funds largely through the Easter
Seal Campaign.

Every year when state and
federal appropriations run out --
as they always do, the commission
must come to the Society for sup-
plementary funds.

Last year, the Society approv-
ed grants-in-aid totaling more
than \$48,000 to enable the Com-
mission to carry out its program.

This was the largest item in
the Society's \$193,677 program of
treatment, education and reha-
bilitation of crippled children
throughout the state.

All of the utility and easeful living that can be provided in a small five-room home is here. In the kitchen, there is 14 feet of counter or work space in addition to the kitchen table. This will mean that there is a large amount of base cabinet or storage space below the counter, also wall cabinets will be arranged on both sides of the window. The pantry gives ample space for food storage.

The bedrooms are of comfortable size. The large closet with its wide double doors will provide plenty of storage space.

Since the dining room is usually used to much less extent than some of the other rooms, it was designed small. However, a wide opening is suggested between it and the living room to make both rooms appear much larger. The living room is arranged so that it could serve also as a bedroom if three bedrooms are needed. It will afford privacy and is convenient to the bath.

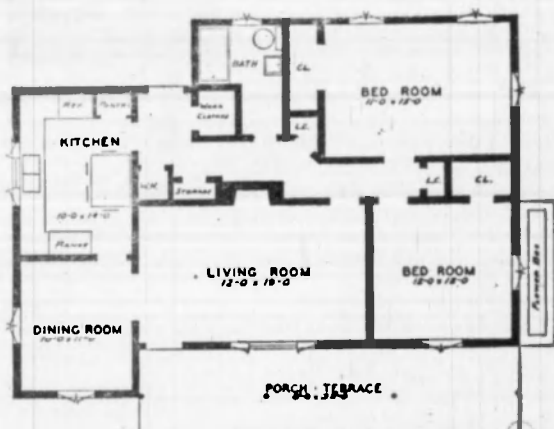
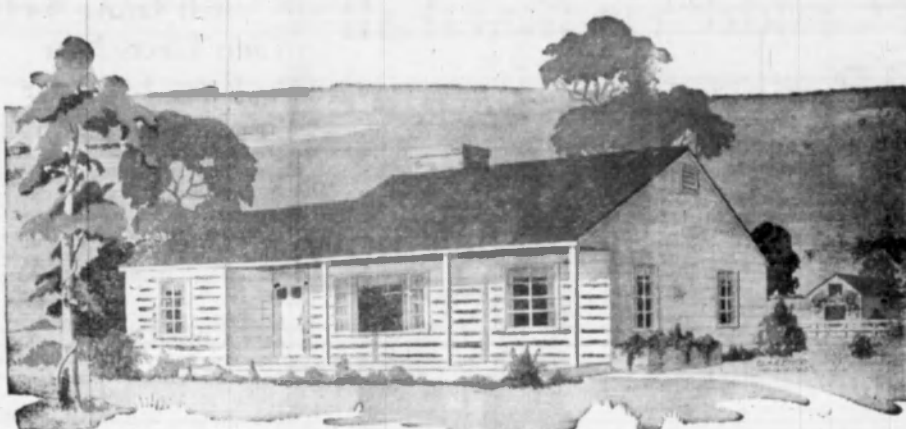
A back porch of work room can be added at the back entrance if desired.

Off the hall there are two linen closets and a storage closet. The large closet by the rear entrance provides an abundance of storage space for work clothes, raincoats, etc.

The water heater closet opening into this hall. This not only puts the heater between the bath and kitchen to cut down on the cost of plumbing, but also provides easy access for any care that it may need.

Although this house was designed for casement type windows, working drawings are such that other standard window units can be used. It is suggested, however, that windows which will stress the horizontal lines of the house should be used.

Simplicity in framing and roof means that there is much less effort in laying out the foundations, cutting the framing, etc.

Scripture: Matthew 26
Devotional Reading: John 10:7-18

In the Shadow

Lesson for March 22, 1953

SUPPOSE Jesus had died five seconds after he was born? What difference would it have made to the Christian religion? One of the most ancient Christian creeds says that the Son of God "was made man." Some theologians have supposed that the Christian religion would be no different if all we knew was that for one single instant the Eternal became man; that if Jesus had died five seconds after he was born, he would still have meant to us all that he can ever mean.

This is surely a grotesque mistake. The New Testament declares that the "word became flesh," that is, was made man; but that is only the start of the story. The four Gospels are there to tell us that the Word became Jesus. It makes all the difference in the world what kind of man God-in-the-flesh is.

Last Days Of Hitler

Adolf Hitler was one of the false leaders of men, as Jesus is the true one. They had nothing in common except that when each passed into the shadow of death, he knew it for what it was.

One of the most gruesome books of non-fiction is "The Last Days of Hitler." Dr. Foreman by H. R. Trevor-Roper (Macmillan 1947). The author, a British Intelligence officer, was sent to find out, from evidence fresh on the spot, what actually happened to Hitler in those last days in Berlin. The story is a terrible one, and the more so for being true. In the days of his glory, Hitler had seemed to millions of people to be a great man. But when the shadows fell, and his "thousand-year empire" was being crushed to powder by the armies of the free, then in the darkness of his underground bunker the real Hitler came out -- great only in madness and in evil.

Three monsters stalked his soul in those last hours. One was indifference to others, even cruelty; nothing disturbed him so much as his own fate. Another was revenge; forming at the mouth, he ranted about the terrible things he would do to all who were against him. Ugly mother of these other two was Fear. He spoke of glory, but his heart was not in it. His words and acts were proud and cruel, but his mind's eye must have seen already the red flames over his forsaken corpse.

How Was It With Jesus?

How different with Jesus! The light that was in him shone more than ever brightly when the shadows came. Jesus, far from being indifferent to others, was sympathetically aware of them. He appreciated, as others did not, the devotion of the woman who broke over him that flask of perfume.

When the disciples fell asleep in Gethsemane, he was not harsh with them, for he knew how weak the flesh can be. Jesus was aware, too, of his friends' weaknesses and sins. He rebuked the quarrelsome disciples at the supper table. He foretold how they would all forsake him and flee. He knew how much fear there was beneath Peter's brave bragging. Yet he did not spend a single word condemning others, not even Judas. The loving and the unloving, the loyal and the unloyal, they were all on Jesus' heart in those dark hours. He lived for others then, no less than in earlier days.

Aware Of God

If ever a man had an excuse for bitterness and revenge, it was Jesus. But his lips and heart were free of both. Fear did not despoil him, because he kept on believing in the Father on high. The shadow of death did not conceal the face of God.

It would have been easier, you might think, to believe in God's coming Kingdom during the days of success in Galilee than in the Upper Room with death breathing over his shoulder. But even there he was as certain of God's Kingdom as if it had already come. Prayer had surely not always been the agony it was in Gethsemane; but he keeps praying even there.

That God is and will be the final Judge of all, is not easy to believe in a Pilate's courtroom; but Jesus' faith never trembled. It is this Jesus, the Jesus of the lighted soul, whom Christians honor and serve as Saviour and Lord.
