Good tobacco brought satisfactory prices while other grades sold low.

Sales by Gant & Gaither Co., of 24 hds, of new tobacco as follows:
11 hds, medium and good leaf at \$7 00, 6 25, 5 55, 5 50, 5 45, 5 30, 5 25, 5 10, 5 00, 4 95.
4 hds, common leaf at \$4 70, 3 10, 4 35, 2 10.
9 hds, lugs at \$2 25, 1 00, 80, 1 15, 1 00, 1 80, 1 10, 1 00, 2 00.
Several hogheads of leaf showed too much order. Would advise farmers to be very careful about the order and assortment of their crops, as the good leaves will bring good prices, while the common part of the crop must sell very low.

Of this offering we sold only 12 hds, 22 being rejected. We expected to see tobacco open low, and were little surprised at the prices. At this season of the year there are few orders, the demand being chiefly from the stemmers, who expect to pay very low prices. Later on, when regular orders appear on the market, we confidently expect to see prices 1 to 2 cents higher. On the basis of to-day's prices every tobacco grower would be brought to the reason of production of the crop. One thing is clearly demonstrated by this sale, viz: frosted tobacco will not pay cost of stripping, grading and selling. After the new year we will see better prices on all good, sound tobacco. Prices are low everywhere now.

San Diego, Its Prosperity And People, Kentucky Immigrants—Waited On By College Graduates.

SAN DIEGO, CALIFORNIA, Dec. 14, 1886. Editor New Era:

Few people in the Eastern States are here know the many and great efforts which have been made by the later management of the Southern Pacific R. R. ABOUT COUNCILMEN.

A great deal of talk has been going the rounds about the ineffectuality of councilmen. It has been given by that Mr. S. E. Trice, Geo. O. Thompson and O. S. Brown were ineffectual, the first two because they were Asylum commissioners and the last because he was a school trustee. We have taken the pains to investigate this matter and find that the fact that a man holds an appointment or office under the state in no way interferes with his serving as councilman. The revised charter states this fact plainly, but, if at the election, anyone of the board elected holds a position or office under the city, he is for that reason disqualified for the office of Councilman. On these grounds Messrs. Trice and Thompson are eligible. Opinions differ as to Mr. Brown, some claiming that he holds the school trusteeship under the state, while others say it is a position under the city. As the school is called the "city" schools and as the people of Hopkinsville elect the trustees, it would appear that the trusteeship is a city office.
