Strow Funeral Is Held

Funeral services for Albert Strow, a former mayor of Benton, were held Monday at Rota Funeral Chapel in Paducah. Burial was held in Mapleawn Cemetery there.

Mr. Strow died last Friday afternoon after collapsing on a street in Louisville, where he had resided for several years.

A Louisville traffic cop saw Mr. Strow stagger and fall. An emergency car was called but Mr. Strow died en route to a hospital.

Mr. Strow operated a drug store in Benton for several years, and was mayor during the early 1930s. During his term as mayor, Benton obtained its first city waterworks and sewer system and also its first paved streets.

Mr. Strow at one time also was a rural mail carrier here. And he had been employed in a Memphis, Tenn. bank before going to Louisville about 10 years ago.

In Louisville, he had been an inspector for the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax unit and an internal revenue agent for the Treasury Department.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ethel Strow of Jackson, Miss.; a sister, Mrs. H. D. Mad-dox also of Jackson; a son, Commander Albert Rowe Strow, U. S. Navy, Washington, D. C.; and one grandchild.

Billy Watkins, who has served three years as State Trooper in Marshall and adjoining counties, has resigned.

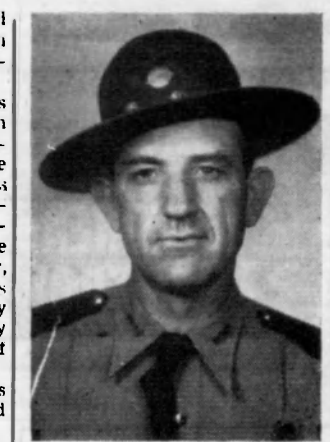

And he says he leaves this office with "Charity for all and with malice toward none."

His letter of resignation, recently submitted to the Commissioner of State Police Department, follows:

"Will you please accept my resignation as State Trooper to take effect not later than April 30, midnight, 1953.

May I take this opportunity of thanking you and your associates for the three years' experience I have had in your Department and for the connection we have had together.

My personal associations with you and your predecessor in office have been such as to remain with me as long as I live. Your kindness, your help and your cooperation will always be remembered by me."

Mr. Watkins is a candidate for Sheriff of Marshall County and resigned as State Trooper to start his political race.

Motorists Warned On Speeding

Three new four-way stop intersections were established in Benton this week by the City Council.

The four-way stops are at 14th and Main Streets, 8th and Main Streets, East 12th St. at Butler's Grocery.

Councilmen also are discussing the proposal to move the sign light now at 14th and Main to the Court Square intersection of 12th and Poplar.

Congested traffic conditions in Benton, due to the industrial development of this area, was given as the reason for the new traffic regulations by Mayor Jim Kinney.

Mr. Kinney also said the city has about 50 more parking meters available, and would like the citizens to give their opinions as to where, if any place, the meters should be erected.

Mayor Kinney also said that motorists must observe the new four-way stop signs in the city and that violators would be prosecuted.

He also said city police were going to start cracking down on speeders all over town, including those speeding on the city's gravel streets.

Grade Team Here Wins Tournament

Benton defeated Briensburg 52-42 Saturday night in the finals of the Marshall County Grade School Basketball Tournament here to claim the county championship. Sharpe was able to hold off a fourth quarter rally by Hardin and edge them 40-37 for the third place trophy.

The 10-team tournament, sponsored by the Marshall County Junior Chamber of Commerce, was observed with keen interest. Almost one hundred boys were seen in action as they disclosed an amazing amount of potential high school talent.

Sharpe and Brewers met in the second game of the Thursday night session to provide the most thrilling affair of the tournament and display a brand of basketball seldom seen in high school competition.

After trailing 41-34 at the 3rd quarter, the Brewers team stormed back to tie the score 58-58 at the end of regulation playing time. Sharpe was able to squeeze out a 65-64 edge in the second overtime.

Wilkins of Brewers accumulated 32 points for the individual high score of the tournament.

Hardin, pulled away from Gilbertsville in the last half to defeat them 47-30 in the first game of the session.

Friday afternoon, Briensburg

smothered Palma 75-29 and Hardin racked up the high team score of the tourney by downing Aurora 92-24. Benton topped Calvert City 63-45 in the Friday night session, while Sharpe stopped Fairdealing cold in the last half to win 69-28.

Briensburg started slowly in the first quarter against the Hardin quintet but they found the range in the last half and were able to coast to a 62-38 win in the first game of the semi-final round Saturday afternoon.

In the other semi-final game, Benton nit from the field with amazing accuracy during the first half to lead Sharpe 26-14 at half time. Benton was able to maintain a five to seven point lead throughout the last half after surviving a serious Sharpe threat shortly after half-time.

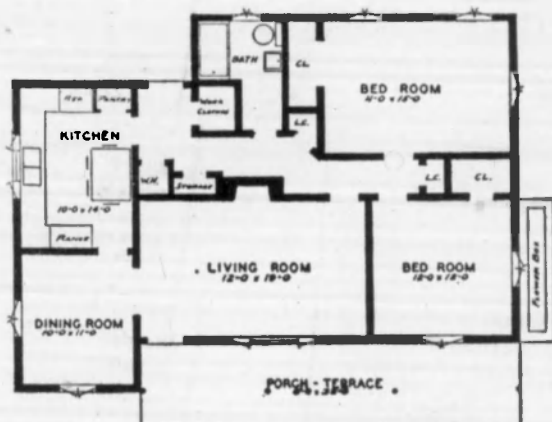
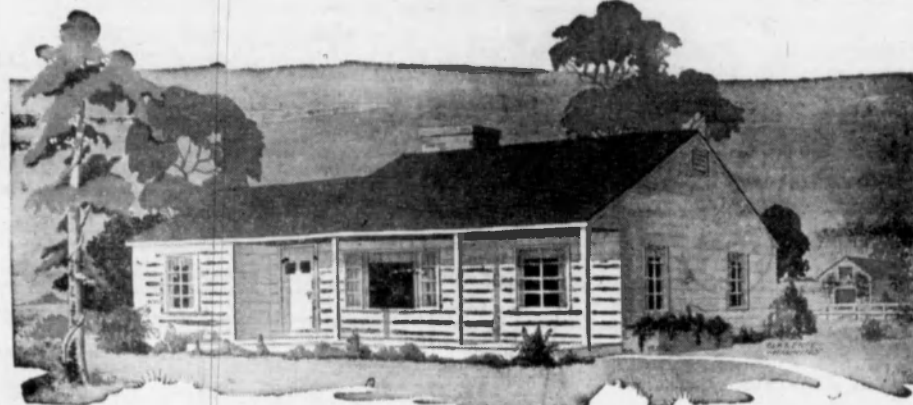
The bedrooms are of comfortable size. The large closet with its wide double doors will provide plenty of storage space.

Since the dining room is usually used to much less extent than some of the other rooms, it was designed small. However, a wide opening is suggested between it and the living room to make both rooms appear much larger. The living room is arranged so that it could serve also as a bedroom if three bedrooms are needed. It will afford privacy and is convenient to the bath.

A back porch of work room can be added at the back entrance if desired.

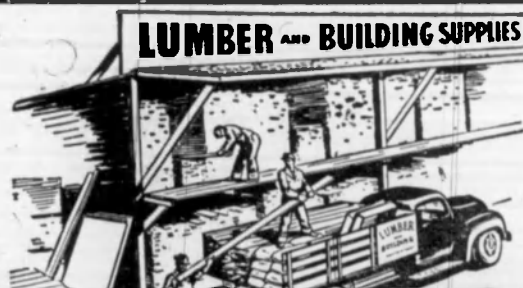
Off the hall there are two linen closets and a storage closet. The large closet by the rear entrance provides an abundance of storage space for work clothes, raincoats, etc.

The water heater closet opens into this hall. This not only puts the heater between the bath and kitchen to cut down on the cost of plumbing, but also provides easy access for any care that it may need.



Although this house was designed for casement type windows, working drawings are such that other standard window units can be used. It is suggested, however, that windows which will stress the horizontal lines of the house should be used.

Simplicity in framing and roof means that there is much less effort in laying out the foundations, cutting the framing, etc.

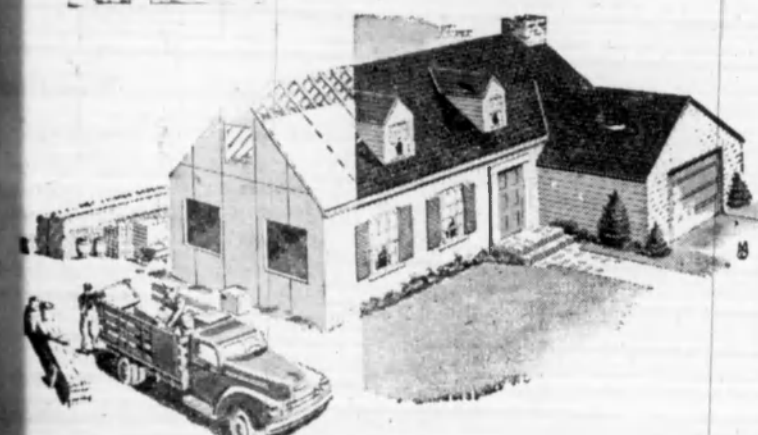

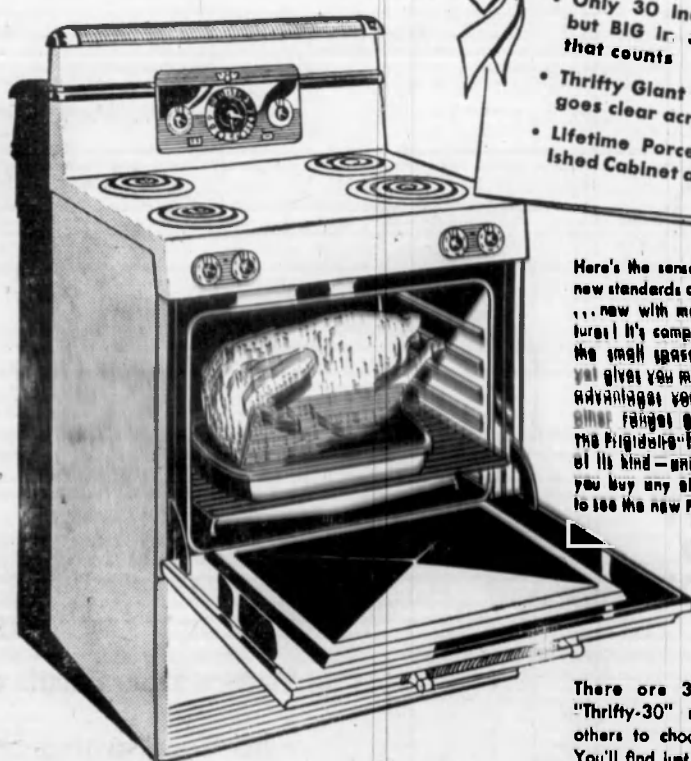

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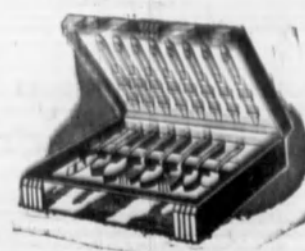
