COUNTY FAIR MASSMEETING.

Prospects Favorable for the Organization of an Asso- ciation in Calloway.

In accordance with previous announcement the mass meeting to take preliminary steps toward the organization of the Calloway County Fair Association was held at the court house last Saturday afternoon. Quite a crowd attended and it was evident that the project is in strong favor with the people.

Mr. Nat Ryan was chairman of the meeting. His selection was fortunate as it is well known he puts "ginger" into anything he undertakes. The first question put was "do we want a county fair," and it was evident that those present did want it. Different parts of the county were heard from and speeches favoring the proposition were made by J. B. Swann and W. A. Patterson, Joe Clark, Frank Paschall, Rev. W. O. Hargrove, W. H. Finney, A. J. Holland, Jake Taylor, I. T. Crawford, Frank Beaman, Mr. Bailey, C. D. Holt, E. H. Haley and others.

Mr. Jeff D. Newton, of Jackson, Tenn., who happened to be present made a fine talk. He said the only thing that surprised him was the fact that Calloway did not already have a fair association. He spoke of the advantages of the Madison county, Tennessee fair to the county at large and of the benefits accruing from the fairs to other counties in our neighboring states. He had traveled over Calloway to some extent and thought our resources superior to many of the counties which maintain fairs.

Mr. Ditto, a traveling man, who lives in Illinois, spoke along the same lines. He said there were county fairs in Kentucky, and he cited instances, paying 25 to 40 per cent annually to the stockholders—counties, too, that are far behind us in blooded stock, poultry, farming products, etc. He also was surprised to learn that Calloway had no county fair.

Uncle Jack Holland said he contributed to the first county fair ever held in West Kentucky at Paducah in 1854 and the good effects of that meet were apparent even in the days when the country was a sparsely settled. Mr. Jake Taylor, another aged citizen, also spoke of the beneficial results of these organizations within his observation and spoke not for himself but for the rising generation. Mr. Hiram Finney who had interviewed several fair managers of neighboring towns gave the result of his investigation which was altogether pleasing.

Ben Swann had visited several fairs and what impressed him most was the great good-fellowship at these meetings, which he said, was worth more to a community than anything of a pecuniary nature. Mr. C. D. Holt, a "crank," as he said, in getting at the scientific facts of anything pertaining to agriculture made an interesting talk. Mr. Ewing Haley made perhaps his first speech in public. He was for the fair and had done everything else around a fair but speak. However we might say that the various prizes Mr. Haley has carried off from different fairs speak louder than anything he could say. Rev. Hargrove made a strong speech for the fair, which showed his interest in things earthly as well as divine. In fact all the talks were good and to the point.

The books were then opened for subscriptions to stock in the association, and in a few minutes something near \$2,000 of the \$12,000 stock was taken up. The

shares are \$25 and several took as much as four shares. The same lines. CIRCUIT COURT TERM AT END.

Murray Telephone Co. Wins from Planters. Other Cases Tried.

Circuit court was closed here Saturday, winding up the three weeks term. A large volume of business was transacted during this session, and if Judge Hanbery keeps up his present gait the docket will be practically cleared up at the next term, except for new business. He promises to give an extra week on the next session if it is possible to do so. Following are the important cases tried the last week:

The Murray Telephone Co. vs. The Planters Telephone Co. Judgment for \$1,300, \$1,200 of which was on pre-emptory instructions and \$100 more by jury. The Murray company had sued the Planters on a contract for services. The Planters sought to invalidate the contract but the judge and jury held it to be good. Mrs. A. J. Melan was given judgment for \$350 for extra care and attention of A. M. Melan against J. B. Hay, administrator for deceased.

Holly Wilson vs. Ida Wilson, divorce, granted.

Hollie Swader vs. Ollie Swader, divorce granted.

Maude Hays vs. Frank Hays, divorced granted and \$10 mouth alimony.

Eula Calhoun vs. R. L. Calhoun divorce granted.

D. E. Rye vs. Nora Rye, divorce granted.

Arnett Hodges vs. Pearl Hodges divorce granted.

The grand jury returned 31 indictments all for minor offenses except that against Homer Bridges for murder and Clancy McGee for manslaughter.

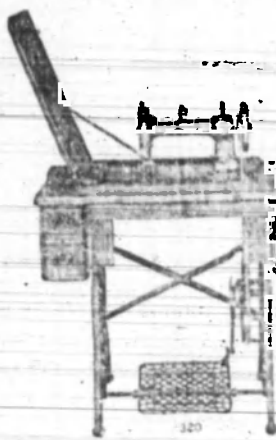

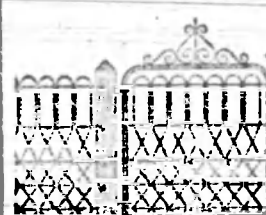

GORILLA HAS ALL OTHER ANIMALS IN SUBJECTION.

Strength of This Manlike Creature of the Wilds is Almost Unbelievable. Of a Savage and Ferocious Character.

Of all the existing man apes the gorilla is beyond question the most formidable. A large male standing not infrequently over five feet six inches in height, and hence being known of one which apparently measured in life no less than six feet two inches. It is not, we know from experience, in the gorilla and chimpanzee, always when young quite so utterly untamable a beast, and so entirely and constantly an enemy of man as the gorilla represented, but it is savage and ferocious enough.

It is still uncertain whether in a wild state, except in the immediate moment of an attack, it ever actually walks erect without either resting its knuckles on the ground or supporting itself by a branch overhead, but that it does that it does upon its breast when cornered. The gorilla says that he has heard the noise like a great "boom" at a distance of a mile in a valley, and when the male gorilla turns, as usually it does, to confront man fearfully when attacked, with its huge, its great hairy limbs, and hideous head set almost down into its shoulders, we can hardly that its description can be given in horror its appearance. Add that the gorilla usually lives in the depth of forests where the light is so dim that it is difficult to see any object clearly at a distance of more than a few yards and it is not to be wondered at that the natives have invested it with attributes even more terrible than those which it possesses.

Many believe the gorilla to be human, others hold that though itself a beast, it is often informed with the transmitted spirit of the human mind. It is said to be in wait crouched on the lower branches of trees, and when a human being passes to drop one of its long hind limbs, and clutching the victim by the throat so suddenly and in so terrible a grip that hardly a sob is heard to drag the man or woman up to its lurking place. It is reported with curious and astounding women and carrying them off to keep them in the forest, and armed with clubs, is said to attack and beat off elephants.

The ferocity of the gorilla is the most apparent when compared with other beasts, however, is not an easy matter to pass upon. In Africa it is noteworthy that the lion and the gorilla do not occur together, and it has been conjectured that the lion has exterminated the gorilla within its territory, and that the gorilla has driven out the lion.

In the most serious neighborhood of the orang and the python and the crocodile, and the natives say that the ape overcomes them both, the python by seizing and biting it, and the crocodile by leaping on its back, clutching it by the upper jaw, and by sheer main strength tearing it open. The name "orang" is in itself a title of honor, meaning roughly "make one" the Malays giving it alike to their chiefs, to elephants and to the "wild men." Perhaps, however, no native myth or story explains in wonder the statement of Emile Pasha, made seriously, that in the Siam forest the chimpanzees used to come to rub the banana plantations in troops, bearing torches to light them on the way. "I had I not witnessed this extraordinary spectacle personally," he is reported as saying, "I should not have believed that any of the animals understood the art of making fire." Unhappily we personally did not witness it.

Marie Antoinette's Clock. Among the clocks at Versailles is one of great interest historically, as it belonged to the hapless consort of Louis XVI. It is a musical clock. For many years it has been out of order, but on the initiative of Count de Saxe, a descendant of the constructor of the timepiece.

M. de Saxe, under authority of the University of Fine Arts, and M. de Nollet, curator of the museum, have had the satisfaction of hearing the clock after so many years of silence produce the popular air of the end of the eighteenth century, with fragments of Gluck and Rameau, which delighted in her days of happiness Marie Antoinette. In a few days the clock will be replaced in one of the apartments of the unfortunate queen.

First English Chrysanthemum. Flower lovers may be interested to learn that a flower from the first chrysanthemum ever grown in England may still be seen in the herbarium at the British Museum. The plant, one of the small yellow flowered variety, was introduced into the Chelsea Botanical Garden in 1764 by the famous horticulturist Philip Miller, who himself preserved the specimen now in the museum. The new flower, however, failed to "catch on." After Miller's death its culture was neglected and it is only within recent years that it has attained its present popularity. — Westminster Gazette.

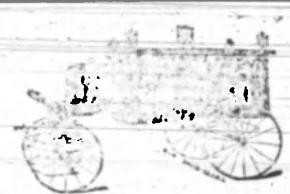

Strung Sermon by Local Pastor.

John M. Alexander, pastor of the Christian church, preached Sunday evening from the text: "Where shall we spend Eternity?" A large congregation heard the forceful, fearless discourse. In the course of his sermon he touched upon the tendency of the times to place the dollar above the man. He rightly said "the only aristocracy is the aristocracy of character," yet the man with money can gain admittance to the most exclusive society, as society is at present constituted, while the poor man, no matter how pure in heart, is barred. The bible simply said, "the rich man died and was buried," with a more extended account of Lazarus. Today the "rich man" gets a two-column obituary, while off in one corner of the paper may be found a two-line local referring to the death of a Lazarus.

He said it is just as easy for a man who claims church membership to go to hell as it is for one who is out in the world. "The repentant sinner is slow to climb over a bunch of stumbling blocks—hypocrites—in order to reach the Lord Jesus." Those outside are prone to pick up the "excuses" in the church as examples of church life. "The religious man will lift up and encourage a man who is down and out, and will put a new suit of clothes on the back of a poor boy and send him to Sunday school."

It was a strong sermon throughout. Messages of this character from the men of God should be productive of good results right here in the town of Murray, where we must all admit, is great room for improvement along the lines the minister suggested.

We have noted considerable improvement of late in the editorial department of the Paducah News-Democrat. The only drawback to its excellent service is that we who take the Nashville Banner and Louisville Herald get the benefit of those "editorials" the day before they are clipped or rewritten for the N-D. Still, it doesn't hurt a man to read good things over several times. We fear, however, that the N-D does not improve the Nashville and Louisville editorials by rewriting them. Better let them stand pat. It's easier on the office boy.

Open and Close.

Editor Ledger:—I see the leading business houses of Fulton have agreed to close at 6:30 o'clock in the evening. Murray might follow this example with profit, and pleasure to the business men and clerks.

I don't suppose Fulton ever had a law closing restaurants and soda fountains, fruit stands, etc., on Sunday. In Murray it's almost impossible to get anything to eat on Sunday, unless you go to a hotel and pay for a dinner and if a stranger doesn't happen to be on hand at noon he goes hungry till some citizen of the town takes pity on him and generously affords a handout. If a person is thirsty on Sunday he cannot get a glass of soda or lemonade, and no water, for the water tank is usually empty on Sunday. These blue laws make Murray ridiculous in the eyes of the outside world. Suppose a Murray man should go to Paducah or Fulton Sunday and not be able to get a bite to eat or something to drink? Wouldn't he raise a howl?

If this town wants to grow and be popular there must be a little more spirit of liberality and common sense manifested. We don't believe the people of Murray are in favor of the "blue laws," yet they as a whole must necessarily bear the odium and criticism.

I am by no means in favor of a wide open town, in the sense that the term usually implies, but I cannot see any excessive form of riotous living in eating a sandwich or sipping lemonade on the holy Sabbath day; and I am informed that a fragrant cigar, fresh from the dealer's showcase, aids digestion on Sunday as well as at any other time.

When a young man from the country drives with his best girl on Sunday afternoon it is quite natural and proper for them to indulge in, if they can procure it, a dish of cream or a glass of soda. As it is not healthful to live on love they need a little fruit, some bon bons, or if they desire to stay over to evening church services, then something more substantial. Our city ordinance says, "You can't get it; you should have brought your lunch with you, and the town branch is a good place to get a drink."

Yet some people wonder why so few visitors from the country and neighboring towns are seen here on Sunday.

By the way, I hear talk of a carnival in Murray. Now look out for a hell-warming sermon.
