## Leonard Jones Formally Announces for Re-election

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. E. G. Williams of Alton, Route 1, one brother, Joe Carroll, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. George Collins of near Dexter.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Linn Funeral Home, with the Rev. J. Frank Young officiating. Burial was held in Sinking Springs Cemetery in Calloway County.

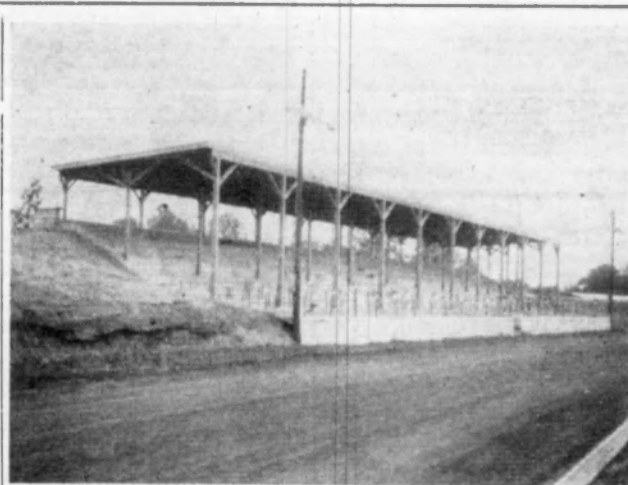

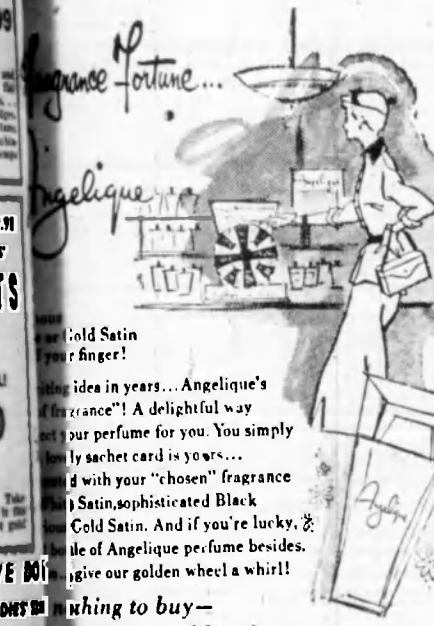

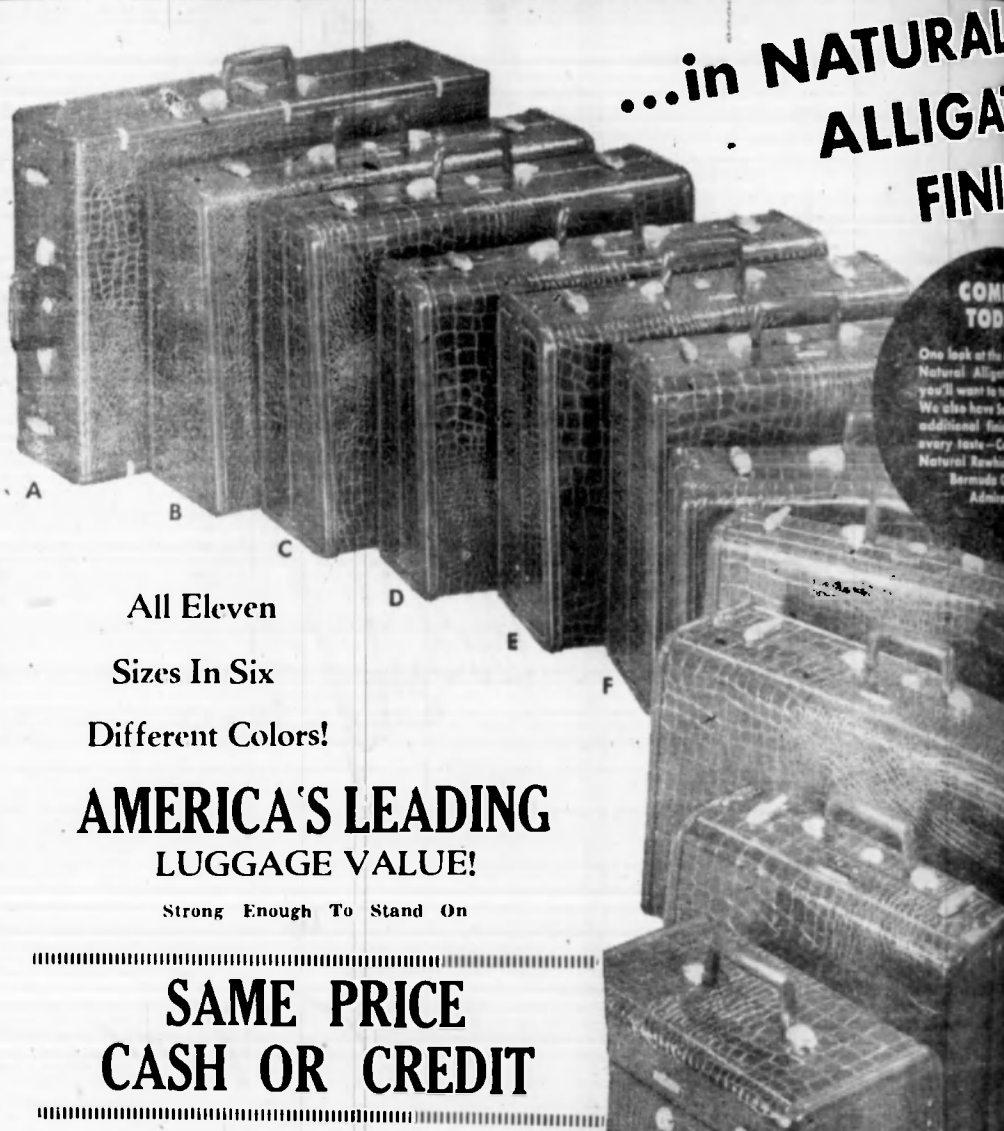

## Light Strawberry Crop Due

Frankfort—Kentucky's strawberry crop will be well below that of 1952, according to the State Department of Agriculture.

The department's Kentucky Strawberry Buyers Guide, just published, indicates that a season of normal weather will see about 87,000 crates of berries harvested, compared to 245,000 crates last year. The great decline will be because of last year's drought which severely damaged new beds and a labor shortage.

There will be a decrease of about 2,000 acres from 1952, with the estimate showing about 2,900 acres to be harvested. About 900 acres of new plants will be set for the 1954 harvest, which is an increase over the plantings last year.

Kentucky's main producing areas and the expected yields: Trimble County, 10,000 crates; Greenville, 3,500; Licking Valley, 1,500; Jefferson and Bullitt Counties, 10,000; Covington, 15,000; Paducah, 11,200, and Bowling Green 30,500.

Most of Kentucky's berries are marketed within a radius of 400 miles but some are shipped as far as the east coast.

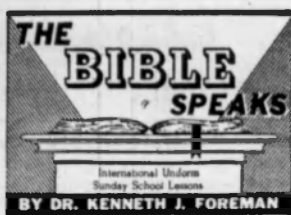

### A Flame In Chains

Lesson for May 10, 1953

YOU can keep a dog on a leash but not a flame. Passing a hand-cuff over a fire is no way to keep it where you want it. Now the man Paul was more like a flame than most men are. Some men are like lumps of clay. They stay where they are put and they never give trouble. And never amount to anything. Others are like fire. They have a life of their own. They can be terribly dangerous or wonderfully helpful. Paul was like this; he had been a kind of devil when he was persecuting good Christians. Now he was a missionary, an extremely successful one; but still a man of fire. He had got into trouble with the authorities, had been through a series of trials; had appealed to the Imperial court, highest in the Empire; and had been sent as a prisoner to Rome. For at least two years Dr. Foreman (some say for the rest of his life) he never was a free man in Rome. And still all the time he was preaching, testifying, just winning friends for Jesus. You can't chain a living flame.

**Strange Answers**  
The story of Paul and how he got to Rome has at least three messages for us today. One is this: God sometimes answers our prayers in strange ways. As we know from Paul's letters, he had had a visit to Rome in mind for a long time (Romans 1:10). It was the capital of the great Empire; the church founded there was destined to have great influence. Paul sent the Christians there the most careful and complete letter he ever wrote. God answered Paul's prayers and hopes, and so Paul in time reached Rome; but not at all as he had hoped. He was a prisoner; the outcome of his trial in Rome was uncertain, and if he lost his case, it meant death. You would have thought Paul's mind would be shadowed by foreboding; but it was not. He realized that his prayers had been answered, and he did not grumble that they had not been answered as he might have expected. So when we think our prayers have not even been heard, we might look around us; perhaps they are already answered in some way altogether a surprise.

**No Prison for the Word**  
Tradition says that Paul was acquitted at his Roman trial, but was arrested again some years later. At any rate, from a Roman prison he wrote his young friend Timothy (as Moffatt translates it) "There is no prison for the Word of God." (II Tim. 2:9.) That is the second message from Paul's experiences as a prisoner. Men can be imprisoned, tortured, killed; but the Word of God goes on and on. If the Christian religion had been no more than a set of notions, it would have died a natural death centuries ago. That Christianity has lived is one of the evidences that it is true. It is a comfort to remember this today. People get discouraged about the church in China, in Poland, in Hungary and Bulgaria and Russia. It is certainly a fact that Christians have a hard time in those places; but it is also a fact that there are Christians there and some of them will not give up their faith.

**Nothing Need Shut Our Mouths**  
When Martin Niemöller was a prisoner, absolutely not allowed to walk in the yard even, nor to associate with other prisoners, because as a Christian minister he had dared to say "No!" to Hitler, he used to sit at his cell window which was near the yard, and listen to the men as they went by. One of these used to repeat a verse of Scripture aloud every day and Niemöller would hear it and take it as a message from his friends, and from God. There is another story about a Japanese guard in charge of American prisoners, some of whom sang Christian hymns. He knew one English word: Jesus. Whispering this name, he used to bring the men medicines and things they needed—even at risk to his own life. If it is impossible for a prisoner or for a guard in a war-prison, surely the most unlikely of all places, to let himself be known as a Christian, is it likely that anything need shut our mouths? To speak a good word for Jesus is not always easy; but it is never impossible.

Report fire losses for the entire state amounted to \$13,812,434, the greatest figure on record and \$2,911,486 above the losses for 1951.

Curdin, commissioner of highways. The company submitted a low bid of \$21,436. The contract calls for 12.8 miles of bituminous surface and machine patching on portions of the Mayfield-Hardin-Cadiz and the Benton-Eggers Ferry roads.

MAY IS THE MONTH OF DECISION on Kentucky farms. Doing the job well and at the right time in May will often determine the profit or loss from an enterprise for the entire year. High on the list of important farm questions this month are: Will I get a good stand of corn and tobacco? Will I sow Sudan Grass for summer pasture? Will I clip pastures early and put surplus growth in silos? Will I cut meadows in early bloom stages to make better hay?

THE RIGHT THICKNESS OF CORN is important in producing high yields. In Kentucky, 10 to 12 thousand stalks per acre is just about right-thick enough to produce near 100 bushels in a good season, not too thick for a drought. This means having a stalk about every 15 inches in rows 3 1/2 feet apart. Because of loss in plants due to birds, insects, diseases, faulty germination, and mechanical injury, seed should be planted about 20% thicker than the expected stand, either by closer spacing of rows or closer dropping of the seed in the row.

SILOS WILL BECOME INCREASINGLY IMPORTANT as Kentucky moves more and more into a livestock economy. A silo full of succulent grass or corn silage is the best insurance against summer droughts or severe winters. Most livestock farms need two silos - one for winter, the other for summer. Feeding from a trench silo in the summer does not present the difficulties of winter feeding - rain, snow and mud. A silo available for filling during wet, hay-curing periods is also good insurance against the loss of a crop of alfalfa or clover. Better plan now for a silo.

COUNTY LIVESTOCK IM-

PROVEMENT ASSOCIATIONS have been, or are being organized in at least 550 counties. They are consolidating their efforts with those of the Kentucky Purebred Livestock Association to improve livestock quality and production.

LADINO CLOVER, after an almost complete knockout by the drought last year, is making a comeback in Kentucky pastures this year. There is no crop which produces more palatable and nutritious pasture than ladino clover in cool, moist seasons.

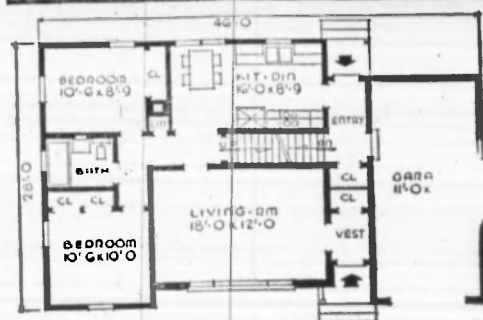
Wardrobe closets are used in all bedrooms, linen cabinets on both floors and coat closets for each entrance.
