Shelbourne in Race For District Attorney

To the residents and voters of Marshall and McCracken Counties: At the Democratic Primary Election to be held on August 1, 1953, you will elect a nominee to be voted for in the regular November election for the office of Commonwealth's Attorney of the 2nd Judicial District.

This election is made necessary by the resignation in January of this year of the Hon. David R. Reed, who had served one year of the six-year term to which he had been elected in November, 1951.

I was born at Bardwell, Ky. Sept. 11, 1915 and am therefore in my 38th year. I am the oldest of the three children of United States District Judge and Mrs. Roy M. Shelbourne. I attended the public schools at Bardwell and Paducah, graduating from Tilghman High School in 1933. I attended the Paducah Junior College, University of Virginia and the Law College of the University of Kentucky, graduating from the latter school in January, 1942.

Since that time I have been engaged in the practice of law at Paducah.

December 7, 1943, I married Mrs. Catherine Clark and we are the parents of four boys.

In the short time I have been privileged to serve as your Commonwealth's Attorney, I have done my utmost to conduct the affairs of that office in such manner as to merit your approval and warrant my asking your endorsement of my appointment to serve the remainder of Mr. Reed's term. I believe that I am qualified to render good service.

By reason of the arrangement of the terms of Court in Marshall and McCracken Counties, the time which I will be permitted to devote to my campaign will be short. I therefore take this method of soliciting your vote and influence in my campaign. If elected, I pledge to you the best years of my life for honest and efficient service and that without fear or favor, I will conduct the affairs of the office free from dictation or control except of those who seek unselfishly to maintain good government and respect for law.

The grand jury recommended new shelving in the kitchen and replacement of screens at the County Farm. The jury also recommended filling of the County Farm cistern so the pump would work.

The jury found the jail and courthouse were being kept in good condition.

Marshall County Circuit Court convened Monday, June 22, but no cases were called for trial this week. Court is expected to stay in session until September as a heavy docket of 85 cases has been scheduled.

This construction is now waiting final approval from the State Department of Education, Frankfort. Says Signal Lights Must Be Put Back

Removal of some of the new four-way stop signs in Benton has been requested by Jack Carson, district engineer of the State Highway Department.

In a letter to Mayor Jim Kinney, Mr. Carson wrote: "We have had traffic counts made on the four-way sign placed on the state highway through Benton and find that the traffic does not justify these signs on state and federal routes."

"We regret this is the case and will thank you to remove them at your earliest convenience and on U. S. 61 put back in operation your stop-and-go lights."

Mayor Kinney asked the Lions Club to act on the matter Tuesday night. The Lions voted by about two to one NOT to protest the removal of the signs by the state.

Ray Linn said the four-way signs on North Main forced heavy trucks to stop all during the night and that citizens in the area were not able to sleep because of the noise made by the big trucks in stopping and starting. He suggested the traffic lights be put back into use.

Bill Butler said the four way signs in front of his grocery store were not serving the purpose for which they were intended. He said motorists, not being used to the signs, were violating them frequently.

Several individual citizens, however, have written to Mr. Carson and protested the Highway Department's decision to remove the signs.

The matter probably will be taken before other civic groups for action.

Junior Woman' Club Makes Report on Its Many Activities During the Past Year

Mrs. Alvin Austin, retiring president of the Junior Woman's Club, reports that the twentieth year of the club has been a very successful one.

The programs for the past year have been entertaining and educational. A variety of subjects were covered including handling the family income, national and city governments, American heritage, and needs of our schools.

Several events were planned for club entertainment. Husbands of club members were invited to a dinner and social in the fall and a barbeque supper and square dance in the spring. New members were honored at a convalescence party and a picnic. Club members enjoyed a club talent show and an installation dinner for the new officers.

This year the main goal of the Junior Woman's Club has been to be of service in the community.

They worked for the Marshall County Fair by planning and carrying out the Fair Queen Contest and operating a snack stand and giving half of the profits to the fair. They helped to sponsor a dinner to benefit the school band and also donated food and served at a dinner to benefit the school library and community building. The club sponsors the Girl Scouts and several members serve as leaders and club members solicited donations during the Girl Scout fund raising drive. They sent food and clothing to a needy family at Christmas. The club endorsed and urged its members to vote for a school tax to build a cafeteria, gymnasium, and classrooms. Contributions were made to the March of Dimes, Red Cross, Heart, and Christmas Seal Drives.

The club has had other projects beside those in the community. They adopted a little two-year old girl, an orphan at the Benuloh Heights Orphanage, and have sent clothes and necessities to her all during the year. They collected almost two-thousand stamps for wounded veterans. They supported the International-Scholarship Fund which enables a foreign student to study at U of K and the Student Loan Fund which gives financial aid to needy students.

The present club, with a membership of more than fifty young women, had an humble beginning. The club was organized in 1940 with ten members. The growth and work of the club will continue as long as its members are as active, enthusiastic, and cooperative as they have been during this twentieth year.

SIGHTSEEING IN LAKE AREA

While you're in the lake area of Western Kentucky you won't want to miss out on the opportunity to do a little sight seeing. This famous region boasts of many things. The inventor of radio was not Marconi, as some history books teach, but Nathan B. Stubblefield, a resident of Murray, Ky. On the campus of Murray State College just 15 miles from Kentucky Lake, is a marker in memory of this great man. He is recognized as the inventor of radio by the World Almanac and many other factual and historical publications.

The home of Irvin Cobb, world renowned humorist, newspaper man and author, was at Paducah. There his birthplace on South Third Street and his burial place in Oak Grove Cemetery are marked. During Prohibition a little place by the name of Golden Pond, ten miles from Kentucky Lake on U. S. 68 and Ky. 80, became quite famous for its moonshine whiskey. In fact, it still is famous with revenue agents. In its heyday, Golden Pond was well known to New York and other big city speakeasies.

You won't want to miss the famous Old Inn at Canton, on the Cumberland River; the Ancient Buried City at Wickliffe; the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, Confederate president, at Fairview; the Woodbridge cemetery statues, at Mayfield; and the Columbus-Belmont State Park, at Columbus, on the Mississippi River (Columbus once was laid out as the site for the Capitol of the United States). Western Kentucky is famous for fluospar, tobacco and heavy industry.

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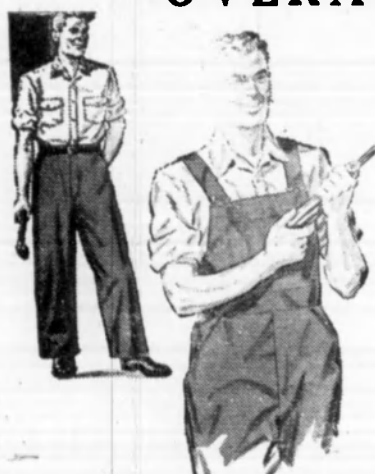
