Air Tour Of County Set Aug. 1

Saturday, Aug. 1, 1953, has been set as the day for the Conservation Air Tour of Marshall County.

On this day, farmers, business and professional people, and others will have the opportunity to get a "birds-eye view" of the soil and water conservation needs and accomplishments in the county.

The following farms have been selected and will be marked for the tour:

J. M. Solomon, Sanders Watkins, O. L. Chumler, A. L. McGregor, W. W. Shemwell, W. J. Joseph, George Long, Hatter Morgan, Perry Greenfield, Elbert Imman, Frank Greenfield, Roy Boyd, W. L. Frazier, and B. L. Alcock.

Looking at these farms from above one will see correct land use in contrast with incorrect land use on other farms. The land treatments which are needed to save soil and water will also be pointed out by the pilots. Examples of these needed treatments are farm ponds, terraces, diversion channels, farm drainage, and waterways, contour plantings, pasture and forestry.

An special look will be taken at Clarks River at Elva and Glade. This river is one of the greatest conservation problems in the county.

Also beautiful Kentucky Dam and Lake will be seen. Water Conservation, recreation, and electric power are its main functions.

The Kentucky Department of Aeronautics will make a pro-gram of the above route and take pictures of each farm. These will be used for briefing each person before he starts the tour.

This air tour is sponsored by the Marshall County Soil Conservation District with the help of all agencies and organizations.



Banks to Double Time Deposit Pay

Beginning on July 1, the Bank of Marshall County and the Bank of Benton will increase their interest rate on time deposits from one to two percent.

The announcement was made jointly by Paul Darnell of the Bank of Benton and B. L. Treva of the Bank of Marshall County.

Both banks also announced that they will pay the state tax on deposits as an added service for their customers.

Heretofore, the depositor has paid the state tax on money he had in the bank.

Statements of the financial conditions of both banks, as of June 30, 1953, are being mailed out this week. Both banks were in fine financial condition.

Hog Prices Stay Near Top Level

Kentucky hog producers had another good week at the state's major auction and terminal markets. Prices are still at record levels, with some prices reported up \$1.175 over the previous week.

Choice butchers brought \$28.10 per cwt. very freely. Top quality eggs still are hard to find on these hot days and prices range around 45 to 50 cents.

Veals rose \$1.50 to \$2 on a statewide basis, but prices are dropping again. Lambs also rose, but are falling at the rate of 50 cents to \$2.50 on most markets since last week. Hen markets are unsettled and continuing down, especially the low grades.

One bright spot in the farmer's picture is that chicken and egg prices are supposed to continue above those of last year. And a much smaller turkey crop should push those prices higher.

Bill Hamrick Fined \$50 In Court Here

A jury in County Court last Saturday found Bill Hamrick, superintendent of Kentucky Lake State Park, guilty of breach of peace and fined him \$50. Hamrick appealed the case.

He was charged in connection with a disturbance involving four teenagers. He said they broke some bottles in the park and that he reprimanded them and asked them to leave.

The boys, 15 and 17, said Mr. Hamrick cursed them. The 15-year old boy said the park superintendent struck him in the altercation that followed. The girls, called as witnesses by Mr. Hamrick's counsel, said they did not see him strike the boy.

The girls are from Louisville. The boys did not show up for court at the designated time so an attachment was issued for them. They were brought in by Sheriff Volney Brien.

Mr. Hamrick also swore out warrants for the boys but their trial before juvenile authorities is scheduled for July 11.

Another warrant charged Mr. Hamrick with assault and battery but that case went to the grand jury and no action was taken on it.

Rex Sirls Gets Vague Promise of Freedom

Governor Wetherby has denied immediate freedom for Rex Sirls, one of 105 Kentucky penitentiary inmates penalized last March 6 by a Court of Appeals decision outlawing concurrent terms, but he gave a vague promise of clemency for the Marshall county inmate.

Sirls' attorney, Earl Osborne, wrote to the governor last week asking for a full pardon of the Marshall prisoner's second two-year sentence.

Osborne explained that Sirls was given two two-year terms to be served together in consideration for a plea of guilty to housebreaking charges.

Governor Wetherby's office said in cases where concurrent sentences, declared illegal last March 6, were the result of agreements that the "governor is expected to yield executive clemency."

But, George H. Kerler, a Wetherby aide, said in a letter to Mr. Osborne "Sirls' case will be reviewed by the attorney general and a recommendation will be submitted to the governor."

Mr. Kerler said Sirls "will be first, or among the first, prisoners to be examined."

"It will be bold enough to predict that you will receive what you have fought for in this matter," he told Mr. Osborne.

Here's New Method of Making Tea

Here's good news for iced tea
drinkers! A new open-saucer-
method of making iced tea en-
ables you to make 2 quarts of this
refreshing beverage at one brew-
ing. You simply bring 1 quart of
freshly drawn water to a full,
rolling boil. Remove from heat.
Immediately add 6 tablespoons
of tea. Allow to brew 3-5 min-
utes, depending on how strong
you like your iced tea. Stir,
strain into a pitcher or container
holding 1 quart of cold water.
And there you have it—2 quarts
of delicious iced tea. To serve,
just put a few ice cubes in a
glass, fill with tea and add sugar
and lemon to taste.

There are many advantages to
this new method. For one thing,
you can make iced tea just
once a day in quantity—say
around lunch time, and have
enough left over to serve your
friends or neighbors who
might drop in. Or, if you make
it for the evening meal, chances
are you'll have enough left over
to serve with light snacks during
the evening while watching tele-
vision or passing the time on
the front porch.

This new way of making iced
tea, makes it unnecessary to put
the tea in the refrigerator. You
can keep it at room temperature,
and thus avoid clouding. And,
incidentally, the tea experts tell
us that cloudy tea has absolutely
no effect on the flavor of tea.
But, if you want to restore tea
to its original crystal-clear color
just add a little boiling water.
Other advantages to this new
method are (1) less utensils,
(2) less ice cubes, (3) plenty of
iced tea on hand to serve any
time of day.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Here is a way to make a small
amount of cooked chicken go a
long way, according to home
economists at the University of
Kentucky. One can of cream of
chicken or mushroom soup
diluted with 1/2 cup milk may be
used in place of the white sauce.
Chicken Italiane
2c uncooked broad noodles
2 cups uncooked broad noodles
2 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup sliced almonds
1/2 Teaspoon salt
Dash pepper
1 1/2 cup milk

1/4c parmesan cheese
Cook noodles in boiling salted
water until tender. Drain and
rinse. While they are cooking,
melt butter in saucepan and add
garlic, onion and almonds, and
brown slightly. Add salt and
pepper. Make a white sauce of
milk or chicken stock, butter
and flour. When thickened, add
to garlic and other seasonings.
Fold in cooked noodles. Pour
into a casserole and top with
buttered crumbs and cheese.
Bake in moderate oven, 20 to 25
minutes. Make 4 to 6 servings

CURRIED CHICKEN FOR SPRINGTIME MENU



Curried chicken takes on a party air when served in individual
bowls on fluffy rice enlarded with an outer ring of crisp, fried
noodles. Small bowls of pungent chutney preserves, topped with
whole almonds, and tall glasses of refreshing beer add a flipp of
flavor and smartness to the curry.

Spring is a time that's dif-
ficult for meal planning. Warmer
weather brings on finicky ap-
petites, yet it's too early for sum-
mer foods.
A good solution is to plan a
menu around an appetite-arous-
ing main dish such as curried
chicken and to include spring-
like accompaniments—fresh as-
paragus spears, crisp relishes
and pineapple sherbet with fresh
strawberry sauce.

CURRIED CHICKEN
(Makes 4 servings)
3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon curry powder
1 cup chicken bouillon
1/2 cup rich milk

Salt and pepper
1 1/2 cups diced cooked chicken
Cooked rice
Canned fried noodles
Melt butter; blend in flour and
curry powder. Gradually add
chicken bouillon and milk, stir-
ring constantly. Cook over hot
water, stirring frequently until
thickened. Season to taste with
salt and pepper. If more curry
flavor is desired, mix additional
curry powder to smooth paste
with a little of the sauce before
adding it to the sauce in the
double boiler. Add chicken and
continue to cook until heated.
Serve on freshly cooked rice
with a garnish of canned fried
noodles.

Those who have been collecting garbage to feed hogs are warned against this, as quarantines are now being issued in this county by Dr. Henson of the Department of Agriculture to all swine being fed this type garbage.

Garbage can be fed to hogs only after cooking for at least 30 minutes at 212 degrees Fahrenheit and by securing a cooking permit from the Department of Agriculture.







Farm Facts FOR KENTUCKY FOLKS

Last month, June, was dairy month so we discussed dairying and its importance to Kentucky and the things we could do to make dairying more profitable. Now, in July, we will discuss pastures, because August is designated as "Green Pastures Month" and there is much to be done in July if pastures are to be renovated, or established in August. First, a word about why is best month in which to launch a pasture improvement program. It is a good time to use limestone and fertilizer, to sow alfalfa, to disk, fertilize, and reseed poor pastures and to start the cover crop program.

Soil testing is the first step in a pasture improvement program. One simply can't lime or fertilize efficiently without knowing what elements should be added. One hundred county soil testing laboratories will be testing soils samples for Kentucky farmers this year. In 1952 over 46 thousand samples were tested. Of these, only 3315 samples came from meadow or pasture fields. 57% of these needed lime; 56% needed potash and 46% needed phosphate.

An abundance of plant food available for the seedling grass and clove is essential in starting a good pasture. Lighter rates of fertilizer may be used if it is concentrated in rows just under the seed where the roots may come into contact with it early in their existence.

The excellent crop of grass and clover seed harvested in Kentucky this year will favor the men who have to cut it. There is an abundance of fescue, red and ladino clover, and an adequate supply of orchard grass and blue grass, which are the principle species used in the pasture program.



Accumulated Winter Pastures is a term with which Kentucky farmers should become familiar. It refers to the removal of live stock from certain grass fields in late August, treating them with needed fertilizer and permitting growth to accumulate for grazing in December, January and February. This system has been used successfully both in research and practice and materially reduces the cost of livestock production. An acre of pasture in winter is worth as much as an acre in the summer.

An Accumulated Winter Pasture of fescue and ladino clover in North Georgia carried one cow per acre during the period, Dec. 1, 1950 to Feb. 15, 1951. The only other feed available was hay harvested from the same area the previous summer.

Plan to sow small grains this fall? These are among the best varieties for Kentucky: wheat vigo; barley-kenbar; rye-balbo; winter oats-Atlantic seeded at the right time and on good soil, these small grains furnish much grazing through the cool seasons.





SIGHTSEEING IN LAKE AREA

While you're in the lake area of Western Kentucky you won't want to miss out on the opportunity to do a little sight seeing. This famous region boasts of many things. The inventor of radio was not Marconi, as some history books teach, but Nathan B. Stubblefield, a resident of Murray, Ky. On the campus of Murray State College just 15 miles from Kentucky Lake, is a marker in memory of this great man. He is recognized as the inventor of radio by the World Almanac and many other factual and historical publications.

The home of Irvin Cobb, world renowned humorist, newspaper man and author, was at Paducah. There his birthplace on South Third Street and his burial place in Oak Grove Cemetery are marked. During Prohibition a little place by the name of Golden Pond, ten miles from Kentucky Lake on U. S. 68 and Ky. 80, became quite famous for its moonshine whiskey. In fact, it still is famous with revenue agents. In its heyday, Golden Pond was well known to New York and other big city speakeasies.

You won't want to miss the famous Old Inn at Canton, on the Cumberland River; the Ancient Buried City at Wickliffe; the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, Confederate president, at Fairview; the Woodbridge cemetery statues, at Mayfield; and the Columbus-Belmont State Park, at Columbus, on the Mississippi River (Columbus once was laid out as the site for the Capitol of the United States). Western Kentucky is famous for fluorspar, tobacco and heavy industry.

Scripture: Romans 1-3

God Is Righteous

Lesson for July 6, 1953

MAYBE it is because righteousness is not a single word. (Is there any rhyme for it?) Maybe it is because the word has a hard ring to it in some ears. It seems to suggest something rigid and unyielding, like a poker or a fencepost. Anyway, for some reason or other, we do not hear much about God's being righteous. Words like "love" or "mercy" are used more often. We hear of the high and holy God, the almighty, or we hear of the loving Father, or the Father who first and last and Dr. Foreman always is the righteous God.

A Righteous God Or None

The Bible's God is a righteous God. But the writers of the Bible did not shiver when they wrote that word. They did not believe and tremble, they believed and were glad. In fact, nobody who gives the question the serious thought it deserves would be interested in God if he were not righteous. An unrighteous God would be no God at all but a kind of devil. Righteousness means being right, first of all. It means seeing things as they are, seeing past the surface to the heart of things. No one who sees men and character dimly or crookedly can be righteous.

But righteousness is more than being right. It means being right-in-action. It includes being just and fair, though it is more than that, too. Some one might be fair because the rules compelled him to be. He might be fair to others so that they in turn would be fair to him. Righteousness means not only justice in act, but justice in desire. It means the love of justice and not only the practice of it. Righteousness—the Bible word—in addition means dependability. The original meaning of the word was simply "straight."

Justice For All

God is like man in one respect. His actions speak louder than his words. The writers of the Bible Old Testament and New, more of ten speak of God's righteous acts than of his righteous words. It remained for the Apostle Paul to sum up the case for God's righteousness. It is shown, he says—demonstrated, that is to say—in two ways. These two ways are enlarged on in the early chapters of Romans as well as elsewhere in Paul's writings.

First of all, the justice of God expresses His righteousness. God is no " respecter of persons; " in other words, He plays no favorites. Paul's own people, the Jews, had misunderstood what it meant to be the "chosen" people. They had supposed it meant they were God's favorites, though the prophets had long tried to explain that "chosen" meant chosen for service, appointed. Some people today think that "Nordics" or Americans or some other group is God's chosen people. His favorites. His pets so to speak. No, the Bible teaching is that in God's sight all men stand on an equal footing.

Redemption For All

If this were all that could be said, we of the human race would be in a hopeless hole. As Paul shows, the fact that God treats all men alike in the long run, is no comfort at all; it only means that the verdict "GUILTY" must be pronounced on us all. Comparing what we are with what we ought to be, not even we ourselves can honestly say much for ourselves. If God's righteousness were nothing but an even-handed justice, it would be a searing flame. But it is more. The other way God shows His righteousness is in His mercy, in His coming to us in Christ. He has made salvation—that is, the setting-free from the deadly whirling wheel of sin and destruction—He made this free to all. He forces mercy on no one. But if He offered mercy and forgiveness only to a selected few—for that matter, only to a selected many—then while He might be called merciful, He could hardly be called righteous. If God saved everyone, regardless He would still not be righteous. He saves those who have faith, that is, those who humbly accept what they realize they can never earn—the transforming love of God. For one of the glorious things about God is that He is not only righteous—He shares His righteousness.


