TVA Resource-Development Funds OK'd by US Senate

Marshall Youths Win at 4-H Camp

A number of 4-H Club members from McCracken and Marshall Counties hold the distinction of being the first campers at the new Dawson Springs 4-H Camp.

The five-day camping session June 29-July 3 featured instruction in swimming, handicrafts and electricity, nature study, folk games, music, vespers and evening entertainment programs.

Latest improvements to the 450-acre tract include erection of a kitchen and dining hall to handle 200 people and 10 cottages housing 12 girls each.

Outstanding youngsters received awards at the close of camp.

Amendment Put Across By Cooper

The U. S. Senate has adopted an amendment offered by Senator John Sherman Cooper to give the TVA the authority for continuing its resource development work.

The money had been eliminated from the budget in the House of Representatives.

The Senate action came after a speech in support of the appropriation by Senator Cooper during debate on the Second Independent Offices Appropriations Bill on July 10.

Senator Saltwater of Massachusetts, chairman of the appropriations subcommittee, which had made the study of the appropriations bill, accepted the principle of Senator Cooper's proposal on behalf of the Senate appropriations committee and this action was thereupon adopted by the Senate as a whole.

Senator Cooper's amendment was the only one adopted by the Senate for increase in the fund under the Second Independent Offices Bill.

Cooper's amendment added \$1,750,000 to the full TVA appropriation for the purpose of maintaining the TVA resource development program.

The original estimate for this program, presented to Congress by the Truman administration was \$2,377,000.

The Eisenhower administration offered a revised estimate of \$2,090,000, a reduction of \$287,000.

The House of Representatives eliminated the entire sum. The Senate Appropriations Committee followed suit.

Cooper then took the fight to the Senate floor and won. Several Benton business men and civic groups wired protests to Washington about eliminating the resource development funds. Other towns in this section of the state also had filed protests. Elimination of the funds would have curtailed operations of the TVA program in this area.

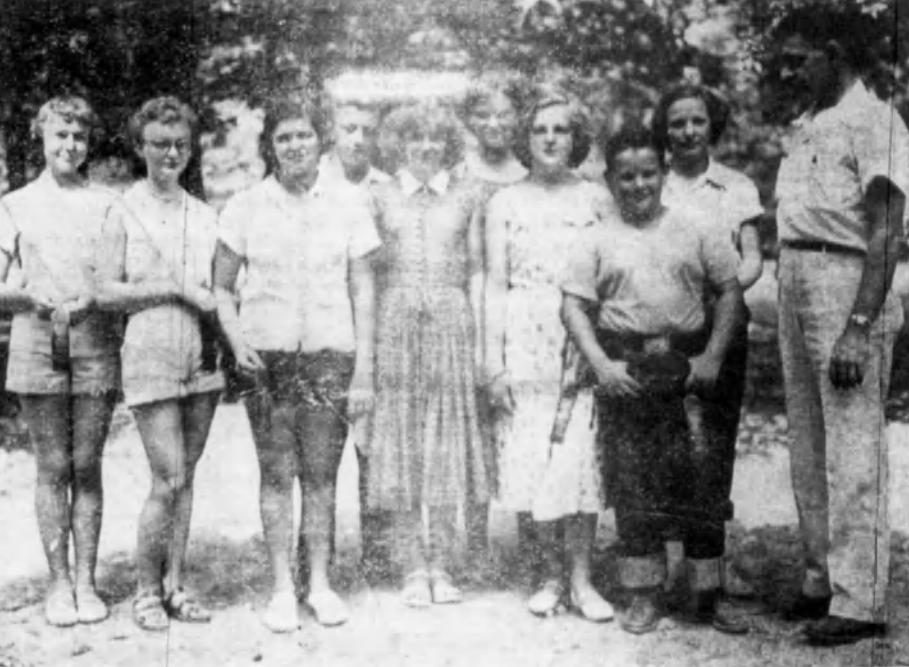

SIGHTSEEING IN LAKE AREA

While you're in the lake area of Western Kentucky you won't want to miss out on the opportunity to do a little sight seeing. This famous region boasts of many things. The inventor of radio was not Marconi, as some history books teach, but Nathan B. Stubblefield, a resident of Murray, Ky. On the campus of Murray State College just 15 miles from Kentucky Lake, is a marker in memory of this great man. He is recognized as the inventor of radio by the World Almanac and many other factual and historical publications.

The home of Irvin Cobb, world renowned humorist, newspaper man and author, was at Paducah. There his birthplace on South Third Street and his burial place in Oak Grove Cemetery are marked. During Prohibition a little place by the name of Golden Pond, ten miles from Kentucky Lake on U. S. 68 and Ky. 80, became quite famous for its moonshine whiskey. In fact, it still is famous with revenue agents! In its heyday, Golden Pond was well known to New York and other big city speakeasies.

You won't want to miss the famous Old Inn at Canton, on the Cumberland River; the Ancient Buried City at Wickliffe; the birthplace of Jefferson Davis, Confederate president, at Fairview; the Woodruff cemetery statues, at Mayfield; and the Columbus-Belmont State Park, at Columbus, on the Mississippi River (Columbus once was laid out as the site for the Capitol of the United States). Western Kentucky is famous for fluorspar, tobacco and heavy industry.

Report Made by Western Dark Fire Tobacco Group

The twenty-second annual meeting of the members of Western Dark Fire Tobacco Growers' Association was held July 8 at Murray, headquarters, for the association.

Boone Hill, president, advised members that 2295 hogheads of tobacco were sold last year and that the association packed of both types 1347 hogheads of the 1952 crop, representing a decrease of 948 hogheads old stocks.

Receipts of the 1952 crop were 11 1/2% of the total sales representing 1,267,280 pounds of Type 23 tobacco; and 23% of Type 35 tobacco representing 683,774 pounds.

The fiscal affairs of the association and its subsidiaries, Murray Warehousing Corporation and Western Dark Tobacco Packing Corporation were reviewed and President Hill reported that Packing Corporation had a net savings of 60¢ per one hundred pounds during the past year.

There are 13,000 active members in the eight counties of Kentucky and Henry, Weakley and Obion Counties in Tennessee.

The Western Dark Fire Tobacco Growers' Association subsidiary, Murray Warehouse Corporation, as agent for wheat producers, received approximately 40,000 bushels of wheat for storage in tobacco properties enabling farmers to obtain support prices for wheat.

The directors passed a resolution praising the efforts of United States Senators Earl C. Clements and John Sherman Cooper and Congressman Noble J. Gregory for their aid in working out a program whereby farmers might receive loans for their wheat in this area. The directors also expressed their appreciation to R.O. Wilson, former chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee, for his assistance in the wheat program and his services to the past several years.

A survey by counties indicates that crop conditions are spotted and the outlook at this stage is poor for dark tobacco. Poor stands and irregular growth was noted.

Banks Provide Farmers With Most of Their Credit

During 1952 Kentucky farmers called upon the state's banks to provide them more credit than was extended by any other type of farm lending agency, according to H.L. Trevathan, president, Bank of Marshall County, who represents the Kentucky Bankers Association as Marshall County agricultural chairman.

Quoting from the twelfth annual study of farm lending by the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association, Trevathan noted on Jan. 1, 1953, Kentucky banks had loans totaling \$184,023,000 outstanding to farmers, compared with \$73,091,000 held by all other principal lending agencies combined.

"As they have in the past, the state's farmers continued in 1952 to turn mostly to their banks when they needed credit," Trevathan said. "The amount of credit the farmers needed to run a successful operation is much larger today than it was in past decades," he continued, "farming is now a mechanized, highly competitive

enterprise; and operating a profitable farm involves a much greater investment in machinery and modern agricultural methods. Hence, adequate funds are a prime concern to the farm operator. Meeting his needs for operating credit is one of the most important services of Kentucky banks."

The banks have encouraged farmers to modernize and improve their present acreage rather than buy additional land during this period of high land prices. More than half of the bank loans outstanding at the beginning of this year were production loans, not real estate loans.

Trevathan reported that 351 of the 362 insured commercial banks in Kentucky served agriculture by making credit available to farmers during 1952.

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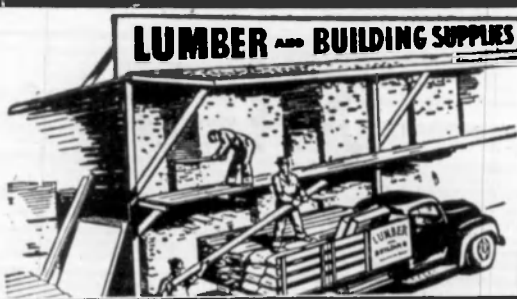
