## Huge Old Bank Safe Is Tossed Into Discard

An old time fixture in banking is disappearing from the business field in Benton. The Bank of Benton, in its program of remodeling, is doing away with its old 13,000 pound safe, long a familiar fixture in the front window of the bank. The safe was bought in 1905 for the sum of \$5,000. The safe was purchased, oldtimers say, after the bank was robbed in 1904 of \$4,700. Safecrackers blew open the previous safe to make away with the money. Bank officials decided it was high time to get a safer safe. When the new steel giant arrived, oldtimers say, it caused considerable commotion in town. How would they get it from the depot to the bank? A sort of sled contraption was rigged up by Oscar Brandon, a Benton lumberman of that day, and strong oxen were used to pull the sled and the giant safe from the depot to the bank. The bank's customers, the story goes, were very happy about the new safe. They felt certain their money would be forever safe from burglars. And it was. The bank never was robbed again. Vic Mobley, who collects things other people can't handle, fell heir to the steel giant of a bygone banking era.

## RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Seeing Re

With an abundance of vege-  
tables and fruits at hand, this  
is the season to enjoy salad.  
Dressings of different types pro-  
vide variety from day to day,  
says Mrs. Pearl Haak, specialist  
in foods at the University of  
Kentucky.

Although basic French dress-  
ing is usually made with cider  
vinegar, try substituting from 1  
to 4 tablespoons with other  
flavored vinegars, such as tarragon,  
eschalot or garlic. The addi-  
tion of horseradish, chili sauce,  
catsup, or Roquefort cheese gives  
a distinctive flavor.

FRENCH DRESSING: 1 cup  
salad oil, 1/2 cup apple cider vine-  
gar, 1/4 cup tarragon vinegar,  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup sugar,  
1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon  
horseradish. Put ingredients in a  
deep bowl and beat with rotary  
beater until all are well blended.  
Serve on tossed salads.

FRUIT SALAD DRESSING: 3  
tablespoons orange juice, 3 ta-  
blespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon  
pineapple juice, 1-3 cup sugar, 1

teaspoon flour, 2 eggs, 1/4 cup  
whipping cream.

Heat fruit juices. Mix sugar  
and flour and slowly add the  
fruit juices. Cook in double  
boiler until thick. Pour slowly  
over well-beaten eggs and cook  
2 minutes longer. Cool. Just be-  
fore serving, fold in whipped  
cream. Especially good on frozen  
fruit, congealed gelatin fruit  
salad, or fresh fruit.

## Ky. Dam Village Top Vacation Spot Again

FRANKFORD — Kentucky's State Parks attracted nearly ten times as many visitors during the last fiscal year as they did five years earlier when an expanded park system was just being started by the State. A report issued today by Henry Ward, commissioner of Conservation, shows that attendance for the 1952-1953 fiscal period hit an all-time high with an estimated 3,261,500 persons using the parks. The figure for 1947-1948 was only 373,589. Last year's attendance was a gain of approximately 465,000 visitors over the total for 1951-1952. The increase was general throughout the system with all 24 parks and shrines showing gains. Kentucky Dam Village, Gilbertsville, again was the most visited park attracting some 1,300,000 visitors. This included

visitors to TVA's giant Kentucky Dam. Kentucky Lake State Park near Hardin, was next with about 800,000 and Cumberland Falls State Park, near Corbin, was the third most visited park with approximately 300,000 guests.

## Kentucky Squirrel Season Now Open; Limit Is 6 Per Day

FRANKFORD — Kentucky's squirrel season opened on Tuesday, Aug. 25, and will continue through Nov. 5, with a limit of six per day or a possession limit of 12 after two or more days of hunting. Preliminary reports from Conservation Officers throughout the state indicate that the squirrel crop this year is as great and in some sections greater than last season. Either rifles or shotguns may be used by the hunter, but a hunting license must be held. On Sept. 1 a 3-day dove season will open in the state with a bag and possession limit of eight. Shooting hours are from noon (CST) until sundown and doves may not be shot over baited fields.

## Marshall County Population Gains

Marshall County was one of several counties in West Kentucky which showed a population gain in the year ending on April 1, 1953. This county had a gain of 953 persons. The figures were released by the State Department of Education and are the latest school-census figures. The August issue of Kentucky Business, magazine of the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, carried a story written by Allan M. Trout of the Louisville Courier-Journal showing gains and losses in population by Kentucky counties. Sixty-seven counties showed a total population loss of 52,403 and 52 counties gained in population by 76,707, making a statewide gain of 24,304. The most spectacular gain was in the counties of Jefferson, McCracken and Fayette. Jefferson gained 29,722; McCracken 10,162 and Fayette 5,499. Most spectacular losses were in 10 coal-producing counties—Pike, Letcher, Harlan, Bell, Perry, Floyd, Knott, Knox, Whitley and McCreary. These counties lost 76,263 in population. Counties in West Kentucky showing gains, besides Marshall

and McCracken, were Calloway, Graves, Ballard, Carlisle, Livingston, Christian, Hopkins, Logan, Warren, Union, McLean, Davies and Henderson. Calloway gained 787, Graves 603, Livingston 139, Ballard 1,855 and Carlisle 36. Losses were reported for Hickman, Fulton, Trigg, Lyon, Caldwell, and Webster counties in this end of the state.

The magazine article pointed out that Kentucky's population is shifting sharply from the eastern and south-central sections to the counties in the Bluegrass and on the south bank of the Ohio River.

This condition is due partly to the poor economic conditions in the eastern coal-producing counties and also partly to the industrial gains in the Ohio River counties and to the industrial boom in McCracken and Marshall counties.

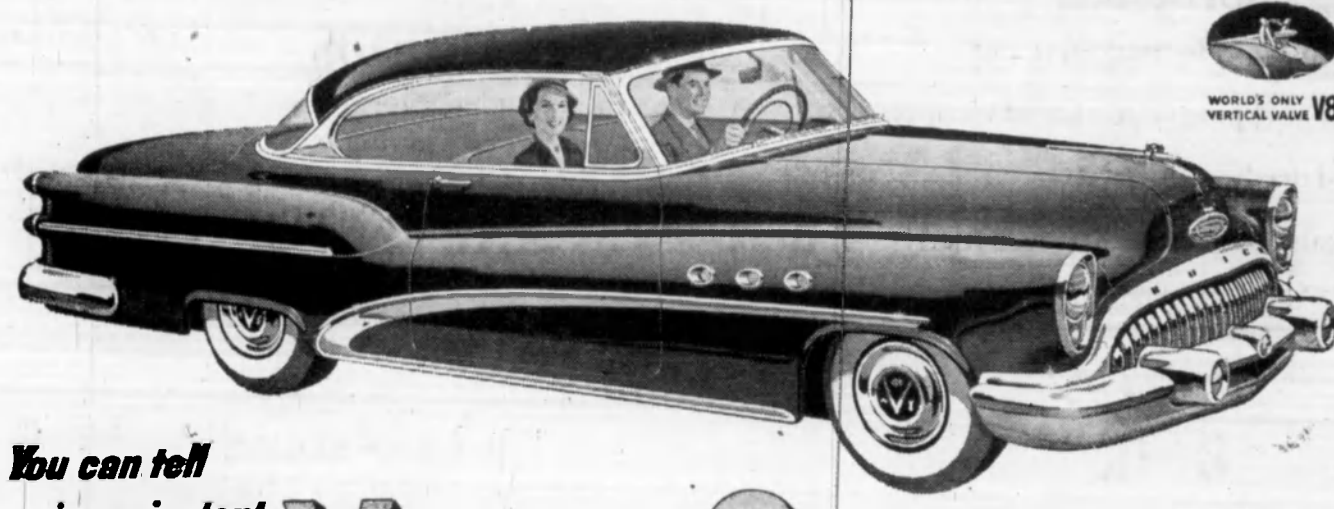

## 2,430,000 Seedlings Distributed

FRANKFORT — Kentucky's Division of Forestry distributed 2,430,000 seedlings for planting on private and public lands last year, according to a report by Forestry Director Harold B. Jewell.

The figure is a new record, exceeding the total for 1951-1952, the previous high year, by some 70,000 seedlings.

The report shows that trees were planted on nearly 2,500 acres of land as a result of the program. Seedlings were sold from two nurseries belonging to the division — at Dawson Springs and Louisville — and also imported from out-of-state nurseries for sale.

Species of seedlings distributed were white ash, black locust, red and white oak, white, loblolly and shortleaf pine, yellow poplar and black walnut.

Pines were the most popular species with 1,137,000 shortleaf, 404,000 loblolly and 183,000 white seedlings being sold.

In addition to its own program of distribution, the division distributed 421,000 seedlings provided by the TVA for seven far west Kentucky counties during the year.

### Civil War Widows

In Kentucky Draw \$25,000 In Pensions

FRANKFORT — The Civil War — over 88 years — still cost Kentuckians nearly \$25,000 last fiscal year in pensions paid to widows of Confederate veterans.

The Department of Finance reported that during the year ending June 30 a total of \$24,454 was paid under a pension law for veterans and widows first passed in 1914 and later amended. Present provisions pay widows \$600 a year and provide their estates \$100 for burial expenses.

There are at present 35 widows on the pension rolls. There are no surviving veterans listed.

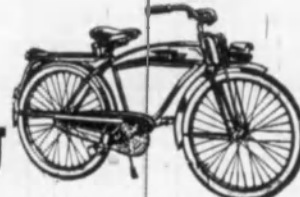

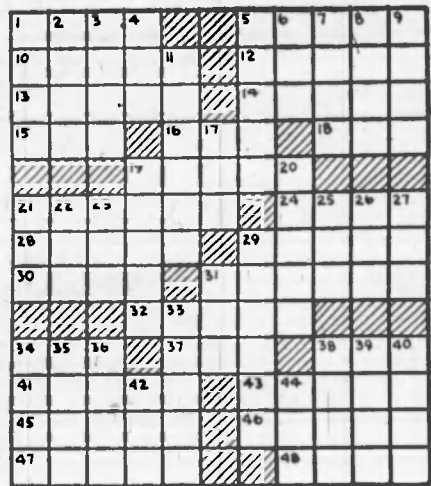
