Bank of Marshall County To Mark 50th Anniversary

The Bank of Marshall County will observe its Golden Anniversary this Saturday with open house from 1 to 8 p. m. There will be souvenirs, entertainment and refreshments for visitors. Also a birthday candle will be lighted and the public is invited to take part in a guessing contest as to how long the candle will burn. Government bonds will be given for the three best guesses.

Letters have been arriving all week, congratulating President B. L. Trevathan and officers and directors of the bank. The letters are from bankers, business and professional leaders from all parts of Kentucky and several other states.

Growth Figures
And by Saturday the bank will be decorated with bouquets of flowers from its friends and well wishers.

The Bank of Marshall County was organized on Sept. 26, 1903. It was incorporated with resources of only \$16,011.98. On June 30, 1913, its resources had climbed to \$114,022.97.

Here are growth figures down through the years:
June 30, 1923 - \$218,742.79.
June 30, 1933 - \$388,720.35.
June 30, 1943 - \$1,464,635.59.
June 30, 1953 - \$3,515,458.96.

First Officers
First officers of the bank, elected in 1903, were R. G. Treas, president; W. M. Gold, vice president, and W. C. Rowe, cashier.

First directors of the bank were J. N. Henson, T. E. Russell, R. G. Treas, W. M. Gold, E. Barry, M. Oliver, J. W. Reed, T. A. Shemwell, W. M. Reed, T. A. Miller and Lee Cox.

The bank has now had five presidents in its 50 years of service. R. G. Treas, who served from 1903 to October 1906, J. N. Henson, from October 1906 to December 1907; Joe L. Price, from December 1907 to Jan. 1, 1949, and the present chief executive, B. L. Trevathan, who was elected on Feb. 4, 1949.

Vice presidents of the bank in 1903 were R. G. Treas, president; W. M. Gold, vice president, and W. C. Rowe, cashier.

W. L. Prince has been attorney for the bank for 25 years.

Mrs. Betty Brien, secretary to Mr. Trevathan, is a great granddaughter of W. M. Gold, the bank's original vice president.

County Soil Conservation Notes

Daniel Devor of Fairdealing reports, "The farm pond I dug last year was the best investment I have made so far in this farm. There are four or five feet of water in it now during this dry weather". Gilbert Henson, Fairdealing, has lost all the water out of his pond. The cause seems to be incorrect construction of the dam. He plans to make repairs early next summer. Paul C. Newton, east of Tatumville, said, "I cut the corn from five acres so that grass could be seeded early. Now the dry weather is delaying the seeding work". Newton plans to sow two acres of timothy to produce hay for

his chinchillas. On five other acres the corn stalks are to be disced down and a small grain cover crop sown. The following farmers received help from the Soil Conservation Service in staking ponds during August: Ralph C. Ross, Sharpe; C. W. McDougal, Palma; H. H. Gregory, near Lakeview Church; Randal Anderson, Fairdealing; and T. H. Williams, west of Benton. Ponds were dug by the following farmers during August: Ned Pacy, Hardin; Daniel Irwan and Woodrow Hill, south of Sharpe; Alvie Edwards, south of Benton; T. R. Foust and A. P. Harrell, Palma; and Govie Collins, Pusumtrot.

Roy E. Story has bought fifty more acres of land near Possum Trot. The land had been idle for many years and had grown up in brush. In the past two months Story has cleared the land, dug drainage ditches, shaped waterways and prepared the seedbed. Because of the drought, he plans to sow winter oats instead of grass. A new pond was also dug. Archie Story, west of Scale, has cleared several acres of bottom land for pasture. Row crops would drown during summers of normal rainfall. C. W. 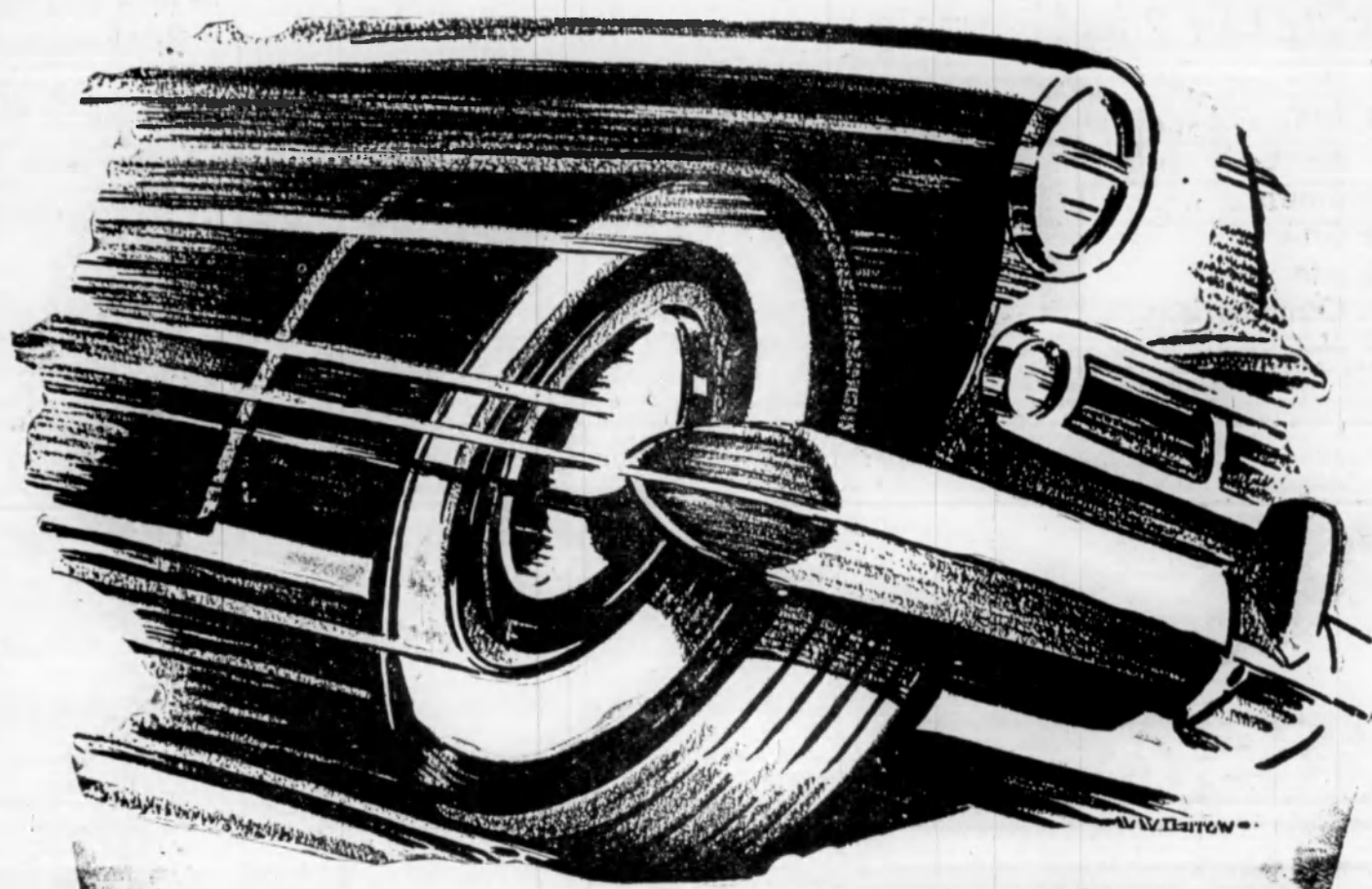

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Butterscotch Chiffon Pie

1 1/2 cups Fat
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup butter
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1 egg white

Put 3/4 cup milk into ice cube tray of refrigerator. Chill until ice crystals begin to form around edges. Press a mixture of the crumbs and butter firmly in bottom and on sides of 9-inch pie pan. Soften gelatin in cold water. Put pudding powder, sugar and salt into a saucepan. Stir in gradually a mixture of 1/2 cup milk and the water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture is thickened. Add softened gelatin and stir until dissolved. Chill until almost firm. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed until fluffy. Add lemon juice and whip until stiff. Beat in pudding. Pour into crust. Chill until firm, about 3 hours.
