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
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Pre-trial conf. held in case of Crouse, local hospital

Attorneys for both sides of a wrongful death civil lawsuit Murray-Calloway against County Hospital met in Calloway Circuit Court Tuesday for a pre-trial conference.

The suit was filed by Shelia Crouse in October 2010 as executrix of the estate of Mildred Adams, who died Dec. 14. 2009, at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, Tenn. Adams was a patient at MCCH and suffered a fall there on Dec. 13, 2009, according to the suit.

The complaint alleges that the hospital was negligent in its response to the fall and that staff allegedly failed to properly diagnose and properly treat a subdural hematoma from the accident. The suit claims that these alleged actions were a "substantial factor" in Adams' death. Crouse and Billy Ray Adams are seeking compensation for Mildred Adams' funeral and medical expenses, as well as punitive damages and compensation for pain and suffering

In Tuesday's pre-trial conference, Circuit Judge Dennis



Last year, the program served meals to 420 different kids, with a total of 1,547 meals served over the course of the summer, according to Calloway County Family Resource Center statistics.


Former prof writes book about tenure case at MSU

What happens when campus politics come into play is the subject of a recent memoir by retired Murray State University professor Wayne C. Bell.

In most faculty members' view, tenure is an important part of any college or university. Rob Donnelly, Murray State University professor of mathematics, said in his view, it protects and promotes academic freedom. A faculty member with tenure can only be fired for "incompetence, insubordination or moral turpitude."

"I think that tenure protects the university from becoming over politicized," Donnelly

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60-year-old Purple Heart medal found

ARIS, Tenn. (AP) - Just in time for Memorial Day, a 60-year-old Purple Heart medal was found in a farm ravine and was scheduled to be in the hands of the daughter of the fallen Korean War soldier who was awarded it.

The rust-stained medal, its purple enamel peeling away, was found Sunday by Jerome Cook at the farm belonging to his uncle, Maynard Cook.

According to The Paris Post-Intelligencer, the medal was still in its blackened, rusted display case. It bore the

With the help of Stephanie Tayloe at the Henry County Archives, it was learned the medal belonged to Pfc. Thomas Eugene Hutcherson. That discovery led them to Hutcherson's only daughter - Brenda Ginvard of Paris.

Ginyard said she was surprised when the family told her the news.

"It was such a shock to me, and it was so exciting to me," Ginyard said. "It's unbelievable, and the timing of it (so close to Memorial Day). That's what's so ironic." According to the Sept. 15, 1952, Paris

name Thomas E. Hutcherson on its reverse Post-Intelligencer, Hutcherson was killed earlier that month, on Sept. 4. He was an infantryman with the 38th Infantry Regiment when that unit was engaged in the Battle of Bloody Ridge.

> He'd entered the service in May 1951. and his daughter was born that September. Prior to entering the army, the Central High School graduate had excelled in football and basketball.

Ginyard said she was only I year old when her father was killed, and learned about her father from her grandmother.

said. "Faculty ... can easily butt heads with administrators that are working in a different direction, and I do think tenure protects the university and the vitality of its academic mission.

Donnelly was one of the people who encouraged Bell, who worked in the MSU mathematics department from 1976 to 2008, to write about his tenure experience. Bell's memoir, "My Tenure Biennium," is the record of his application for tenure, the denial of his application and his successful appeal.

Bell had told colleagues and friends about his tenure experience, but he said he had not thought of writing it down until after he was retired.

"One of my friends thought it would be a cathartic experience for me, and Donnelly thought it was a story that ought to be told," said Bell.

Bell compiled his book from a stack of journals he kept in his early years at Murray State, as well as transcripts of the tenure appeal hearing and letters and memos sent among university officials at the time of his tenure application and appeal.

Employees of academic institutions will immediately identify with the processes explained in the book. But Bell said he has also heard from people outside the university setting who have identified with his tale.

Foust discussed the upcoming trial with attorneys A.V. Conway, who represents the plaintiffs, and Rick Walter, who represents MCCH. Foust said the trial would begin with jury selection on June 14, and he anticipated that it would be finished by June 21. He added that he would be available for other dates if the trial should last longer than expected.

Foust said the court might

need to reserve one or two alternate jurors in case of emergencies or unexpected bias on the part of any original jurors.

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

Development of the **Beverly Hills Supper** Club site stymied

SOUTHGATE, Ky. (AP) -Atop a lush green hillside in northern Campbell County sits nearly 80 acres of undeveloped land offering spectacular views of downtown Cincinnati.

Located less than four miles from the Ohio River, it provides the kind of real estate opportunity that makes developers salivate.

But the site is also fraught with emotion: on Memorial Day weekend in 1977, 165 people perished and more than 200 were injured when the Beverly Hills Supper Club burnt to the ground in what remains one of the deadliest nightclub fires in U.S. history.

The club, which touted itself as the Showplace of the Nation, drew national headliners. On the night of the fire, it is believed that 2,400 to 2,800 patrons and employees were in the building.

In the 35 years since, debate has raged within the community on how - and whether - to develop the land.

Some local survivors have fought to keep the memory of the fire alive, erecting a memorial on the site which overlooks Interstate 471 and provides a daily reminder of those who died.

At various times, the site was to have been developed into a hotel, corporate headquarters, and office/retail complex, but each fell through.

"We would love to see that site developed," said Southgate Mayor Jim Hamberg. "We've talked about it for years. I've been on City Council since 1990, and even back then we were hoping to see it developed. It didn't happen, but I'm hoping it happens in the short run rather than in the long run."

Last year, Duke Energy and local economic development agencies studied the land as part of Duke's site readiness program. The study found much potential for development, but also obstacles: access, utilities, and the emotions surrounding the site.

"It still holds out a lot of promise," said Dan Tobergte, president of the Tri-County Economic Development Authority. "We've identified a

Volunteers restore graves at disabled home

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - Volunteers in Frankfort last week placed small American flags near hundreds of nearly forgotten graves at the site of a shuttered state home for mentally and developmentally disabled Kentuckians.

Jeff Edwards is a federal program coordinator with Kentucky Protection & Advocacy for Individuals with Developmental Disabilities

He told The State Journal that several groups promoting the rights of the disabled came together to restore the cemetery.

Some of the graves were unearthed for the first time in decades and most were marked "unknown."

Frankfort State Hospital and School Cemetery housed thousands of disabled residents for more than a century before closing in 1972.

Edwards said he'd like to see the cemetery get an annual cleaning and possibly a historical marker.

2 state workers fired for sex with inmate

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) - Two female state workers have been fired after admitting to investigators that they had sex with a male prison inmate who was performing janitorial work at the Department of Housing, Buildings and Construction.

The Lexington Herald-Leader reported on the investigation after obtaining documents through an Open Records Act request.

Scarlett Perry and Dawna King were fired earlier this month. A third employee, Benjamin Lawyer, was suspended for five

days for failing to properly supervise the inmate and allowing him access to pornographic material that he viewed at work.

The reports also noted allegations that moonshine was repeatedly brought to the department and that department workers improperly sold copper fittings that plumbers used when taking exams.

The inspector general's office did not substantiate the moonshine allegations.

Police find body hidden in barn

HUSTONVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Kentucky State Police have discovered human remains inside a Lincoln County barn.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Paul Blanton told WKYT-TV that the home owner smelled a foul odor coming from the barn a few weeks ago but thought it was a dead animal.

After hearing that Thomas Hager was accused of shooting and killing two people in nearby Danville on Monday he got suspicious

Hager used to live in a trailer on the property with another man named Clint Deskins.

Deskins has not been seen since mid-March.

Police searched the barn on Friday evening, finding the body of a man hidden underneath a pile of trash bags.

They have not yet identified the body or the cause of death.

The Fairness Campaign, a Louisville-based gay rights organization, hailed Blanchard's ordination as one of only about two dozen at Baptist churches in the U.S.

Highland Baptist, which is not a member of the Southern Baptist Convention, says on its website it is "open to anyone who professes Christ as Savior.'

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

WASHINGTON (AP) - Mitt Romney clinched the Republican presidential nomination Tuesday with a win in the Texas primary, a triumph of endurance for a candidate who came up short four years ago and had to fight hard this year as voters flirted with a carousel of GOP rivals.

According to the Associated Press count, Romney surpassed the 1,144 delegates needed to win the nomination by winning

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primary. The former Massachusetts governor has reached the nomination milestone with a steady message of concern about the U.S. economy, a campaign organization that dwarfed those of his GOP foes and a fundraising operation second only to that of his Democratic opponent in

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Barack Obama.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The University of Louisville was swamped by flash flooding Tuesday after strong thunderstorms dumped heavy rain and produced lightning that struck an apartment building on the

edge of campus. Fire broke out shortly before 8 a.m. EDT after lightning struck the privately owned apartment complex, said UofL spokesman Mark Hebert. At least a dozen students were dislocated, and others might have to relocate, but there were no injuries, he said.

University officials were

working with the apartment complex managers to find new housing for the students.

Water seeped into at least five buildings on the main Belknap campus. The worst-hit appeared to be the chemistry building, which had about four inches in the basement, Hebert said. The basement of the building remained flooded just before 1 p.m. EDT.

The school canceled morning and afternoon classes but had not decided whether to call off evening classes.

"It was totally unexpected," Hebert said.

Ann Taylor finished off her productive day by taking third in the 200 meters.

Seventh graders Sarah McDowell and Grace Campbell produced big points also, with McDowell placing second in the discus, while Campbell took fourth in the triple jump.

The boys competition was tight all day long, and the Tigers had great success from their field events, as well as their relay teams).

The 4x200 meter relay team of Robert Harvey, Peyton Glynn, JD Cashion, and Des Jahvonni Miles captured second place, while the 4x100 team of Danny Chavarria, Glynn, Cashion, and Miles also finished second.


DEAR SPILL SURVIVOR: Since you are asking me, I suspect that the person who bumped into you took no responsibility for what happened.

Dr. Anthony average Komaroff American took in only about 15 grams of fructose, also called fruit sugar, a day. Most of it came from eating fruits and vegetables. Today we average four or five times that amount. And almost all of it comes from sweetened foods and beverages such as breakfast cereals, sodas and fruit drinks.

Human beings have been on Earth for tens of thousands of years. In that time, our bodies got used to a certain diet. Then, in the last 100 years, our bodies have been exposed to much higher levels of fructose

Common sense might say that such a relatively sudden and large dietary change might be hard for the body to adjust to. Common sense isn't always right, but in this case, it is: There is considerable evidence that today's high levels of fructose are harmful.

Virtually every cell in the body can break down glucose for energy. In contrast, about the only cells that can get energy directly from fructose are liver cells. What the liver does with fructose, espe-

cially when high levels enter it, has potentially dangerous consequences for our health.

High levels of fructose

can damage your liver

When fructose enters the liver, it goes through a series of changes. One remarkable change is that the liver uses fructose, a carbohydrate, to create fat.

Give the liver enough fructose, and tiny fat droplets begin to accumulate in liver cells. This buildup is called non-alcoholic fatty liver disease. It looks like what happens in the livers of people who drink too much alcohol. The breakdown of fructose in

the liver also: -- elevates triglycerides;

-- increases LDL (bad) cholesterol; -- promotes the buildup of fat

around organs; -- increases blood pressure;

makes tissues insulin-resistant, a precursor to diabetes

None of these changes are good for the arteries and the heart.

There is considerable evidence that people who have more fructose in their diets have higher rates of non-alcoholic fatty liver disease, obesity, diabetes and heart disease. However, fructose has not been proven to be a cause of these conditions.

Still, it's worth cutting back on fructose. That's what I tell my patients, and what I have done myself. But don't do it by giving up fruit. Fruit is good for you, and it's only a minor source of fructose for most people.

Instead, cut back on refined sugar and high-fructose corn syrup. For starters, that means limiting your intake of sugar-sweetened drinks, pastries and breakfast cereals
