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Pre-trial conf. held in case of Crouse, local hospital

Attorneys for both sides of a wrongful death civil lawsuit against Murray-Calloway County Hospital met in Calloway Circuit Court Tuesday for a pre-trial conference.

The suit was filed by Shelia Crouse in October 2010 as executrix of the estate of Mildred Adams, who died Dec. 14, 2009, at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, Tenn. Adams was a patient at MCCH and suffered a fall there on Dec. 13, 2009, according to the suit.

The complaint alleges that the hospital was negligent in its response to the fall and that staff allegedly failed to properly diagnose and properly treat a subdural hematoma from the accident. The suit claims that these alleged actions were a "substantial factor" in Adams' death. Crouse and Billy Ray Adams are seeking compensation for Mildred Adams' funeral and medical expenses, as well as punitive damages and compensation for pain and suffering.

In Tuesday's pre-trial conference, Circuit Judge Dennis

Large crowd turns out for 1st 2012 Summer in the Park day

Dozens of kids and teenagers came out to Murray-Calloway County Central Park Tuesday to get a bite to eat and do something fun for their summer vacation.

Tuesday was the kickoff of Summer in the Park, an annual community partnership program between several local organizations. Five days a week through July 17, the program offers a new activity for young people to participate in, and a free meal before hand, said Julie Stone, Murray

Family Resource Center director. This year's activities have been moved from Chestnut Park to the Playhouse in the Park deck in Central Park.

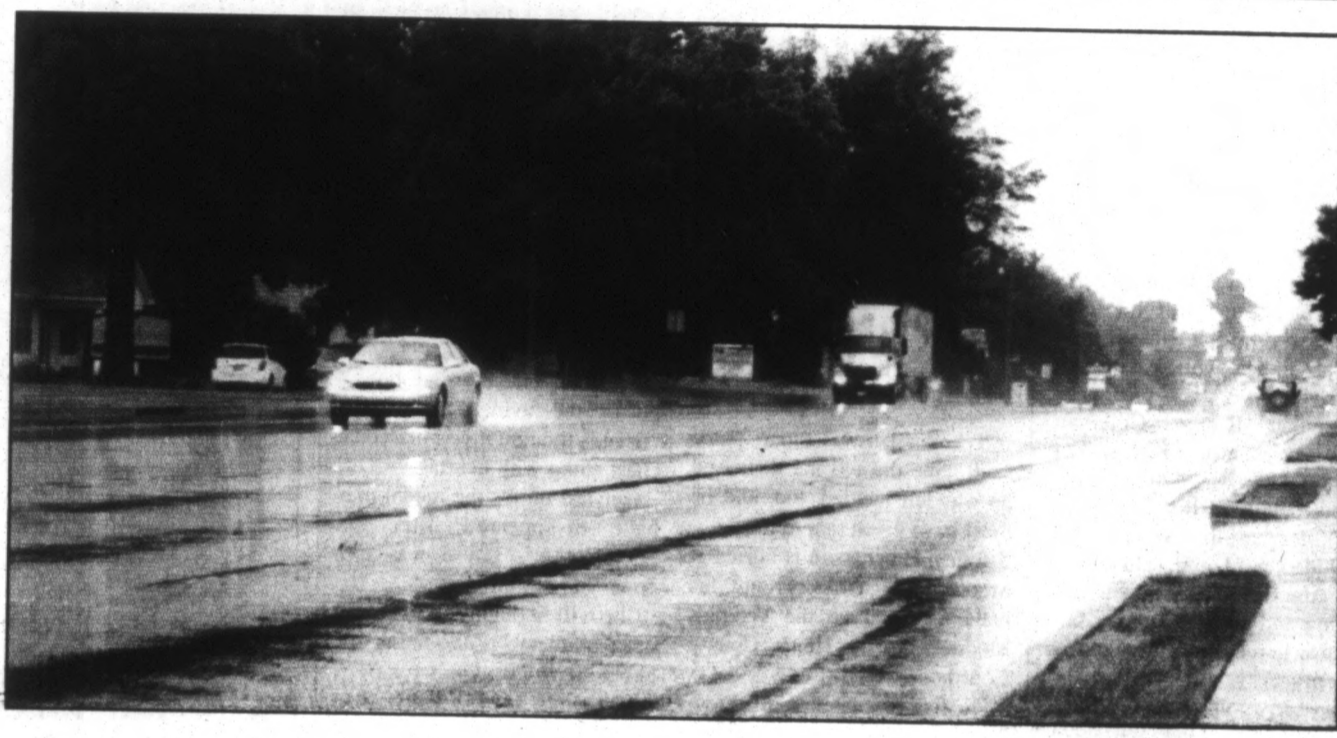
Stone expects an average of 50 children a day will take part in Summer in the Park. Last year, the program served meals to 420 different kids, with a total of 1,547 meals served over the course of the summer, according to Calloway County Family Resource Center statistics.

Each partner is responsible for a different day's

A WELCOME SITE: Murray and Calloway County got a small drenching Tuesday morning as part of a weak cold front moving west through the region passed over the area. Justin Holland, official National Weather Service observer, said the scattered 0.20 to 1.0 inches the storm system brought to the county had little effect on western Kentucky's current severe drought. Former prof writes book about tenure case at MSU

What happens when campus politics come into play is the subject of a recent memoir by retired Murray State University professor Wayne C. Bell.

In most faculty members' view, tenure is an important part of any college or university. Rob Donnelly, Murray State University professor of mathematics, said in his view, it protects and promotes academic freedom. A faculty member with tenure can only be fired for "incompetence, insubordination or moral turpitude."

"I think that tenure protects the university from becoming over politicized," Donnelly said. "Faculty ... can easily butt heads with administrators that are working in a different direction, and I do think tenure protects the university and the vitality of its academic mission."

Donnelly was one of the people who encouraged Bell, who worked in the MSU mathematics department from 1976 to 2008, to write about his tenure experience. Bell's memoir, "My Tenure Biennium," is the record of his application for tenure, the denial of his application and his successful appeal.

Bell had told colleagues and friends about his tenure experience, but he said he had not thought of writing it down until after he was retired.

"One of my friends thought it would be a cathartic experience for me, and Donnelly thought it was a story that ought to be told," said Bell.

Bell compiled his book from a stack of journals he kept in his early years at Murray State, as well as transcripts of the tenure appeal hearing and letters and memos sent among university officials at the time of his tenure application and appeal.

Employees of academic institutions will immediately identify with the processes explained in the book. But Bell said he has also heard from people outside the university setting who have identified with his tale.

60-year-old Purple Heart medal found

PARIS, Tenn. (AP) - Just in time for Memorial Day, a 60-year-old Purple Heart medal was found in a farm ravine and was scheduled to be in the hands of the daughter of the fallen Korean War soldier who was awarded it.

The rust-stained medal, its purple enamel peeling away, was found Sunday by Jerome Cook at the farm belonging to his uncle, Maynard Cook.

According to The Paris Post-Intelligencer, the medal was still in its blackened, rusted display case. It bore the

name Thomas E. Hutcherson on its reverse side.

With the help of Stephanie Tayloe at the Henry County Archives, it was learned the medal belonged to Pfc. Thomas Eugene Hutcherson. That discovery led them to Hutcherson's only daughter - Brenda Ginyard of Paris.

Ginyard said she was surprised when the family told her the news.

"It was such a shock to me, and it was so exciting to me," Ginyard said. "It's unbelievable, and the timing of it (so close to Memorial Day). That's what's so ironic."

According to the Sept. 15, 1952, Paris

Post-Intelligencer, Hutcherson was killed earlier that month, on Sept. 4. He was an infantryman with the 38th Infantry Regiment when that unit was engaged in the Battle of Bloody Ridge.

He'd entered the service in May 1951, and his daughter was born that September. Prior to entering the army, the Central High School graduate had excelled in football and basketball.

Ginyard said she was only 1 year old when her father was killed, and learned about her father from her grandmother.

activity, Stone explained. 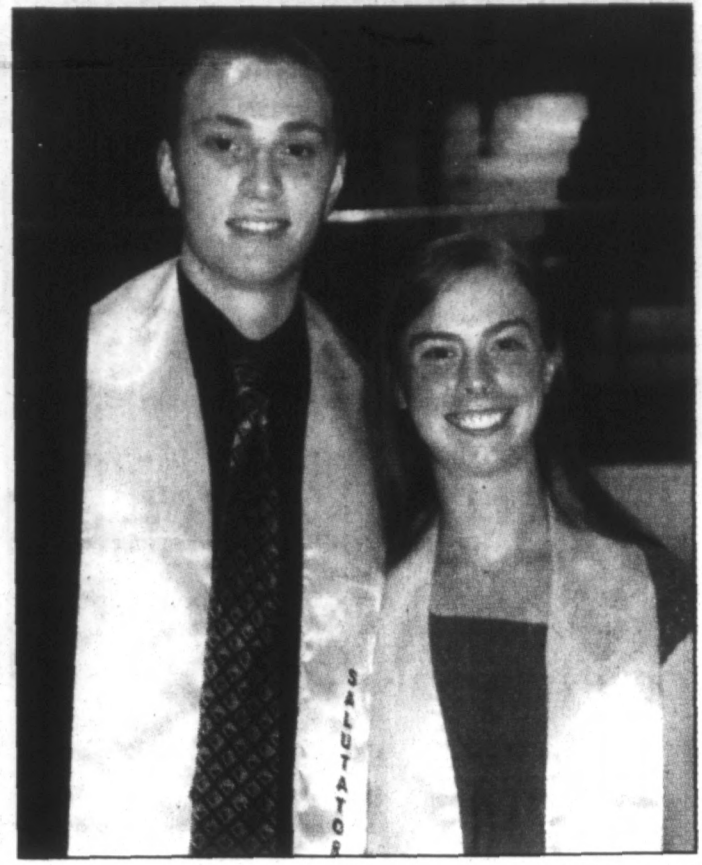

Foust discussed the upcoming trial with attorneys A.V. Conway, who represents the plaintiffs, and Rick Walter, who represents MCCH. Foust said the trial would begin with jury selection on June 14, and he anticipated that it would be finished by June 21. He added that he would be available for other dates if the trial should last longer than expected.

Foust said the court might

need to reserve one or two alternate jurors in case of emergencies or unexpected bias on the part of any original jurors.

"A lot of times, people do know something about some of these cases," Foust said. "It amazes me, and whether what they know is factual or false, a lot of times they already have opinions formed. And they're usually not shy about sharing those."

A lawsuit presents only one side of a case.

Korean War memorial dedicated in Paducah

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) - A new memorial for Korean War veterans has been dedicated in Paducah.

The Paducah Sun reports the memorial was a collaborative effort between the city, the county, a local American Legion post, other veteran organizations and private donors.

Several Korean War veterans gathered Monday to dedicate the three-columned monument that stands 10 feet tall and 12 feet wide in smooth black granite. The front has a bronze medallion for each service branch and shows a bronze sculpture containing a collage of images from the Korean War. The back includes a timeline of

the war. "I think it's a beautiful monument," said McCracken County Judge-Executive Van Newberry, who came up with the idea. Newberry says it was inspired by his father, who is a Korean War veteran.

Speaker Robert Coleman, who served in the Korean War in the U.S. Air Force, spoke about details of the war during the dedication, which also included a 21-gun salute from the American Legion, a wreath laying and a time to honor fallen war heroes from McCracken County.

Newberry said it took about a year to raise more than \$60,000 for the monument. The county and the city each contributed \$15,000.

"I know he was smart," she said. "She did tell me that. And he was left handed, too, and he must have given that to me."

Today, Hutcherson is buried at Maplewood Cemetery, and his name is listed on the Veterans Memorial at the Henry County Courthouse.

The flag presented to his grieving mother, Alma, is in a chest at his daughter's home, where his Purple Heart also was thought to rest.

"We don't have a clue how it got (in the ravine)," Cook said. "Brenda thought it was in a cedar chest along with his flag."

Ginyard thinks the medal may have disappeared after her grandmother's house was torn down and rebuilt in 1998.

She will be happy to have one more memento of the father she never knew.

"Although I was a baby when he got killed, after I got older, I felt like I knew him because of all the nice things that were said about him."

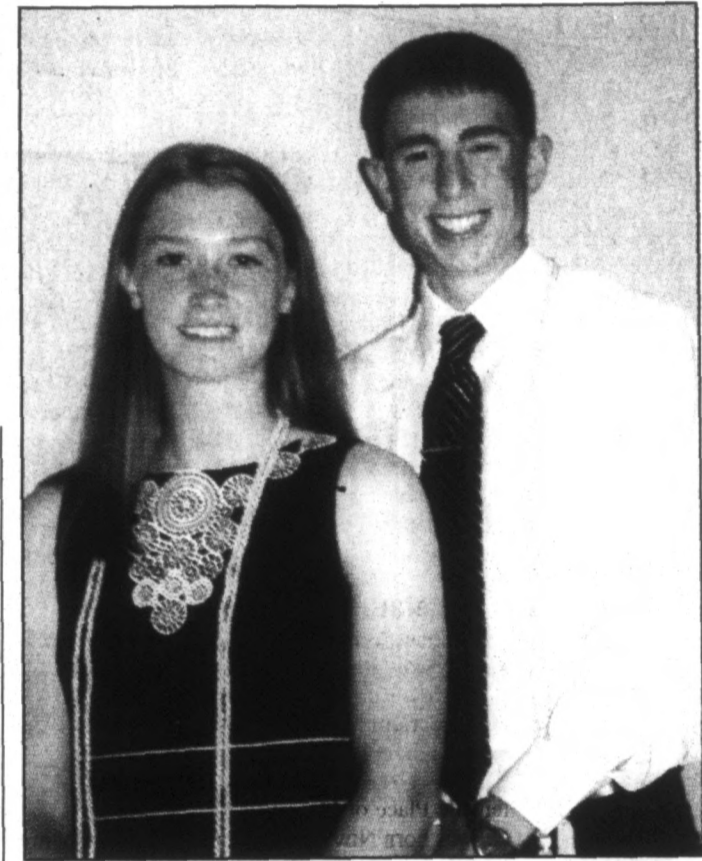

"Academics or not, any institution that has processes for promotion and evaluation, needs to take extreme care to protect the integrity of those processes, and that's the main thing that I think

(the book) has to say to anyone else outside academia," he said.

Bell said he feels his story is a part of Murray State history. At the time he applied for tenure, the university was going through a major shift toward a more academically rigorous and

professional system that ultimately made it what it is today, he said. Bell said he views his case as an example of mistakes from which the university learned, as well as a reminder to all schools to never allow politics to interfere with an institution's educational mission.

Folk musician Doc Watson dies at NC hospital

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) - Doc Watson, the Grammy-award winning folk musician whose lightning-fast style of flatpicking influenced guitarists around the world for more than a half-century, died Tuesday at a hospital in Winston-Salem, according to a hospital spokeswoman and his manager. He was 89.

Watson, who was blind from age 1, recently had abdominal surgery that resulted in his hospitalization.

Arthel "Doc" Watson's mas-

tery of flatpicking helped make the case for the guitar as a lead instrument in the 1950s and 1960s, when it was often considered a backup for the mandolin, fiddle or banjo. His fast playing could intimidate other musicians, even his own grandson, who performed with him.

Richard Watson said in a 2000 interview with The Associated Press that his grandfather's playing had a humbling effect on other musicians. The ever-humble Doc Watson found it hard to believe.

Development of the Beverly Hills Supper Club site stymied

SOUTHGATE, Ky. (AP) — Atop a lush green hillside in northern Campbell County sits nearly 80 acres of undeveloped land offering spectacular views of downtown Cincinnati.

Located less than four miles from the Ohio River, it provides the kind of real estate opportunity that makes developers salivate.

But the site is also fraught with emotion: on Memorial Day weekend in 1977, 165 people perished and more than 200 were injured when the Beverly Hills Supper Club burnt to the ground in what remains one of the deadliest nightclub fires in U.S. history.

The club, which touted itself as the Showplace of the Nation, drew national headlines. On the night of the fire, it is believed that 2,400 to 2,800 patrons and employees were in the building.

In the 35 years since, debate has raged within the community on how - and whether - to develop the land.

Some local survivors have fought to keep the memory of the fire alive, erecting a memorial on the site which overlooks Interstate 471 and provides a daily reminder of those who died.

At various times, the site was to have been developed into a hotel, corporate headquarters, and office/retail complex, but each fell through.

"We would love to see that site developed," said Southgate Mayor Jim Hamberg. "We've talked about it for years. I've been on City Council since 1990, and even back then we were hoping to see it developed. It didn't happen, but I'm hoping it happens in the short run rather than in the long run."

Last year, Duke Energy and local economic development agencies studied the land as part of Duke's site readiness program. The study found much potential for development, but also obstacles: access, utilities, and the emotions surrounding the site.

"It still holds out a lot of promise," said Dan Toberge, president of the Tri-County Economic Development Authority. "We've identified a

few things on the site, with respect to infrastructure, to get it ready for development ... Once it's ready to be marketed, we can go at it in earnest."

Since 2001, the land has been owned by Life Enriching Communities, a Loveland non-profit that operates senior living communities in Montgomery and College Hill.

"We don't have a plan at this point to develop it," said Connie Kingsbury vice president of marketing and public relations. "If we have it five years from now and if the economy's better and the demographics are better, would we consider developing it? Maybe. But those are lot of 'ifs.'"

The site is not on the market, but Kingsbury said the company is entertaining offers. It includes two parcels: a 49-acre tract of land assessed at \$2.9 million, and a 30-acre tract assessed at \$1.5 million. The site would likely fetch a much higher price, however, given its development potential and proximity to the Ohio River.

"When that site is at a position to be publicly marketed and open for development, there may not be a better site within our region," said Adam Caswell, president of the Campbell County Economic Progress Authority. "With its size, with its location, and with its views of the Cincinnati skyline, that's as good as it gets."

The land is zoned for professional office use, and some envision a campus-style setting similar to those of Citigroup in Florence and Fidelity Investments in Covington.

Development of the site would provide a significant tax boost to Southgate, a 1.42-square-mile city that relies heavily upon ad valorem property tax revenue from its 3,800 residents.

"I'm a positive person. I believe there will be development on that site," Hamberg said. "I certainly hope it comes sooner rather than later, but you just don't know, especially with the economy just now coming back. And you would hope it would be a development that would help impact not only the city of Southgate, but the county as well as the state."

Romney clinches GOP nomination with Texas

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mitt Romney clinched the Republican presidential nomination Tuesday with a win in the Texas primary, a triumph of endurance for a candidate who came up short four years ago and had to fight hard this year as voters flirted with a carousel of GOP rivals.

According to the Associated Press count, Romney surpassed the 1,144 delegates needed to win the nomination by winning

at least 88 delegates in the Texas primary.

The former Massachusetts governor has reached the nomination milestone with a steady message of concern about the U.S. economy, a campaign organization that dwarfed those of his GOP foes and a fundraising operation second only to that of his Democratic opponent in the general election, President Barack Obama.

Kentucky News in Brief

Volunteers restore graves at disabled home

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Volunteers in Frankfort last week placed small American flags near hundreds of nearly forgotten graves at the site of a shuttered state home for mentally and developmentally disabled Kentuckians.

Jeff Edwards is a federal program coordinator with Kentucky Protection & Advocacy for Individuals with Developmental Disabilities.

He told The State Journal that several groups promoting the rights of the disabled came together to restore the cemetery. Some of the graves were unearthed for the first time in decades and most were marked "unknown."

Frankfort State Hospital and School Cemetery housed thousands of disabled residents for more than a century before closing in 1972.

Edwards said he'd like to see the cemetery get an annual cleaning and possibly a historical marker.

2 state workers fired for sex with inmate

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Two female state workers have been fired after admitting to investigators that they had sex with a male prison inmate who was performing janitorial work at the Department of Housing, Buildings and Construction.

The Lexington Herald-Leader reported on the investigation after obtaining documents through an Open Records Act request. Scarlett Perry and Dawna King were fired earlier this month.

A third employee, Benjamin Lawyer, was suspended for five days for failing to properly supervise the inmate and allowing him access to pornographic material that he viewed at work.

The reports also noted allegations that moonshine was repeatedly brought to the department and that department workers improperly sold copper fittings that plumbers used when taking exams.

The inspector general's office did not substantiate the moonshine allegations.

Police find body hidden in barn

HUSTONVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Kentucky State Police have discovered human remains inside a Lincoln County barn.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Paul Blanton told WKYT-TV that the home owner smelled a foul odor coming from the barn a few weeks ago but thought it was a dead animal.

After hearing that Thomas Hager was accused of shooting and killing two people in nearby Danville on Monday he got suspicious.

Hager used to live in a trailer on the property with another man named Clint Deskins.

Deskins has not been seen since mid-March. Police searched the barn on Friday evening, finding the body of a man hidden underneath a pile of trash bags.

They have not yet identified the body or the cause of death.

Baptist church ordains openly gay man

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — An eastern Louisville Baptist church has ordained an openly gay man as a minister with unanimous support from church members.

Highland Baptist Church on Sunday ordained Maurice "Bojangles" Blanchard, a local gay-rights advocate who started the church's gay and lesbian outreach group last year.

Church Pastor Joe Phelps says ordaining Blanchard was "new territory" for the church but in April it moved to support his ordination.

The Fairness Campaign, a Louisville-based gay rights organization, hailed Blanchard's ordination as one of only about two dozen at Baptist churches in the U.S.

Highland Baptist, which is not a member of the Southern Baptist Convention, says on its website it is "open to anyone who professes Christ as Savior."

Blanchard is studying ministry at the Louisville Seminary.

U of L hit by flooding, storm

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The University of Louisville was swamped by flash flooding Tuesday after strong thunderstorms dumped heavy rain and produced lightning that struck an apartment building on the edge of campus.

Fire broke out shortly before 8 a.m. EDT after lightning struck the privately owned apartment complex, said UofL spokesman Mark Hebert. At least a dozen students were dislocated, and others might have to relocate, but there were no injuries, he said.

University officials were

working with the apartment complex managers to find new housing for the students.

Water seeped into at least five buildings on the main Belknap campus. The worst-hit appeared to be the chemistry building, which had about four inches in the basement, Hebert said. The basement of the building remained flooded just before 1 p.m. EDT.

The school canceled morning and afternoon classes but had not decided whether to call off evening classes.

"It was totally unexpected," Hebert said.

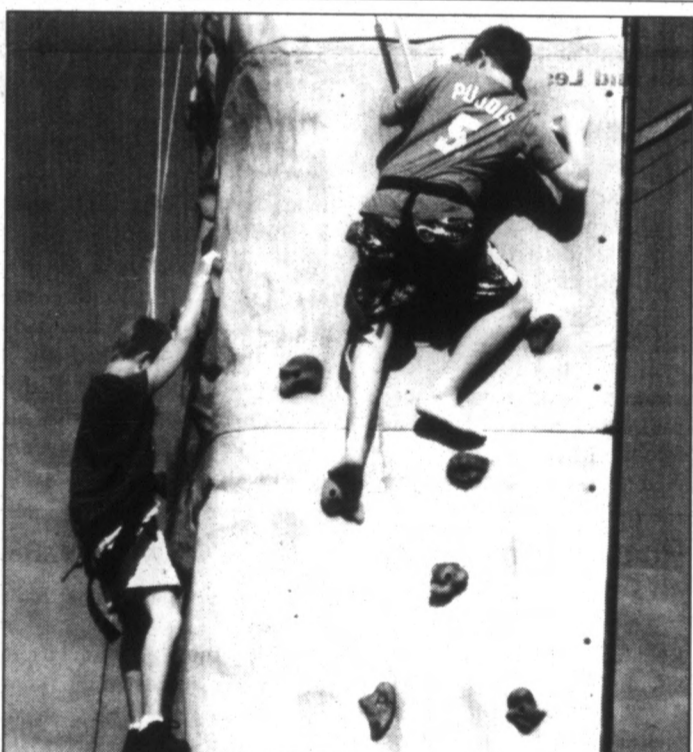

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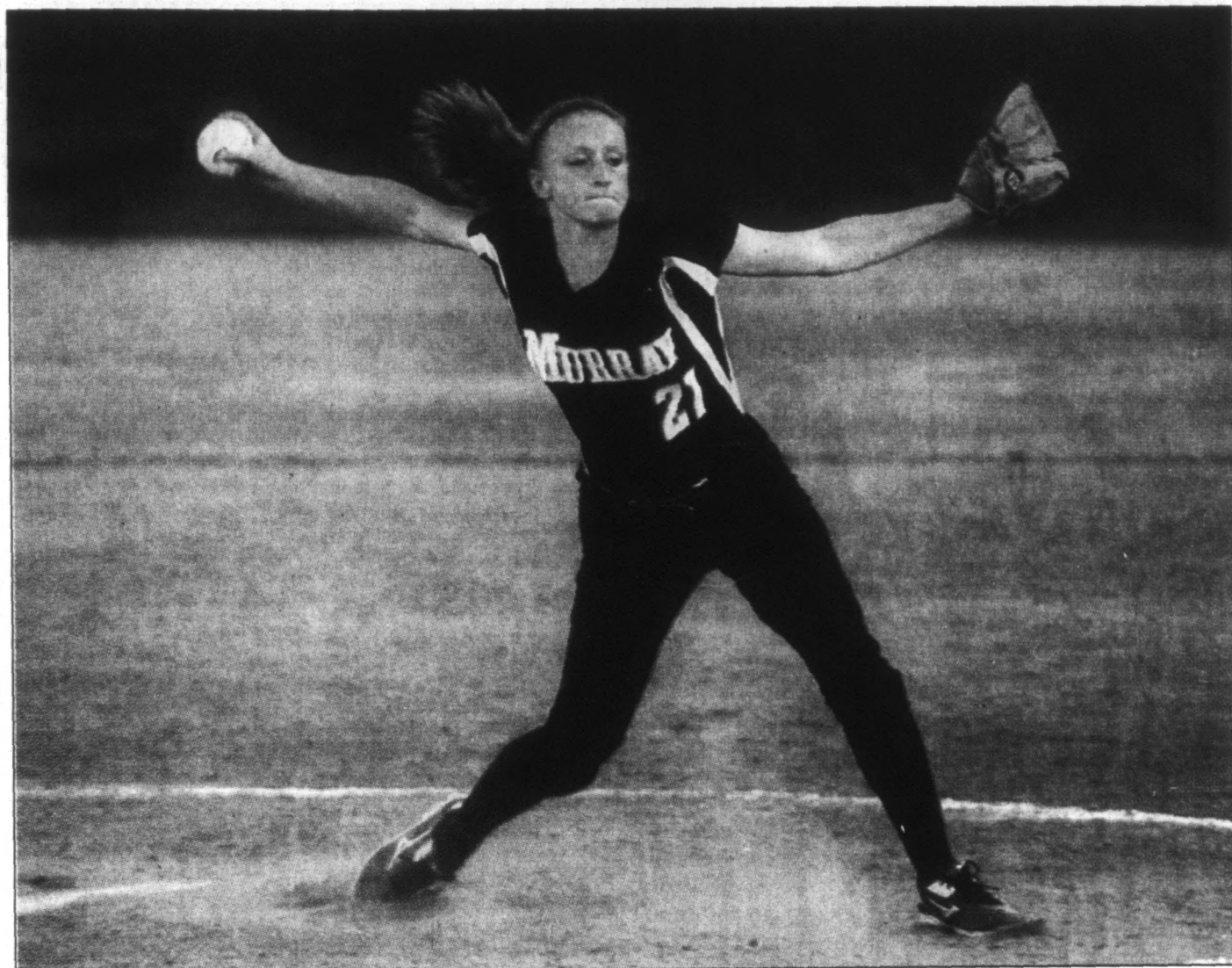

MURRAY HIGH FALLS TO REIDLAND ON SEVENTH-INNING, SOLO HOME RUN FROM CHANTELL DRIVER

BENTON, Ky. — One thing Rick Grogan emphasized to his team from the beginning of the season was to be aggressive in every facet of the game.

That's why, with two outs in the top of the seventh inning of Tuesday night's First Region semifinal bout with Reidland, the Murray High head coach wanted freshman pitcher Lexie Harper to go right after Chantell Driver — the Lady Greyhounds' No. 5 hitter.

"We preached all season long to be aggressive, be aggressive in whatever you do," Grogan said. "Whether it's on offense or defense, pitching or base running."

Harper battled Driver for seven-straight pitches, reaching a full count by the time the

Reidland wasted little time scoring, jumping out to a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning with a solo home run from catcher Hope Davidson.

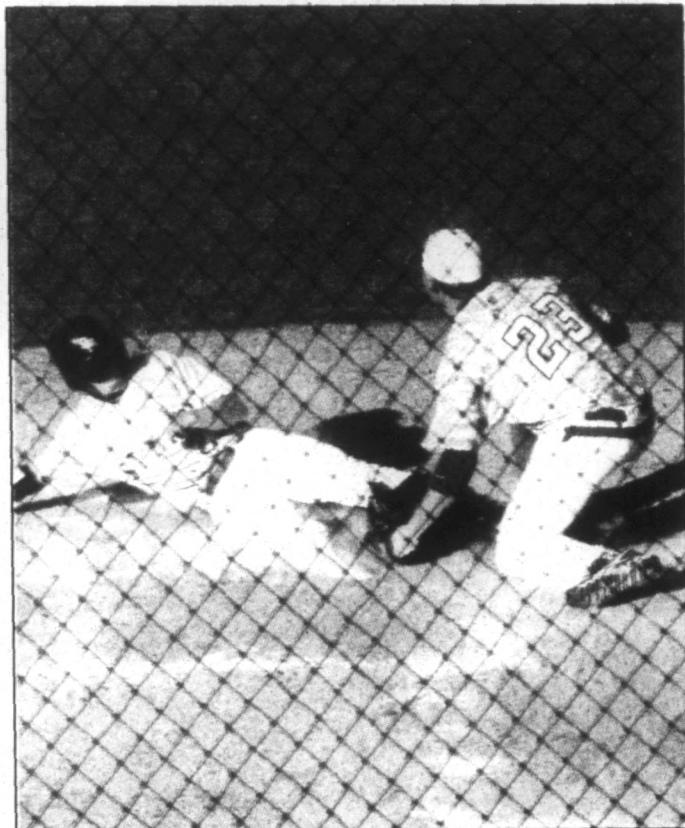
After that, however, Harper would settle down in the circle for the Lady Tigers.

adjustment, and we scored a couple runs and we were fine."

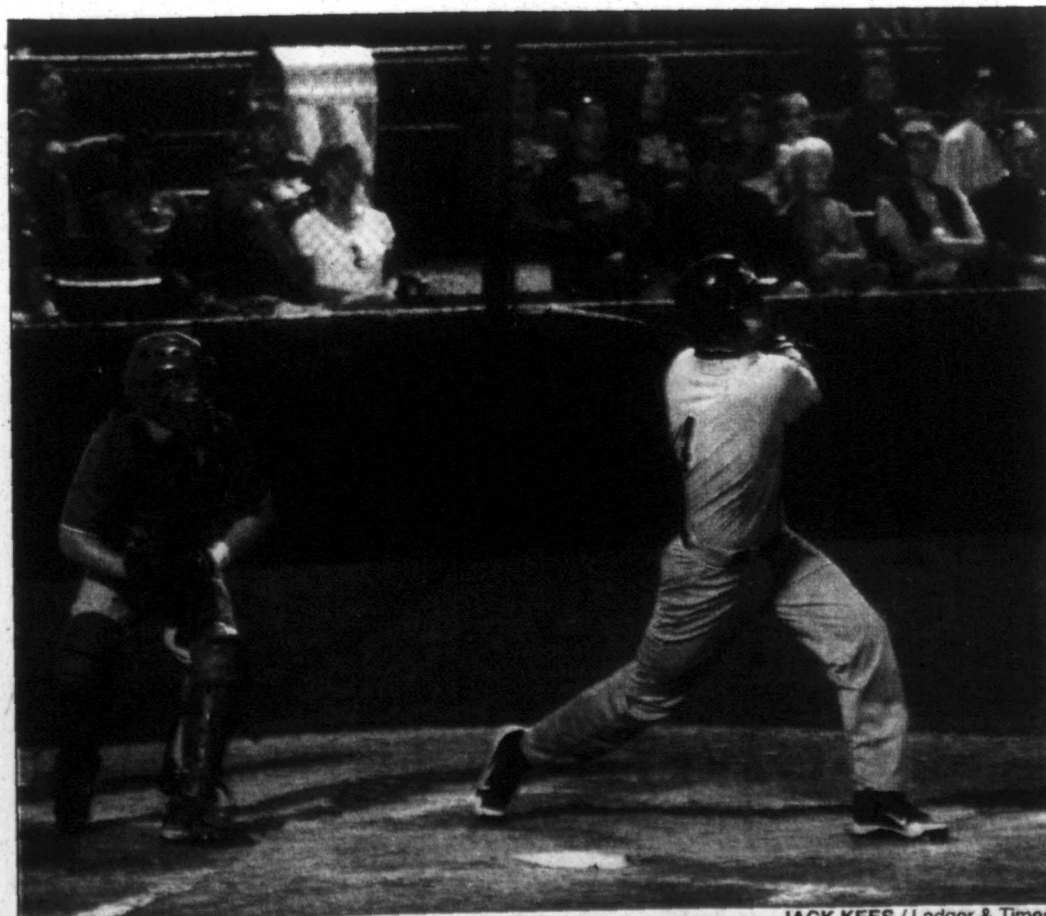
The couple of runs Johnson mentioned were actually six runs, as they put up another 'six-spot,' as Johnson called it, in the third inning to take a 6-1 lead.

The Murray Middle School girls and boys track teams competed in the Kentucky State Middle School Track and Field Championships on Saturday at Paul Dunbar High School in Lexington.

Over 1,600 athletes, making up over 80 teams, participated in the event.

With that, the Murray Middle School girls team won the state championship, earning 70 total points in the competition, beating out second-place Henderson County, who finished the day with 46 points.

While the Murray Middle School girls team brought home the big trophy, the Murray Middle boys were runners-up with 52 points, falling to Crawford Middle School, who earned 69 points.

The girls were led by eighth grader Yasmine Homa, who laid claim to two state titles in the long jump and pole vault before ever hitting the track.

From there, Homa teamed up with Ann Taylor, Cammy Fields and McKenzie Lamar to bring home the gold in the 4x200 meter relay, and finished her impressive

day with a second place finish in the 300-meter hurdles.

The 4x100 meter relay team of Linda Arakeylan, Taylor, Zan Speed and Lamar also finished second for the Lady Tigers, narrowly missing out on the gold medal at the finish line.

Ann Taylor finished off her productive day by taking third in the 200 meters.

Seventh graders Sarah McDowell and Grace Campbell produced big points also, with McDowell placing second in the discus, while Campbell took fourth in the triple jump.

The boys competition was tight all day long, and the Tigers had great success from their field events, as well as their relay teams.

The 4x200 meter relay team of Robert Harvey, Peyton Glynn, JD Cashion, and Des Jahvonni Miles captured second place, while the 4x100 team of Danny Chavarria, Glynn, Cashion, and Miles also finished second.

Peyton Glynn claimed the state title in the turbo javelin with a throw that landed just two feet shy of the state record, and placed fourth in the 100 meter dash.

Cole Riley earned a second place finish in the pole vault, and Miles finished third in the high jump.

The Viking pitcher started the game opposite of Cowen, as he gave up three walks in the bottom of the first, but the Lakers could not capitalize, and ended the frame with no runs.

Cowen stuck to his form in the second, with another strike-out to start, then got the next two batters to line out to first and right field, and bring out the bats for the top remaining team in the First Region.

The inning really got rolling when Dain Satterwhite was walked, then stole second, and Clint Craig singled to left to send him to third. With Tyler Greer at the plate, Craig took off to second, and when the St. Mary catcher tried to pick him off, Satterwhite stole home, where the Vikings tried to throw him out, which cleared a spot for Craig at third that he took, notching another steal and put-

ting himself in scoring position. Greer then brought him home when he singled to center field, and Wade Carter reached on an error when he bunted and sent Greer to third.

Dwyer hit a sacrifice fly to bring Greer around, and Hugh Paschall hit a double to score Carter. The Lakers scored the fifth run of the inning when Paschall came around on a single by Cowen.

"He did a great job," Hobbs said, "he got tired there late, and I challenged him to push through. He wanted to finish the game. I almost took him out, but he only threw 88 pitches, he did a great job."

"He fought through, and gave up four runs, but I think we settled down a little bit when we got to 10 and took the foot off the accelerator."

Cowen echoed the coach's thoughts about slowing down

late in the game.

"I think we all got relaxed in the fifth and sixth," Cowen said. "I know I did, I relaxed, took the foot off the accelerator, and allowed them to do something."

Hobbs said the lax effort in the later innings caused the team some stress they hadn't seen in quite some time.

get the team reeled back in, and make sure they were not taking the game where they were heavily favored for granted.

"I was just trying to strike a nerve with somebody," Johnson said. "I know its high school, and every body was excited about (Monday), but it's common in baseball to win the big one and then come out the next night and be flat."

"We did a good job, it only lasted about two innings, and we put the runs up to win the game."

The Tigers took care of business for the rest of the game, not giving up another error, and scoring one run in the fourth, fifth, and sixth, and two in the seventh on their way to the win.

Johnson said the pep-talk worked for the team, as they closed out Hickman County, but the errors will need to be eliminated in the championship game, as they committed five in the two games of the tournament so far.

"We know (tonight) we've got to play pretty clean to have a chance, and that's what we want to do, we want to play the perfect game."

The game against the team's rivals will be a tough one, which is no secret to the Tigers or their fans, but Murray has been expecting this since last Friday.

"We wanted to just be in the championship," Johnson said. "It happens to be Calloway, and when we looked at the draw, we

figured they were going to come out their end, and we figured we'd be coming out of our end.

"We've played good teams this year, and (Dylan) Dwyer's going to throw it, and he does a great job on the mound, so we're going to come out and battle and see what happens."

The Tigers have already taken down one of the best teams in western Kentucky in the first round, and will look to take down the other top-25 team in the First Region. Even though they haven't seen Dwyer in a few years, they faced Lone Oak's ace Monday and had little trouble winning that game.

"We're going to approach it as he's a very good left-handed pitcher, and we're going to approach it just like any other left-handed pitcher: Have a plan going in and try to stick to the plan."

"He's an SEC signee so he's really good, we'll just have to be at our best hitting and just see what we can do to scrap out some runs," Johnson said.

The Tigers garnered seven runs in the outing, while Pitcher Zack Grogan threw the complete game and gave up four hits and three runs (one earned). He said once he got settled in, it was rather smooth sailing.

"When the game started, I wasn't throwing really well for strikes, but as the game went on, I started to settle in, and we started hitting better."

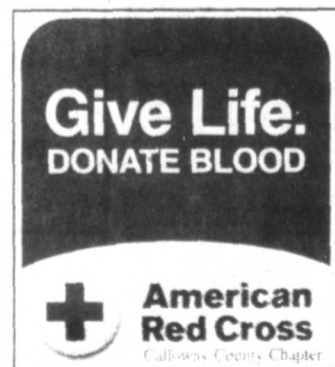

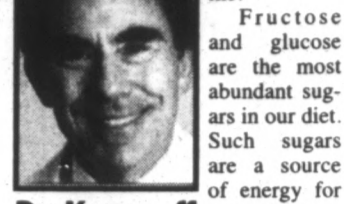

DEAR SPILL SURVIVOR: Since you are asking me, I suspect that the person who bumped into you took no responsibility for what happened.
People who perambulate are supposed to watch where they are going. That the texter didn't offer to reimburse you for the meal or at least help clean up the mess shows a distinct lack of class. While the texter should have felt obliged to help, there is no way to "compel" someone to do the right thing.

High levels of fructose can damage your liver

DEAR DOCTOR K: I keep hearing about how bad fructose and high-fructose corn syrup are for my health. But is fructose really worse than other types of sugar?

DEAR READER: The short answer is yes. I'm not an expert on sugar metabolism, but I'll tell you what the experts at Harvard Medical School tell me.

Fructose and glucose are the most abundant sugars in our diet. Such sugars are a source of energy for our cells.
In the early 1900s, the average American took in only about 15 grams of fructose, also called fruit sugar, a day. Most of it came from eating fruits and vegetables. Today we average four or five times that amount. And almost all of it comes from sweetened foods and beverages such as breakfast cereals, sodas and fruit drinks.
Human beings have been on Earth for tens of thousands of years. In that time, our bodies got used to a certain diet. Then, in the last 100 years, our bodies have been exposed to much higher levels of fructose.
Common sense might say that such a relatively sudden and large dietary change might be hard for the body to adjust to. Common sense isn't always right, but in this case, it is: There is considerable evidence that today's high levels of fructose are harmful.
Virtually every cell in the body can break down glucose for energy. In contrast, about the only cells that can get energy directly from fructose are liver cells. What the liver does with fructose, espe-

cially when high levels enter it, has potentially dangerous consequences for our health.
When fructose enters the liver, it goes through a series of changes. One remarkable change is that the liver uses fructose, a carbohydrate, to create fat.
Give the liver enough fructose, and tiny fat droplets begin to accumulate in liver cells. This buildup is called non-alcoholic fatty liver disease. It looks like what happens in the livers of people who drink too much alcohol.
The breakdown of fructose in the liver also:
-- elevates triglycerides;
-- increases LDL (bad) cholesterol;
-- promotes the buildup of fat around organs;
-- increases blood pressure;
-- makes tissues insulin-resistant, a precursor to diabetes.
None of these changes are good for the arteries and the heart.
There is considerable evidence that people who have more fructose in their diets have higher rates of non-alcoholic fatty liver disease, obesity, diabetes and heart disease. However, fructose has not been proven to be a cause of these conditions.
Still, it's worth cutting back on fructose. That's what I tell my patients, and what I have done myself. But don't do it by giving up fruit. Fruit is good for you, and it's only a minor source of fructose for most people.
Instead, cut back on refined sugar and high-fructose corn syrup. For starters, that means limiting your intake of sugar-sweetened drinks, pastries and breakfast cereals.

SMOOTH CEREAL BARS
Dear Heloise: My family loves the treats made with rice cereal and marshmallows. However, my oldest daughter decided to surprise us by making them herself, but she didn't know to smooth them out to finish them. (I use a spatula coated with butter.) 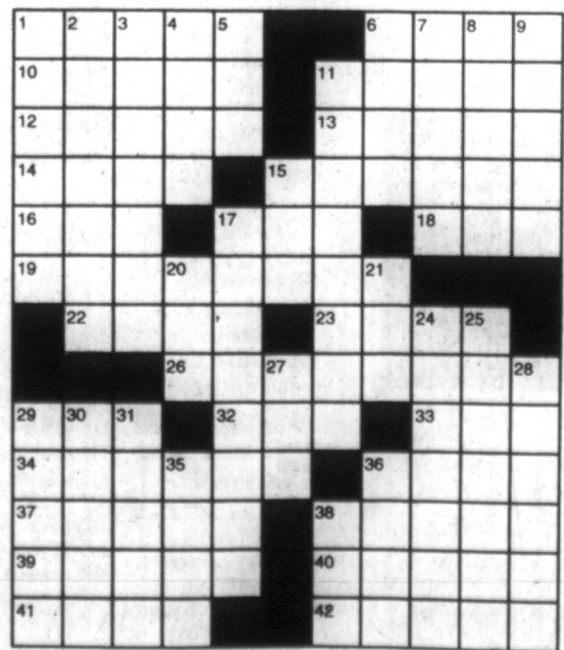

MICROWAVING POTATOES
