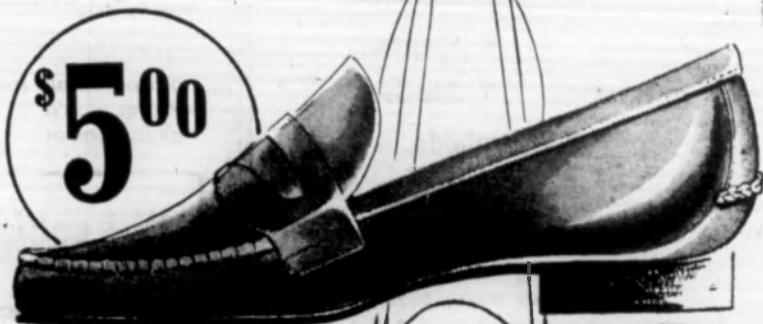

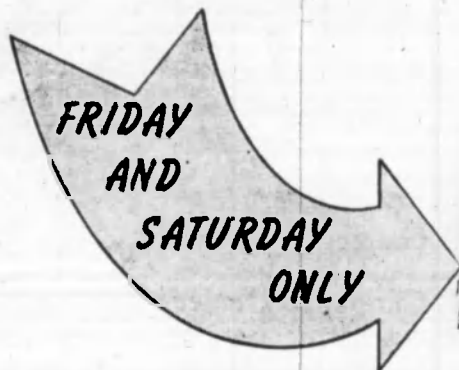

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Here is a new way to prepare a tempting main dish made with ground beef. It comes from Miss Florence Imlay, food specialist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

Casserole of Beef with Celery

1 lb. ground beef
1 cup chopped celery
1/4 onion chopped
1 tablespoon fat
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
Pepper
Pinch of sage if desired.

Tomato or mushroom soup
To prepare the filling, cook celery and onion in 1 tablespoon of fat for a few minutes. Add bread crumbs, half the salt, and other seasoning and mix thoroughly. In a greased casserole, place a layer of half the ground meat which has been mixed with

salt. Next add the stuffing to cover, then top with the remainder of the ground meat.

Bake for 30 minutes in a medium oven, 350 degrees, then remove and pour over the top a cup of tomato or mushroom soup. Continue baking for about 30 minutes. Serves 6.

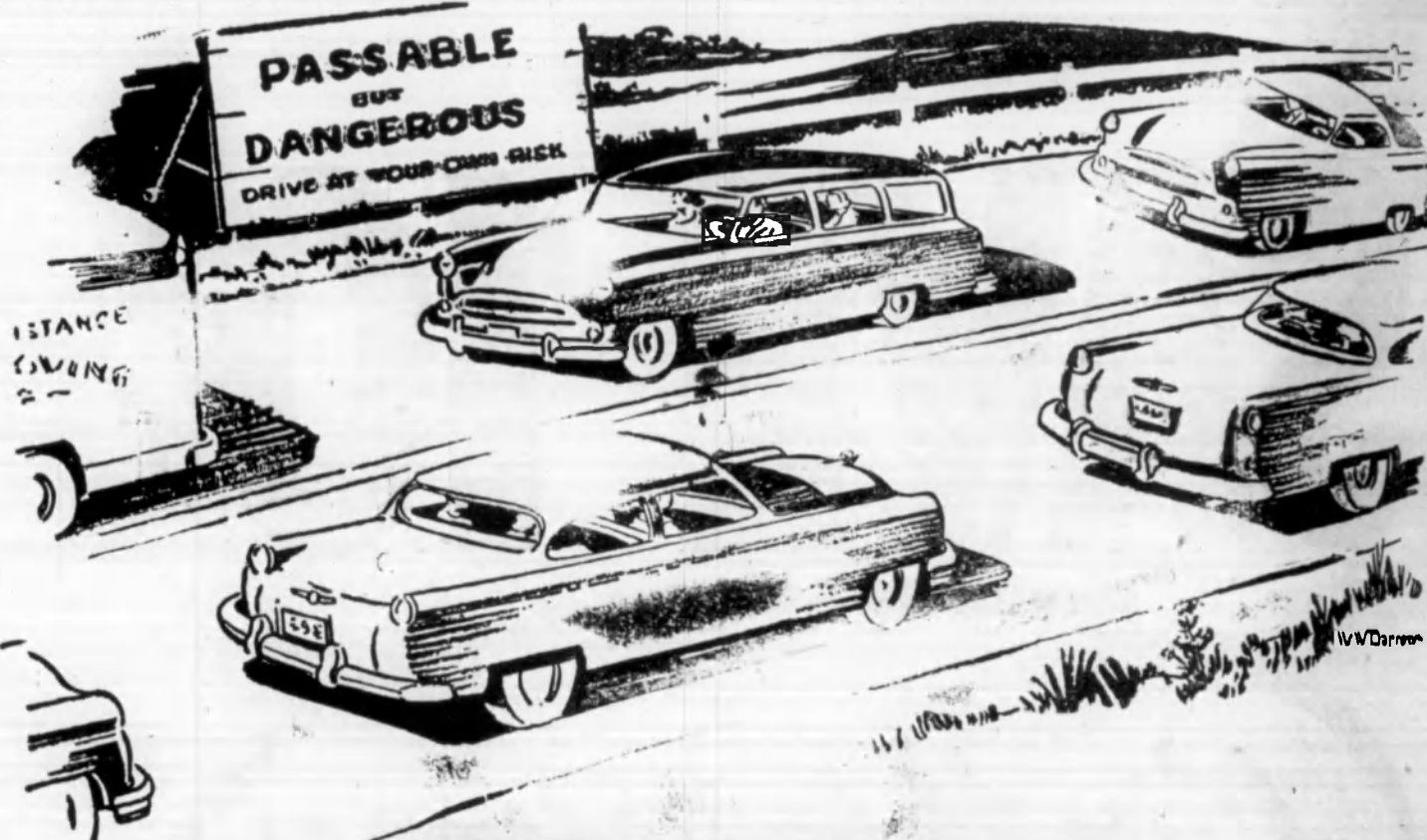

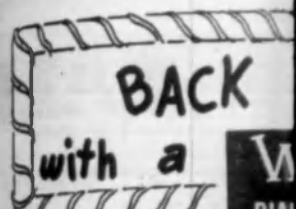

Here is How School Amendment is Worded

Kentucky voters will be asked to make a decision on the distribution of two Amendments to the State Constitution when they go to the polls on November 3. It is the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the issues involved before he votes. Below is the exact wording of the Amendments, according to legal public opinion given last month by the Secretary of State Office.

Section 186 of the Constitution of Kentucky be amended as to read as follows:

All funds accruing to the State shall be used for the maintenance of the public schools of the Commonwealth, and for other purpose, and the General Assembly shall by general law prescribe the manner of the distribution of the public school fund among the school districts and its use for public school purposes.

Shall the Constitution of Kentucky be amended as to officers of the Executive Department for the State-at-Large, so as to (1) permit the Governor or Lieutenant Governor to perform his official duties when temporarily out of State.

(2) permit our General Assembly to provide for the manner of selection and the term of any or all of the following State officers:

Treasurer, Secretary of State, Commissioner of Agriculture, La-

West Kentucky Tour is Planned
