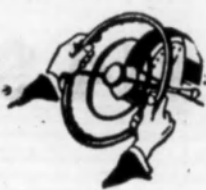
Operation Heartbreak -

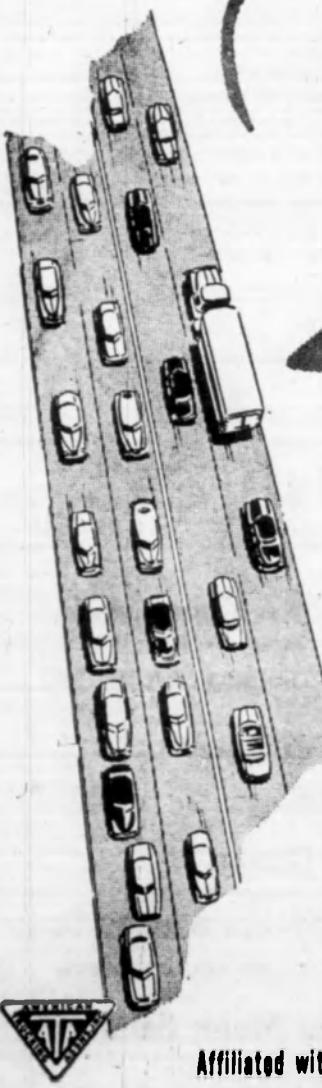
