Election is Important; Be Sure to Vote

Most citizens are likely to regard the Nov. 3 election here in Marshall County too lightly.

Any election, from magistrate on up to the presidency of the United States, is important.

If an official is to represent the people properly, he should be placed in office by a majority of ALL of the qualified voters.

Voters who stay home and do not take an interest in elections are not carrying out their real responsibilities as citizens.

If few votes are cast in an election and an official is placed in a true majority of the people.

The Nov. 3 election is important to citizens of Benton and Marshall County. And as true citizens, every eligible man and woman in Marshall County should go to the polls on Nov. 3 and have their say on the issues involved.

The citizens of Benton will choose a new mayor and six councilmen on Nov. 3. These men will operate the city government for the next few years. Whether the city government functions properly will be decided almost entirely by them. So it is important to the citizens who they choose to run their town for the next few years.

For the information of the voters, there are two tickets in the city election. One of the tickets is listed as an Independent Party and its sign on the ballot is that of an open book.

The Independent Party ticket is headed by Louis O'Daniel, grocery store owner, who is a candidate for mayor.

There are nine candidates for City Council on this Independent Party ticket. They are Joe Darnall, oil distributor; Urey Woodman, cross newspaperman; W. C. Hutcheson, barbecue restaurant owner; Elton Telle, carpenter; Joe Clark, contractor; Bob Rider, employee of Treas Lumber Company; John Rayburn, construction worker; Joe Dunn, shoe shop owner, and Leon Byers, milk company salesman.

The other ticket in the Benton governmental race is known as the Progressive Party. Their sign on the ballot is the arm and hammer.

The Progressive Party ticket does not offer a candidate for mayor. But it does offer four candidates for seats on the City Council.

On this ticket are Bill Butler, grocery store owner; John Sled, service station and appliance store owner; Dale LeNeave, service station owner, and Chester Ray Powell.

There are a total of 13 candidates running for City Council. The voters will choose ONLY SIX. So the voters will have plenty of choice of men to run their government.

Calvert City also is electing city officials on Nov. 3. And it is important that the citizens of our neighboring city go to the polls in full force and elect the men they want.

For the county as a whole, there is an important school problem to be solved. Most of the citizens already are familiar, through speeches and press reports, with Amendments 1 and 2 to be voted on.

Most interest is concentrated on Amendment 1, which would change Section 186 of the State Constitution so as to equalize the distribution of school funds among wealthy and poor school districts. The overall aim of educators is to give both the poor and the wealthy pupil an equal chance to get an education.

Marshall County, since it is not a wealthy county, should be particularly interested in the amendment because the school systems of our county stand to gain by the passage of Amendment 1.

The Marshall Courier heartily endorses Amendment 1 and urges the citizens of the county to vote for it and give their children an opportunity to get the same education as children in the more wealthy counties.

Rotarians Indorse Amend't 1

The Benton Rotary Club Friday night endorsed State Constitutional Amendment No. 1 to be voted on in the general election on Nov. 3.

The amendment would change Section 186 of the State Constitution so that state school funds could be distributed more equitably.

The club's endorsement came after speeches were made by County School Superintendent Holland Rose and Benton City School Superintendent Joe Duke.

Both men pointed out that Kentucky's school system and its students were being hindered by Section 186.

School pupils in wealthy areas, better speakers pointed out, have adequate education advantages while pupils in poor areas suffer from inadequate facilities—all because Section 186 does not permit proper distribution of the state's school funds.

Amendment No. 1, which will be voted on Nov. 3 and which will change Section 186 so school funds can be distributed more properly, also has been endorsed by the Benton Lions Club, the Woman's Club and a majority of the P-T-A groups all over Marshall County.

Governor Wetherby also has recommended passage of Amendment No. 1.

Drouth Relief Applications Soon Can be Made in County

We now are officially in the drought disaster area and the PMA should be in a position very soon to take applications.

Feeds available to the county to eligible farmers are corn at \$1.10 per bushel, oats at 50¢, 2 bushel and wheat at \$1.10 per bushel and cotton seed meal pellets or cake at \$35.00 a ton.

Livestock eligible are basic foundation herds or flocks, beef and dairy cattle, sheep and goats.

Woodrow Hill at the Co-op store informs me he hopes to be able to furnish some black strap molasses in barrel lots to farmers.

Contact him if you are interested.

Low quality roughage can be used for feed. Molasses not only increase the amount eaten by livestock but increase its digestibility. This would mean more feed value to livestock.

Ripe tomatoes from your garden at Xmas can be a reality if you will pick and store them now.

They should be put in a cool dark place where they will not freeze.

You can also pull vines and all and hang them up in the basement or garage. With the price high you can save several dollars and still have tomatoes.

Since most of the crops have been harvested it would be a good time to store the farming tools for the year. They should be cleaned and oiled for the winter. It will make far better working equipment next spring.

Hunting Ban Throughout State Lifted

The ban on squirrel hunting in Kentucky was lifted Tuesday by the state following a general rain which alleviated the forest and field fire hazard.

Commissioner Earl Wallace of the Fish and Wildlife Resources Department announced there are several days remaining in the regular season which closes Nov. 5.

The ban, which was clamped on Oct. 2, caused hunters to lose 25 days of the regular season. These days will be made up during the rabbit and quail season opening Nov. 20.

The ban on hunting of opossum and coons with dogs only also was lifted.

Power Shortage to Cut Calvert Plant Forces

The Calvert City industrial area's electric power supply, curtailed Oct. 1 because of the drought, will be further reduced in November by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Because of low water conditions in its reservoirs, TVA has advised the four Calvert City plants that, for the second time this fall, it will be necessary to curtail its power interruption rights.

One of the plants will begin to curtail its operations Nov. 1. This is Pittsburgh Metallurgical Co., producer of ferro alloys and a large user of electric power.

Pennsylvania Salt Manufacturing Co. will begin a two-month curtailment of operations Nov. 2.

National Carbide Co. and B. F. Goodrich Chemical Co. will curtail their operations Nov. 10.

The TVA expects resumption of power service on or after Dec. 1 if normal rain falls in the Valley in November, which would help to replenish TVA reservoirs.

The power curtailment will result in an almost complete shutdown for National Carbide. The company will lay off 155 of its 185 employees now working there.

B. F. Goodrich Co. uses relatively little electric power in its chemical plant, but will have to curtail its manufacturing operations Nov. 10 to Dec. 1 because National Carbide will not be producing acetylene, which Goodrich uses in the manufacture of vinyl chloride.

Goodrich also receives anhydrous hydrochloric acid from Pennsalt.

Goodrich has about 55 employees, most of whom will be assigned to maintenance work while manufacturing operations are shut down.

Pittsburgh Metallurgical will operate only three of its nine units beginning Nov. 1. It has been operating only four thru October. Normal employment there of 635 will have been reduced to around 200 by Nov. 1. Only 290 have been working in October.

Pennsalt, which did not have a power cut October 1, was advised by TVA that its supplemental power expects the cut, which will reduce its operations perhaps more than 50 per cent, to continue through December.

The company, which employs about 180 persons, said that no layoff is expected through November.

Here's how to make the pumpkins.

Halloween Cheese Pumpkins With Pretzel Stick Stems
(Makes 12 pumpkins)
2 6-ounce packages process American Cheese
4 pretzel sticks

Slice each package of cheese in 6 even chunks. Roll chunks between the palms of the hands to form a ball. Flatten each ball slightly to form the shape of a pumpkin. Score surfaces with a tooth pick to resemble ridges in a pumpkin. Break Pretzel Sticks in 1 inch lengths and insert for stems.

Highway Death Rate in State
Down for First 8 Months of Year

Frankfort — Kentucky's highway death rate for the first eight months of 1958 was down slightly compared to the same period last year, according to a report made last week by the Department of State Police.

The figures through August, the latest month for which a complete study is available, show that deaths this year have occurred at the rate of 8.3 for each 100 million vehicle miles traveled, while the rate last year for the same period was 9.

Through the eight months this year, there were 493 deaths in 5,886,000,000 vehicle miles, while there were 509 for 5,620,000,000 miles last year.

The mileage estimates are obtained by using a formula devised by the National Safety Council which takes into account the amount of gasoline sold within the state. The gasoline sales are determined by the amount of tax paid.

Later accident figures show that on a numerical basis Kentucky is doing better in preventing highway deaths this year. Through October 21, there 594 fatalities, compared with 640 at the same date last year.

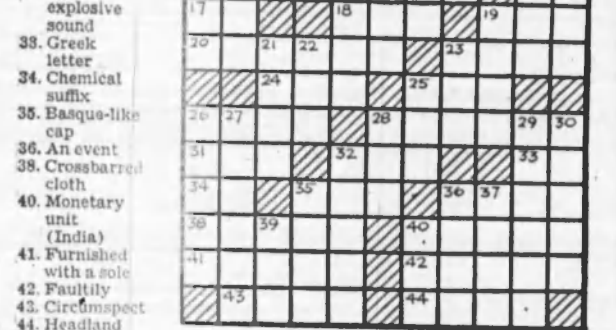

Tuberculosis Strikes Persons of All Ages

"He's too old to get TB." When
you hear anyone make that
statement, speak right up and
say, "It isn't true."

There is no age limit on tuber-
culosis. The germ can and does
attack babies, children, young
adults, the middle aged and the
aged.

It is true that TB causes more
deaths than any other disease
primarily in the age group from
15 to 35. Fifty years ago, tuber-
culosis was considered a disease
of young people. The reason for
this may have been partly be-
cause in the old days a TB pa-
tient didn't have a chance to
grow old. Death within a few
months or years was the usual
result.

It may also be true that for
some reason there is greater
susceptibility to tuberculosis in-
fection in adolescence, just as
there seems to be greater resis-
tance to the disease in children
from 5 to 15. When TB strikes
children under 5, it may cause
the dreaded tuberculosis men-
ingitis.

In recent years tuberculosis
has become more and more a
problem of middle-aged and old
men. It may be that modern life
places especially heavy strains on
these men or that they are care-
less of their general health.

However, a heavy bombard-
ment with TB germs combined
with a poor state of health can
cause tuberculosis to develop at
any age.

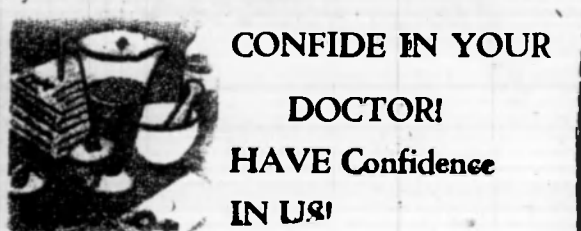

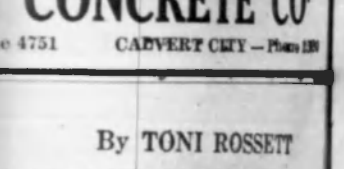
