RECIPE OF THE WEEK

By Mary Lee Taylor

Coconut Graham Cake

Broadcast: November 14, 1953

1 cup sifted, all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup soft shortening
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 egg
1 cup shredded coconut

Grease well, then dust with flour an 8-inch square cake pan. Sift together into a bowl the flour, baking powder and salt. Add crumbs, sugar and shortening. Mix milk, water and vanilla. Add half of milk mixture to sugar mixture. Beat hard 2 minutes with spoon or electric beater at medium speed. Add rest of milk mixture and the egg. Beat hard 2 minutes longer. Stir in coconut. Put into prepared pan. Bake on center rack in moderately hot oven (375) about 45 minutes, or until cake pulls from sides of pan. Let stand in pan 5 minutes before turning out to cool. Serve cake warm, topped with canned, sweetened applesauce, or when cake is cool, spread top and sides with your favorite frosting.

Recipe of The Week

A timely hint from Mrs. Pearl Haak, extension specialist in foods at the UK College of Agriculture and Home Economics, is to have an oven prepared meat dish when guests are coming. Last-minute duties are simplified in this way.

Chicken and Rice Mexican
1 frying chicken
1-2 c fat or oil
1-cup rice uncooked
1-3 onion, chopped
1-clove garlic minced
1-8 cup minced green pepper
1 1-2 cup tomato puree
2 1-2 cup boiling water
2-teaspoons salt
1 1-2 teaspoons mono sodium glutamate.

Cut chicken in pieces and fry in fat or oil until a delicate brown. Remove chicken from pan. Add uncooked rice to fat in the pan and fry until golden brown, stirring frequently. Add onion, garlic, tomato puree, green pepper and boiling water. Add seasoning and browned chicken. Cover tightly and let simmer for 30 minutes, or until chicken and rice are done. Serves six.

Menu: Chicken and rice Mexican, buttered green beans, congealed pineapple and white grape salad, hot French bread buttered, ice cream with hot mince meat sauce over it.

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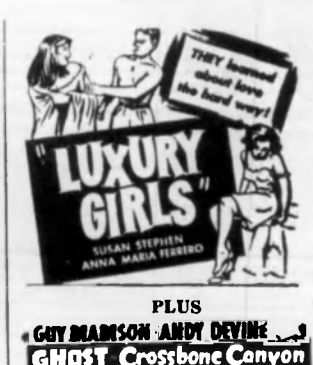

Child-Parent Conversations Are Important Part of Life

(By David Taylor Marke)
Child-parent conversations are an important part of family life. Through them, says Dr. Mary M. Thomson, we can help solve many child problems and bring about mental and emotional adjustments.

A well-known psychiatrist who divides her time between private practice and the Vanderbilt Clinic, Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in New York, Dr. Thomson has just written a book, "Talk It Out With Your Child," (McGraw-Hill, N.Y.) which treats with this whole subject. She points out:

"Children are very practical people. They do not take the love of their parents for granted, unless it is shown to them in word as well as deed."

Children also are very literal people, she says. They have not developed sufficient reasoning power to know that such expressions as "I could eat you up" or "If you do that, I won't love you" are not intended to mean exactly what they say. She continues:

"Children are logical people. But their logic is not developed like ours. A matter of cause and effect in their minds may cover many fields in their experience, from why dogs bark to where babies come from. They arrive at the weirdest conclusions from the oddest bits of information and often scare themselves into panics with their inventions."

"Children are very proud people as well. Only gradually do they grow up to the realization that they are not the precise center of the universe—and they may not rush the process. Growing up

too fast is less desirable from a psychological standpoint than growing up too slowly. It costs nothing more than considered rather than careless talk to keep the little egoist happy about his position relative to his world. It is as easy to say, 'You can talk to me in a few minutes' as 'I have no time now, can't you see?' Or, 'Come help me feed the baby' rather than 'Go away and play while I take care of your sister.'"

There is always plenty to talk about with your child. Naturally, Dr. Thomson says, it is the adult who must lead the way because of his superior strength of logic, wealth of experience, and power of understanding. The child still has to grow into these. The parent can prepare himself to know how much he can say to his child and be understood. In addition, he can discover the art of encouraging the child to speak. Practical conversations should revolve around what all children instinctively notice, ponder over, and draw conclusions about. She adds:

"Since these conclusions usually are hidden in a welter of emotional confusion, knowledge of the child's emotions is the key-stone in understanding how to converse with children."

"If a parent is to talk with a child sympathetically, he must also know what the basic topics of interest are to a child: physical sensations, anger, fear, love, possessions, birth."

"There are rewarding values for both parent and child in these shared conversations. Not only does the parent find his life more purposeful as he progressively

comprehends the emotions and thinking of his child, but his child benefits immeasurably. The child finds that his parent is able to join in his thinking and opinions, and this understanding enables the youngster to work out and develop his basic attitudes toward himself, work, play and comrades.

Feeling he has cooperation, the child can only feel strengthened and consequently experience greater companionship and security in his parents."

Livestock Raisers Can Obtain Special Loans

More than \$11,689,000 in special livestock loans have been made to 1,190 farmers and ranchers throughout the United States and nearly 600 other applications are being considered, Raymond E. Hogue, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Calloway, Fulton, Graves, Hickman and Marshall Counties, reported this week.

Drive Started To Improve FFA Camp At Hardinsburg

The state-wide drive to raise \$250,000 to improve and expand the Future Farmers of America State Leadership Training Center at Hardinsburg began Nov. 10 and will continue until Thanksgiving.

The drive started with a meeting Tuesday at the F.F.A. center in Hardinsburg.

F.F.A. bought the 100-acre camp from the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1937. C. C. C. barracks, dining hall and other buildings are still being used. The high school boys have added more than \$100,000 worth of improvements, including a swimming pool and auditorium. But the old C.C.C. buildings are in poor condition and the present facilities are inadequate for F.F.A. needs.

During the past 10 years, the camp has trained more than 17,000 boys for more prosperous farming careers.

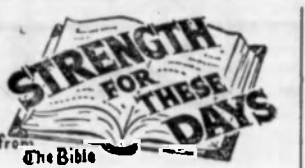

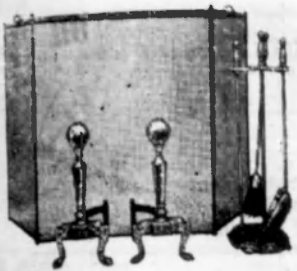

PARTY HAM LOAF FOR SPECIAL DINNERS



Add to the enjoyment of this spicy ham loaf by serving it with hot mustard sauce, freshly baked corn bread and goblets of thirst-quenching beer.

For special occasions, bake a ham loaf in the shape of an angel food cake and serve it with decorative, grilled pineapple slices circling the top and sprigs of fresh parsley tucked into the sides.

It's easy to duplicate the illustrated loaf. Just remember that lean ham is essential to avoid excess shrinkage. Cooked ham left from your own roast is ideal. Otherwise, buy precooked ham and grind it yourself to make sure that the fatty portion is omitted.

PARTY HAM LOAF
(Makes 8-10 servings)
1 quart soft bread crumbs
1 No. 2 can pineapple tidbits
2 eggs

2 pounds lean ground smoked ham
1 pound ground veal
1 medium onion, chopped
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1/2 teaspoon pepper

In a large mixing bowl, combine all ingredients and mix well. Pack into a greased 9-inch tube pan; press down. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 2 hours. Pour off drippings. Allow to stand in pan about 5 minutes, then turn into serving plate. For garnish, saute or broil canned pineapple slices until lightly browned. When ready to serve, place broiled pineapple on top of unmolded ham loaf and tuck sprigs of fresh parsley into sides of loaf.

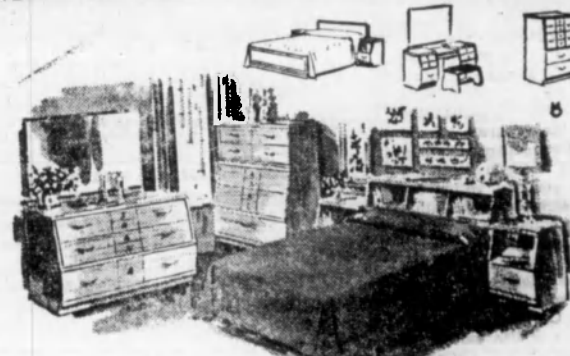

Stewards Of God

Lesson for November 15, 1953

IF THERE is anything the Bible teaches clearly, it is that man does not own this earth. It is given him, not permanently, but for a time, as he pleases, not to waste, but to use selfishly, but given him, to each generation, to use for the service of man and to the glory of God. Man is expected to contribute something of his own skill and thinking, expected to put something in as well as take something out. Human nature being what it is, we tend to take credit to ourselves for all we possess. However, when a man honestly recognizes how much of what he has comes to him as a gift from God, he can see that his life is a partnership with God, and that God as an investor in the human enterprise has the rights of a partner and owner of most of the stock. To act as if we ourselves were the lords of creation is plain dishonesty.

The Church, God's Special Agent. Let it be said again, though it has been said before. The church is the one community on earth which is devoted solely to carry out the purposes of God. The church is God's channel of action; the church is the body of Christ through which our Lord lives and works. The church is the one organization devoted to the "ideal world"—the kingdom of heaven—which aims at bringing about that world through the most fundamental of all methods, transforming life from within. The church is the one organization on the planet whose aims actually obeyed time, for its intention is to prepare men not only for this life but for the life to come.

Now you would think that church members would realize this and act accordingly. But most of them do not. (Query: Is a "church member" who neither knows nor cares at the church is doing, a real member at all?) Look at these facts: Out of the total income of church families throughout the U. S. A., only 1.1 per cent is being given to churches and their work. Only 1.83 per cent of taxable income is deducted for gifts. Only about 45 per cent—less than half—of the present membership give anything of record for local church support; and only about 30 per cent give anything to the outreach evangelistic activities of the church. You might not be surprised that non-Christians are selfish; but when more than two-thirds of the enrolled church members don't put a one red cent for the unselfish purposes for which the church exists, something is rotten in Christianity.

Four Points In The Christian Program. Let us come to some more basic facts. There is no argument among the leaders of all Christian churches that there are four major emphases in the program of the church. 1. Evangelism—winning new Christians. (If you don't believe in that, you are voting for Christianity's sickness and death.) 2. Christian education—training better Christians, learning how to serve as Christians in every walk of life. (If you don't believe in that, you are voting for an infantile kind of Christianity, blind to the problems of life today.) 3. Missions—spreading Christianity into new territories. (Don't forget that if it had not been for missionaries, your own race would never have heard the gospel.) 4. Stewardship—the active recognition of God as giver of life and life's possibilities, of God as senior partner in our lives, of the fact that what we have, we hold in trust for him.

Now it must be clear to any one who will take the time to think it over, that if point four is left out, the other three will just collapse.

What Is Your Church Doing? At the grass-roots of this whole problem is the local church. What are you doing to improve this situation of neglect? Does the minister preach on stewardship? Is stewardship studied in the church school? Do the adult study classes ever look into this matter seriously? Are new members "briefed" about being stewards of God? Do the young people's programs ever go into this?

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26,000 Get Instruction In Kentucky College

More than 26,000 persons received instruction last year from Kentucky's state institutions of higher learning—the University of Kentucky, Eastern, Western, Murray, Morehead, and Kentucky State College—a report just released to the public reveals. During the past school year, 18,878 young men and women were enrolled in the six schools. In addition, 3,643 adults were enrolled in special extension courses conducted throughout the state, and 5,480 Kentuckians were taught by means of home-study courses. The new bulletin, copies of which may be obtained by writing to the president of any of the institutions cooperating in its publication, also points out that the state University and colleges:

Graduated in the one year 906 teachers and school administrators, 162 engineers, 42 lawyers, 238 employees of business and industry, 47 pharmacists, 238 agriculturists and home economists, and 705 persons trained for the many fields of arts and sciences.

Carried on experimental work adding millions of dollars to Kentucky incomes. Aided hundreds of thousands of farmers, homemakers, 4-H Club members, and other individuals through extension work.

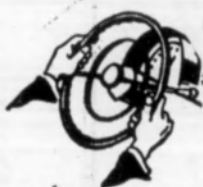

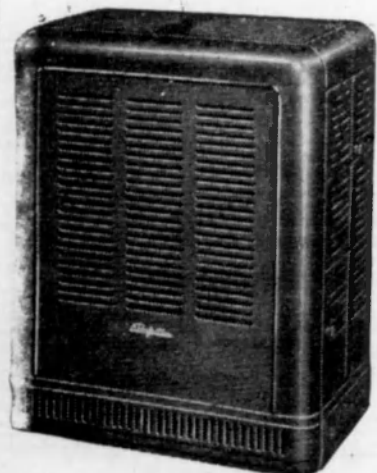

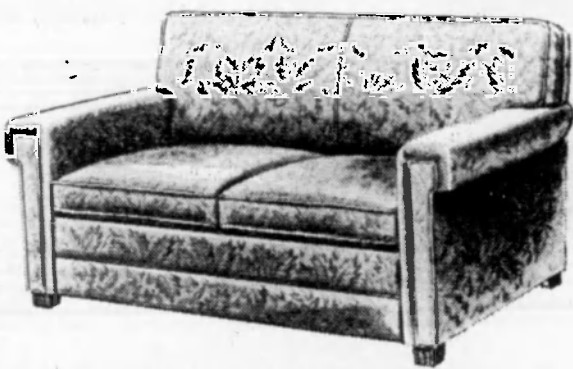
