County Men Will Seek Soil Award

The Marshall County Soil Conservation District has entered the national Soil Conservation Awards program sponsored by the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. of Akron, it was announced this week by District Chairman Renée Rudolph, of Sharpe.

Members of the Marshall district will compete against other soil conservation districts in the state. Non-partisan judging committees, selected from Kentucky's outstanding exponents of the soil conservation movement, will determine the state's outstanding district for the period July 1, 1953, and April 30, 1954, on a basis of total points scored in performance of regular district duties.

Grand award for one member of each winning district governing body and the top cooperating farmer or rancher named by the district will be a one-week, expense-free, vacation trip to Goodyear's fabulous winter resort, the Wigwam Guest Ranch on Goodyear Farms, Litchfield Park, Ariz., in December 1954.

Members of the Marshall County district governing body who will compete for the Goodyear award are: Homer Chester, Brewster; Eura Mathis, Hardin; Sam Galt, Olive; and J. M. Solomon, Calvert City.

National winners will be announced at the seven regular area meetings of the National Association of Soil Conservation districts. Plaques will be awarded at these conventions to the 100 first and second place winning districts.

GSA Sends Information To Gregory

Benton still has priority position for a new postoffice building, in the General Services Administration at Washington has informed Congressman Noble Gregory.

Edmund F. Mansure, administrator of the General Services Administration, wrote Gregory in answer to a letter Gregory had written on Oct. 30.

In part, Mr. Mansure's letter said:

"The Benton project was authorized pursuant to the provisions of the Public Buildings Act approved June 16, 1949, authorizing this agency to acquire sites and prepare architectural drawings for a limited number of Federal Buildings to be erected at such times as funds are appropriated for actual construction."

"Following the usual administrative and site investigation, a tract submitted by H. D. Huley, as agent, was tentatively selected as the site for the proposed project. However, before a formal contract for site purchase could be executed, the Korean situation developed and in August 1950 this agency was directed to stop further acquisition of Federal Building sites throughout the country, except in the case of 12 major projects that were considered essential to the government service."

"As a result of the directive, the Benton project and 300 others have necessarily reverted to an indefinitely deferred status."

"In view of the continuing policy of deferring Federal Building construction, it is impossible to advise regarding the early consummation of the Benton project."

However, its currently deferred status does not alter the fact that Benton is the selected project for the 1st Congressional District of Kentucky under the provisions of the 1949 Public Buildings Act, and will retain its priority position at such time as Congress authorizes the resumption of the public buildings program."

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union Sunday School Lesson

Scripture: Leviticus 19:1-10; Deuteronomy 10:1-16; Ruth 2:1-16; Matthew 23:23-28; 25:1-13; Mark 1:32-34; 1:14; Deuteronomy 1:1-5; Matthew 23:23-28

Help The Hungry

Lesson for November 22, 1953

AS CHRISTIANS, we owe a great deal to our mother religion, the religion of the ancients, Hebrews. Two of the characteristics of the religion of the ancients are: one is that religion has everything to do with our everyday life, and the other is that society (that is, the persons who make up society) has a sacred duty to care for the weak and friendless. Now in ancient times the most helpless people in the community were the widows, the orphans and the "sojourners," that is to say, migrants people without land or family, uprooted and displaced persons.

Widows had very little chance at a living except by almost slave-labor; orphans even less; and as for the sojourners, in most places in those days even his life was in danger. If anybody starved in an ancient city, it would be the sojourner first, then the widows and orphans.

An Ancient "Poor-law"

The Hebrews were taught carefully, from Moses' time onward, that God loved these helpless persons, widows, orphans and sojourners; and the Hebrews were commanded to take care of them. Something can be learned from a study of the ancient laws protecting these poor persons, laws which the Hebrews believed, and so can we, that God himself inspired. They are not laws which we can copy unchanged, for conditions of life and work have changed. But the spirit of them is as fresh and as needed today as three thousand years ago. Consider this from Deuteronomy: "Love the sojourner therefore, for you were sojourners in the land of Egypt."

There is a certain rich man in America whom we may call Mr. X. He came to this country when a boy, an immigrant son of very poor parents. Had he stayed in the old country, he himself thinks he would have had to starve and die at his father's ill-paid trade. In America's freedom, however, this boy rose to riches and honor, and is now a man who loves to talk of the "American dream" and of how he himself is an example of it.

But what does Mr. X think of encouraging others at this present time to come over and try the American dream for themselves? He is opposed to it. He wants no more immigrants. He is glad the door was open to himself; he wants it closed now for good. But he does not stand alone; he gets re-elected to congress by several thousand other Americans who do not love the sojourner. "Love the sojourner" means have a concern for migrant workers, for displaced persons, for immigrants, for oppressed minorities. America can hardly call itself a Christian nation unless it takes such laws of God more seriously.

Helping Men To Help Themselves

Another more particular law is found in Leviticus 19, where the farmer of those days is forbidden to harvest either his wheat-field or his grape-vineyards clean. He must leave some wheat un-gathered, some vines untouched. We see how this worked in the case of Ruth who would have starved had she not had the chance to glean (pick up those stray sheaves) in the fields of Bethlehem.

This is not a law we can copy right on to our statute books; but we may well copy its spirit and intention. First there is a real concern for the man at the bottom of the ladder. Then there is given him an opportunity to work for his own living. Wheat and grapes are not delivered to his door; he has to get out and work for his food. But the point is that he is helped by being enabled to help himself.

Hunger Around The World

In the time of Moses, and of Jesus, indeed till most recent times, our neighbors, those whom we could help, were those whom we could see, within walking distance of our homes. No doubt there were famines in India, floods in Japan, while Jesus was living. But he never said a word about aid to India, because in the first place the Galileans themselves lived on the edge of starvation, and in the second place if they had had a million tons of surplus wheat they could never have reached India with a quart of it. 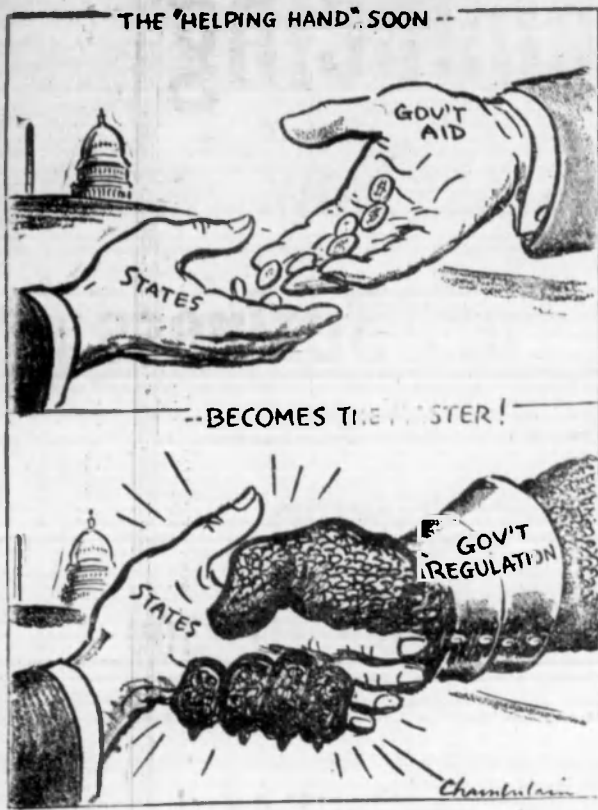

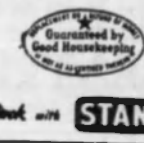

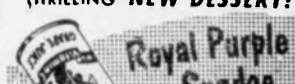

Ky. Farm Bureau Sets Membership Record

The Kentucky Farm Bureau has set another new membership record with 4,024 more members than ever before, according to Burt S. St. Clair, Falls of Rough,

president of Kentucky's only general farm organization. The grand total for the fiscal year ending Oct. 31 shows 72,314 Kentucky farm families who are members of the federation, St. Clair said.

He gave credit to the tremendous success of the Farm Bureau during 1935 to those farm men and women who volunteered to work without pay to build county Farm Bureau organizations. In addition, much credit can be given to Farm Bureau's achievements, St. Clair said, to the extensive policy development program in which each and every Farm Bureau member had an opportunity to voice his opinion in developing policy for all major agricultural issues.

Some interesting membership data: Again, Henderson County Farm Bureau led the state, with a grand total of 1,825. The second spot went to Daviess County Farm Bureau, with 1,640.

Crittenden County Farm Bureau showed the greatest increase in membership of 229 members. Harlan County showed the largest percentage increase over 1934 with 107 percent.

Fifteen other counties topped the 1,000 mark. They are: Shelby, 1,419; Jefferson, 1,368; Graves, 1,351; Hardin, 1,280; LaRue, 1,194; Owen, 1,182; Pulaski, 1,173; Nelson, 1,154; Fayette, 1,115; Mercer, 1,115; Breckinridge, 1,101; Washington, 1,085; Grayson, 1,088; Grayson, 1,050; Pendleton, 1,003; Mason, 1,001.

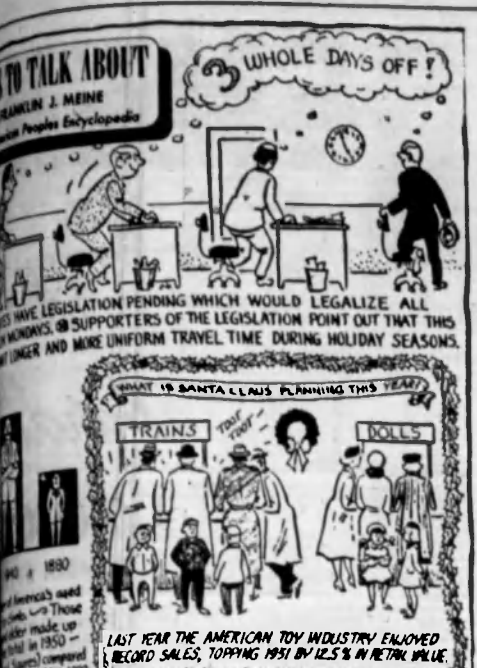

Recipe of The Week

Whether it is for Thanksgiving or one of the other holidays ahead, the rich goodness of steamed pudding has appeal. The recipe comes from Miss Florence Day, food specialist at the University of Kentucky.

Steamed Pudding
1 cup white flour
1 cup wholewheat flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1-2 teaspoon baking powder
1 cup raisins
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup molasses
1 cup buttermilk or sour milk
1 egg

Mix dry ingredients. Add raisins and nuts and toss until the mixture is well covered with flour. Mix molasses, milk and beaten egg. Combine mixtures and stir rapidly until all the flour is well incorporated. Pour mixture into greased cans and fill two-thirds full. Cover. Steam 2 1/2 hours.

The pudding may be steamed in the pressure cooker. Turn mixture into a greased mold that can be set loosely in the cooker. Cover mold with waxed paper. Place mold on rack with water in cooker. Place cover on cooker. Allow steam to flow from vent pipe for 20 minutes. Close cooker. Raise pressure to 15 pounds and cook for 40 minutes. Cooker at once. Serve with hard sauce or whipped cream.
