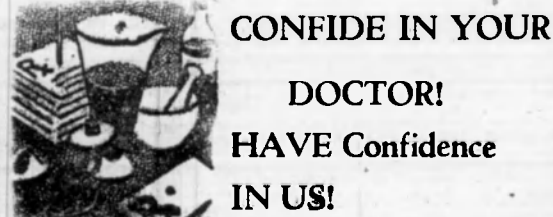

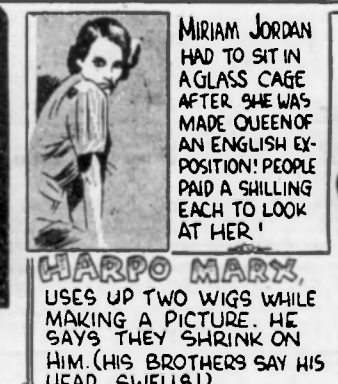

New Gadgets Make the Job Of Building Shelves Easy

A number of devices now on the market have made shelf-building easy. The four below were pictured in Home Modernizing magazine, along with the suggestion that a good grade of one-inch pine be used for the most satisfactory shelves.



Small metal clips with attached dowels are fine for light loads. Dowels fit into holes drilled in the uprights at the end of the shelves. Shelves rest on the clips.



This bracket is similar to the clips shown above, in that it fits anywhere on a metal strip. In this case, however, strips are screwed to wall or back of shelf unit. Only two are needed.

There are a number of brackets available for erecting single shelves. These are attached to the wall and the shelves rest on them, with no additional support being necessary.

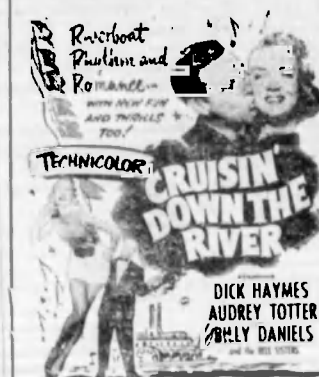

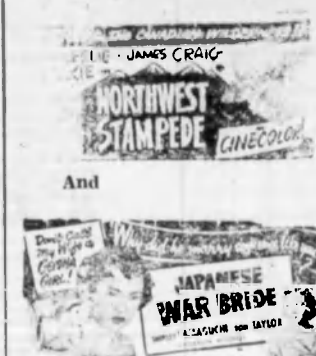

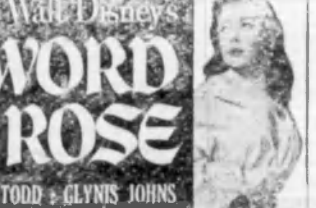

Chance For All

Lesson for November 25, 1933

AN INTELLIGENT traveler in Spain writes to an American friend in 1933: "We have just returned from a six-day trip to Franco's paradise. Madrid is a modern city of beautiful parks, squares and circles with fountains playing, a modern university campus and splendid buildings. Alongside these modern structures one finds people living in caves dug back into clay banks; sometimes a wooden door has been fitted into the mouth of the cave and a pane of glass put in the door for light. The more elegant of these residences have the door white-washed. As soon as the door begins to open at the city's edge one sees men reaping wheat and barley with hand reaps-hooks such as used in the days of Ruth and Boaz. We were told that there is nothing worth while outside Madrid. Nothing but 20 million people living in ignorance and economic slavery!" One has to see such a country to appreciate how in America we enjoy what is a heritage and a teaching of true Christianity.

Men Are Not Equal, But—

The crushing of the poor by the rich is one of the sins specially set down in the Bible as hated by God. (See the Scripture for the week.) The crushing of the weak by the strong is a problem always with us; but in our country we do at least try to keep the doors of opportunity open for every one. Our Declaration of Independence says that all men are created equal; which is not a statement of fact, of course, not all schools are equally good. Some states have such poor schools, or such poor school laws, that children from there are handicapped in competition with children from states with better schools. But even where this is true, it is widely felt that this ought not to be. Educational leaders are not complacent about this state of things. Further, many states have equalized their school funds so that children born in remote sections will have just as well-equipped and well-staffed schools within reach, as children in the larger cities.

For one thing, we try, at least in part, to see that no child shall be penalized in his education for being born where he was and not somewhere else. As a matter of fact, of course, not all schools are equally good. Some states have such poor schools, or such poor school laws, that children from there are handicapped in competition with children from states with better schools. But even where this is true, it is widely felt that this ought not to be. Educational leaders are not complacent about this state of things. Further, many states have equalized their school funds so that children born in remote sections will have just as well-equipped and well-staffed schools within reach, as children in the larger cities.

Fair Chance At Jobs

Another angle of equality of opportunity is a fair chance at jobs. Some one is sure to ask: What has religion got to do with this? Well, look at the Bible. Paul said that a man who will not work shall not eat—that was his rule. "We all know the commandment, 'Six days shalt thou labor,'" and we all have observed how important it is for the development of personality that a man or woman shall have work that suits his capacity and gives him a chance to be a producing member of society. So if men are cut off from the chance to work, or not allowed to compete for the kind of work for which they are fitted, religion says: This is wrong, whenever one of God's children is barred from a God-given right.

Fair Chance At Religion

There is another kind of equality of opportunity even more important than what has been mentioned. That is equality of opportunity in religion. "Freedom of Worship," as it is often called, is not just the legal right to worship under any church roof one pleases. It is the right to be faced with the choice God offers us in Christ and to share in his fellowship everywhere. It is not enough that your community has (as it does, no doubt) a variety of churches. The question is: Is every one in your community equally welcome in all these churches? Are there persons in your community who never come to church, because they have never been asked?

Hunters are Given Safety Rules

Hunting accidents each year affect not only the hunter but also his relatives, safety advisors of the U. S. Department of Agriculture say in calling the attention of the whole family to the need for precautions at hunting season.

For the children's safety, all guns and ammunition in the home should be kept out of their reach and sight, preferably in a locked closet. Only empty guns, taken down or with action open, should be carried in automobiles or taken into camps or homes.

Hunting season is dangerous time for farm children to be roaming woods and fields.

The cardinal rule for gun safety at all times is: Treat every gun as if it is loaded.

Women who go along on hunting trips may well adopt the

hunter's bright red for caps and jackets. They, as well as men, may benefit from a review of the important rules for gun safety issued by the Sporting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers Institute:

1. Be sure the barrel and action of the gun is clear of obstructions.
2. Always carry the gun so you can control the direction of

the muzzle even if with a loaded gun. 3. Never aim at a person. 4. Be sure of your target and the distance before you pull the trigger. 5. Never shoot at a surface or the muzzle of another gun. 6. Never point a thing you do not want to shoot at. 7. Never leave a gun unloading it first.

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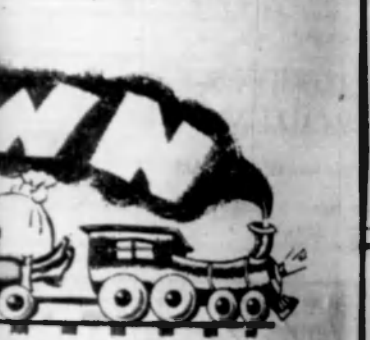

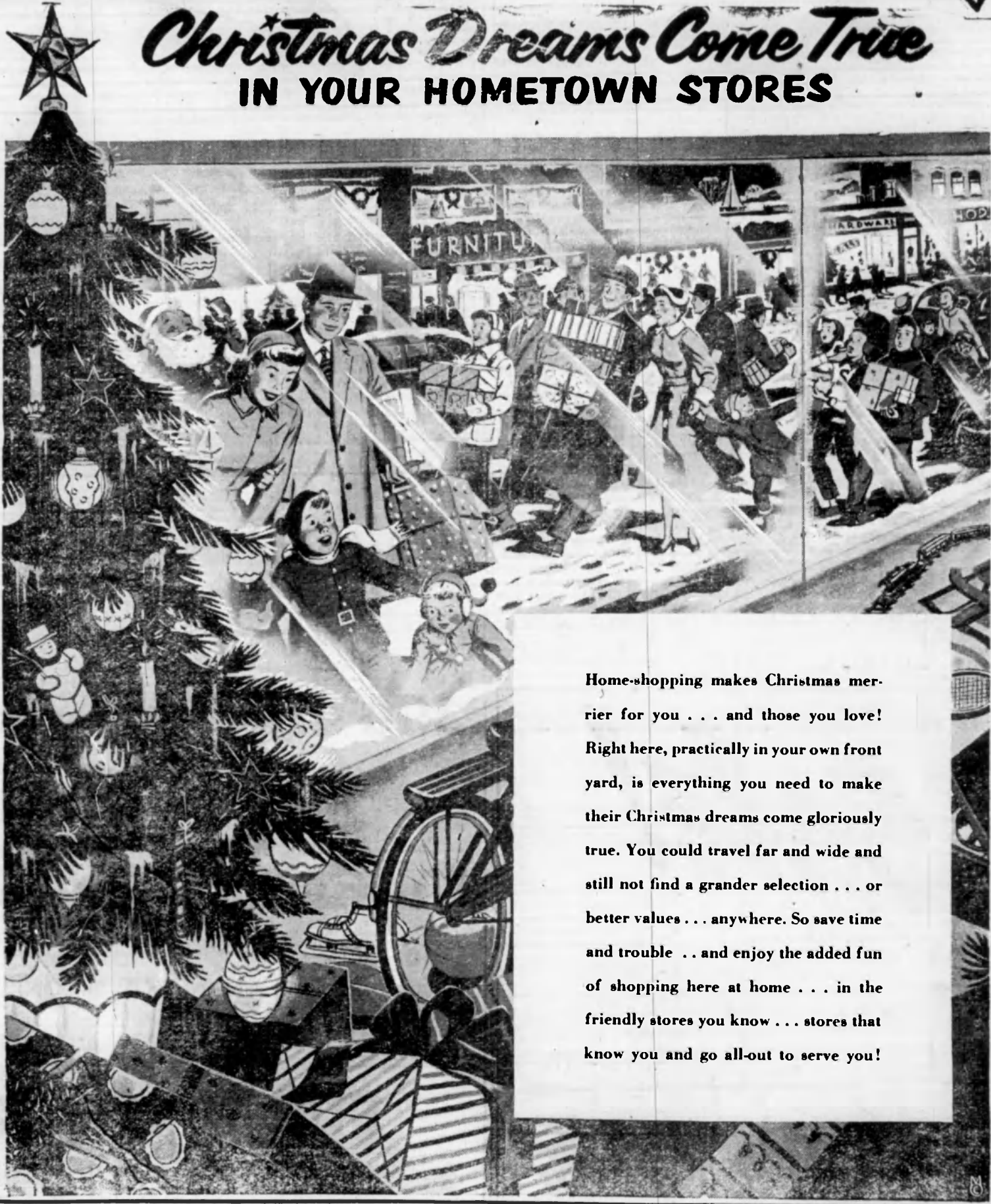

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Brisk fall days call for griddle cakes. Mrs. Pearl Haak, specialist in foods at the University of Kentucky, suggests they be served for either breakfast or supper.

Rice-Ham Griddle Cakes

1 cup sifted flour
5 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
1 cup cooked rice
1 cup milk
1 cup diced cooked ham
3 tablespoons butter

Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Beat the eggs and add cooked rice, milk, ham and melted butter. Combine the two mixtures until well blended. Spoon onto a hot greased griddle. Cook on one side until a number of bubbles appear. Turn over and bake to a golden brown. Serve with butter, syrup, honey or jam. Makes about 15 cakes, 4 inches across.

To prepare fluffy rice: Put 1-3 cup rice, 2-3 cup cold water and 1-3 teaspoon salt in a quart

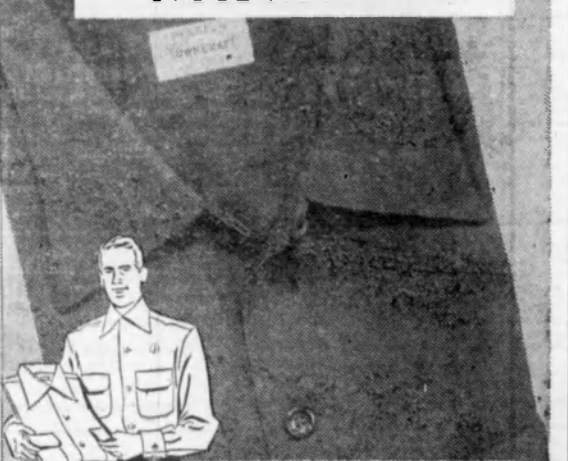

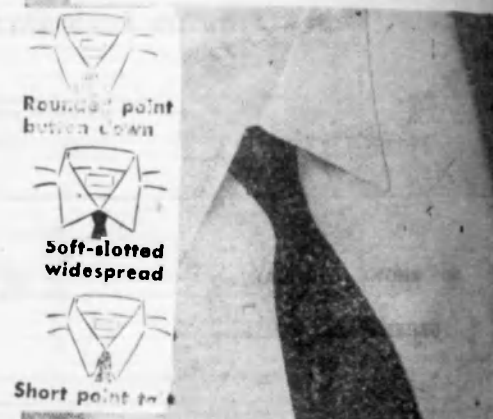

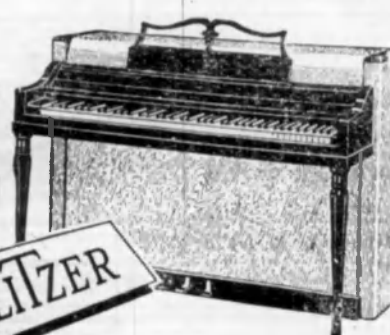
