Homemade Sausage Is Good; Try This University Recipe

Home-made sausage is one of the compensations of butchering. The meat should be about three-fourths lean and one-fourth fat, the seasonings being sprinkled over the meat before it is ground. Two grindings, first with a coarse plate and then with a finer one, will distribute the seasonings well and make a good blend of fat and lean. In a recent circular from the University of Kentucky, "Hog Killing and Cutting and Curing of Meat," this recipe is given for a mild sausage: 6 pounds of meat, 3 tablespoons of salt, 2 tablespoons of black pepper and 1 tablespoon of sage. If a spicier sausage is desired, 3/4 teaspoon of ground cloves or 1 1/4 teaspoons ground nutmeg may be added with 1 1/4 teaspoons of sugar. Copies of the above circular, No. 458, may be had from offices of county agents or from the Experiment Station, Lexington.

WEEK'S RECIPE

A different salad dressing can add new interest to familiar foods. Here is a dressing that is particularly good on fruits, says Mrs. Pearl Haak of the University of Kentucky.

Honey Salad Dressing
2/3 cup sugar
1 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon celery salt
1 1/2 cup strained honey
1 tablespoon lemon juice
5 tablespoon vinegar
1 teaspoon grated onion
1 cup salad oil

Mix together the first five ingredients, then add honey, lemon juice, vinegar and grated onion. While beating with a rotary egg beater, add the salad oil, very slowly at first. Beat until thick and well blended. Makes 2 cups of dressing.

Menu: Baked ham, sweet potatoes, buttered turnips, grapefruit and orange salad with honey dressing, whole wheat rolls, butter, and ice cream with hot fudge sauce.

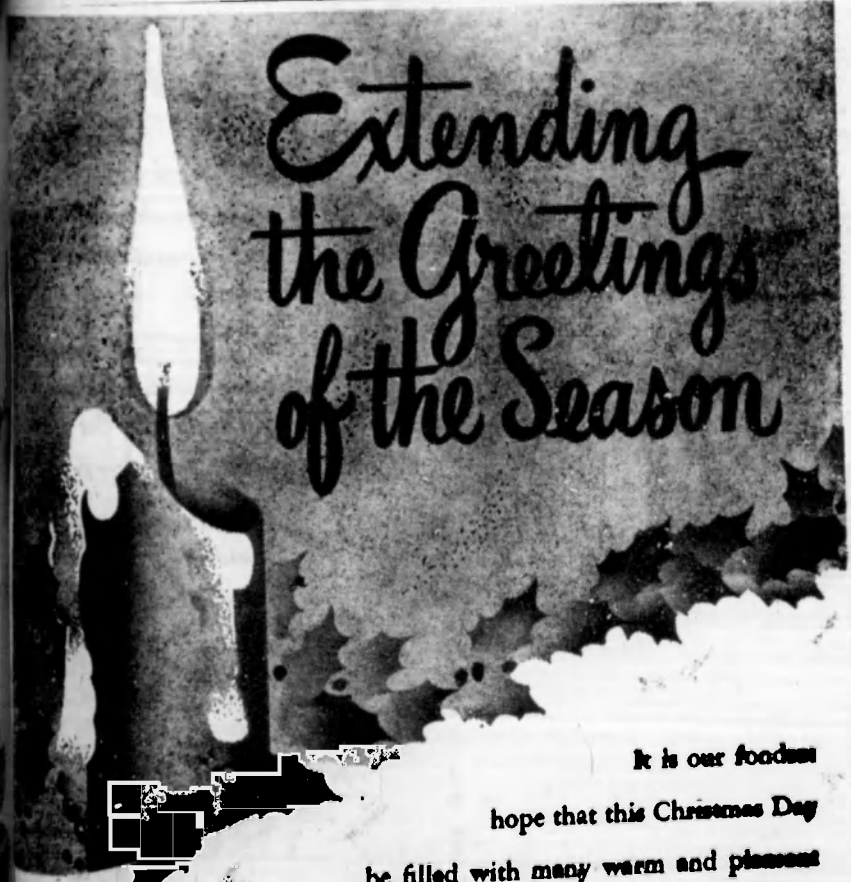

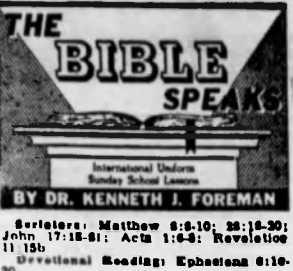

Thy Kingdom Come

Lesson for December 27, 1953

"Thy Kingdom Come"—how often we pray it, how little we think about it! How much do we mean it? And do we know what we mean when we say it? Scholars who know the near-eastern languages tell us that the form of the Lord's Prayer as it would be in the Aramic language which Jesus and his disciples no doubt used, is that of a poem. Not rhymed but rhythmical.

"Thy name be hallowed," "Thy Kingdom come," and "Thy will be done," are three parallel lines, and their essential meaning is the same. The kingdom of God does not simply mean the fact that God is King of Kings. He is, and does not need our prayers to make him so.

The kingdom of Dr. Foreman God means the state of things, here on this earth or in heaven or anywhere, where God's royal will is actually done. We have a right to believe that in heaven God's will is the rule of life. On earth God's will is the rule of life too, only it is disobeyed perhaps more often than it is obeyed.

In heaven all God's children are loyal; on earth some are disloyal all the time, and even his loyal children have their times of disloyalty. So what we are praying for, if we say intelligently "Thy Kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven," is that more and more God's will may be known, loved, obeyed, carried out on this earth of ours.

In The World
Instead of any reflections in this column, the reader is invited to do some reflecting on his own. Here it is nearly the end of December. An old year will be gone before the week is out. It is a good time to look back on the year almost gone, and ask the question seriously: Can we see any answers to our oft-repeated prayer, "Thy Kingdom come"? In the year 1953, has the Kingdom of God come any nearer? The Kingdom, as Paul tells us, is "love, joy, peace." Have these things spread or have they wilted during this past year?

The reader is invited to let his mind run to what he can recall of his own and world-history for the past 12 months. Have there been events which have been encouraging to Christian people? Have there been events which would tend to discourage Christian people? Is there some evidence that love, joy and peace have spread somewhat in the world, or have they been dammed up?

In The Neighborhood
What about the neighborhood, the community where the reader lives? It never will be exactly like heaven, (or if it is, please let the writer know and he'll move there) but surely there must be something heavenly about it, or everybody would move away. Has the neighborhood grown toward the Kingdom of God this year? Is there more love, joy, peace in it? Are the churches getting anywhere? Do the churches set a better example of Christian living than they used to? Does the preaching of the Gospel take effect in people's lives? If people move away, is it because they can't help it or because they can't stand the place any longer? If a church has lost a minister this past year, has it been hard to get a new man to come or would a minister welcome a chance to be a pastor in your community? Have the Christians who live there made some real effort to answer the prayer "Thy Kingdom come"? Do they ever try to win others to Christ? If a stranger's car broke down in your community, would he go away finally with memories of helpfulness or would he always hate to remember the place?

In Home And Heart
The Kingdom, Jesus said to his friends, "is within you." The will of God is done first of all in the minds, intentions and wills of individual persons in their everyday relationships. If the Kingdom does not come in heart and home, it is not going to come in the community of the world.

Let the reader think back over his personal year of 1953, not what he has read about or seen on the TV screen, but what has gone on in his own heart and home. Have love, joy, peace been on the increase there?

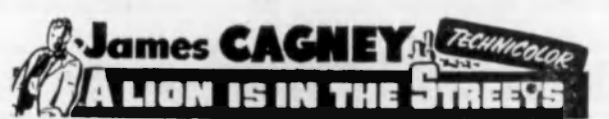

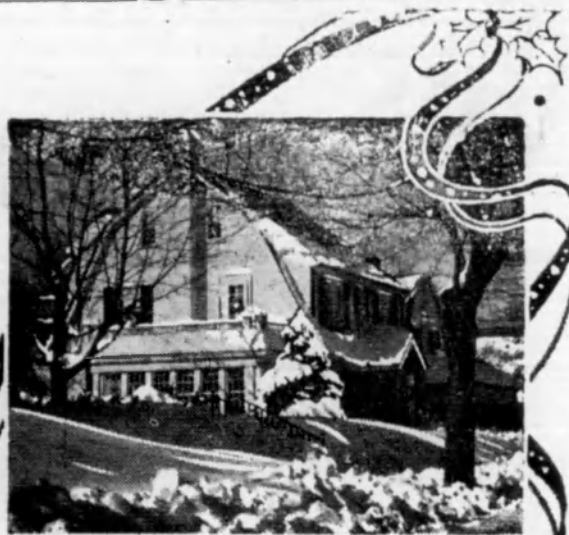

Soil Conservation Notes

O. L. Chumler, south of Palma enlarged his pond last October. A new spillway was selected and the levee made higher and longer. Water will now stand six feet deep over two-thirds of the water area.

Chumler also cleared two acres of land and straightened some bad crooks in two creeks that run through his land.

Rolle Cox, Tatumville, dug a pond last month in a badly gullied area. Two acres were also cleared and sown for pasture.

G. A. Covington, south of Palma, cleaned the gravel out of a drainage ditch last month. A levee was also built along one drain to keep the water from breaking out over a bottom field.

Tommy York, Sol Henson, W. T. McDermott, and W. F. Rose received land capability maps last week, from the Marshall County Soil Conservation District. The maps were prepared by the Soil Conservation Service.

Bicolor lespedeza and multiflora rose plants are now available for immediate delivery. These plants are used to furnish food and cover for quail and other forms of wildlife. They are furnished free to farmers by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Place your order at the ASU, SCS, or County Agent's Office.

Randal Anderson, east of Benton; Pete Gardner, Hardin; and Lowell Braddy, Palma, dug farm ponds last month.

Joe Bryant, east of Benton, enlarged a pond last month. The levee was built higher and a new spillway cut.

W. O. Fooks, Mt. Moriah, has started the construction of a four and one-half acre lake. The earth levee will be fifteen feet high, four hundred and seventy-five feet long, and will require 8,800 cubic yards. The watershed has eighty-five acres. A spillway thirty-feet wide will be needed.

Bill Grimmer, is clearing the willows from forty-five acres of bottom land with a bush saw. The land is located on the lake at the mouth of Clear Creek. Pasture grasses and legumes will be sown next spring.

Applications are now being taken for financial help in the establishment of soil and water conservation practices through the 1954 Agricultural Conservation Program. Farmers can receive one-half of the cost of doing a practice if the requirements are met.

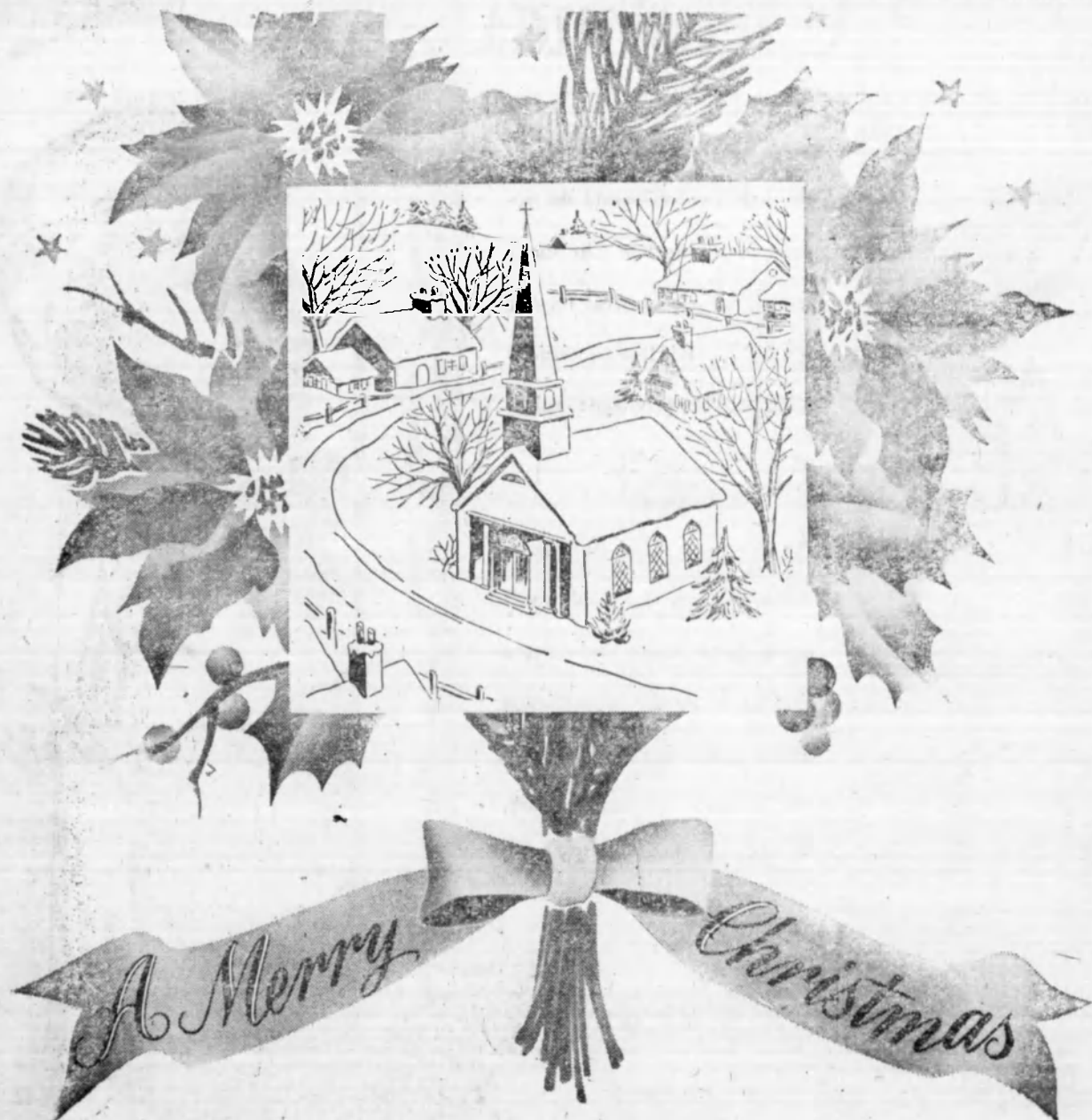
