Jaycees Start Drive for New Hotel in Benton

The Marshall County Junior Chamber of Commerce is interested in getting a new and modern hotel erected in Benton. Benton long has been without a modern, fireproof hotel to accommodate the traveling public and the JCC project deserves the consideration of the public.

The following letter, sent out over the signature of H. L. Carpenter, JCC president, is printed for the information of the Courier readers:

Does our County seat need a hotel to serve those who travel to this county on business? There is only one logical answer. Ask any business or professional man if he is not asked several times a month by a traveling salesman if there is a hotel in town.

True, we have in Benton a large rooming house but it does not have the facilities of a modern hotel. True also, we have motels nearby but can you acquire one with even a reservation in the fishing season? No, they are filled by unscheduled arrivals and by a week-at-a-time occupants.

It may be noted that the county seat is centrally located for the cities of Mayfield, Murray and Paducah for the purpose of travel, and even the lake, for that matter.

To be sure, matters will be brought up about finance. Property could be obtained if the owners would only ask a fair price. Twenty people with \$5,000 to invest or 19 people and the other furnish the property. Nearly a \$100,000 hotel by a board of twenty.

Maybe a little better thought would help find a better way. Do you know of one?

Work to Begin Soon as Possible

Marshall County Fiscal Court, in session Monday at the courthouse here, awarded contracts for the new county high school building to be erected near the Calvert City Y.

Hal Perry of Benton was awarded the general contract on a low bid of \$78,423. The plumbing and heating contract was awarded to G. & H. Plumbing Co. of Paducah on a low bid of \$19,500.

The new high school will serve the north end of the county. It will serve students of Calvert City, Sharpe, Gilbertsville, Paducah and Brinsburg. The Calvert City and Sharpe schools will continue as grade schools, but will not be used as high schools after the new building is completed.

Work on the new county high school will start as soon as the weather permits. Holland Rose, county superintendent of schools, said. The building is scheduled for completion by the fourth Monday in August of this year.

The building will be erected on a 20-acre site purchased from Jim and John Gilliland. The site is where Ky 95 adjoins the Gilliland farm near the Calvert City Y.

The new county high school will be a one-story structure consisting of seven classrooms, a home economics room, a science room, library room, offices for the principal, and a cafeteria.

It will accommodate 325 students. Revenue bonds will be issued to pay for the new school building.

6 Percent Penalty On County Taxes Will Start On Feb. 1.

County tax books, which were closed a few days when Volney Brien turned over the sheriff's office to Billy Watkins, are now open again.

Sheriff Watkins advises taxpayers to come in and pay their taxes during January while the 2 percent penalty is in effect. A 6 percent penalty goes into effect on Feb. 1.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

A pecan cake is a "must" for many housewives who make careful plans for Christmas baking. This recipe comes from Mrs. Pearl Haak, specialist in foods at the University of Kentucky.

- Pecan Cake**
- 1 1/4 lbs. seeded raisins
 - 1/2 lb. candied orange peel
 - 1/8 lb. candied cherries
 - 1 slice candied pineapple
 - 1 1/2 lbs. pecans
 - 1/2 lb. butter
 - 2 cup sugar
 - 6 eggs
 - 1/3 cup molasses
 - 4 cup flour
 - 1 cup fruit juice
 - 2 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Brown two cups of flour in a shallow pan in a 400-degree oven for 10 minutes. Stir frequently. To the fruit and nuts add one cup of white flour. Cream butter and sugar; add egg yolks beaten slightly. To this add the molasses, browned flour and half the fruit juice.

Mix well, then add alternately the remaining white flour sifted with spices and baking powder, and 1/2 cup of fruit juice. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Add the flour, fruit and nuts. Grease and line sides and bottom of baking pans.

Bake a six-pound cake for three hours at 325 degrees, or one-pound cakes for 1 1/2 hours.

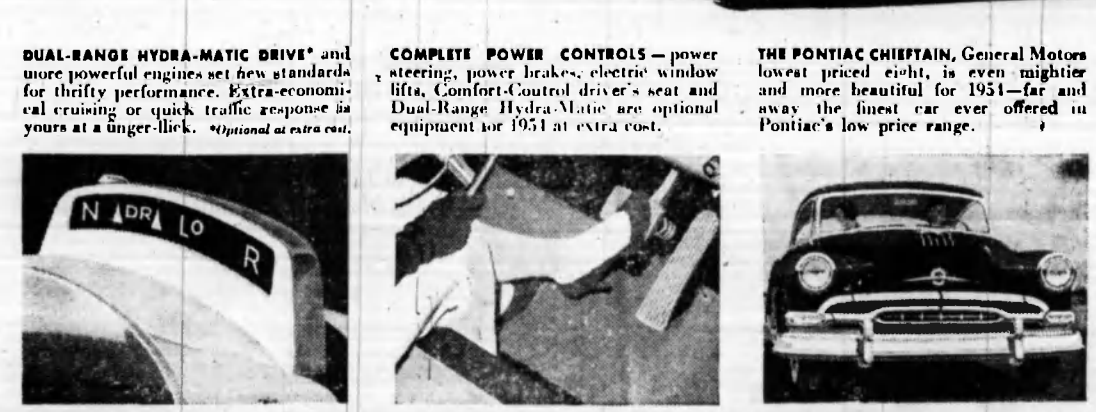

Pointers Given On Storage Of Foods

Today many women save time by shopping for food only once or twice a week. If you're one of these, you'll be interested in a study of the "Storage Life of Foods" recently made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Food experts making this study warn that the keeping quality of perishable foods depends on a number of factors. You must consider the type of food and its freshness when stored. Also, foods must be stored under proper temperature and humidity conditions.

For best results, store meats and milk near the freezing unit, and other types of food in the remaining space of your refrigerator. Fresh fruits and vegetables go in your refrigerator-covered containers.

With this arrangement, fresh cuts of meat can be kept from three to six days. However, fresh fish and ground meats should be used after one day's storage, and poultry after two to three days. Cured meats keep longer, but should be used within seven days.

For best quality, liver, heart, kidney, and brains may be kept for two days; sliced cold cuts, up to six days. All meats should be wrapped loosely except sliced cold cuts; wrap these securely in semi-moisture-proof paper.

Hard cheese, wrapped or kept in a container, will keep indefinitely. But soft cheese is best used within one to two weeks. Milk should not be kept longer than three days. Fresh eggs are usable from two to six weeks, but best if used within a week.

Fresh beans of various types may be kept from one to three weeks. A few days is the limit for soft berries. Apples and oranges stay fresh from one to two months.

The experts make no recommendations on the length of time to keep leftover foods since their nature, composition, and methods of preparation are so varied. The freezer compartment, if your refrigerator has one, is the place for these if you don't plan to use them within a day or two.

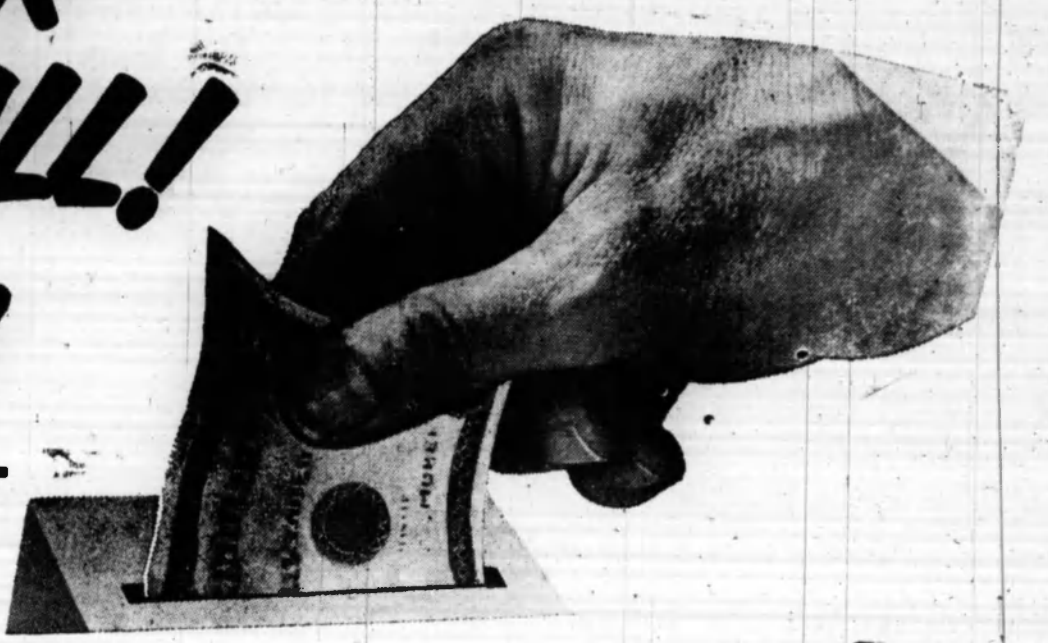

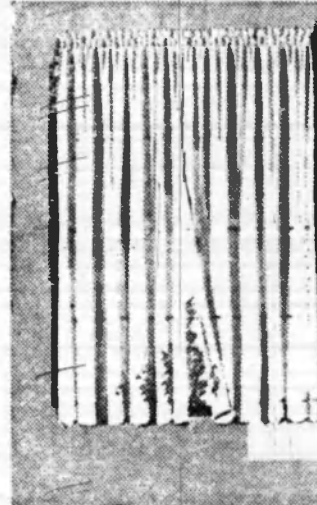

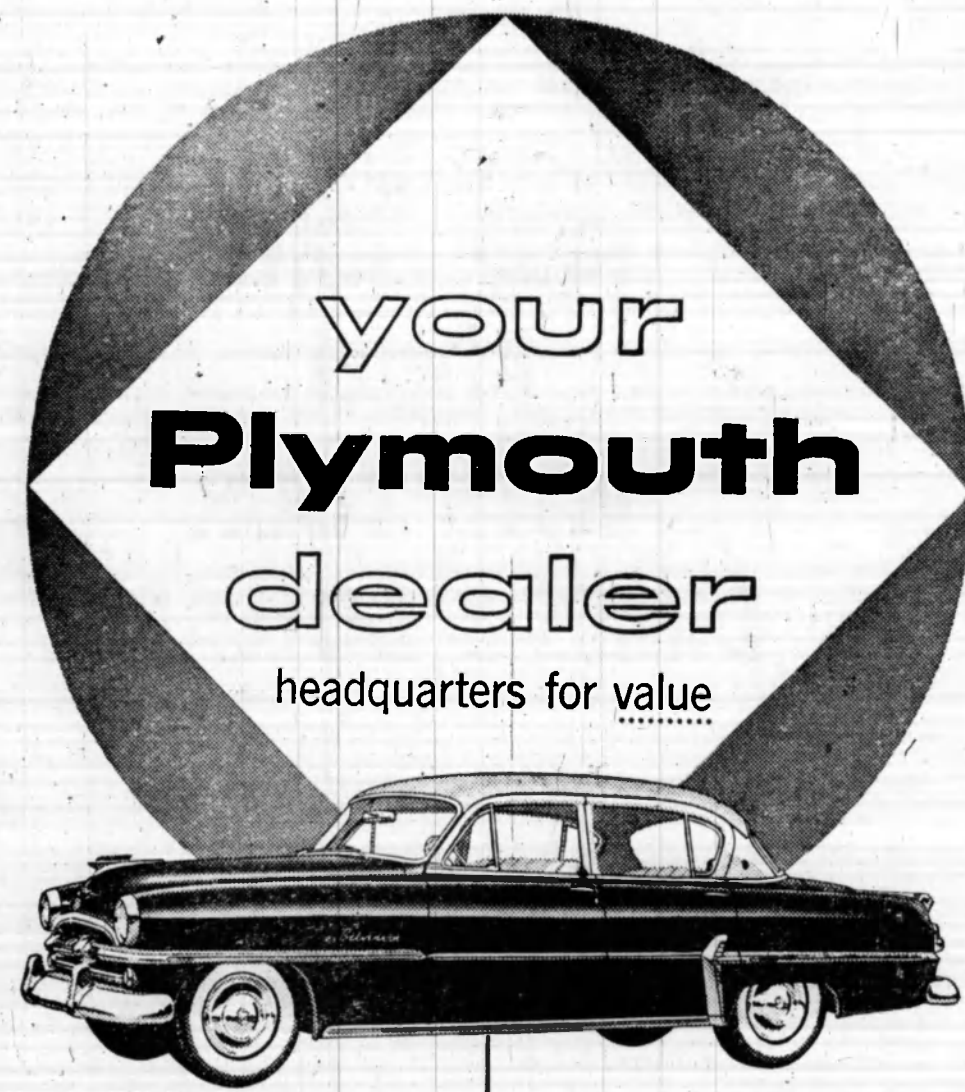
