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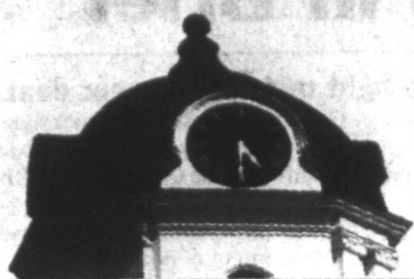
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MSU Regents form committee for Dunn contract review

At its quarterly meeting Friday, the Murray State University Board of Regents unanimously voted to set a schedule for evaluating the performance of MSU President Dr. Randy Dunn and taking action on his contract in May.

Board Chairman Dr. Constantine Curris broached the subject during his chairman's report. He said the board was "keenly aware" that there were many questions and concerns among faculty and staff about the renewal of Dunn's contract, which is currently set to expire on June 30, 2014. Curris said the board has always sought to function in a manner consistent with its policies and procedures and maintain transparency. He noted that the board unanimously voted on a new contract for Dunn in September 2010. The terms of the contract stated that the board would take action on the contract no later than a year prior to its maturation, which would be at the end of the 2012-13 fiscal year on June 30, 2013.

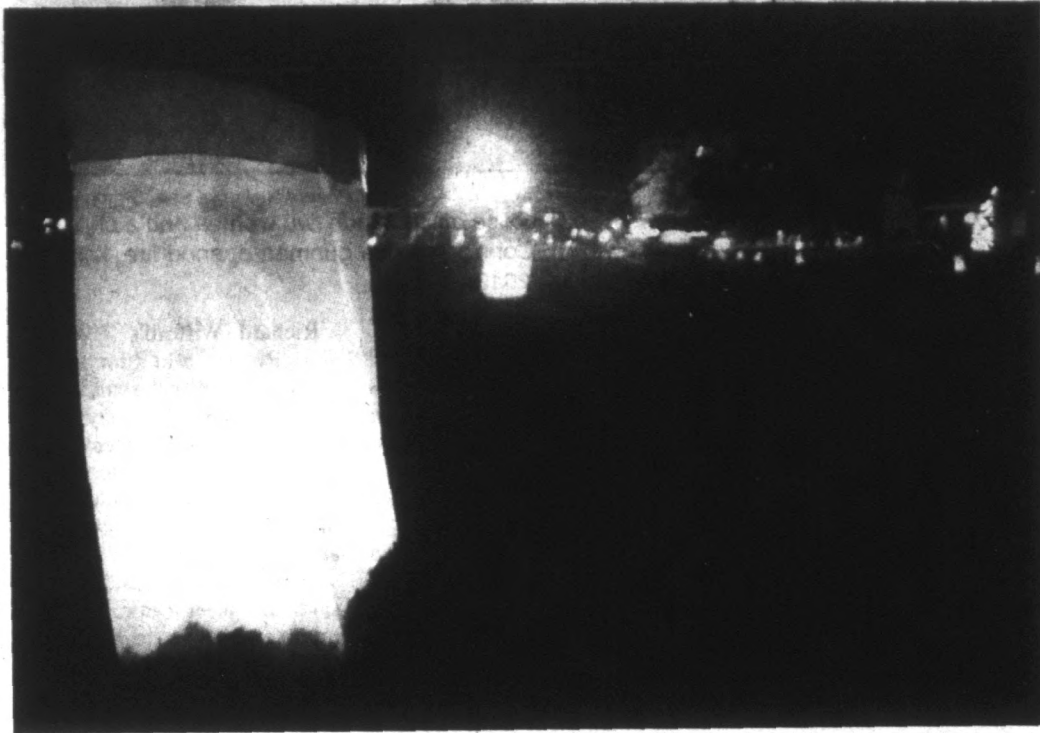
"The specific process that we would follow had not been enunciated, and several board members exchanged some emails on this point because we do want to be very open and straightforward about this," Curris said. "So at this time, I would like to recognize Regent Steve Williams."

Williams made a motion, which was seconded and unanimously approved, for the board to recognize concerns expressed by several constituencies and initiate a contract review process with several steps involved. By the date of the next board meeting on

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Luminaries light Olive Blvd.

A long-standing tradition was renewed Friday night as residents of Olive Boulevard between 13th and 14th streets hosted their annual luminary lighting.

Several residents — and even non-residents — of the neighborhood nestled near the main campus area of Murray State University and lit candles placed inside about 400 white sacks at their customary three-paces width (honoring the wishes of the three men most responsible, founder Howard Titsworth and longtime next-door neighbors J.D. Rayburn and Hugh Oakley). Murray Electric System added ambiance to the occasion by following its own tradition of cutting power to street lamps to allow the luminaries to provide the only light on the street.

Kemmerich gets preliminary approval for tax incentive

Kemmerich USA LP has been granted preliminary approval for a \$3 million tax incentive by the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development for a new location in Calloway County, according to the KCED website.

The KCED financial incentives database at thinkkentucky.com shows that the incentive has been preliminarily approved for a \$3 million tax incentive through the Kentucky Business Investment Program. The total

project cost is currently estimated at \$12.24 million. It is estimated to bring 120 new jobs with an estimated hourly wage of \$16. The date of the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority's action was Thursday, Dec. 13, according to the site.

Murray Calloway County Economic Development Corporation President Mark Manning declined comment during repeated phone requests.

A formal announcement should be expected provided the project reaches fruition.

Man kills mother, then 26 at Conn. grade school

NEWTOWN, Conn. (AP) — A man killed his mother at their home and then opened fire Friday inside the elementary school where she taught, massacring 26 people, including 20 children, as youngsters cowered in fear to the sound of gunshots reverberating through the building and screams echoing over the intercom.

The 20-year-old killer, carrying at least two handguns, committed suicide at the school, bringing the death toll to 28, author-

ities said.

The rampage, coming less than two weeks before Christmas, was the nation's second-deadliest school shooting, exceeded only by the Virginia Tech massacre that left 33 people dead in 2007.

"Our hearts are broken today," a tearful President Barack Obama, struggling to maintain his composure, said at the White House. He called for "meaningful action" to prevent such shootings. "As a country, we have been through this too many times," he said.

Police shed no light on the motive for the

attack. The gunman, Adam Lanza, was believed to suffer from a personality disorder and lived with his mother, said a law enforcement official who was briefed on the investigation but was not authorized to discuss it.

Panicked parents looking for their children raced to Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, a prosperous New England community of about 27,000 people 60 miles northeast of New York City. Police told

Chapman: A fighter and a survivor

Murray youth on track to be cancer free

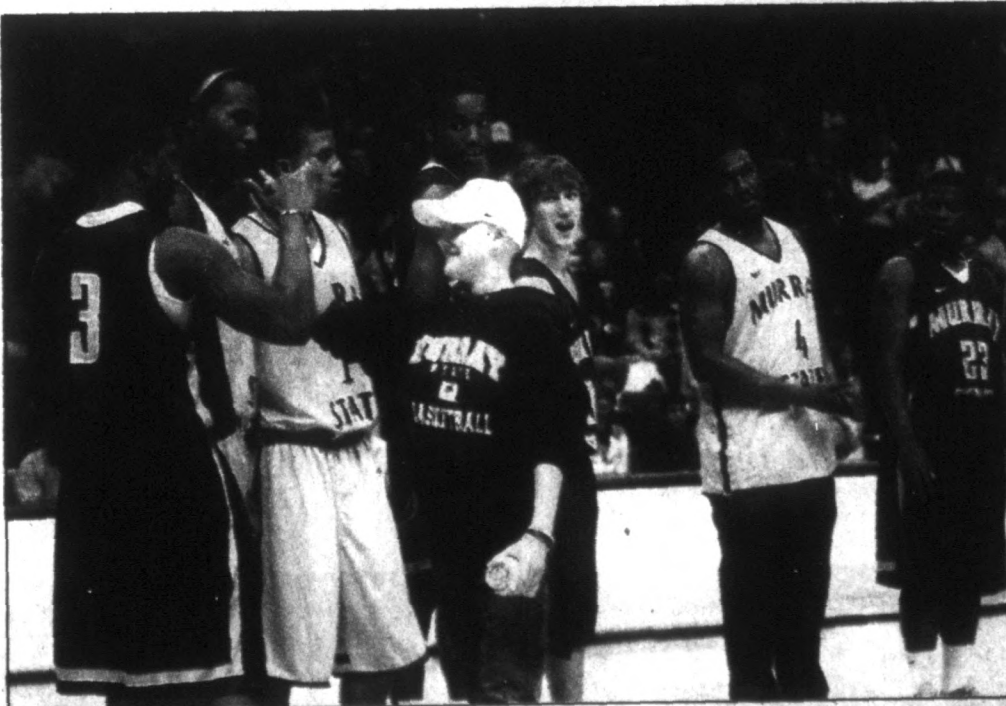
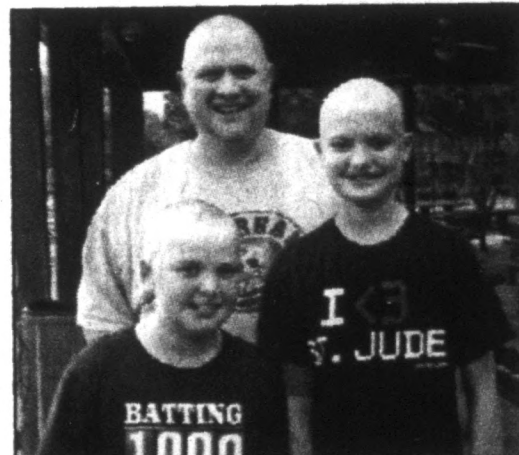
When students in Murray accomplish big things, the community rallies around them with compliments, praise and well-wishes, but more importantly, when a middle school student is diagnosed with cancer, this community rallies around them with prayers, donations, well-wishes, signs, t-shirts, and the list could go on forever.

That was the case with one Murray family, because on July 13, 2012 (a Friday the 13th) they were made aware their oldest son was diagnosed with leukemia. Carson Chapman has become well known in Murray over the last few months, as not only a 12-year-old dealing with cancer, but also a fighter, a survivor and most importantly, a boy who has leaned on his faith to get through this most trying time.

Since, the Calloway County Middle School student found out he has Acute Lymphocytic Leukemia, the youth has been successfully battling the disease with

youngsters at the kindergarten-through-fourth-grade school to close their eyes as they were led from the building so that they wouldn't see the blood and broken glass.

Schoolchildren — some crying, others looking frightened — were escorted through a parking lot in a line, hands on each other's shoulders.

Law enforcement officials speaking on condition of anonymity said that Lanza killed his mother, Nancy Lanza, and then drove to the school in her car with three guns, including a high-powered rifle that he apparently left in the back of the vehicle. Authorities said he shot up two classrooms, but they otherwise gave no details on how the attack unfolded.

A custodian ran through the halls, warning of a gunman on the loose, and someone switched on the intercom, alerting people in the building to the attack — and perhaps saving many lives — by letting them hear the hysteria going on in the school office, a teacher said.

Teachers locked their doors and ordered children to huddle in a corner or hide in closets as shots echoed through the building.

State police Lt. Paul Vance said 28 people in all were killed, including the gunman, and a woman who worked at the school was wounded.

Lanza's older brother, 24-year-old Ryan, of Hoboken, N.J., was being questioned, but a law enforcement official said he was not believed to have had any role in the rampage. Investigators were searching his computers and phone records, but he told law enforcement he had not been in touch with his brother since about 2010.

The officials spoke on the condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the unfolding investigation.

At one point, a law enforcement official mistakenly identified the gunman as Ryan Lanza. Brett Wilshe, a friend of Ryan Lanza's, said Lanza told him the gunman may have had his identification. Updates posted on Ryan Lanza's Facebook page

Friday afternoon read, "It wasn't me" and "I was at work."

Robert Licata said his 6-year-old son was in class when the gunman burst in and shot the teacher. "That's when my son grabbed a bunch of his friends and ran out the door," he said. "He was very brave. He waited for his friends."

He said the shooter didn't utter a word. Stephen Delgiadice said his 8-year-old daughter was in the school and heard two big bangs. Teachers told her to get in a corner, he said. "It's alarming, especially in Newtown, Connecticut, which we always thought was the safest place in America," he said. His daughter was uninjured.

Theodore Varga was in a meeting with other fourth-grade teachers when he heard the gunfire. He said someone had turned on the intercom so that "you could hear people in the office. You could hear the hysteria that was going on. I think whoever did that saved a lot of people. Everyone in the school was listening to the terror that was transpiring."

Also, a custodian ran around, warning people there was some-

one with a gun, Varga said. "He said, 'Guys! Get down! Hide!' Varga said. "So he was actually a hero." The teacher said he did not know if the custodian survived.

On Friday night, hundreds of people packed a Newtown church and stood outside in a vigil for the victims. People held hands, lit candles and sang "Silent Night" at St. Rose of Lima church.

Anthony Bloss, whose three daughters survived the shootings, said they are doing better than he is. "I'm numb. I'm completely numb," he said at the vigil.

Mergim Bajraliu, 17, said he heard the gunshots echo from his home and ran to check on his 9-year-old sister at the school. He said his sister, who was uninjured, heard a scream come over the intercom. He said teachers were shaking and crying as they came out of the building.

"Everyone was just traumatized," he said.

Mary Pendergast said her 9-year-old nephew was in the school at the time of the shooting but wasn't hurt after his music teacher helped him take cover in a closet.

Richard Wilford's 7-year-old son, Richie, told him that he heard a noise that sounded like "cans falling." The boy said a teacher went out to check on the noise, came back in, locked the door and had the children huddle in the corner until police arrived.

"There's no words," Wilford said. "It's sheer terror, a sense of imminent danger, to get to your child and be there to protect him."

On Friday afternoon, family members were led away from a firehouse that was being used as a staging area, some of them weeping. One man, wearing a T-shirt without a jacket, put his arms around a woman as they walked down the middle of the street, oblivious to everything around them. Another woman with tears rolling down her face walked by, carrying a car seat with a baby inside.

"Evil visited this community today and it's too early to speak of recovery, but each parent, each sibling, each member of the family has to understand that Connecticut — we're all in this together. We'll do whatever we can to overcome this event,"

Kentucky News in Brief

Counties vow to fight restrictions near dams

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — Counties in western Kentucky are vowing to fight a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers proposal to add restrictions to headwaters and tailwaters near Cumberland River dams.

The Corps' office in Nashville, Tenn., announced on Thursday a proposal to add restrictions for the safety of boaters.

Officials in western Kentucky counties said the restrictions aren't needed and would close some of the best fishing at Lake Barkley. Boaters above the Barkley Dam would be required to stay 400 feet away from the structure and boaters beneath it would be required to stay 700 feet away.

Livingston County Judge-Executive Chris Lasher and Lyon County Judge-Executive Wade White told The Paducah Sun that the regulation isn't needed and they would fight it. White says most people know the danger and take precautions.

Woman pleads guilty in slaying

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — A prosecutor says a fifth person has pleaded guilty to charges involving a western Kentucky slaying.

The Paducah Sun reports Jamie Taylor pleaded guilty to murder and kidnapping in a deal that calls for her to serve a life sentence with eligibility for parole in 20 years in the slaying of 21-year-old CaSondra Evard, whose body was found in December 2010 near a creek. She had faced the death penalty.

Taylor's husband, Mark Taylor, and daughter, Jasmine Taylor, are also charged with murder and kidnapping in the case, and prosecutors said they may call Jamie Taylor to testify in their upcoming trials.

Four other defendants in the case have entered guilty pleas on various charges. Jamie Taylor

Summer start date projected for bridges

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Transportation officials from Kentucky and Indiana told Louisville Metro Council members that construction on two new bridges over the Ohio River is projected to start at nearly the same time next summer.

The Courier-Journal reports that Indiana Department of Transportation project manager Ron Heustis said he expects construction on the eastern bridge, which will link Utica, Ind., and Prospect, Ky., to start in June.

Kentucky Transportation Cabinet project manager Andy Barber says he expects construction on the downtown span, which will connect Louisville, Ky., and New Albany, Ind., to begin in July.

The dates were provided to council members Thursday as part of an update of the project. Both new bridges are expected to open in 2016.

Battalion to donate canned food

FORT CAMPBELL, Ky. (AP) — Soldiers from Fort Campbell will be donating food items to the installation's YMCA for distribution to other military families.

On Friday morning, each soldier from the 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division will donate two food items to the Backdoor Boutique, which is a free store for military families on the post on the Tennessee-Kentucky state line. It offers household and personal items, such as baby clothes and appliances.

The unit is donating canned goods to help other soldiers in need and their families during the holiday season. Following the donation, the battalion will participate in a physical fitness event at the Division Parade Field.

the help of the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Carson's father, Ed Chapman, works with the Laker P.R.I.D.E. Center at Calloway County High School and is an assistant coach for the boys basketball team. He said there were several events that lead to the family getting Carson checked out, with the main one occurring after a simple game of pick-up basketball.

During the game, Carson was showing signs of weakness, not giving his all, and as his father said, he looked like he was not in the game mentally, much to the chagrin of the elder Chapman, who always has his basketball coaching eyes on his son. He said he was getting on his son for not trying, and was even "aggravated" with him, but when Carson told him he was having trouble catching his breath, and was having pain in his upper back, he decided to have him checked out, and they went to Primary Care Medical Center, where Dr. Joyce Hughes took over.

"We went down the road of trying to figure out what was wrong," he said, "and we're thinking the breathing was related to asthma due to sports, but ruled that out when she did an x-ray and saw something in one of his lungs. She took the next step and did a cat scan, where she found a sign that there was cancer present, and she immediately recognized that this was serious, and didn't hesitate. She called St. Jude's and then told us, 'you're all lined up, and they want to see you, as soon as you can gather yourselves, you can go down there (to Memphis).'"

"We left about three hours later, and Carson got down there and didn't leave for seven weeks."

Through the eyes of 12-year-old Carson, things went a little differently: "I went from Gulf Shores, Ala., playing my last baseball tournament with a group of friends, to four days later, seeing the huge building of St. Jude and knowing it was going to be my home for about seven weeks. It was quite a turnaround.

"There were a lot of emotions, we were at Primary Care and they ran the last test. Then Dr. Hughes left the room, and we knew something was up. That is when she went to call St. Jude and get me set up. She came back into the room and called just for Mom and Dad, and I immediately started to think the worst.

"Then they came back and told me that it really was the worst, that in itself was just a handful of emotions just running through me," he said. "We leave Primary Care, still just shocked, and we get home and there are already cars there waiting for us and embracing us."

The family said Carson's seven-week stay at St. Jude's was tough. He said the first week was the toughest, but it calmed down from that point forward as the family got to go to the Ronald McDonald house for the rest of his time there. He said the hardest part was the in-and-out of family, while his

friends in Murray were going about their summer breaks as normal kids. He has been able to stay positive with one little thought: "You can't think of the worst, you just have to keep moving forward, that's what I've always told myself through all of this."

While one can assume the last several months have been tough for him and his family, Carson's dad said they have come through it with help and prayers from the community and their family.

"It's really humbling to be in this type of position when you see the love and good deeds and well-wishes and prayers," Ed Chapman said. "People have sacrificed time and money and resources to try to do anything to ease our burden. Almost all of us pride ourselves on trying to take care of our own business, and our family tries to put a high priority on helping others. To be on the receiving end was humbling, and it's really hard to describe, because you almost feel unworthy, yet you're so moved that people care enough about you to do and say so many wonderful things."

When Carson was on his way back from Memphis on Friday, Oct. 12, the family stopped in Jackson, Tenn., for a bite to eat. Ed Chapman jokingly told Carson to tweet to MSU basketball coach Steve Prohm about how he was going to be able to make it to Racer Madness. Carson did, thinking nothing would come of it, but he was wrong.

Once he got to the CFSB Center for the event, Prohm called him out, and told him to stand up, which caused the typical Murray State eruption people are used to hearing during basketball games. Then came the icing on the cake. Prohm invited Carson to come onto the floor to be the celebrity assistant coach and sit on the bench with the team during the scrimmage.

"I was the first one to sit back down when he called me out the first time," Carson said. "But when he called me down there, my first thought was that my balance has been off since I've been through the treatment, and as I'm walking, I'm thinking 'just hold on, don't fall down,' talking to myself the whole time. It was pretty cool to get to meet the players and get to talk to them and get excited for the new season."

Carson began the first of 120 weeks of treatment in Memphis on Nov. 6, which he will finish in February or March of 2015. As long as the cancer stays in remission, he will finish on schedule. A.L.L. has risen from a four percent cure rate 50 years ago when St. Jude began, to a 94-98 percent cure rate today, it was reported.

The Chapman family, including father Ed, mother Chrystie, oldest son Carson, and 10-year-old Jackson, will never be the same, but once 2015 rolls around, they will surely be grateful for the blessings they have received, both from their faith and the community they call home.

"It's just a celebration of the lives of people we have loved and lost," said Judy Ratliff, who has helped organize the event for most of the 20-plus years Olive has had lit the luminaries. She said, for her, this year's event is a tribute to Rayburn, who died recently at the age of 100. "Even as he became older, and unable to bend down and light the candles, he would still be involved. If you had a bag out of line, he was watching from his porch and point it out to you with his cane. That's because he wanted it to be perfect."

The lighting was to have happened last weekend, but poor weather conditions prompted a postponement to this weekend. Ratliff said that proved advantageous, though, as it allowed Murray State students participating in Saturday's December commencement exercises to be part of the event.

"We've had two fraternities

(Sigma Pi and Alpha Sigma Phi) agree to be part of this," she said, explaining that longtime Olive resident Pete Waldrop suggested the outreach to MSU groups. "We also have several new families that have moved into this neighborhood and are seeing this for the first time, and we're hoping this is something they're going to want to be part of for many years to come."

Gene Schanbacher lives on nearby Farris Avenue, but as a property owner on Olive, he said he feels he is part of that neighborhood and has helped participate in the luminary event each year.

"I just think it's a nice occasion for a neighborhood to be doing, and it's indicative of what Murray and Calloway County are all about. Where there's a worthwhile project, everybody pitches in," Schanbacher said.

Weather permitting, the luminary display is scheduled for Saturday night as well.

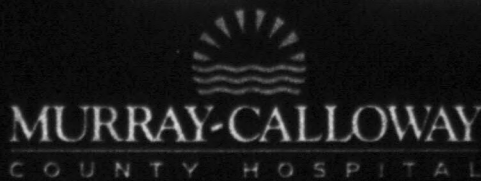

Paul: I'll be on 2016 Senate ballot

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — U.S. Sen. Rand Paul, the tea party Republican who has acknowledged he's interested in a presidential bid in 2016, insisted Friday that he would seek re-election to the Senate that year.

The quandary for Paul is that he has to choose one or the other because, under Kentucky law, he's legally precluded from running for both.

Paul told reporters after a speech to Lexington business leaders on Friday that he has formed a re-election committee and that he intends to be on the ballot for Senate, though he still didn't rule out running for president.

"I'm really not going to equivocate on whether I'm running for Senate or not," Paul said. "That will happen." As far as a presidential bid, Paul said "it will probably be two years before we have a serious discussion" about that.

Republican strategist Mike Kareem, a Louisville attorney, said Paul has put himself in a precarious position by telling ABC News

last month that he's interested in a presidential run.

"He's trying to ride two horses at the same time," Kareem said of Paul. "He could slip and fall."

Paul, the son of Texas Republican Ron Paul who ran unsuccessfully for the GOP presidential nomination this year, was elected to the Senate from Kentucky in 2010.

Karen said uncertainty about which race the younger Paul will enter could have a chilling effect on his fundraising. He said it could also cause some other GOP candidates to begin positioning themselves for Paul's Senate seat.

"I think talk about him being a presidential candidate undercuts his credibility as a Senate candidate," said University of Louisville political scientist Laurie Rhodebeck. "Even though the re-election rate of Senate incumbents is extraordinarily high, one of the reasons why those folks get voted out is when they're perceived as too greedily seeking options outside their state. Ambition sometimes gets punished."

Kerry front-runner as Secretary of State

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic Sen. John Kerry, who unsuccessfully sought the presidency in 2004 and has pined for the job of top diplomat, vaulted to the head of President Barack Obama's short list of secretary of state candidates after U.N. Ambassador Susan Rice suddenly withdrew from consideration to avoid a contentious confirmation fight with emboldened Republicans.

The exit of Rice and elevation of Kerry shook up Washington on Thursday and was coupled with the potential for even bolder second-term changes in Obama's national security team next month. Chuck Hagel, a former Republican senator from Nebraska, emerged as the front-runner to serve as defense secretary.

The possible selection of Kerry and Hagel would put two decorated Vietnam War veterans — one Navy, the other Army — at State and the Pentagon.

Official word on replacements for Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and Defense Secretary Leon Panetta in an Obama Cabinet remake could come as early as next week. The choice of Kerry would open a Massachusetts Senate seat, boosting the prospects for recently defeated Republican Sen. Scott Brown to win back a job in Washington.

Kerry, a senator for nearly three decades and the current Senate Foreign Relations Committee chairman, has won praise from his Senate Democratic and Republican colleagues and should be confirmed easily, if nominated. He has been Obama's envoy to hot spots such as Afghanistan and Pakistan, the administration's point man in 2010 on a nuclear arms reduction treaty with Russia and was a stand-in for Republican Mitt Romney during Obama's debate preparation.

Hagel was a senior member of the Foreign Relations Committee during his years in the Senate. He and Obama became close while they served in the Senate and traveled overseas together. Hagel has irked some in the GOP

with his complaints that the party has moved too far to the right and for his endorsements of Democrats, most recently Bob Kerrey in last month's Nebraska Senate race.

"He's a combat vet who was wounded twice and understands that the decisions we make here are carried out by our young men and women" in the military, said Sen. Jack Reed, D-R.I., a member of the Armed Services Committee.

It would be highly unusual for Hagel's political moves to sink his nomination, even in bitterly divided Washington.

But Democrats blamed politics for Rice's demise as a possible candidate. They clearly insinuated that Republicans who failed to get any traction in using the deadly September attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, Libya, to derail Obama's re-election bid instead took down Rice.

She "deserved far more respect than she was shown by certain Senate Republicans," Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., said in a blistering statement late Thursday. "Their behavior was a disgrace to the Senate's tradition of bipartisan cooperation on national security issues and beneath the stature of senators with otherwise distinguished records on national security."

"I hope that moving forward, senators will act based on fact-finding and serving the public interest, not advancing partisan political agendas or settling old scores," Reid said.

In the past month, Arizona Sen. John McCain, Obama's Republican presidential rival in 2008, and Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., had been Rice's harshest critics, threatening to block her nomination. Sen. Kelly Ayotte, R-N.H., expressed serious concerns. The most damaging blow, however, came from Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, a moderate Republican who voiced doubts not only about Rice in her current job but also when she was a State Department official during the Clinton administration.

All four met with Rice in unusual, private sessions on Capitol Hill where she failed to mollify her critics.

Calloway Clerk's Office receives clean audit

Calloway County Clerk Ray Coursey Jr. and the 13 members of his office staff got what they expected Wednesday when a letter from the Kentucky State Auditor's office arrived to tell them that the annual audit of the office of three months ago found no problems.

Still, while it was expected, Coursey said it was reason for celebration.

"I was actually pretty proud of it," Coursey said Thursday, adding that a problem has yet to be uncovered with his office since he took over as clerk 18 years ago. "I'm tickled to death with that. When you're in an office where 13 different people are handling 35 tasks during a given day, it would be easy for things to happen, and mistakes can happen."

"These folks understand the factors of human error, though, and I think they know that if anything were to happen it would not be because it was intentional. We've never had an issue, though, and that's important because you want the public to have faith in you and your people."

The audit dealt with 2011 expenditures and receipts and how Coursey's office processed them. He said a team of three auditors occupied his office for a total of about three weeks, checking every transaction for accuracy.

"Whenever I submit information in reports to the fiscal court, for example, on expenditures and money we've received each month, that's the kind of thing they look at, among other things," he said. "They do this every year. It's just a regular audit and they do these with other offices, like the sheriff's office, the county itself, throughout the entire state, and it's usually a different team they have for each one so they put in a lot of time on this."

"I can't even communicate with them really while they're here. All I do is just give them a place in the office to operate. I can't even buy them a Coca-Cola. It's not allowed."

Coursey said another stipulation for members of the audit team is that none of them can be a resident of the county where the audit is conducted.

Beshear urges Kentucky's senators to pass river bill

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — Gov. Steve Beshear this week urged U.S. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell to sponsor legislation that would force the Army Corps of Engineers to release water from dams on the Missouri River to raise the water level on the Mississippi River, where drought conditions could soon halt barge traffic.

Beshear, a Democrat, made the request in a letter to McConnell and the state's other Republican U.S. senator, Rand Paul, asking them to act quickly.

"I also urged the corps to release waters from the Missouri River dams to benefit navigation on the Mississippi River," Beshear said. "The corps' position is that their Missouri River master manual does not allow this action, that their master manual has the force of law, and that congressional action would be necessary in order for the Corps to release water from the Missouri dams in this situation."

McConnell and Paul had warned last week of potentially negative economic consequences if the water level on the Mississippi River continues to fall. They said in a letter to Beshear that commercial traffic on the river could "come to a complete halt in coming days" unless the Corps takes action to increase the water flow.

The senators described the diminishing water levels on the river as "a looming crisis" that could affect Kentucky's shipping, agriculture and manufacturing sectors. They urged

him to seek a federal disaster declaration, an action that Beshear said "is not applicable to the situation at this time."

In a statement Thursday night McConnell's office disagreed.

"Senator McConnell has heard from many Kentuckians in the shipping, agriculture, manufacturing and energy sectors who will be adversely affected by this situation," the statement said. "They believe the Governor's power to request a federal disaster declaration from the President could remedy this situation and therefore Senators McConnell and Paul were happy to support their request. Unfortunately, the Governor has a different interpretation of his power to help them."

Beshear said the Corps, acting at the request of him and officials in other affected states, has expedited the letting of a contract to demolish rock formations that could cause a bottleneck for shipping on the river.

The second-term governor said he has been in discussions with Illinois Gov. Pat Quinn and Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon as well as the Corps about the "potential navigation crisis."

"I strongly urge you to assist the Corps of Engineers to address this serious issue by working with your colleagues in Congress to reauthorize the Water Resources Development Act, which has languished for years," Beshear said in his letter. "Further, Congress should act to assist the corps in addressing the funding shortfalls that have hindered its ability to manage the infrastructure backlog on our nation's waterways."

Police: Pedestrian in fatal crash 'not visible'

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Police reports say a pedestrian who was struck and killed by a fire truck in Lexington was "not visible" at the time of the crash.

The Lexington Herald-Leader cited the documents it obtained on Thursday through an open records request in reporting that pedestrian Lauren Roady had a "walk" signal and was in the crosswalk when she was hit. However, the report said it was

10:04 p.m. and raining when the accident happened and Roady, who was 5-foot-3 and 120 pounds, had on dark clothing when she was hit.

Police say the 27-year-old Roady, of Washington, D.C., died shortly after being struck Saturday. She was in town for a running competition.

Police say charges are unlikely to be filed against the driver of the truck.

Jan. 15, the chair will appoint a small ad hoc contract review committee consisting of himself and at least two additional regents. The ad hoc committee will review relevant information and materials, including resolutions forwarded to the board, data responding to the university's progress, information and comments that Dunn might wish to forward to the committee, as well as any information or comments individual regents want to convey.

At the scheduled March 15 board meeting, the committee will meet with the full board in executive session to discuss the contract

and receive any instructions from the board, Williams said. At the May 10 board meeting, the committee will conclude its work and make recommendations to the board. The board will take final action on the contract.

"Mr. Chairman, I would just add that I believe this process will ensure that the board meets its obligations to the university and to President Dunn in a thorough manner, yet within the time frame to which we previously committed," Williams added at the end of his motion. "And, obviously, if we complete the process sooner, then that would be even better."

The issue of the contract had come to the forefront in recent

months in part because of two jobs for which Dunn had applied. Dunn interviewed for the presidency of Missouri State University in October and interviewed earlier this week to become the next Florida Commissioner of Education. Dunn was one of two finalists for the Missouri job, but withdrew his name before the university board made its decision. He was one of three finalists for the Florida job, but another candidate was chosen on Wednesday.

Faculty Regent Jack Rose reminded the board in his constituency report of the resolution the Faculty Senate recently passed in support of Dunn that encouraged the board to take action on his contract. In his constituency report, Staff Regent Phil Schooley

said Dunn had worked hard to improve salaries and benefits among the university's staff. He said the Staff Congress on Wednesday unanimously passed a motion to have Schooley remind the board of a letter the congress had sent in support of Dunn in March 2012 and that the sentiments of the letter still stand.

Among other business: • Enrollment Management and Student Success Committee Chairwoman Marilyn Buchanan said the committee heard a report earlier in the morning from Fred Dietz, executive director for enrollment management. She said enrollment was up 2 percent from last fall with 10,830 total students. • The board approved several naming proposals, including the Gene W. Ray Center, which will be the CFSB Center basketball practice facility; the Jim Thomas, Beth Williams and Howie Crittenden Conference Room inside the practice facility; the Bennie Purcell Men's and Women's Basketball Area at the practice facility; and the Dave Wilcox Student Plaza with the Hutson School of Agriculture.

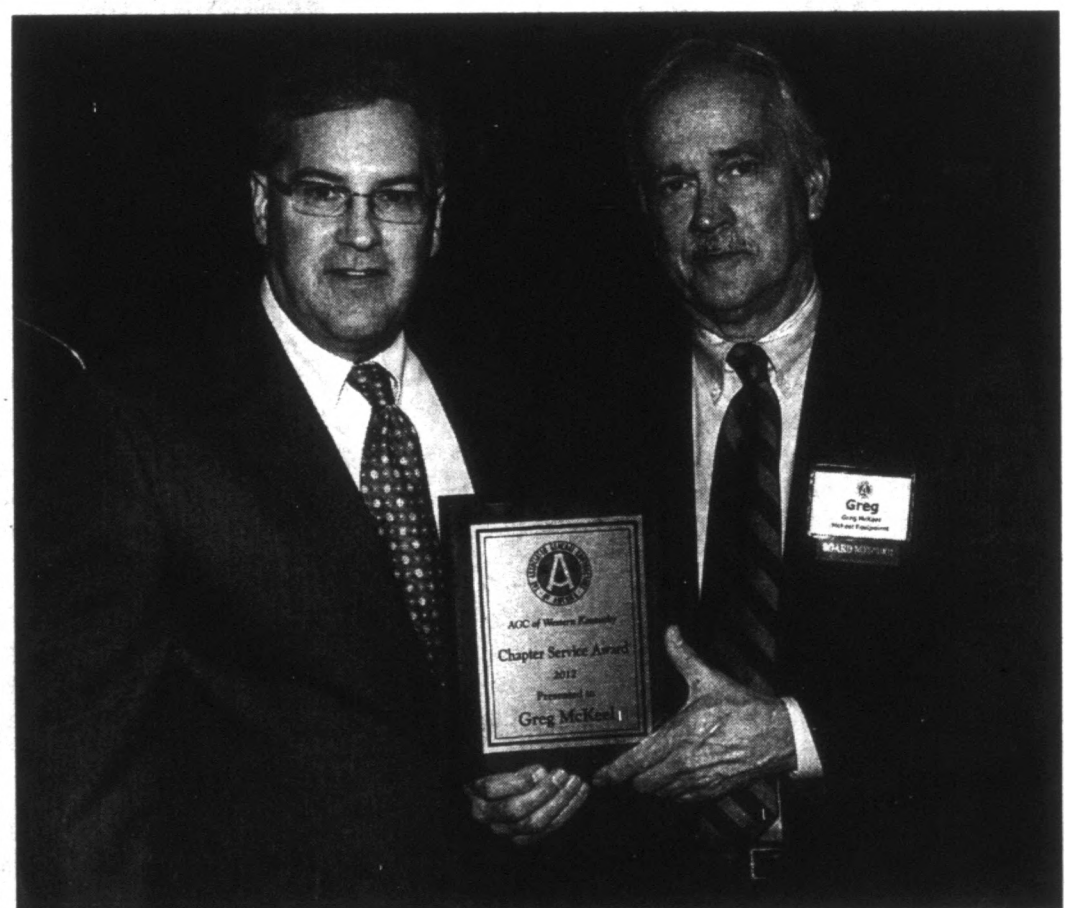

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Deer and ducks appear on upswing

The 2012 deer season is poised to make a run at the state record of 124,752 animals harvested during the 2004 season. With one weekend of muzzleloader, the free youth weekend, and the remainder of archery season to go, Kentucky hunters

have bagged 121,702 deer. This can be attributed to the awesome number of deer that inhabit the Commonwealth and the agreeable weather during the gun and muzzleloader seasons.

Of the total number of deer harvested to date, 1,542 have come from Calloway County (as of this writing), almost as many as hunters have taken in the deer-rich Livingston County (1,573). Marshall County has produced 1,142 so far and Graves County accounts for 2,777. The top producing county for 2012 is Owen with 3,517 to date.

Fall turkey hunters in the

state have taken 4,175 birds to date, 1,607 of which were toms and 2,568 hens. That's a lot of hens to take out of the flock, especially since each hen represents somewhere around three turkeys that will survive to maturity each year.

A new state record black bear has been killed in Kentucky during the two-day bear season just completed. Because the quota of bears taken was met on the first day, it was essentially a one-day season. Overall, 11 black bears were harvested from the Pine Mountain area of Harlan and Letcher Counties. The record bear weighed in at 410 pounds.

Duck hunters are enjoying the best first half of duck season they've seen in years. Reports from the big lakes indicate good numbers of ducks with a fair amount of mallards hanging around. Cold weather up north has been sending the ducks southward a bit earlier this year. In years past, the ducks have stayed in the Dakotas and other northern climates while the weather there was unseasonably mild.

If you want to keep up with the ducks, Ducks Unlimited has an app for smart phones that tracks the migration via reports from real hunters on the scene.

There's a little cost involved, but the app is worth the price just to see what part of the country is holding ducks.

Last weekend's rain has filled a lot of ponds and sloughs and has made the area somewhat more duck-friendly. Of course, the influx of additional water may have scattered the ducks that were using the main lake, but savvy hunters can find the water that the ducks prefer.

On Dec. 29 and 30, Kentucky will hold the annual Free Youth Weekend for deer. On those two days, hunters age 15 and under may hunt deer with a firearm without a license or deer permit.

The youth must be accompanied by an adult, however. The idea for the Free Youth Weekend is to give youngsters an opportunity to use firearms, clothing, or other hunting equipment that they may have received for Christmas.

The Free Youth Weekend is a wonderful time to introduce a youngster to deer hunting and to whet their appetite for a lifetime of hunting.

On the home front, this humble writer has yet to get a decent buck in his sights. That means I'll be out this weekend, muzzleloader in hand, looking for that one big buck.

Watch for winter storms

Hope all of you anglers are enjoying fishing in the rainfall this week. It is some cooler at least and I know you are aware that when it rains, many species of game fish tend to move closer to the surface when it rains. Now, I don't expect to be out there in a

downpour looking for hungry fishes of any species. I have been struck by lightning six times now so I have had enough thank you.

Each time I was on the water in my boat and a tornado swept into the cove very quickly and there is nothing you can do but pray to your maker and ask for protection.

Always wear your life jackets even if you are in close to the shoreline. Tornadoes don't have a conscious so if you encounter a dark, black sky head for the nearest shoreline and get back into a cove quickly. Tie the boat good and get out on the bank where there are medium size trees to hold on to and just pray and wait for the

storm to leave your area.

One time I was having a tough time with a tornado so I saw a huge oak tree about fifty yards ahead. I entered the cove bound for the protection of the huge tree where I would be safe. When I was about fifteen yards away from the bank, I began to slow my boat and stood up so I could throw the heavy rope upon one of the big tree limbs.

I was standing ready to toss my tie rope when a huge bolt of lightning struck all the tree and caused it to fall all over me and my boat. When I came to I was still afloat but covered with several of the big tree limbs. There wasn't any damage to my boat but I had to work my

way out from under the limbs to shut the motor off. I was stuck in the tree limbs but nothing was damaged with the boat.

I thanked the All Mighty, pulled my raingear over me and went to sleep so my pulse would slow down. When I awoke sometime later I had to cut limbs away so I could get my boat out and start back to the marina. It was 4 a.m. when I tied my boat at the Irvin Cobb Resort dock, locked the engine and drove home to my family.

Prepare yourself with the necessities to stay well and safe ahead of time. In case you get trapped along a shoreline due to a bad storm.

Record bear harvested in Letcher Co., hunters take 11 bears during weekend

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Kentucky hunters harvested 11 bears during the recently concluded bear season that ran Dec. 8-9. One of the bears set the new state record.

Doug Adkins of Jenkins, Kentucky took a 410-pound male bear in Letcher County, besting the previous record bear of 350 pounds set last year by Neil Perkins of Hallie, Kentucky.

"The 410-pound bear is the field dressed weight," said Steve Dobby, bear program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "The live weight would have likely exceeded 450 pounds."

All of the bears taken during this season came from Harlan or Letcher counties. The highest bear densities in Kentucky lie along Pine Mountain, which

stretches from the Breaks of the Russell Fork of the Big Sandy River in Pike County through Letcher and Harlan counties.

Hunters purchased 359 permits for the 2012 hunt, down from 484 permits last year. Males made up nine of the 11 harvested bears and 13 of the 17 total bears taken since bear hunting began again in Kentucky in 2009. This is by design.

"Having the hunt in mid-December helps prevent excessive harvest of female bears," Dobby said. "Most female bears are in their dens by this time of year."

This year's total harvest of 11 bears exceeds by one the number of bears established as an annual quota by the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission. Hunters may take only 10 bears per season, of which no more than five shall

be females. "If the quota is not met in a single day, the following day is open until sundown regardless," said Dobby. "We have the season structured in the event this happened. The baseline quota will prevent over harvest of bears."

This hunt was scheduled to continue through Dec. 10, but closed Dec. 9 after hunters reached the bear quota for the season. The 2012 season marks the first time hunters met the quota of bears in the four-year history of modern bear hunting in Kentucky.

By meeting the quota for the season, the bear quota hunt with dogs scheduled for Dec. 17 through Dec. 21 is now a chase-only season in which no harvest of bears shall occur. Harvest of bears would only occur if the bear quota was not met during the regular bear season. The scheduled late bear

chase season with dogs will last from Dec. 24 through Dec. 28. Harvest of bears is not allowed during this chase season as well.

Hunters from the bear zone took 10 of the 11 harvested bears. "Local hunters should take great pride in their success this bear season," Dobby said.



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LBL small game hunting season open

All hunters (age 16 and older) must have an LBL Hunter Use Permit, an appropriate state license and observe LBL rules and applicable state laws regarding hunting zones and safety precautions.

Small game hunters who hunt with dogs should be aware of information regarding LBL's mid-January trapping season, also included in that publication.

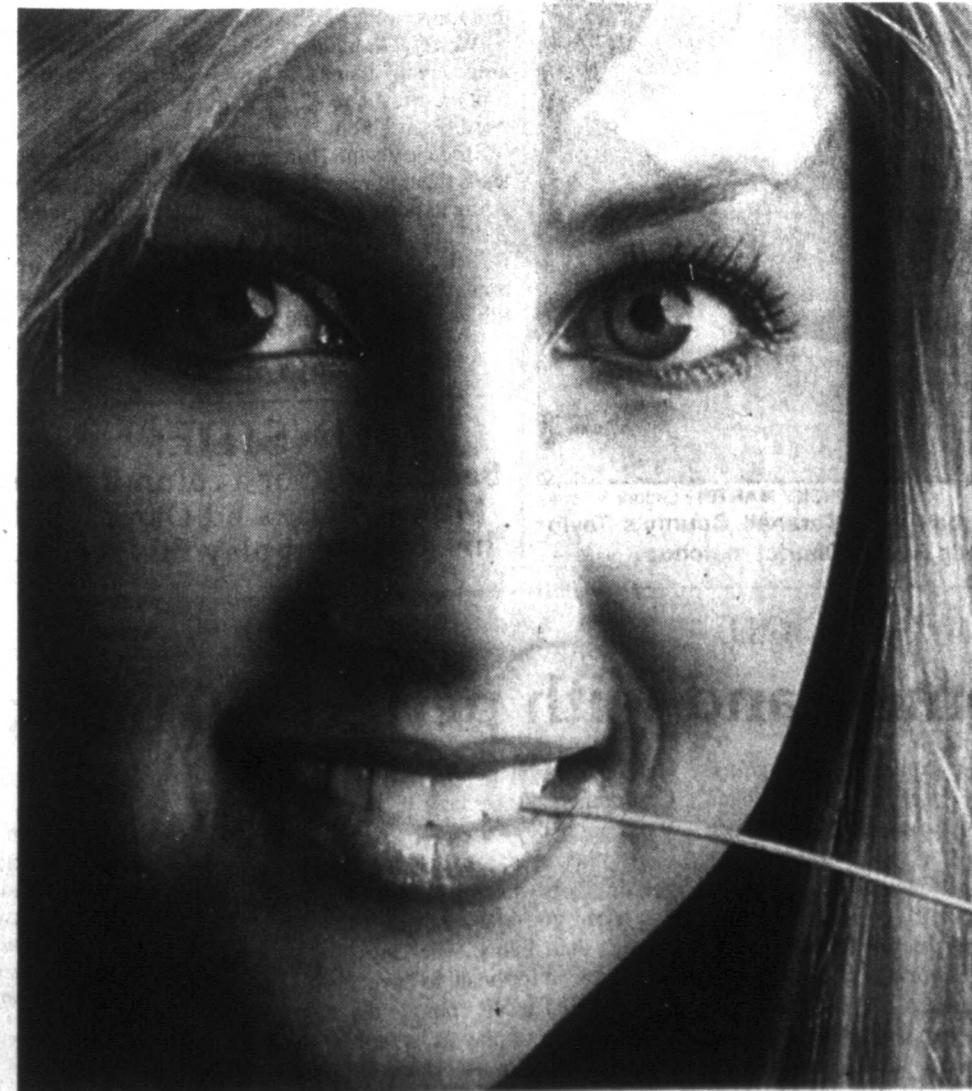

Tigers struggle against Marshall

AFTER QUICK START, MURRAY COOLED DOWN BY MARSHALL COUNTY'S HOT SHOOTING TOUCH

DRAFFENVILLE, Ky. — Murray High head coach Joey Adair was hoping for a little more from his Tigers on Friday night.

Traveling to take on the defending First Region champions in Gus Gillespie's Marshall County club, Adair was hoping his Murray High team would go toe-to-toe with the Marshals.

"We know they are a good team, but we have a good team too," Adair said. "I thought we prepared our guys for them extremely well, but we just didn't do many things right against them."

What looked like a promising start for the Tigers was erased after the first quarter, as Marshall County went 18-for-24 from the field in the second and third periods to pull out a 61-36 victory.

The Tigers jumped out to a 10-3 lead over Marshall County thanks to a few made three-pointers, but Adair said his team never really settled in, adding his Tigers "got punched in the mouth and never recovered."

"Even in the first quarter we outscored them but we shot 2-for-10 from three-point range," Adair said. "It just wasn't a good game for us. We didn't rebound well, and we didn't guard them particularly well, and a lot of that goes on our leadership, they have to be able to go out and execute what we work on in practice."

"(Marshall County) didn't do anything that we didn't prepare for, and even their adjustments, we prepared for those too. We just couldn't do much tonight, and that's extremely frustrating."

Murray High held a 12-7 lead at the end of the first quarter, despite shooting just 4-for-15 from the field, but the offensive struggles would turn into woes for the Tigers for the rest of the night.

While Marshall County got going in the second period, shooting 72 percent from the floor for 17 points, the Tigers mustered only five points on 2-for-6 shooting.

The second quarter, Adair said, decided the ball game.

"You can't score five points against anyone and expect to win, much less Marshall County," he said. "We had way too many turnovers and we were settling for shots instead of trying to get to the rim and get to the free throw line."

Murray High only got to the stripe six times on the night.

Duane Curtis came off the bench to lead the Tigers in scoring with seven, and Adair said he was pleased with the freshman's performance in a district road game, but added other players need to step up.

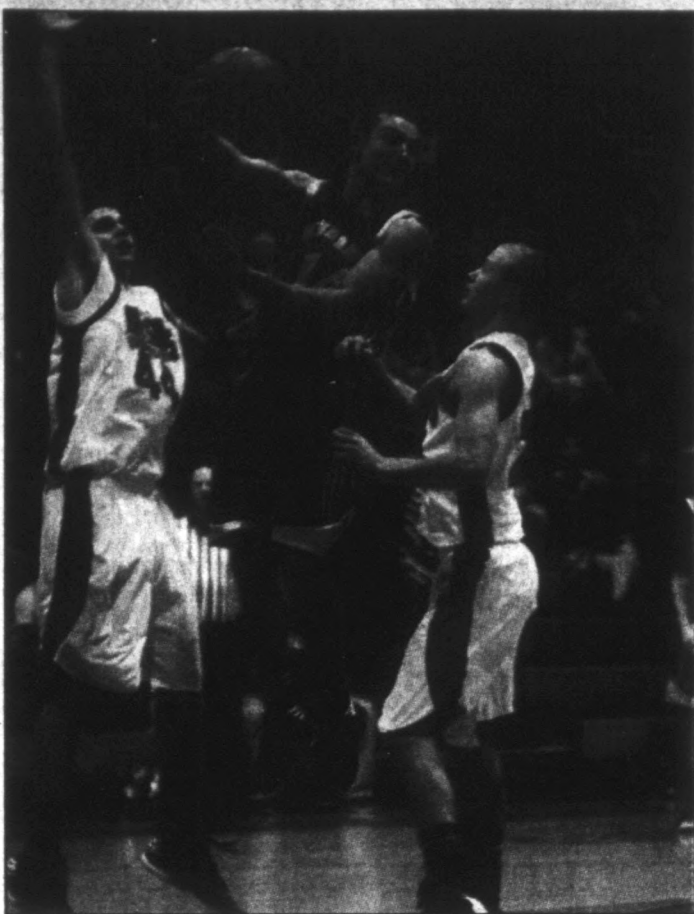
"Duane, he was really the only guy that could score for us for stretches there," Adair said. "And this is no offense to him, because I love the kid and he's a good player, but you can't have a freshman come off the bench and lead you in scoring against a team as good as Marshall County."

"You've got to have other players step up."

Tre Hornbuckle and Tanner Foster had six points for the Tigers, while no other Murray High player scored more than five.

Meanwhile, Marshall County got a double-double from forward Austin Rentfrow, who pitched 20 points and 10 rebounds

Murray High out-rebounded Marshall County 45-37, leaving Turner with plenty of reasons to smile.

"If you ask any of our players, they will tell you that the biggest thing I've been talking about is rebounding the basketball," Turner said, "and tonight we came out and we did that against a very good basketball team."

"We knew (Marshall County) was going to get some shots up against the zone, and we knew that it was important for us to be there on the misses and not give them second chances."

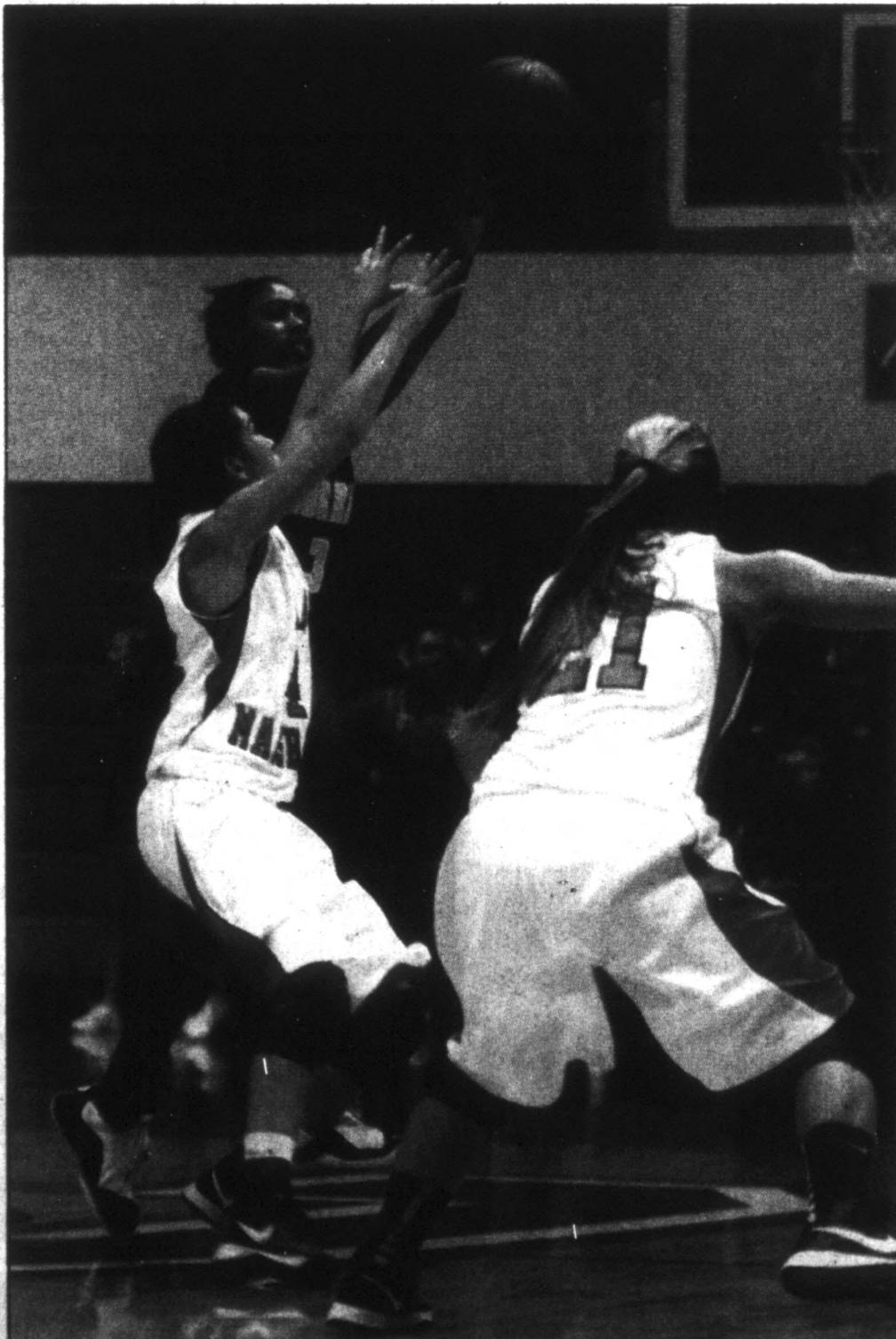
Janssen Starks, who is battling a contusion on her right leg, led the Lady Tigers with 17 points — 10 of which came on a 10-for-12 night at the free throw line.

Marshall County head coach Joseph Simmons said the Lady Marshals sent Starks to the stripe way too many times.

"She's the best free throw shooter in the region," Simmons said. "I thought we did a good job defending her from a field goal percentage standpoint, but we fouled her and put her on the line, and you just can't do that."

Steve Prohm says he will be pretty disappointed if the Racers don't sell out the CFSB Center for Sunday's tilt with Western Kentucky.

Rivalry aside, Isaiah Canaan and Ed Daniel only have 11 home games remaining in their Murray State careers.

Prohm says that alone, should be enough.

"It should be a great crowd, it should be a sold-out crowd," he said. "This game against Western has been as big as any since I've been at Murray State, so I would expect it to be standing-room only."

"But even if it wasn't Western Kentucky, I would hope it would be a sell-out, because people aren't going to get to see Isaiah and Ed at home very many more times."

Daniel is fifth in the country in rebounding, while Canaan — an AP preseason All-America selection — is averaging 21.4 points per game.

On Sunday, those two will play against their rivals to the east for the final time in their careers, and each could get the biggest test they've faced up to this point in the season.

Western Kentucky (8-2) is on a six-game winning streak, thanks in large part to the play of sophomore guard T.J. Price and sophomore forward George Fant.

Price leads the Hilltoppers in scoring while Fant leads them in rebounding, and Prohm said each are going to present an interesting matchup on Sunday.

"They are both tremendous players, guys that we would have loved to have had here at Murray State," Prohm said. "They each do some certain things really well, and they are both physical guys

Murray State looking to close out home stand with perfect 6-0 mark

If there's one thing Rob Cross knows about Sunday's opponent Alabama A&M, it's that he doesn't know very much about them at all.

Having played only four games this season, two coming against Kansas and Auburn, Cross says there isn't a ton of

information about the Lady Bulldogs available, creating a little bit of a different flavor for a game this late in the season.

"It's a little unusual, really," he said during Wednesday's weekly press conference.

"Usually, you can get film on teams and things like that, but with them, there just really isn't a whole lot out there to get.

"It makes preparing a little more difficult, but that just means we have to play our game and do what we do well on Sunday."

Murray State is looking to close out a six-game home stand with an unblemished mark, something Cross said he didn't necessarily see coming in early November.

After home losses against Western Kentucky and Indiana to open the season, Murray State dropped a road tilt to James Madison to fall to 0-3, but hasn't lost since.

A big reason for the Racers recent success has been the sudden impact of true freshmen Erika Sisk and Kelsey Dirks, who have now combined to

claim three-straight Ohio Valley Conference Freshman of the Week honors.

Another reason, Cross said, has simply been being at home.

"When you aren't having to travel, that helps," he says. "We've been fortunate to have a lot of quality teams come to the CFSB Center to play us, where as last year, we were out travel-

ing to play them, and that matters."

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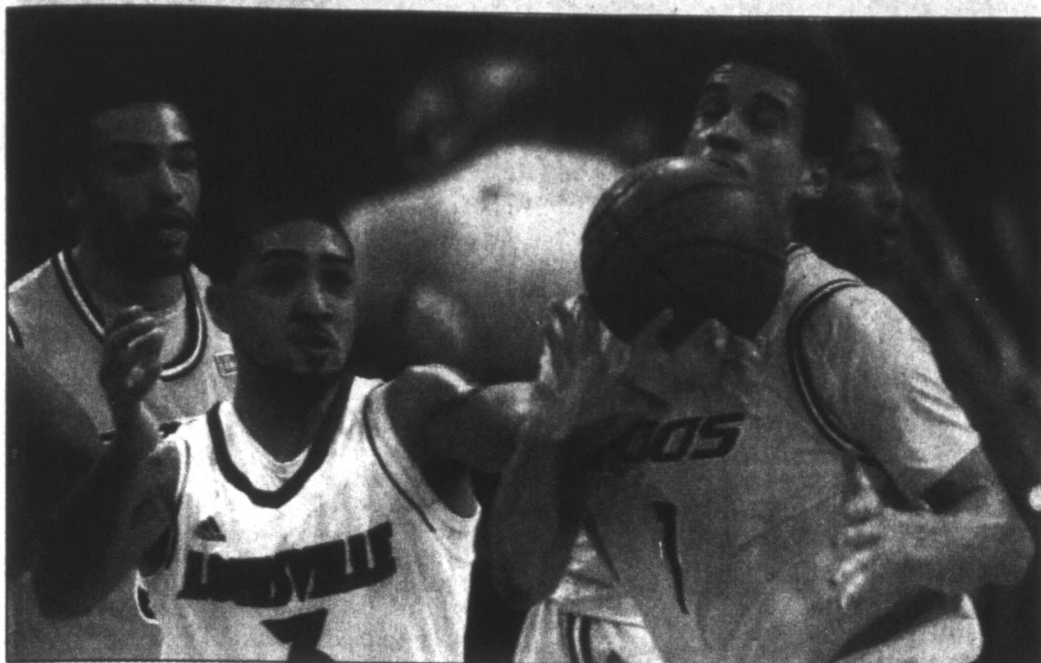

No. 6 ranked Louisville, Memphis set to renew rivalry

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Saturday will seem like old times when No. 6 Louisville travels to face Memphis.

The game could also offer a look into the future, albeit briefly.

The former Conference USA rivals will be meeting for the 87th time but this one has the feel of a Big East Conference game. That's because Memphis is scheduled to join Louisville in the league next season.

For schools very familiar with each other, that makes their rivalry more intriguing even if Louisville has already announced it will be leaving for the Atlantic Coast Conference.

For the Cardinals (8-1), this is another test in a season that has seen them play Northern Iowa, Missouri and Duke. That Memphis reminds Louisville coach Rick Pitino of his own squad makes it that much more important, especially since the Tigers (6-3) began the season ranked.

"It's probably not, in our minds, as the big as the Kentucky rivalry but to a lot of the fans it's

just as important as that game," Cardinals point guard Peyton Siva said. "We're just going in here with the mindset that it's a top-ranked opponent."

"Memphis is always good, every year. We grew up watching them with the Derrick Roses and everything."

Pitino's only regret is that Memphis and Louisville won't be conference rivals for long. He was a vocal advocate for adding Memphis to the Big East. While he's excited for Louisville's opportunity in the ACC he's disturbed by the tradition lost in the changing landscape of college athletics and what it has meant for schools like Memphis to be left in limbo.

"I pushed very hard for Memphis to get in the Big East," Pitino said. "I feel bad that they were looking so forward to it and now it's falling apart."

"It's sad but we are corporations today. That's what it's all about. We are corporations and we're being taken over by bigger corporations."

Pitino is more concerned though with the health of his

team. Louisville is already without center Gorgui Dieng, who broke his left wrist in last month's Battle 4 Atlantis in the Bahamas.

Other players are hurting as well, causing Pitino to be more cautious in practice.

"I'm trying to hold this thing together right now and it hasn't been easy because we are a little banged up," he said.

Siva said recent practices have been a bit shorter with less work on the team's signature press defense. The Cardinals have worked through injuries throughout his four years he said and Saturday's test against a physical opponent would be no different.

"I just think it's basically another Big East game," Siva said. "We've played a lot of tough opponents in the Big East and we've dealt with it before."

Siva, the Big East's preseason player of the year, has gotten a boost this year from backcourt mate Russ Smith. Smith's 24 points and seven steals in his game against the Tigers were both career bests.

that can really create problems for opposing defenses."

Price's availability is still in question after suffering a right ankle sprain a couple of weeks ago, but all indications point to the sophomore starting for the Hilltoppers on Sunday afternoon.

Meanwhile, Canaan hasn't been bothered by a shot to the head he took against Evansville last Saturday, and Prohm said he expects both teams to have it's top guard on the floor for tip-off.

Canaan and Daniel have fared well in their first three seasons against the Hilltoppers, with their only loss coming during their freshman season in 2010.

The Racers have owned the rivalry in recent years, claiming three of the last four victories, but Western Kentucky still holds an edge in the series, which started in 1932.

The Hilltoppers lead the all-time series 95-54, and are 57-13 at E.A. Diddle Arena in Bowling Green. The Racers are 33-29 all-time at home against the Hilltoppers, but Western Kentucky hasn't won a game at the CFSB Center since an 82-72 decision in 2004.

"It's as good of a rivalry as there is," Prohm said, "because both programs have so much history and tradition. I have a lot of respect for Western Kentucky and what they've accomplished and I know that they will continue to be one of the better programs in the nation."

"I think we are right there too, and so I think that just makes this series so much better, the fact that both teams are capable of winning in any given year, and the fact that both teams have won so much historically."

Western Kentucky has been on a tear since Ray Harper took over the team in the middle of last season, winning the Sun Belt Conference tournament and defeating Mississippi Valley State in the opening round of March's NCAA Tournament before falling to eventual National Champion Kentucky.

"When I first got here, everyone told me this was the biggest game on the schedule every year," Prohm said. "I hope that's true, because we should have a sold-out arena on Sunday if that's so."

Ed Daniel holds key to season

MURRAY STATE SENIOR IS FIFTH IN THE NATION IN REBOUNDS, AND KEEPING THE RACERS ON THE NATIONAL CONSCIENCE

Throughout this past summer I got one question more than any other.

"Can Ed Daniel be as good this year as he was against Marquette in the NCAA Tournament?"

I would always reply with a hearty, "absolutely," fully knowing there was no way I could possibly say that with 100 percent certainty.

I was wrong, though.

Ed Daniel hasn't been anything close to the monster he was against Marquette, grabbing a then career-high 14 rebounds against one of not only the Big East's, but college basketball's, most physical teams.

He's been better. As crazy as it sounds — and trust me, as I type these words it feels like moral perjury — Ed Daniel might be the best player on his team this year.

Yes, that's with AP All-American point guard Isaiah Canaan.

Everyone understands the type of player Canaan is. He's the type of guy, that once he's left Murray State and subsequently cashed checks with a lot more zeroes at the end of his salary than my own, Murray State fans will talk about as the greatest Murray State player ever.

The greatest ever. Let that soak in. Popeye Jones, Bennie

Purcell and James Singleton. Jeff Martin, Marcus Brown and Howie Crittenden. All great players. All in the same breath now as Isaiah Canaan.

There's no doubt Canaan is one of college basketball's true gems, and Racers fans are already saying he could be the greatest ever, even with 11 home games left to play in his senior season.

But right now, as the Racers enter Sunday's tilt with rival Western Kentucky, there's one reason Murray State is 7-1.

He stands 6-foot-7, nearly 7-foot hair included.

"He's been locked in like I've never seen," Murray State head coach Steve Prohm said about Daniel. "He's going out there and battling every day, and he's bringing that intensity and toughness that we need."

"Ed has been one of the best big guys in the country."

Daniel is averaging 17.1 points and 12.1 boards per game, ranking him fifth in the nation in rebounding. He's also recorded six-straight double-doubles, which ranks him fourth in the country.

If he wants number seven, however, he's going to have to work for it.

Western Kentucky has perhaps the most physical front court on the Racers' schedule yet, including George Fant, who is as strong down low as anyone.

Fant leads the Hilltoppers in rebounds and is third on the team in scoring, and Prohm said Fant vs. Daniel is just one reason to get to the CFSB Center early on Sunday.

"That will be a great matchup," he said. "Fant is a tremendous player, he's a Kentucky kid from right over

there in Bowling Green and he's the type of kid that we would love to have had.

"He and Ed are both very physical players, neither one of them gets pushed around too much, and so I expect there to be a lot of toughness on display on Sunday afternoon."

Now, before the emails and voicemails come rolling in, I need to be clear.

I'm not saying Ed Daniel is a better player than Isaiah Canaan. I'm not saying Daniel is a better pro-prospect or even

saying his No. 2 jersey deserves to hang in the CFSB Center rafters, a place Isaiah's No. 3 jersey certainly does.

I am saying Daniel has been more important, however.

I will never question Isaiah Canaan's importance to the Racers basketball program and to the Murray community, and neither should anyone else.

But don't overlook the big fella either.

Even though he's pushing 7-foot with his afro, he's playing even bigger than that.

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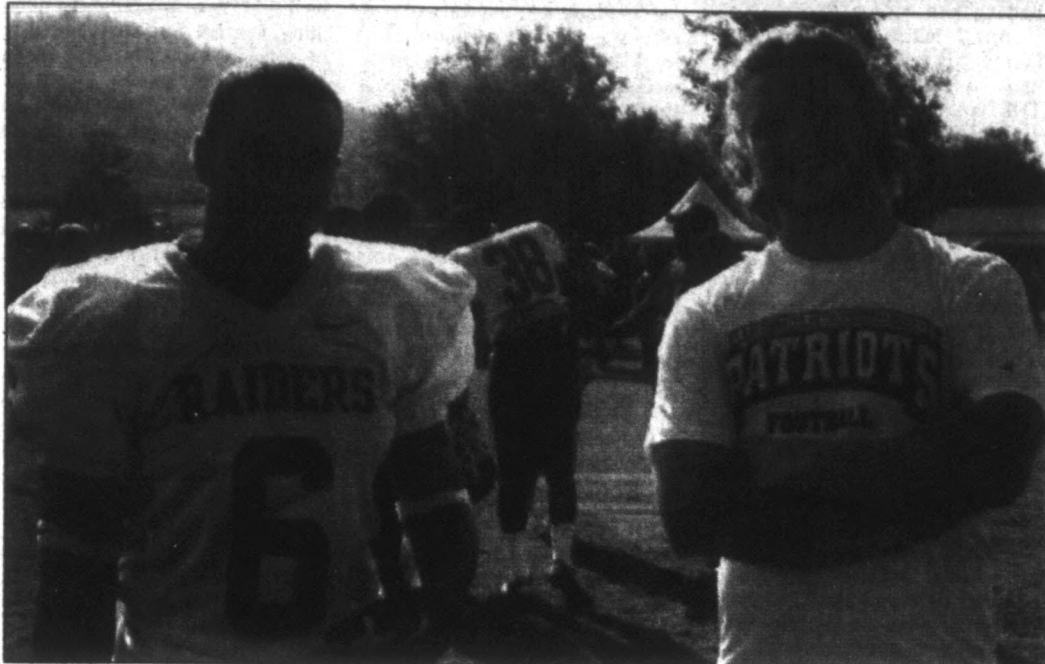

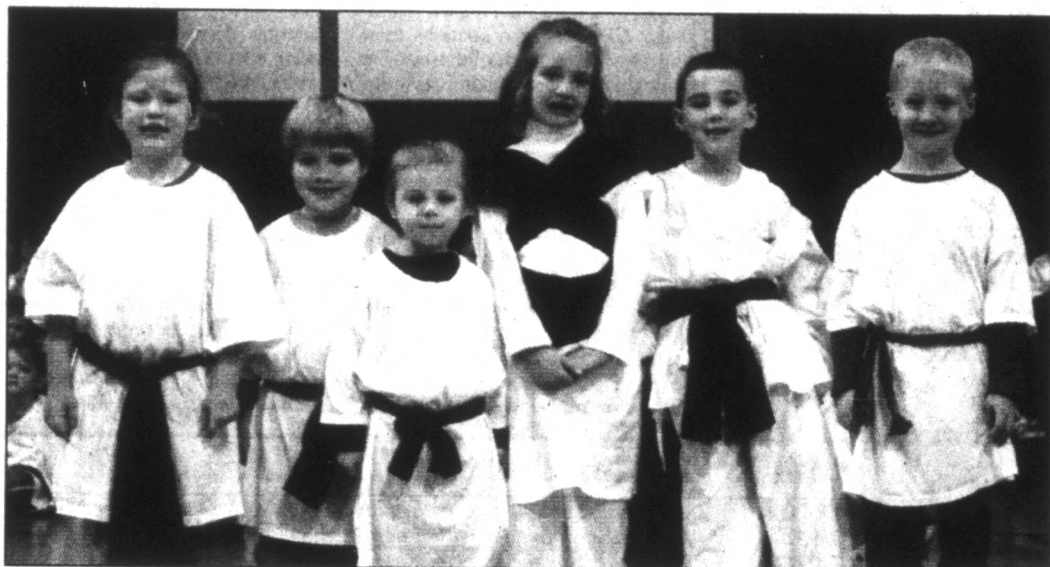

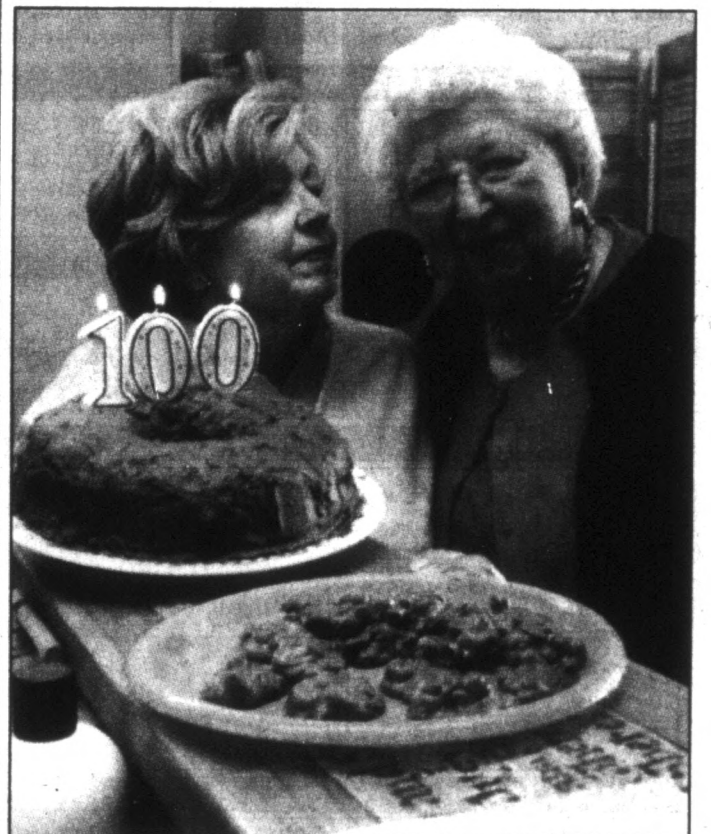

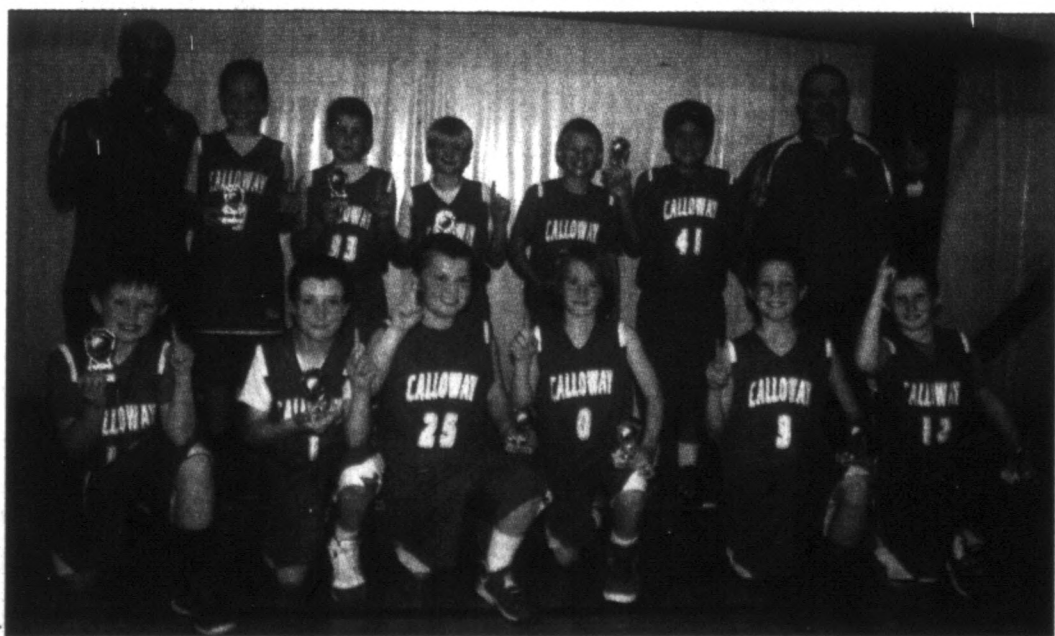

Avoid tobacco in any form

DEAR DOCTOR K: Is smokeless tobacco safer than cigarettes? What about other non-cigarette tobacco products?

DEAR READER: It's tempting to think so, but there is no safe way to use tobacco. Any level of tobacco, in any form, increases your risk of heart attack, stroke, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, pneumonia, lung cancer and other cancers.

Don't fool yourself into thinking that any tobacco products are safe to use.

Chewing tobacco can cause cancer and other health problems even when it is chewed rather than inhaled. It may be somewhat safer than regular tobacco, but it's still dangerous for your health. Chewing tobacco increases the risk of cancer of the cheek and gums by about 50 times.

Snuff. The same goes for snuff, finely ground tobacco that's either inhaled or tucked next to the gum.

Cigars. Since cigar smokers usually smoke less often than cigarette smokers, they may think their habit is a safe one. That's a mistake. Cigar tobacco contains more nitrate than cigarette tobacco. The smoke it produces contains more toxins of various types (particularly nitrosamines and carbon monoxide) that raise cancer and heart risks.

It's true that cigar smokers don't inhale as deeply as cigarette smokers, and probably have a lower risk of lung cancer. But they are at considerably higher risk for all tobacco-related diseases than non-smokers.

Pipes. When I was young, I was a pipe smoker for a few

months. I thought it added to my self-image as a contemplative intellectual. I probably would have been a pipe smoker for more than a few months if I could have figured out how to keep the darn thing lighted. Smoking one pipe of tobacco typically took me a couple of matchbooks.

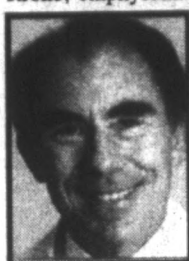
Because you didn't inhale as deeply as with cigarettes, people thought pipe smoking was safer than the ravages of cigarettes. In fact, it's like cigar smoking: maybe a little safer than cigarettes (except for mouth and throat cancer), but much riskier than not smoking.

Water pipe (hookah) smoking is widely perceived to be less harmful and less addictive than smoking cigarettes or other forms of tobacco. In fact, my colleagues here at Harvard who study tobacco use say that hookahs are becoming more popular among young tobacco users. But they are as addictive as cigarettes -- and perhaps even more harmful. When people smoke a water pipe, they often smoke for long periods of time. Each session can last half an hour or more. This long duration means more exposure to nicotine and other toxins.

Electronic cigarettes, or e-cigarettes, are battery-powered devices that were developed to gradually get people off cigarettes. They vaporize a solution of nicotine dissolved in water and propylene glycol, a fluid that helps nicotine dissolve. While they're often advertised as free of cancer-causing substances, the Food and Drug Administration is not convinced. Ads claim they help people stop smoking, but there is no evidence yet to back this up.

In short, there is no safe form of tobacco.

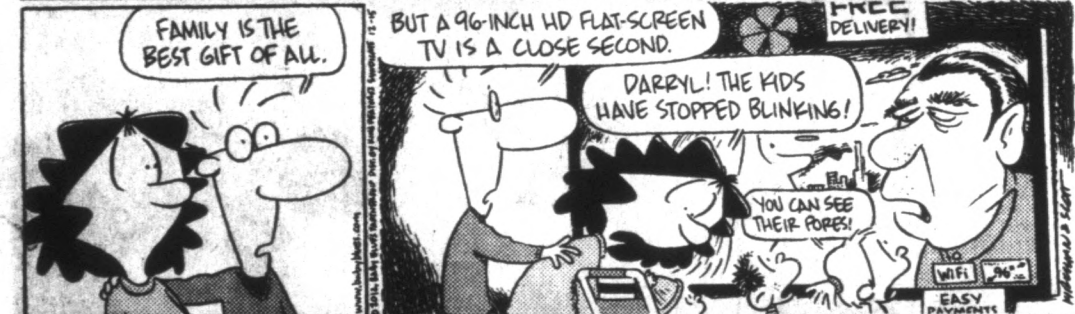

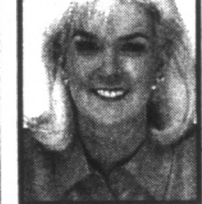

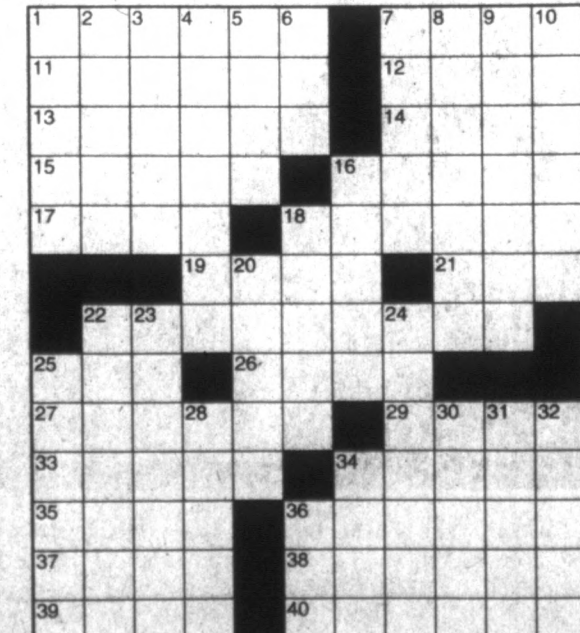

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Russia says Assad losing control, rebels could win

BEIRUT (AP) — Syria's most powerful ally, Russia, said Thursday that President Bashar Assad is losing control of his country and the rebels might win the civil war, the first time Moscow has acknowledged the regime is cracking under the force of a powerful rebellion. NATO also predicted Assad's fall, with Secretary-General Anders Fogh Rasmussen saying the regime's collapse is "only a matter of time."

"An opposition victory can't be excluded, unfortunately, but it's necessary to look at the facts: There is a trend for the government to progressively lose control over an increasing part of the territory," Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Mikhail Bogdanov said during hearings at a Kremlin advisory body.

Bogdanov also said Moscow is preparing to evacuate thousands of its citizens from Syria, where nearly two years of violent conflict have killed more than 40,000 people and turned Assad into a global pariah. His statement marks a clear attempt by the Kremlin to begin positioning itself for Assad's eventual defeat at a time when rebels are making significant gains.

Opposition fighters have seized large swaths of territory in northern Syria along the border with Turkey and appear to be expanding their control outside of Damascus, pushing the fight closer to Assad's seat of power in the capital. In a Damascus

suburb, a bomb blast Thursday near a school killed 16 people, at least half of them women and children, the state news agency SANA reported.

A day earlier, the U.S., Europe and their allies recognized the newly reorganized opposition leadership, giving it a stamp of credibility and possibly paving the way for greater international aid to those fighting Assad's forces.

At the same time, international condemnation of the regime has grown more intense as Western officials raise concerns that Assad might unleash his chemical weapons stockpiles against rebels in an act of desperation. On Wednesday, the U.S. and NATO said Assad's forces had fired Scud missiles at rebel areas.

Syria denied the Scud allegations, calling them nothing more than a conspiracy.

But the NATO secretary-general said the military alliance detected the launch of a number of the unguided short-range missiles inside Syria earlier this week.

"We can't confirm details of the missiles, but some of the information indicates they were Scud-type missiles," he said at NATO headquarters in Brussels.

"In general, I think the regime in Damascus is approaching collapse. I think now it's only a question of time."

Fyodor Lukyanov, the editor of the magazine Russia in

Global Affairs, said Bogdanov's statement may reflect new information about the situation on the ground.

"A public statement like that appears to indicate that the balance is shifting," he said.

Abu Bilal al-Homsi, an activist based in a rebel-held neighborhood of Homs in central Syria, said he is encouraged by Bogdanov's comments because Russia is in a position to know about the strength of Assad's forces.

"The Russians know his capabilities and his military force. Russia knows what warplanes and what weapons he has," Abu Bilal said via Skype. "The Free Syrian Army is on the verge of strangling Damascus and this indicates that the regime is reaching an end," he added, referring to the main rebel fighting force.

Despite Russia's acknowledgement that Assad could lose, Bogdanov gave no immediate signal that Russia would change its pro-Syria stance at the U.N. Security Council, where Moscow has shielded Damascus from world sanctions.

Bogdanov also reaffirmed Russia's call for a compromise, saying it would take the opposition a long time to defeat the regime and Syria would suffer heavy casualties.

"The fighting will become even more intense, and you will lose tens of thousands and, perhaps, hundreds of thousands of

people," he said. "If such a price for the ouster of the president seems acceptable to you, what can we do? We, of course, consider it absolutely unacceptable."

Russia's ties to Syria date back to Assad's father, Hafez, who ruled Syria with an iron fist from 1971 until his death in June 2000. In the last four decades, Russia has sold Syria billions of dollars' worth of weapons. A change in power in Damascus could not only cost Russia lucrative trade deals, but also reduce Russian political influence in Arab world.

The Russians also strongly oppose a world order dominated by the United States and they are keen to avoid a repeat of last year's NATO air campaign that led to the ouster of Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi, a former Moscow ally.

Bogdanov's remarks will likely be seen in Damascus as a betrayal of these longstanding ties. There was no immediate reaction from the Syrian regime on the comments.

Bogdanov said the Foreign Ministry is preparing evacuation plans for thousands of Russian citizens, most of whom are Russian women married to Syrian men and their children.

"We are dealing with issues related to the preparation for evacuation," Bogdanov said. "We have mobilization plans. We are finding out where our citizens are."

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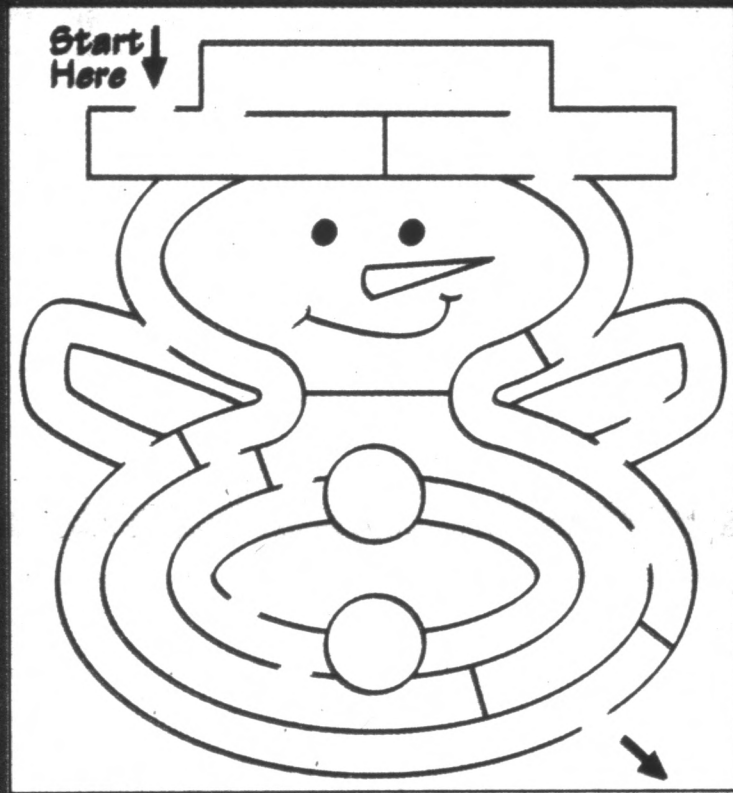
