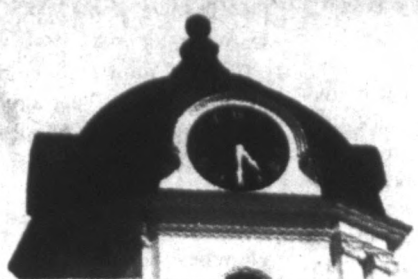

Imes comments on changes in Frankfort

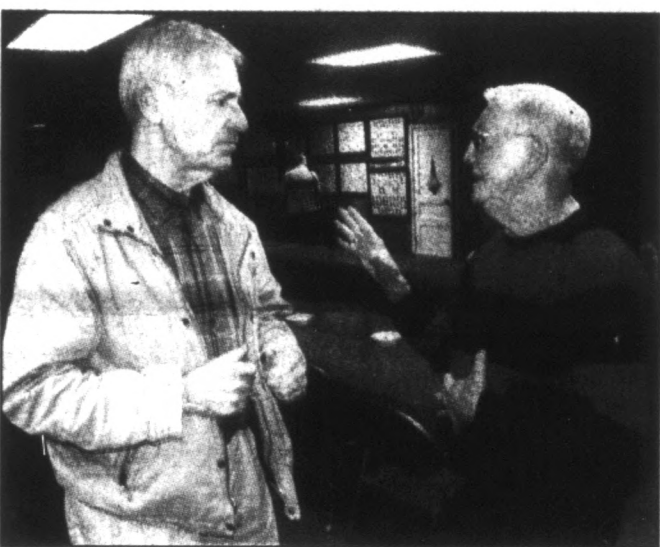
Kenny Imes says he is glad he attended an orientation session earlier this month for newly-elected members of the Kentucky State Legislature in Frankfort.

It prepared him for how different things are since he last served as Fifth District state representative in the 1970s.

"It was kind of like walking into a time warp," the Murray Republican said Friday, less than two weeks from his scheduled swearing in ceremony to the office he held for four terms between 1972 and 1979. "Before, you had only five secretaries for the whole House of Representatives to help you if you needed to write a letter or make a phone call. If you wanted to meet with a lobbyist or someone concerned with an issue, you usually just met in the hall or down in the basement of the capitol."

"Now, you have one secretary for every four representatives (was for every 20) and you have the Legislative Research Commission that consists of a staff of 300 (was 30) who help you do all the drafting for bills and researching things that let you obtain information you need. Plus, we now have our own office space where you can actually have productive meetings."

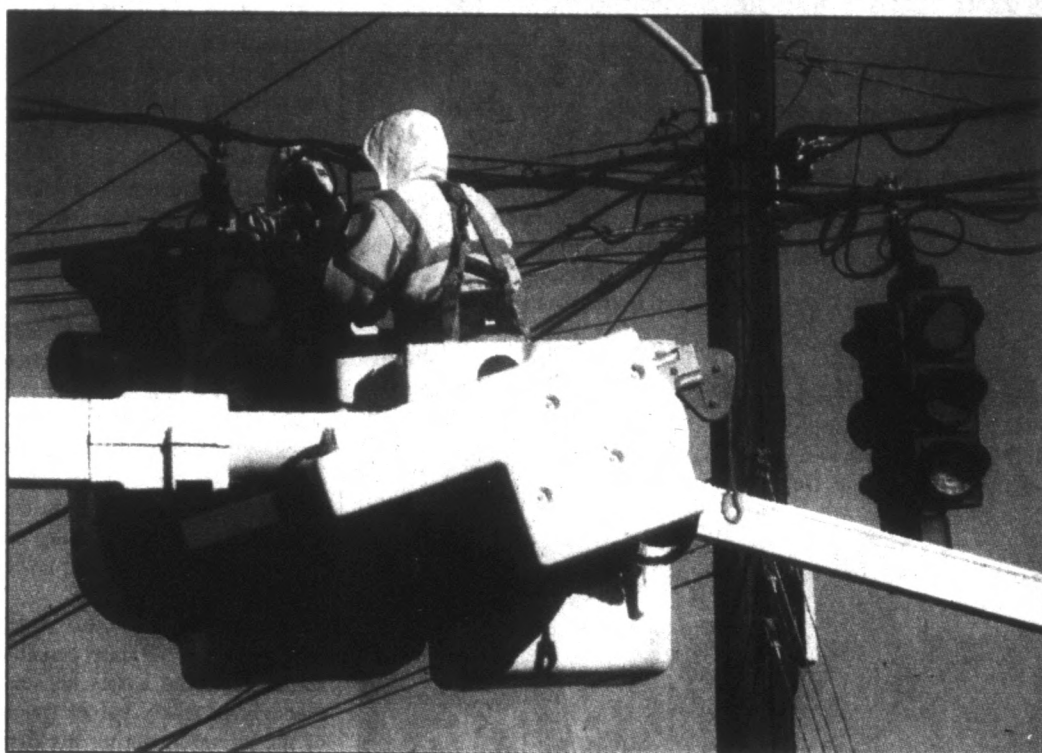

The Santa Project has once again ensured many children will have gifts under the tree this year. Program director Michelle Hansen said it could not have happened without the many hours volunteers put in and the donations members of the community made.

The Santa Project is coordinated by the four Calloway School Family Resource Youth Service Centers and has been going on for more than 15 years. After endless hours of shopping and organizing in a storage room of the north branch of BB&T bank, Hansen reported the program served 409 families and 964 kids, and said 267 kids were covered by 130 sponsors. It was reported that last year the project served 862 children and 392 families.

well. In addition, a stop sign was reported as being blown down on Barnett Street in Hazel and power lines were reported down on Cherry Corner Road and Mills Trail.

Winds were sustained most of the day between 20 and 25 mph throughout the area, but some

gusts were reported approaching 50 mph, according to the National Weather Service.

Due to high winds damaging a number of traffic signals across the region on Thursday, Kentucky Transportation Cabinet technicians were busy Friday starting to make repairs. Work at the 5 Points Intersection in Murray — northwest portion of the Murray State University

campus where North 16th Street, Coldwater Road, Chestnut Street and College Farm Road converge — required that intersection to be closed during the morning as repair of the signal required two aerial trucks to be working in the intersection.

Keith Todd, public information officer for KTC districts One and Two, said that work was completed after about two hours and the intersection was reopened to traffic.

"With computers and the Internet, things have just changed incredibly."

That will also go for when Imes is in the House chambers. He said he remembers not being able to see the speaker of the house from his desk because he was having to deal with a pile of five or six books that impeded his vision, along with his ability to ask to be recognized to speak.

"Now they have a computer monitor that I can tell is going to be a lot easier to work with," Imes said, admitting that the weight of what he is about to re-enter in Frankfort is starting to get heavier as his first official day on duty — Jan. 20, 2013 — draws closer.

"When you walk in there for the first time and see the House chambers, the awesome responsibility of this job starts to hit you, and it did me. You know, I'm not 'State Rep. Kenny Imes' until Jan. 1, but when I go to events in the community now, I definitely try to walk a little more humbly and with a sense of gratitude, more so than when I was campaigning. The major issues are still there that were discussed during the election and there are some tough issues out there, and you just want the people you're representing to realize that you are going to do your best for them."

Imes listed the state tax code, re-districting and state pension reform as three issues he sees that will probably garner much of the attention during his first session. Health care will also have heavy discussion.

helped as well.

"Our school district was over the top in helping us," she said. "We had district employees helping with donations, shopping and even coming over to help us after school to prepare the items. It truly takes many people to make such a big project happen."

Tiger Christmas has been taking donations since early November and recently wrapped up at the end of this week. This year, the program served 184 families and 400 students. This was a substantial increase of last year of about 70 students and 25 families according to Stone. In early November Stone reported that she expected Tiger Christmas to serve more than 350 students.

The goal of the program is to not only provide a few Christmas gifts but also make sure kids will be prepared to return to school in January. This could mean receiving educational games, age-appropriate literature or personal hygiene products. Stone said the family resource center wants students to return ready to learn without having to worry about whether

they'll have a backpack or a warm winter coat.

Families must meet eligibility qualifications to participate in the program. Once the application is received and verified, the families are sponsored by the many individuals, businesses, churches and other organizations that make Tiger Christmas possible each year. Due to confidentiality, names are not shared with sponsors, but they do receive a list with the students' clothing sizes and interests and any special wishes they might have. Not only does the program provide the extra care the holidays often require, but it makes sure those in need feel personally attended to.

"It's really exciting for us to see what the children will receive and how the sponsors take such great care in selecting gifts," Stone said. "But the payoff is when you have parents tell you that without the help we have provided, their children would not receive any Christmas gifts. Making a difference for the kids is why we do what we do. It's all about the kids."

"We just want everyone to know how thankful we are because there were a few moments of concern where we weren't sure if we would be able to cover everyone," Hansen said. "But the community stepped up again and really made it their job to take care of every single person they could."

The Santa Project interviews every family that signs up so specific needs can be met. Hansen said the Santa Project is more than just putting a few toys under the tree—it is about supporting and empowering parents and guardians so they can make great family memories, decrease family stress levels and give kids some items to assist them academically. The hope is that students can return to school in January and be able to concentrate on their studies without having to worry about having the materials to do so.

"We really appreciate the community's support of the Santa Project through the years," Hansen said. "It is always exciting to see the parents' faces on pick up day, or talk to the kids when they return to school in January and hear how the Santa Project items helped them make great memories and get ready to come back to school."

Not only has the program relied on community donations, but the volunteer hours put in to

the Santa Project truly made its success possible this year.

"Our volunteers, whether they worked two hours or 60 hours in the month of December, made a huge difference," Hansen said. "There's no way we could have done any of this without them."

Volunteers were of all ages and from all walks of life this year, as Calloway County Middle School held a day where each student donated \$2 to the Santa Project. Hansen said that simple act raised approximately \$1400 to go toward purchasing for the project. She went on to say businesses in the area came together to collect toys to be made available to kids so they could have a jolly Christmas. Though official numbers have not yet been calculated, the project has been deemed as wildly successful according to Hansen. Monetary donations are still being accepted through the Calloway FRYSC in order to get a start on next year's Santa Project.

"Folks just stepped up and even had monetary drives to raise money," she said. "It really has been amazing. Every group has really embraced the Christmas Spirit this year and we thank everyone."

tions are not mandatory, they are welcome.

"We estimate about 10,000 folks coming through this year," Brockman said. "And we've had very positive feedback and we always appreciate it. We've already sent several truckloads of canned food to Need Line."

Visitors are asked to supply a donation of either non-perishable food or personal items for the Murray Need Line. Cash donations go to the parks department. Individuals who come through can also expect to see a few new light displays this year, as Brockman said they aim to make it a little different for the annual event.

"We have a handful of new displays, and the guys have arranged them a little differently," Brockman said. "We closed off the wrap-around road in the back by the playground and it all just looks very nice and cheery. The staff has done an amazing job."

The light display is made possible by several organizations that sponsor the event each year. "We wouldn't be able to do this without the sponsors," Brockman said. "I would be remiss if I didn't give them credit. We have 80 or so sponsors and it's always a great way for them to support the community and get everyone in the Christmas spirit. They really keep this event moving forward every year and we are lucky for that."

Obama cites experience in Kerry nod

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama on Friday nominated Sen. John Kerry as his next secretary of state, elevating the longtime lawmaker and foreign policy expert to the top diplomatic job he had coveted.

"He is not going to need a lot of on-the-job training," Obama said, standing alongside Kerry at the White House. "Few individuals know as many presidents and prime ministers or grasp our policies as firmly as John Kerry."

If confirmed by the Senate, Kerry would replace Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, who plans to leave Obama's Cabinet early next year.

The 69-year-old Democrat is expected to be easily confirmed by his Senate colleagues. He would be the first of what are expected to be several new faces on Obama's national security team, including a new defense secretary and director of the Central Intelligence Agency.

The son of a diplomat, Kerry has served as chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and is a decorated Vietnam veteran who was critical of the war effort when he returned home to the United States. He has represented Massachusetts in the Senate since 1985.

"John's entire life has prepared him for this role" said Obama, who praised Kerry for his belief that the country must harness "all elements of Americans power."

Murray Police Department plans holiday crackdown to stop impaired driving

Holiday party-goers, beware. To help save lives this holiday season, the Murray Police Department is launching a special "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" crackdown to stop impaired drivers and to save lives on our roadways.

MPD officers will be aggressively looking for impaired drivers and will arrest anyone caught driving impaired. Enforcement efforts will include sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrols. The special enforcement crackdown will run from Dec. 12, 2012, through Jan. 1, 2013. The checkpoint sites are as follows:

- South 12th Street between Glendale Road and Murray City Limits.
- Main Street between Eighth and Ninth streets
- KY 121 at the intersection of Bailey Road
- Glendale Road between Ninth and 12th streets
- Main Street between Industrial Road and the Murray city limits.
- Chestnut at the intersection with Eighth Street
- U.S. 641 at Diuguid Drive
- Doran at Holiday Drive
- North 16th Street at the intersection with Olive Street

During 2010, more than 10,000 people were killed nationwide in motor vehicle traffic crashes involving an impaired driver.

The holiday season is a particularly dangerous time. During December 2010, 30 percent of all fatalities in traffic crashes involved alcohol-impaired drivers. Data also shows that among those alcohol-impaired fatalities, 71 percent occurred when drivers had nearly twice the legal limit blood alcohol concentration of .15 grams per deciliter or higher.

Last year in Kentucky, six people were killed over the Christmas and New Year's holiday. Two of those deaths involved alcohol.

It is illegal in all 50 States, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico to drive with a BAC of .08 or higher. Violators face jail time, loss of driver license, and steep financial consequences such as higher insurance rates, attorney fees, court costs, lost time at work, and the potential loss of job.

There are three simple steps people can take to stay safe and out of trouble:

1. Plan ahead. If you will be drinking, do not plan on driving. Designate a sober driver or find another safe way home.
2. If you are impaired, find another way home. Use a taxi, call a sober friend or family member.
3. Be responsible. If someone you know is drinking, do not let them get behind the wheel. If you see an impaired driver on the road, contact law enforcement.

"We want everyone to enjoy their holidays, but we also want our roadways to be safe," said MPD spokesman David Howe. "We will be out in force to help save lives, and we are not going to tolerate impaired driving. So remember, 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over.' We will be watching."

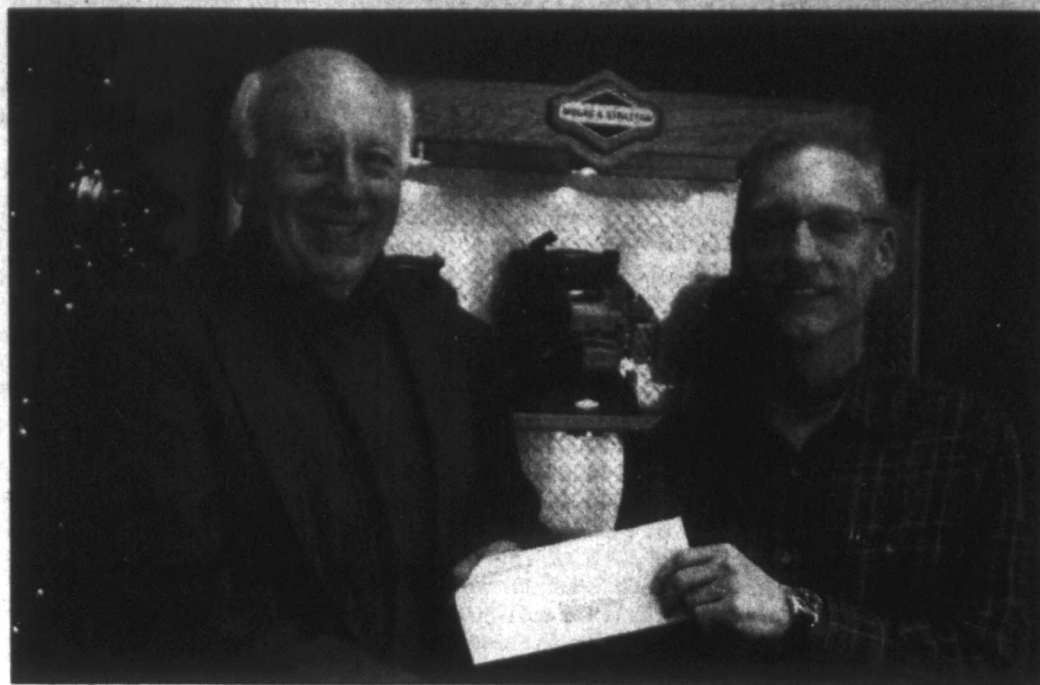

State Police offer winter driving tips

FRANKFORT, Ky. - With the onset of winter and the possibility that motorists may have to drive in inclement weather, the Kentucky State Police (KSP) are offering safe driving tips.

The weather in Kentucky is unpredictable and this time of year you never know when to expect black ice, snow, icy roads or a mixture of road conditions. KSP is asking motorists to prepare in advance for the winter driving months ahead. "Winter provides new challenges and responsibilities to the public and the Kentucky State Police," says KSP Commissioner Rodney Brewer.

"We ask that drivers be prepared to meet the challenges of the upcoming winter season in Kentucky. Plan ahead, make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained, drive defensively and be sure the vehicle is properly maintained to handle the effects of cold temperatures."

KSP reported that slippery roads were the contributing factor in 14,913 crashes and 63 fatalities in 2011.

Here are a few simple steps to help keep you on the road and less stressed.

- Avoid travel unless necessary when winter weather is in your area.
- Decrease speed.
- wear your seatbelt.
- Driving Considerations
- Leave early - allow more travel time; expect delays.
- Increase distance between vehicles - it takes significantly longer to stop on snow covered or icy roadways.

- Clear all windows on your vehicle prior to travel - having unobstructed vision is vital to avoid running off of the road or having a collision.
- Illuminate your vehicles headlights.
- Use caution on bridges and overpasses as they susceptible to freezing before roadways.
- Avoid using cruise control - cruise can cause the vehicle's wheels to continue turning on a slippery surface when speed needs to be decreased.

Be Prepared

- Ensure your vehicle has a full tank of gas in the event you are stranded for an extended period of time.
- Charge your cellular phone prior to departure.
- Take a blanket.
- Notify a family member or a friend of your travel plans prior to departure - if you travel is interrupted, someone will know.

Collision Information

- Be patient - weather also limits our capabilities and increases our response time; also, keep in mind that we will be experiencing a high volume of requests for service.
- Attempt to move your vehicle out of the roadway if you are involved in a minor, non-injury traffic collision; especially if you are in a dangerous area such as a curve or a blind hill.
- If your vehicle is stranded or wrecked but not in the roadway, attempts to recover your vehicle will have to wait until conditions improve for safety considerations.

Murrayan faces burglary charges

The Murray Police Department says it has charged a Murray man with four burglaries after arresting him Thursday during a burglary in progress.

Following the arrest of Stalls, MPD investigators say they solved three additional burglaries. Howe said Stalls' home was searched after police determined that the shoes Stalls was wearing during the burglary at Baldy's Grill were similar to shoe prints documented at a burglary that occurred Monday at Renfro's Hih Burger Restaurant at 413 South Fourth St. Howe said the search of Stalls' home resulted in the recovery of items stolen from La Cocina restaurant and Upper Cuts hair salon in Murray, as well as items identified as being stolen from locations in Calloway County.

Stalls was later charged with an additional two counts of Burglary 3rd Degree and one count of Burglary 1st Degree. He is still lodged in the Calloway County Jail.

Kentucky post office being auctioned

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. (AP) — A small post office in south-central Kentucky is being put up for auction.

The Daily News reports the building where Alvaton's post office is located will be auctioned on Saturday, but that won't mean the end of postal services at the location.

Postal Service spokesman David Walton says the agency has a lease at the building that

runs through 2017. He says some small post offices are being considered for closure, but the Alvaton location is not one of them.

Listing agent David Chelf says he's had several people express interest in the property as an investment opportunity, and having rental income guaranteed from the Postal Service helps out.

FDA: Fast-growing fish would not harm nature

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal health regulators say a genetically modified salmon that grows twice as fast as normal is unlikely to harm the environment, clearing the way for the first approval of a scientifically engineered animal for human consumption.


The Food and Drug Administration on Friday released its environmental assessment of the AquaAdvantage salmon, a faster-growing fish which has

been subject to a contentious, yearslong debate at the agency. The document concludes that the fish "will not have any significant impacts on the quality of the human environment of the United States." Regulators also said that the fish is unlikely to harm populations of natural salmon, a key concern for environmental activists.

The FDA will take comments from the public on its report for 60 days before making it final.

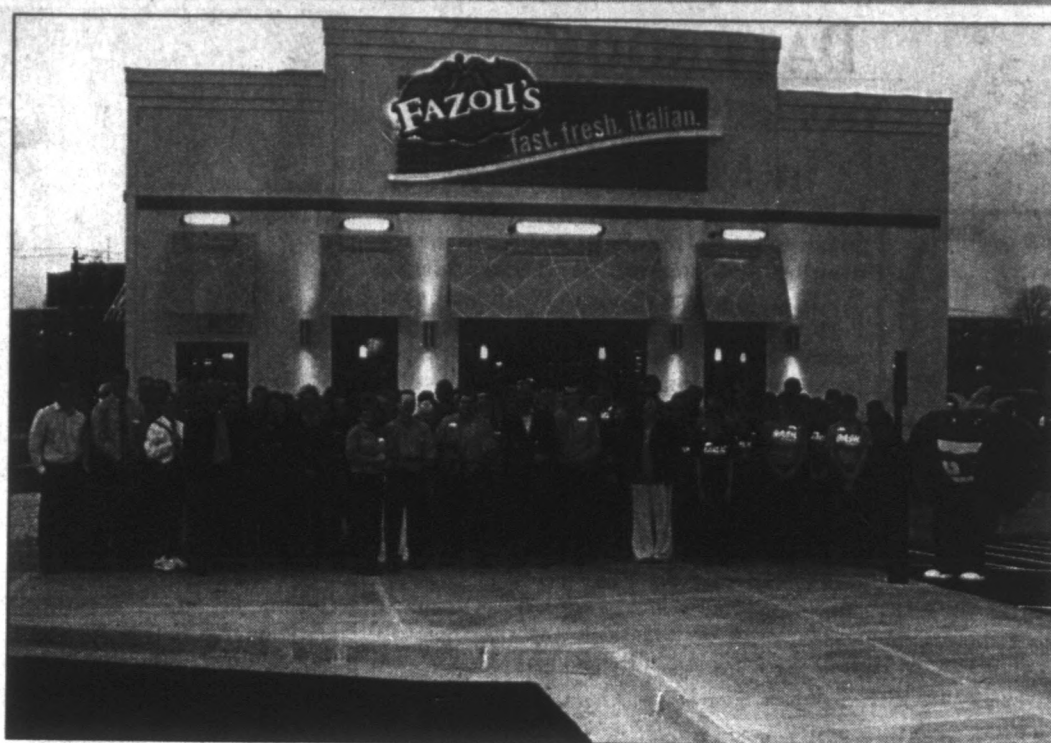

It's all-hands-on-deck for final retail push

FREEPORT, Maine (AP)—With the final retail push under way, L.L. Bean CEO Chris McCormick is playing Santa's helper against a backdrop of conveyor belts and beeping front-end loaders as he boxes up slippers and shirts. But there's little time to reflect on the holiday cheer those gifts will bring because he's busy concentrating to make sure no shipments go astray.

At L.L. Bean, top executives are abandoning their desks to work in the shipping department and to answer customers' phone calls as part of an annual all-hands-on-deck approach to ensure last-minute purchases arrive at their destinations before Christmas.

This season, the deadline for orders with guaranteed Christmas delivery is the latest ever, with L.L. Bean offering free shipping as late as noon Friday.

"Consumers are going to buy when they want to buy. There's

no changing that, so we have to be ready," McCormick, his sleeves rolled up, said during a break inside the busy 1-million-square-foot distribution center where nearly 200,000 orders are shipped daily in late December.

There's never been a better time to be a procrastinator because retailers continue to offer later guaranteed delivery, and in some cases retailers are offering same-day delivery in select cities, said Al Sambar, a logistics and retail strategist at the consulting firm Kurt Salmon.

Thanks to improved shipping logistics, many online and catalog retailers established Christmas delivery deadlines on Thursday and Friday, with some like Amazon extending the deadline for one-day shipping until Saturday.

And shoppers can expect the trend to continue. Retailers are increasingly focusing on speed. Following Amazon's lead, other retailers are experimenting with regional warehouses to get the product closer to potential customers, said Raj Kumar, a retail partner at A.T. Kearney, a global management consulting firm.

Macy's, Toys R Us and Wal-Mart are testing pilot programs in which stores themselves are utilized as shipping hubs as retailers push for next-day and same-day delivery, he said.

Unlike Amazon, L.L. Bean's worldwide shipping hub is centralized, about a mile from the corporate headquarters, and features seemingly endless aisles of flannel shirts, L.L. Bean boots, camping supplies, and other items, along with a labyrinth of conveyors and chutes that transport them, and a fleet of trucks.

The company hired 4,700 seasonal workers to help with the holiday rush, doubling the workforce, and 500 administrative employees are expected to get into the act during crunch times.

Earlier this week, McCormick was boxing goods in the shipping department with the company's financial controller, Kierston Van Soest. Nearby were the company's chief finan-

cial officer and other executives. In Bean parlance, they're dubbed "day hikers," since they're on a temporary daily assignment.

Pulling items from a shopping cart, McCormick and Van Soest scanned the products with a bar code reader, printed shipping labels and order forms, and then boxed up the items, tossing in catalogs for good measure. On this day, popular items included headlamps, Wicked Good slippers and shirts.

In the past, McCormick worked on a product-sorting conveyor line, in the retail store stockroom, and in a recycling area, breaking down empty cardboard boxes. The worst job of all, he said, was one stint working in the part of the call center that deals with angry and frustrated customers, attempting to set things right.

"It's hard because you've disappointed people and you don't want to disappoint anybody, especially at this time of the year," McCormick said. "I wouldn't want their job."

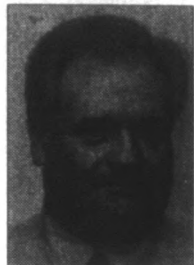

Timely gift-giving advice for sportsmen

Fellows, your hunting opportunities for the next twelve months could very well depend upon how well you

score next week in the "Christmas Gift" category as judged by your wife or significant other. Yes, this is scary stuff. Take any good outdoor-type fellow worth his salt who will kick alligators aside to wade across a swamp, face a grizzly bear with a stick-and-string, make a half-inch hole in the hide of a charging elephant with a rifle, sit in a tree all day on a pot-holder sized seat some fifty feet above the ground, or stand in waist deep ice water during a blizzard just to shoot a duck, and put him anywhere

near where perfume or lingerie is sold, and he'll be overtaken by fear almost to the point of incontinence.

That's why this is such an important subject for hunters, fishermen, golfers, or any male of the species who enjoys an outdoor pursuit every now and then in lieu of wine-and-cheese type events or yoga classes.

I suppose there are ladies out there who would swoon over a new pair of hunting boots or perhaps a silky negligee in Realtree All-Purpose Camo, but I'm not married to one of those nor any of my friends that I can think of. Sometimes a fellow can get away with an "outdoor-themed" gift to a girlfriend or fiancé, but that's only part of her plan to gain leverage after the nuptials when "look at the cute doe-pee dispenser my sweetie bought me for Christmas" turns into "try that now and you'll never hunt, golf, fish, or go to the bathroom standing up again!"

So after years of intense

study and trying to remember to put the seat down, I decided to consult with a higher authority. Unfortunately, John Dale stopped taking my calls and posted a 24 hour guard beside his office door. But remembering that Jesus and his buddies did talk quite a bit about fishing, I turned to the Good Book and found the answer to my gift-giving dilemma in the story of the Three Wise Men who came bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

Gold is the easy one. Nothing beats gold for gift-giving. Gold only comes in two colors: Yellow and white. White gold looks too much like silver and won't equate to as many hunting days as yellow gold. Gold is sold by the ounce, not the foot, and the acceptable standard is 14 ct. A woman doesn't even have to hold gold to determine whether it is solid or just a thin plated piece - they can sense such things at a distance equal to the square root of the width of the average mall.

By the way, we're not talking about fancy Citronella buckets here, tiki torches, or that foul incense you burned back in your college days while listening to Iron Butterfly. Be warned, however, that the aroma given off by some of these scented things will make your eyes cross and may alternately cause or cure warts. The appeal of these devices is that men don't typically like them. Like judging wine, if you can readily identify the fruit by the aroma, it's probably cheap.

One suggestion to keep in mind when buying a simple scented candle is that you will need to know the exact color of your carpet, the shade of the draperies in the formal living

room, and any subtle threads that run through upholstered furniture. If you buy the wrong shade of candle, expect to redecorate your entire house to match the newly introduced color.

So there you have it, gentlemen of the outdoors. Don't be a Scrooge when it comes to Christmas or you'll spend the coming year watching "Love Boat" reruns while your more enlightened buddies are living it up in the duck blind. Just remember that you paid three times as much for your waterproof, scent-free hunting outfit than you did for your best J.C. Penney suit, and that while your best Sunday shoes came from the Discount Irregular Shoe Barn, your fancy hunting boots cost more than the GNP of some third-world countries.

Gold, frankincense, and myrrh (jewelry, perfume, scented candles): Write these Holy words upon your heart (and in your checkbook) and may your days afield be plentiful and full.

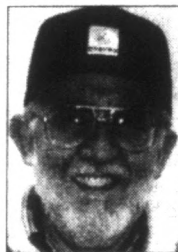

Whooping cranes spotted in Kentucky: Species off-limits to hunt

FRANKFORT, Ky. - A federally protected whooping crane has been sighted at Sloughs Wildlife Management Area near Henderson. The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has also received a report of two whooping cranes along the Pond River in Hopkins County.

The whooping crane is a federally endangered bird that may not be hunted. All three cranes currently in Kentucky are birds that were released in an effort to establish a second flock in the eastern United States. The whooping crane at Sloughs arrived in late November and

has been staying in a refuge section of the WMA that is closed to hunting and closed to the public.

Whooping cranes are solid white with black wingtips. They have a red crown. Adults may have a wingspan of 7 1/2 feet and stand up to 5 feet tall on stilted legs.

Hunters should not confuse these cranes with snow geese, another white-bodied bird with black wingtips. Snow geese do not have stilted legs. Currently there are approximately 10,000 snow geese located in the Sloughs area.

Whooping cranes are similar

in silhouette to a sandhill crane. However, sandhill cranes have gray bodies and are smaller than whooping cranes. There are no reports currently of sandhill cranes in the Sloughs area.

The refuge section of Sloughs does have approximately 80 tundra swans which fly around the area. Tundra swans are large, solid white birds with wingspans approaching 7 feet. They do not have stilted legs. Tundra swans may not be hunted in Kentucky.

Hunters should always be sure of their target before firing a gun, regardless of the species being hunted.

Sweet streak

MURRAY STATE PUTS 16-GAME ROAD WINNING MARK ON THE LINE AGAINST FLYERS

Murray State didn't claim the nation's longest road winning streak without a couple of quick turnarounds, and they'll need to complete another to keep the streak intact.

After a 61-54 victory over Arkansas State in Jonesboro Wednesday night, the Racers returned to Murray for a handful of hours Thursday, before leaving to take on Dayton Thursday night.

The Racers will tip against the Flyers at 11 a.m. CST, and Murray State head coach Steve Prohm said his team will need plenty of resolve for what's been a hectic week.

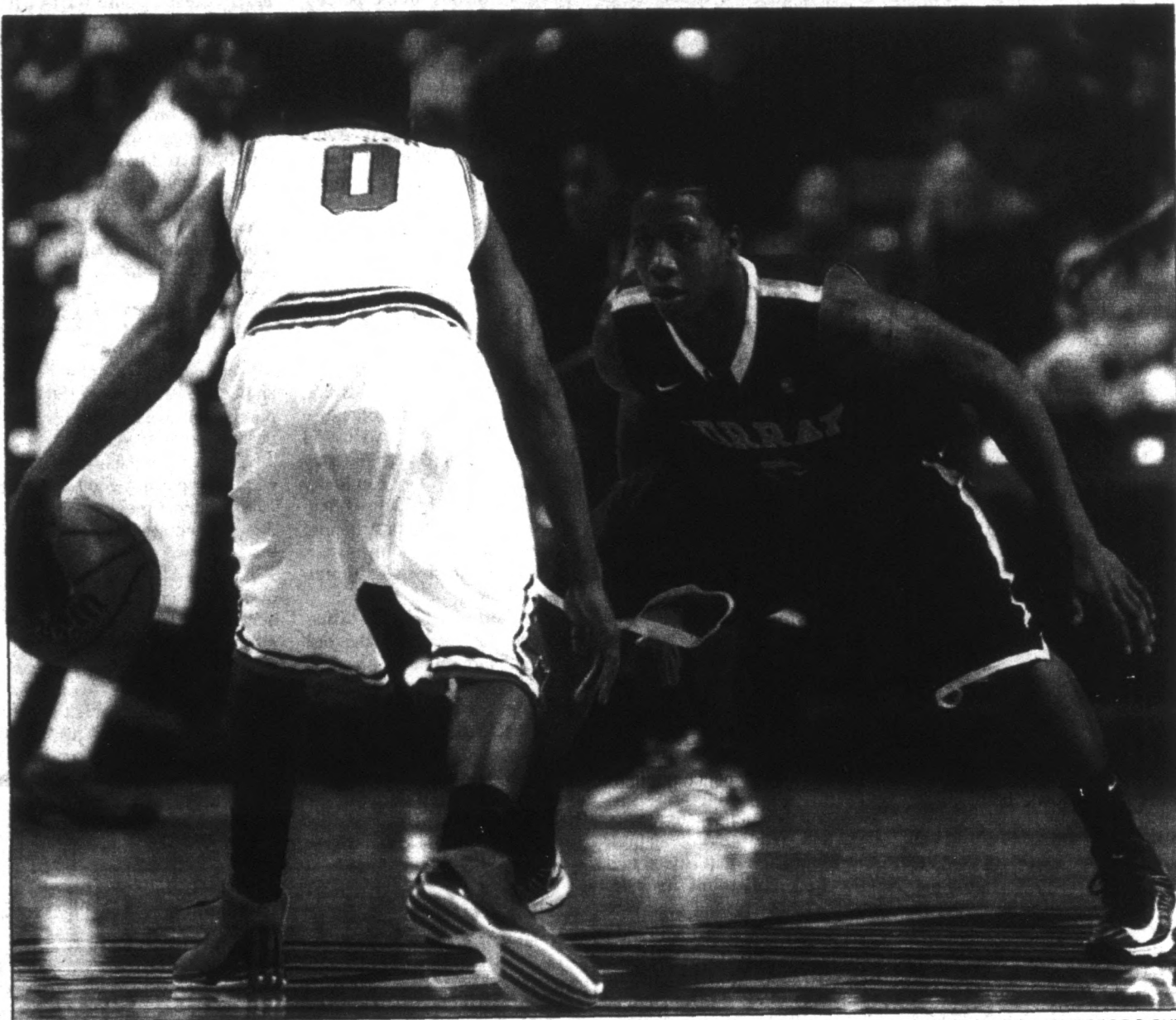
"We've got a quick turnaround," he said. "I didn't want to leave on Friday and get up there late, and school's out. It's an early tip, it's at noon on (Dayton) time, and so I just thought it was best to go ahead and leave Thursday night."

Murray State (9-1) had a brief workout for some of the younger players Thursday afternoon, and went through a full practice Friday in Ohio.

Now, Murray State has an early tip against a tough Atlantic-10 team on its home floor, and Prohm says his guys know how talented the Flyers are.

"(Dayton) is good, and our guys know that," he said. "It's a phenomenal place to play, it's a phenomenal atmosphere and the people up there love it. It will be 13-14,000 people, sold out and so we have to be ready."

Dayton (8-3) has a pair of all-league guards in Kevin Dillard and Vee Sanford, but the Racers

may only have to prepare for one of the two Saturday.

Dillard, a transfer from Southern Illinois, suffered an injury with 4:19 remaining in Dayton's 74-73 loss to Illinois State on Wednesday night, when an attempted rebound triggered back spasms in the point guards back.

Dillard was unable to bring the ball up the floor, and Dayton head coach Archie Miller said he's uncertain how long Dillard is out.

"He's not feeling real well,"

Miller told the Dayton Daily News. "I think it will be a long-shot for him to play on Saturday. He's dealing with a heavy dose of back spasms, and he has a hard time right now moving around."

"Anything from the back pretty much paralyzes you when it locks up. Your muscles go into spasm, and at that point, you can't really move. It's very, very painful. It's going to take some time to address the situation."

With the potential loss of Dillard, freshman guard Khari Price is expected to pick up some

of the slack, including a heavier responsibility on defense in guarding the Racers' senior All-American guard Isaiah Canaan.

While Dillard might not go for Miller's Flyers, the cupboard is far from bare in Dayton.

Sanford, a Lexington Catholic product, is second on the team in scoring behind Dillard at 11.7 points per game, and the Flyers have two more starters averaging double figures in Josh Benson and Devin Oliver.

Dayton can go about nine players deep, and boasts a big and

Canaan one of six in spotlight this season

MSU POINT GUARD IN ELITE COMPANY IN COLLEGE BALL'S NATIONAL LANDSCAPE

Kentucky's Anthony Davis was pretty much everyone's choice as the national player of the year last season.

This season, at least as it nears the midpoint, the player of the year honor appears to be up for grabs.

Though there are a few players who might be considered front-runners, there are roughly two dozen, maybe more, who could be considered the best in the country.

Here's a few, sort of a sampler of the season so far:

Mason Plumlee, Duke

Best player on the No. 1 team is a pretty good start the conversation. The versatile, 6-foot-10 forward has been dominating at times during his senior season, shooting 61 percent from the floor while averaging 19.1 points and 11.3 rebounds per game. Plumlee had 21 points and 15 rebounds in the Blue Devils' rout of Elon Thursday night, a day after getting 19 and nine against Cornell. When Duke (11-0) needs a big shot or rebound, it's usually Plumlee who gets it, and he's a big reason the Blue Devils climbed to No. 1 for the 16th straight season under coach Mike Krzyzewski.

Trey Burke, Michigan

Burke thought about leaving for the NBA after his freshman season. Deciding to stick around may end up helping his draft status. The 6-0 sophomore was an AP preseason All-American and has arguably been the nation's best point guard through the first two months of the season. Burke got away with playing on natural ability last season, but his game has matured and he's helped the Wolverines open the season 11-0 and climb to No. 2 in the AP Top 25. He's shooting 53 percent, impressive for a guard, while averaging 18 points and seven assists, teaming with Tim Hardaway Jr. in what may be the nation's best backcourt.

Doug McDermott, Creighton

Another preseason All-American, the coach's son is as

Lakers split Friday games in Classic

SIVILLS SAYS SIX OF EIGHT QUARTERS PLAYED WITHOUT ENERGY, REASON FOR LOPSIDED LOSS TO WHITLEY

The Calloway County Lady Lakers knew they would have their hands full when they saw they would be playing the state's 10th-ranked team, Whitley County from southeastern Kentucky, but they had no idea what they would face until the visiting Lady Colonels ripped off a 24-0 second quarter that left the halftime score 39-9, and the final score 63-25.

Head coach Scott Sivills essentially said the Lakers did not compete, which was a carryover from the second half of the first game against Clarksville Northwest, where they looked lethargic coming out of the locker room.

"I'm very disappointed in our effort," he said, "we just didn't do

the things to execute both offensively and defensively. We played a very, very good Whitley County team that you just can't make those mistakes against, and they really focused in on both ends of the floor."

"The one thing we tell our kids is that we want to make things uncomfortable for the other teams on defense, and that's what they did against us, they made things very uncomfortable."

The Lakers played against Northwest in Friday's opening game of the tournament, where they won easily, 65-50 to lock up at least the second seed in their pool, and used an 18-point half-time lead to cruise to the victory. The Lakers came out of the half and allowed Northwest to cut the lead to seven, but were able to reel it back in and secure the vic-

tory.

Sivills said the win over Northwest was not a great showing from the beginning of the third quarter, but they managed to win, which they were supposed to do against the lesser opponent.

"It was a really good first half against Northwest," he said. "But from the second half on, and all the way through the (Whitley County) game, it was very sloppy, we looked mentally and physically drained, we didn't pass the ball with precision, we didn't run the floor, our effort was not there like it should have been, and we just didn't play."

The Whitley County game was out of hand from the get-go, even though the Lakers only trailed 15-9 after one quarter. The Lady Lakers led the game at 3-2 and 5-4, but an 8-0 run put the home team in a hole they couldn't climb out of when the score was 12-5. Summer Simmons score four straight for the Lakers, but Whitley County hit a bucket at the end of the period that sparked a 26-0 run that went the duration

of the second quarter.

The home team scored the first three points of the second half to cut the lead to 39-12, but was outscored 16-8 in the third, and the fourth quarter was an 8-8 wash with a running clock.

Sivills said he will take the blame for this loss because he thought the team was prepared to play, but said they didn't have what it took.

"We didn't have it (Friday)," he said, "but we have two games tomorrow to come back and get

tenacious as anyone in the game. Teams have tried just about everything against the 6-8 junior forward and few have found a way to slow him down. McDermott was third nationally with 22.9 points per game last season and is third again this year, up to 23.7. McDermott became the first Creighton player since 1990 to score 30 points in consecutive games last week and is averaging 6.8 rebounds. He's also shooting 55 percent, including 51 percent from 3-point range.

Nick Johnson, Arizona

East Coast fans probably don't get to see much of Johnson since Arizona's games are usually on late, but he's been the glue that's held the Wildcats (9-0) together during their best start in 25 years. An athletic 6-3 guard, he was

solid as a freshman last season, but has played with much more poise and confidence as a sophomore. Johnson has hit some big shots for Arizona while scoring 13.6 points per game, second on the team, and is a tenacious defender in the vein of his uncle, former Boston Celtics great Dennis Johnson.

C.J. McCollum, Lehigh

McCollum was fifth nationally with 21.9 points per game last season and drew plenty of attention by scoring 30 points in Lehigh's upset victory over Duke in the NCAA tournament. Even with opponents geared toward stopping him, McCollum has been nearly unstoppable during his senior season. The 6-3 guard leads the nation with 24.9 points per game and is averaging 5.4 rebounds and 3.1 assists. McCollum is tied for fifth nation-

ally in 3-point shooting, hitting 51.9 percent, and is generating plenty of attention from NBA scouts.

Isaiah Canaan, Murray State

Canaan may be the best player in his state, which is saying something with powerhouses like Louisville and Kentucky just down the road. The 6-1 senior guard led the Racers to national prominence last season and has been even better this season. A preseason All-American and the reigning Ohio Valley Conference player of the year, he's seventh nationally in scoring at 21.3 points per game and has led Murray State to a 9-1 record. Relatively unheralded when he joined the Racers, he could be headed to the NBA after he leaves Murray.

prepared for, and then we've got four games after Christmas, so we have four games to get us ready for Marshall County in January.

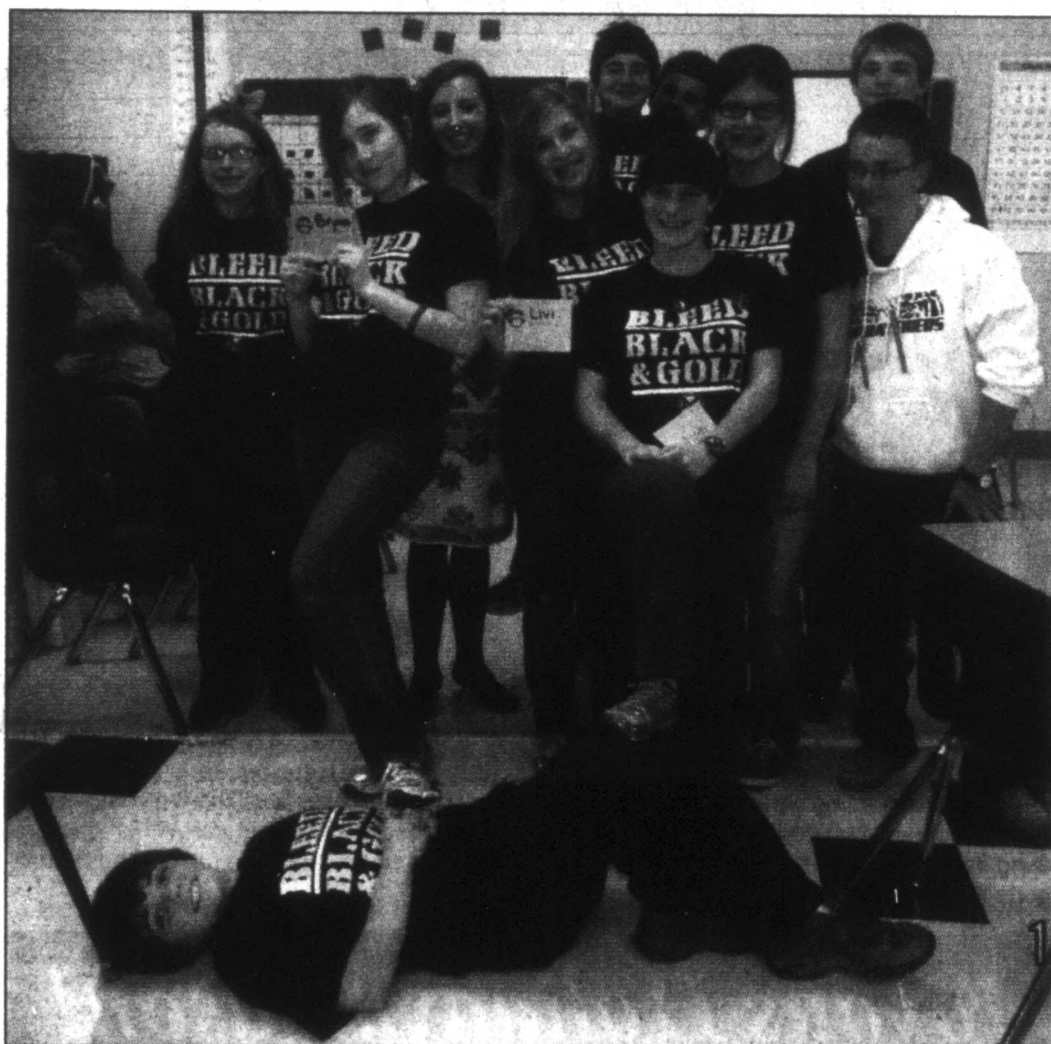

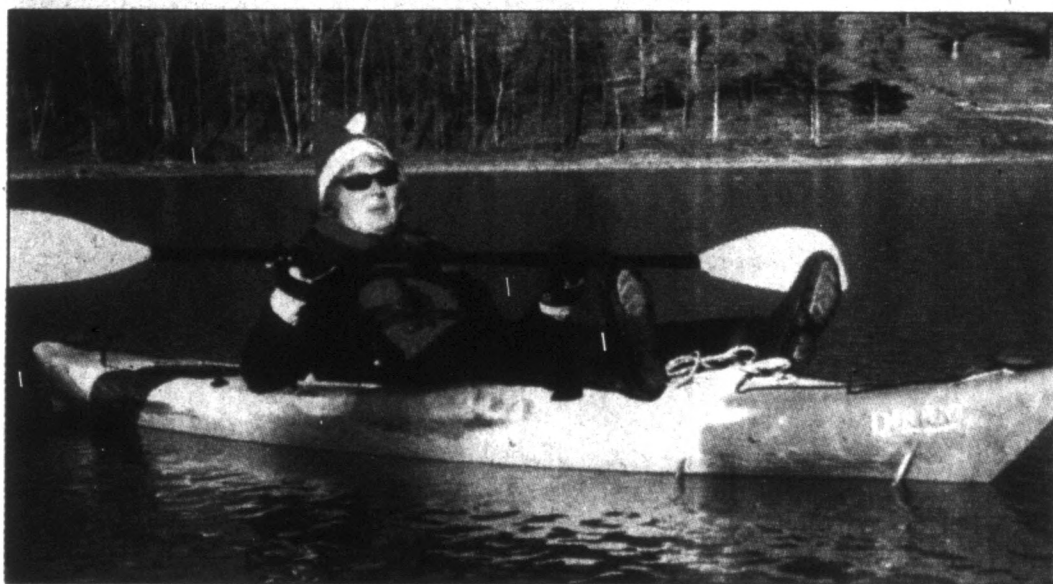

Putin: Russia recognizes need for change in Syria

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian President Vladimir Putin distanced himself further than ever before from his longtime ally in Syria on Thursday, saying he understands Syria needs change and that he is not protecting its president.

Putin, however, warned that efforts to unseat Bashar Assad could plunge Syria even deeper into violence. He insisted that Russia has not changed its stance and believes that only a negotiated settlement can end the civil war.

Putin's assessment came a week after Russia's top envoy for Syria was quoted as saying Assad's forces were losing control of the country. Although the Foreign Ministry backpedaled on that statement, analysts have suggested for months that the Kremlin is resigned to Assad's

fall.

Russia has blocked international attempts to step up pressure on the Assad regime, leading to accusations that it is supporting Assad.

Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov has long stated that Russia is not propping up Assad, as did Putin in strong words on Thursday.

"We are not preoccupied that much with the fate of the Assad regime; we realize what's going on there and that the family has been in power for 40 years," Putin said during his annual hours-long news conference. "Undoubtedly, there is a call for changes."

"We are worried about another thing: what happens next," he said. "We don't want to see the opposition come to power and start fighting the government

that becomes the opposition, so that it goes on forever."

Fyodor Lukyanov, the editor of the Russia in Global Affairs journal, said Moscow's stance has been consistent and Putin's statements do not signal a change.

"Russia has always said it did not support Assad personally, that it wanted a political dialogue" between Assad's government and the opposition, Lukyanov said.

Putin said Russia's position "is not to keep Assad and his regime in power at any cost, but to allow the people to come to an agreement on how they will live further and how they will ensure their safety and their participation in governing the country and then start changing the current order based on those agreements."

Bernard Madoff brother to face victims in NY court

NEW YORK (AP) — The suspense surrounding the sentencing of the brother of Ponzi king Bernard Madoff will largely be absent because a plea agreement makes a 10-year prison term all but certain.

But drama will likely fill the courtroom Thursday in U.S. District Court in Manhattan anyway as 67-year-old Peter Madoff faces some of the heartbroken investors who lost their savings when the unprecedented fraud was revealed four years ago this month.

When he pleaded guilty to conspiracy and falsifying books and records of an investment adviser, the former senior compliance officer at the Madoff private investment business said he was "shocked and devastated" when his brother revealed several days before he surrendered that thousands of accounts supposedly worth \$65 billion were worthless. Investigators say Bernard Madoff had distrib-

uted most of the \$20 billion he took in over several decades to other investors while investing none of it in the markets as he had promised to do.

A court-appointed monitor has so far recovered nearly \$9.3 billion that was lost, mostly by clawing back money from investors who received large payouts along the way. Most of the money has not yet been distributed. A small part of the recovery has resulted from the sale of numerous Madoff family assets, including the toys of the wealthy — multi-million dollar homes, fancy cars, yachts and art.

In a pre-sentence brief, attorney John Wing said his client was subject to a "draconian forfeiture order that in one stroke stripped him of all existing assets, his home, his pension, his savings, his personal property, etc. and of all future assets and income should he even have the opportunity to earn any

income after serving his prison sentence." He said Peter Madoff will be left a "jobless pariah" when he gets out of prison.

Yet, one couple who submitted a victim impact statement to federal prosecutors said Peter Madoff did not seem destitute when he was spotted "enjoying a leisurely lunch in an expensive Upper East Side restaurant where many of his victims would like to eat but can't afford to."

In the letter filed publicly Wednesday with others, Jill and Nancy Miller said they saw him there after he had pleaded guilty in June.

Michael De Vita, an investor who has asked to speak, said in a letter to the court that the judge should set aside the plea agreement and impose the maximum sentence.

"I ask that you show the same degree of compassion for Peter Madoff that he showed for us — none!" he wrote.

Perhaps if he has a chance to miss you, he will feel impelled to make more of an effort. And if he's not, then you won't have to cut off your social relationships at home -- relationships you may need if this romance doesn't work out the way you would like.

DEAR ABBY: My wife of 32 years has delusional jealousy. It is so bad that she has checked my genitals and questioned the neighbors' wives. I have stayed

in this marriage only because of our children, who are now adults. I am at a crisis point where I want a divorce. I detest throwing 32 years away, but I have no love for this woman. We have sought counseling three times. However, once I start describing her delusions, the sessions quickly stop. -- **WANTS OUT**

DEAR WANTS OUT: Nowhere in your letter could I discern a question, but from my vantage point, I disagree that you would "throw 32 years away." You used that time to make sure your children were grown and independent.

I'm sorry about your wife's delusions, but because she is unwilling to follow through with counseling, there is nothing you or I can do about them.

DEAR ABBY: My sister is engaged to a severe alcoholic. I host the annual Christmas dinners and I feel stuck. When he was here last year, he broke a wine glass that held special meaning for my husband and me and generally made a fool of himself.

Should I invite my sister and tell her that her fiancé isn't welcome? (They live together.) He has gotten even worse this year. He broke three bones because he was so drunk he fell, and he left rehab three times in one month. I'm a cancer survivor and do not need the stress in my life. -- **NERVOUS IN NEW YORK**

DEAR NERVOUS: I agree that you shouldn't subject yourself to unnecessary stress. Your health must come first.

If you haven't discussed this with your sister, do it NOW. A way to include her and her fiancé would be to serve no alcohol during your Christmas celebration. However, if that isn't feasible, then tell her that until her fiancé is able to stay "dry," you regret that you will be unable to entertain them.

Chronic cough has variety of causes

DEAR DOCTOR K: I've been coughing for weeks. Why won't this cough go away?

DEAR READER: Every human being coughs, beginning from the first moments after birth. In fact, we probably cough when we're still in the uterus.

Why do we cough? The answer probably is that coughing protects our lungs.

Secretions from our nose and sinuses, or fluids in our mouth, can accidentally drop down into our lungs. Coughing is the lung's way of expelling what has dropped into it -- expelling it first from our lungs, and ultimately out through our throat and mouth.

A cough is triggered when nerves in the larynx (voice box) or respiratory tract are stimulated. These nerves can be irritated by infections, allergies, cold air, tumors, smoke, dust particles, nasal mucus or stomach acid. (If you're interested in seeing what happens inside your body to elicit a cough, I've put an illustration on my website, AskDoctorK.com.)

Smoking is the leading cause of a chronic cough, but many nonsmokers develop chronic coughs as well. The lion's share of these are caused by one or more of the following:

- Postnasal drip. Viruses, allergies, sinusitis, dust particles and airborne chemicals can irritate the nasal membranes. The membranes respond by producing extra mucus. When this mucus drips down the throat, it triggers a cough.
- Asthma. Wheezing and breathlessness are the usual symptoms of asthma. But some asth-

ma patients just cough. That's particularly true when they go outside in winter. For people with asthma, and some others, cold and dry air can irritate the breathing tubes. This causes the tubes to go into spasm, which leads to a cough.

Gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD). Heartburn is the usual symptom of GERD. But GERD can cause coughing without heartburn. About one-third of patients with GERD complain of cough, recurrent laryngitis or unexplained sore throats. The stomach acid that gets regurgitated up into the throat irritates the nerve endings in the larynx and throat, and this triggers a cough.

Chronic bronchitis is a persistent infection of the bronchial tubes, which can lead to a chronic cough.

Therapy with angiotensin-converting-enzyme (ACE) inhibitors. ACE inhibitors are frequently used to treat high blood pressure. Unfortunately, cough is one of the side effects of these medications, occurring in up to 20 percent of patients.

Heart failure and lung cancer. It's uncommon, but sometimes a chronic cough is the first sign of either heart failure or lung cancer. Fortunately, the other less serious medical conditions I've mentioned above are much more common causes of cough.

Coughing interrupts sleep, producing fatigue and impairing concentration. It also can cause urinary incontinence, and even fractured ribs.

A chronic cough is always worth discussing with your doctor. If it is accompanied by sputum production, bloody sputum, fever, weight loss, night sweats, breathlessness, undue fatigue or chest pain, consult your doctor without delay.

Texas town allows teachers to carry concealed guns

HARROLD, Texas (AP) — In this tiny Texas town, children and their parents don't give much thought to safety at the community's lone school — mostly because some of the teachers are carrying concealed weapons.

In remote Harrold, the nearest sheriff's office is 30 minutes away, and people tend to know — and trust — one another. So the school board voted to let teachers bring guns to school.

"We don't have money for a security guard, but this is a better solution," Superintendent David Thweatt said. "A shooter could take out a guard or officer with a visible, holstered weapon, but our teachers have master's degrees, are older and have had extensive training. And their guns are hidden. We can protect our children."

In the awful aftermath of last week's Connecticut elementary school shooting, lawmakers in a growing number of states — including Oklahoma, Missouri, Minnesota, South Dakota and Oregon — have said they will consider laws allowing teachers and school administrators to carry firearms at school.

Texas law bans guns in

schools unless the school has given written authorization. Arizona and six other states have similar laws with exceptions for people who have licenses to carry concealed weapons.

Harrold's school board voted unanimously in 2007 to allow employees to carry weapons. After obtaining a state concealed-weapons permit, each employee who wants to carry a weapon must be approved by the board based on his or her personality and reaction to a crisis, Thweatt said.

Employees also must undergo training in crisis intervention and hostage situations. And they must use bullets that minimize the risk of ricochet, similar to those carried by air marshals on planes.

CaRae Reinisch, who lives in the nearby community of Elliott, said she took her children out of a larger school and enrolled them in Harrold two years ago, partly because she felt they would be safer in a building with armed teachers.

"I think it's a great idea for trained teachers to carry weapons," Reinisch said. "But I hate that it has come to this."

The superintendent won't disclose how many of the school's 50 employees carry weapons, saying that revealing that number might jeopardize school security.

The school, about 150 miles northwest of Fort Worth near the Oklahoma border, has 103 students from kindergarten through 12th grade. Most of them rarely think about who is carrying a gun.

"This is the first time in a long time that I've thought about it," said Matt Templeton, the principal's 17-year-old son. "And that's because of what happened" in Connecticut.

Thweatt said other Texas schools allow teachers to carry weapons, but he would not reveal their locations, saying they are afraid of negative publicity.

The Texas Education Agency said it had not heard of any other schools with such a policy. And the Brady Center to Prevent Gun Violence did not know of any other districts nationwide that allow school employees to carry concealed handguns.

But that may change soon.

Oklahoma state Rep. Mark McCullough said he is working

on a bill that would allow teachers and administrators to receive firearms training through the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training, which would authorize them to carry weapons at school and at school events. Other states are proposing or considering similar measures.

However, Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder this week vetoed legislation that would have allowed concealed weapons in schools, churches and day care centers, saying he seeks a more "thoughtful review" that includes school emergency policies and mental health-related issues.

In Texas, guns have an honored place in the state's culture, and politicians often describe owning a gun as essential to being Texan. At the state Capitol, concealed handgun license holders are allowed to skip the metal detectors that scan visitors.

Gov. Rick Perry has indicated he would prefer to give gun owners the widest possible latitude. Just days after the Connecticut attack, Perry said permit holders should be able to carry concealed weapons in any

public place.

Last year, many Texas lawmakers supported a plan to give college students and professors with concealed handgun licenses the right to carry guns on campus, but the measure failed.

Opponents insist that having more people armed at a school, especially teachers or administrators who aren't trained to deal with crime on a daily basis, could lead to more injuries and deaths. They point to an August shooting outside the Empire State Building, where police killed a laid-off clothing designer after he fatally shot his former colleague. Nine bystanders were wounded by police gunfire, ricochets and fragments.

"You are going to put teachers, people teaching 6-year-olds in a school, and expect them to respond to an active-shooter situation?" said Ladd-Everitt, a spokesman for the Washington, D.C.-based Coalition to Stop Gun Violence, who called the idea of arming teachers "madness."

Kristin Rowe-Finkbeiner said she would not have felt better if teachers at her children's Seattle school had been armed during a May shooting at a nearby cafe.

A gunman killed four people at the cafe and another woman during a carjacking before killing himself. The school went on lockdown as a precaution.

"It would be highly concerning to me to know that guns were around my kids each and every day. ... Increasing our arms is not the answer," said Rowe-Finkbeiner, co-founder and CEO of MomsRising.org.

Dan Gross, president of the Brady Campaign, said focusing on arming teachers distracts from the "real things" that could help prevent a school shooting "and at worse it furthers a dangerous conversation that only talks about guns as protection without a discussion about the serious risks they present."

As the debate continues, Harrold's school plans to leave its policy unchanged.

"Nothing is 100 percent at all. ... But hope makes for a terrible plan, hoping that (a tragedy) won't happen," Thweatt said. "My question is: What have you done about it? How have you planned?"

U.S. Mint testing new metals to make coins cheaper

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — When it comes to making coins, the Mint isn't getting its two cents worth. In some cases, it doesn't even get half of that. A penny costs more than two cents and a nickel costs more than 11 cents to make and distribute. The quandary is how to make coins more cheaply without sparing our change's quality and durability, or altering its size and appearance.

A 400-page report presented last week to Congress outlines nearly two years of trials conducted at the Mint in Philadelphia, where a variety of metal recipes were put through their paces in the massive facility's high-speed coin-making machinery.

Evaluations of 29 different alloys concluded that none met the ideal list of attributes. The Treasury Department concluded that additional study was needed before it could endorse any changes.

"We want to let the data take us where it takes us," Dick Peterson, the Mint's acting director, said Wednesday. More test runs with different alloys are likely in the coming year, he said.

The government has been looking for ways to shave the millions it spends every year to make bills and coins. Congressional auditors recently suggested doing away with dollar bills entirely and replacing them with dollar coins, which

they concluded could save taxpayers some \$4.4 billion over three decades. Canada is dropping its penny as part of an austerity budget.

To test possible new metal combinations, the U.S. Mint struck penny-, nickel- and quarter-sized coins with "nonsense dies" — images that don't exist on legal tender (a bonneted Martha Washington is a favorite subject) but are similar in depth and design to real currency.

Test stampings were examined for color, finish, resistance to wear and corrosion, hardness and magnetic properties. That last item might be the trickiest, as coin-operated equipment such as vending machines and parking meters detect counter-

feits not just by size and weight but by each coin's specific magnetic signature.

Except for pennies, all current U.S. circulating coins have the electromagnetic properties of copper, the report said.

A slight reduction in the nickel content of our quarters, dimes and nickels would bring some cost savings while keeping the magnetic characteristics the same. Making more substantial changes, like switching to steel or other alloys with different magnetic properties, could mean big savings to the government but at a big cost to coin-op businesses, Peterson said.

The vending industry estimates it would cost between \$700 million and \$3.5 billion to

recalibrate machines to recognize coins with an additional magnetic signature. The Mint's researchers reached a lower but still pricey estimate of \$380 million to \$630 million.

Another challenge for the Mint is the rising cost of copper (used in all U.S. coins) and nickel (used in all except pennies).

Only four of the 80 metals on the periodic table — aluminum, iron (used to make steel), zinc and lead — cost less than copper and nickel, the report stated. Lead isn't an option because of its potential health hazards.

Pricing of steel, aluminum and zinc are pretty close to each other ... there are promising alternatives for the nickel, dime and quarter," Peterson said.

"There wouldn't be any advantage to shift the composition of the penny, so we offset that cost with (savings from) other denominations."

Pennies may not be cost-efficient, but they won't be getting pinched as long as they're in demand.

"We produce 6 billion pennies a year," Peterson said. "Our customers want them."

Concurrent Technologies Corp., a Pennsylvania-based scientific research and development company, is working with the Mint on the alternative materials study under a \$1.5 million contract awarded in 2011.

The Philadelphia mint, established in 1792, is the country's oldest and largest.

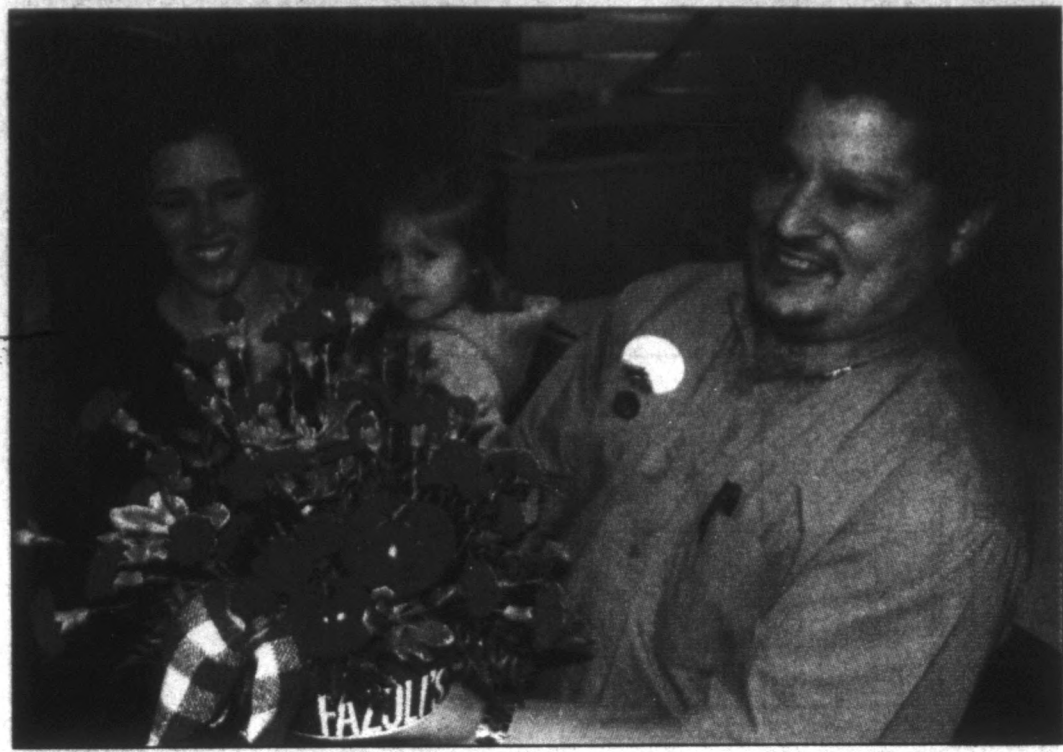

Officials checking dock washed ashore in Washington

SEATTLE (AP) — A dock that apparently was ripped away from Japanese waters by a tsunami and drifted for more than a year-and-a-half across 5,000 miles of the Pacific washed ashore on one of the most remote beaches on the west coast of the United States.

It was spotted Tuesday by the Coast Guard on the Olympic Peninsula. Tsunami debris experts didn't try to reach it by ground until Thursday because of stormy weather and treacherous terrain, said David Workman, spokesman for the state Marine Debris Task Force.

It's a four- or five-mile walk from the nearest road on little-used trails crossing streams running full from a drenching December storm.

Removing the dock or just scraping it clean of potential invasive species of marine life "is going to be a real challenge to find the right solution," Workman said.

Officials aren't disclosing the

exact location of the dock to keep people away because of safety concerns.

"It's a very precarious location to get to, especially in these conditions," Workman said. "At high tide there's no beach and you've got a bluff."

The beach is between La Push and the Hoh River on the northwest tip of Washington. The nearest town is Forks — of "Twilight" book and movie fame. It's about 100 miles west of Seattle.

It's along 70 miles of wilderness beaches protected by the Olympic National Park. The waters are in the 3,200 square-mile Olympic Coast National Marine Sanctuary.

The tsunami debris task force, made up of federal, state and tribal agencies, wants to secure the dock until they decide how to deal with it, Workman said. Officials are concerned about non-native plants or animals that hitched a ride.

They also need to confirm its

Japanese origin.

It's believed to be similar to the 165-ton concrete and steel dock that washed ashore in June near Newport, Ore. Looking like a railroad boxcar, it was 66 feet long, 19 feet wide and 7 feet high. A plaque identified it as one of four owned by Aomori Prefecture that broke loose from the port of Misawa during the March 2011 tsunami. The docks were used for loading fish onto trucks. Another one turned up several weeks later on an island south of Misawa.

The Newport dock carried 1.5 tons of seaweed, mussels, barnacles and starfish. Volunteers scraped it all off and buried it above the high water line, then sterilized the dock with torches. The dock was cut up and removed last summer.

The Olympic dock could get the same treatment to head off a non-native plant or animal taking hold, said state Fish and Wildlife Department spokesman Bruce Botka.

Palestinians aim to isolate Israel

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) — Weeks ahead of Israeli elections, Palestinian officials are already plotting a series of tough steps against Israel to be taken if, as polls predict, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu is re-elected and peace efforts remain stalled.

Emboldened by their newly upgraded status at the United Nations, the Palestinians are talking of filing war crimes charges against Israel, staging mass demonstrations in the West Bank, encouraging the international community to impose sanctions, and ending the security cooperation that has helped preserve quiet in recent years.

These plans, combined with growing international impatience with Israeli settlement construction on occupied land, could spell trouble and international isolation for the Israeli leader.

In a series of interviews with The Associated Press, a number of Palestinian officials all voiced a similar theme: Following the U.N. General Assembly's recognition of "Palestine" as a nonmember observer state in November, the status quo cannot continue.

"2013 will see a new Palestinian political track. There will be new rules in our relationship with Israel and the world," said Hussam Zumlot, an aide to President Mahmoud Abbas.

Israeli-Palestinian peace talks broke down shortly before Netanyahu's election in early 2009 and have remained frozen throughout his term, mostly due to the dispute over Israel's construction of settlements in east Jerusalem and the West Bank. The Palestinians claim the areas, along with the Gaza Strip, for a future state. Israel captured the areas in the 1967 Mideast war.

The Palestinians have demanded that Israel halt settlement construction before negotiations can resume, saying the continued building is a show of bad faith. Netanyahu says talks should resume without preconditions, and notes that a 10-month partial freeze on construction he imposed two years ago failed to bring about substantive negotiations.

Frustrated with the impasse, the Palestinians turned to the

United Nations for recognition of an independent state in the West Bank, east Jerusalem and Gaza. Israel, which withdrew from Gaza in 2005, rejects a return to its 1967 lines.

Although the U.N. vote did not change the situation on the ground, it had deep implications. Opposed by just nine countries, it amounted to a strong international endorsement of the Palestinian position on future borders. It also cleared the way for them to join international agencies to press their grievances against Israel.

Netanyahu has accused the Palestinians of bypassing direct negotiations.

"One would hope we will in fact see in 2013 the re-emergence of the Israeli-Palestinian negotiating process," said Netanyahu's spokesman, Mark Regev. "There is no substitute for direct talks. You're not going to make peace in resolutions at the United Nations or other international forums."

At the heart of the deadlock are the huge gaps between the two sides' conditions. Netanyahu has embraced the idea of establishing a Palestinian state alongside Israel. Without action soon, the thinking goes, Israel will find itself in permanent control of millions of disenfranchised Palestinians, threatening its status as a democracy with a Jewish majority. But Netanyahu has added so many caveats, including a refusal to turn Jerusalem into a shared capital and demands to retain significant parts of the West Bank, that the Palestinians believe negotiations would be futile.

Palestinian officials say they are hopeful that a formula for restarting talks can be found after Israel's election on Jan. 22, perhaps through a new initiative from President Barack Obama.

The Palestinians have begun to speak of a trial, six-month negotiating period. Azzam al-Ahmed, a top aide to Abbas, said Arab diplomats will present the plan in Western capitals, Russia and China next month. But with the Palestinians insistent on a settlement freeze, and opinion polls forecasting a new hardline Israeli coalition headed by Netanyahu, expectations are

low.

The Palestinian officials said they will not rush toward any punitive measure, but they are determined not to stand pat.

"We have to prepare ourselves for a long and tough battle," added Yasser Abed Rabbo, secretary-general of the Palestine Liberation Organization, the Palestinians' top decision-making body. "We will use all the political tools available."

Among the options being considered is halting cooperation between Israeli and Palestinian security forces in the West Bank. The cooperation is widely seen as a key element in preserving the calm in the West Bank in recent years, in sharp contrast to the heavy fighting a decade ago.

"There will be no security cooperation as long as there is no political horizon," said Mohammed Ishtayeh, a Palestinian Cabinet minister.

The Palestinians also talk of increasing "popular struggle," the term they use for demonstrations against Israeli soldiers. Such face-to-face confrontations frequently turn tense, with protesters throwing stones and troops firing tear gas and water cannons, and run the risk of growing more violent.

Perhaps most troubling to Israel, the Palestinians also want to use their upgraded status on the world stage to push for international action against Israel.

Officials say they will move to join the International Criminal Court, where they hope to pursue war crimes charges against Israel for its settlement activities. Although the road to taking legal action in the ICC appears to be long and complicated, it nonetheless has made Israeli officials jittery.

"We are going to pursue this policy to reach a point of having the international community impose sanctions on Israel," said Qais Abdelkareem, another PLO official.

This Palestinian agenda, while ambitious, is likely to encounter stiff resistance from both Israel and its international allies. Israel has a number of tools at its disposal, including possible military or economic pressure on the Palestinians.
