## Roads To Be Piked.

The Directors of the Turnpike Company met Monday night and received a communication from engineer Spurr, of Lexington, stating that he would be in this city by the end of the week ready to begin work. Capt. Townes, who has been engaged by the company, is in the city awaiting orders.

The Directors took under consideration the question as to what roads should be piked, and after much discussion it was determined that the Fairview, the Palmyra and the Cox Mill roads should be piked for five miles out from the city as a beginning. The engineers will be instructed to make immediate surveys of these roads and to submit a profile report which will be furnished to builders as a basis of contract. The company took no action as to any other roads.

## The Court of Claims.

The County Court of Claims convened Tuesday morning with Judge Anderson on the bench and the following Justices present:

Claims amounting to about \$2,000 were allowed. The court granted the right to place a town clock in the court house cupola. A very interesting discussion arose over a proposition to pay the County Assessor for taking polls.

Esquire Warfield offered the following resolution which explains the matter in full:

"Whereas it appears that the Assessor received for his pay in 1886 the sum of \$1,751.30, and whereas the pay of the Assessor under the present system is \$1,180.41, making a difference of \$581.49, therefore be it

Resolved, That this Court request the Representatives in the next Legislature to change the law of the State so as to provide that the pay of the Assessor under the present system will be about the same as the pay of the Assessor under the old law. And whereas it further appears that the Assessor has returned this year 493 polls less than the Assessor reported last year, making a difference to the county in charge to the county tax of \$3,000.

Resolved, further that our Representatives be requested to increase the pay of the Assessor by allowing him a percentage amount for each poll taken, so as to make his pay equal to what has been paid Assessors heretofore."

Upon a vote by yeas and nays the resolutions were laid upon the table by the following vote: Yeas 10, Nays 10, the matter thereby defeating the resolutions.

The sum of \$50 was then voted to the Assessor.

The Court will probably not adjourn before this afternoon, as the question of laying the county levy is yet unsettled and other matters of importance are to be attended to.

## Another Church Dedication.

The Chamberland Protestant church is nearing completion. The ceiling is being oiled and varnished and will soon be finished. In a few days the fixtures will be put in. These consist of two arch lights in the vestibules and two Bailey reflections, one swinging from the center of the ceiling and the smaller will hang over the pulpit. Before the room is completed the lighting fixtures of the fixtures will be thoroughly tested.

The most attractive feature of the building will be the windows. There is one on each side of the house of inspiring dimensions and graceful proportions. One was put in by Miss J. A. McDaniel as a memorial to her deceased husband, Dr. R. J. McDaniel. The other three are contributions respectively from the merchants, the lawyers and doctors of this city. The windows were made by Wm. Jones, of Cincinnati, and Mr. Harper, representing the house, is in the city with Mr. Kingston, an expert workman, to superintend the placing of the glass. The windows are perfect works of art and beggar description.

We are informed that there are some finer in the South. In design, coloring and workmanship they command the highest admiration. The cost was \$130 toward windows.

The church will be completed and ready for dedication on the Fifth Sunday in May, when the congregation will solemnize the occasion with singing services. Dr. W. J. Davis, of Evansville, an eloquent and scholarly divine, has been selected to preach the dedicatory sermon. Rev. Biddle and his flock certainly have reason to be proud of their house of worship.

## The Fair Sell Out.

The rumor that the Fair Company was about to sell out has been the subject of considerable discussion. There is a general desire to know the facts, and meeting one of the recently elected directors of the New Era gained from him some interesting information. Said the director: "It has been manifested for several years that our annual Fair has not been as successful as desired. This is due to the building and grounds are badly in need of repair, and it will cost about \$2,000 to put them in first-class shape. Most of the stockholders are not willing to contribute funds to make these improvements. At the same time, the meeting last Monday these matters were discussed. A majority of the stock was present and a sentiment vote was cast showing that the stockholders were in favor of selling. The directors met next Saturday and the question will then be definitely settled. I think it quite probable we will effect a sale Saturday."

It is well known that the recently organized Jockey Club is to be the purchaser. The Fair Company originally issued 325 shares of stock at \$25 per share. The stock is mostly owned in this city and is quoted on the streets at from \$3 to \$7. It is not known whether the Jockey Club will buy a majority or all of the stock, or make a straight out purchase of the property under a lease of court. If the Jockey Club gets the property the amphitheatre will be torn away and an elegant grand stand erected. The track will be broadened and leveled and the entire grounds put in apple pie order. The result of the negotiations is watched with interest.
