Work to Start Soon On Paducah Dry Co.

Construction is due to start in the next few days on the new Paducah Dry Goods Co. store at 4th and Broadway in Paducah.

Sam Handmaker, general manager of the store, said the new building is expected to open this fall. A construction permit for \$518,607 has been issued for the structure.

One feature of the new store will be the only escalator in Western Kentucky.

Some departments will operate on a self-service principle, said Mr. Handmaker, and the entire building is to be air conditioned.

The upper three stories of the new building will have a brick exterior. Display windows will run the length of the building on both 4th St. and Broadway, with entrances on both streets.

The entire front on Broadway is to be recessed so that the display windows can be seen from a sheltered arcade.

On the first floor will be women's accessories and sportswear and the men's furnishings and clothing departments.

Women's clothing and millinery will be on the carpeted second floor. The third floor will contain a children's department as well as a layaway department and other store offices.

Furniture, floor coverings, lamps, radios and television sets will be on the top floor.

In the basement will be the "home fashion center" with linens, curtains and drapes and similar merchandise.

Among the list of employees are many with long-time records of service with the company. Heading the list is Mrs. Edna Hogan, in charge of the corset department, who has been with the company 25 years.

Calvert City is Ready For United Fund Drive

The United Fund Drive of the Calvert City Area will stage its first annual campaign between March 5 and March 22. It will have as its goal the raising of \$3,000 for five national charities operating in Calvert City. The organizations that have joined the drive and are actively supporting it are the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, American Cancer Society, Kentucky Heart Association, and the American Red Cross. The funds collected in the drive will be apportioned among these five agencies.

By means of this one "united" drive, sufficient funds are to be raised to take care of the needs of the participating agencies during 1954. Therefore, this one drive will take the place of the five individual drives which ordinarily would be made by the agencies themselves.

The Calvert organization is patterned closely after similar united fund raising groups that are enjoying successful campaigns in many of the nation's largest cities.

The newly organized Mayfield-Graves County United Fund Appeal had a very successful drive last fall and exceeded its \$33,000 goal by \$7,000.

As in the recent fire truck drive, every family in and around Calvert City will be contacted. Each solicitor will have the names of approximately ten families that he is to see. In addition, solicitations will be made from all employees working in the four industrial plants which are located in Calvert City—the B. F. Goodrich Chemical Co., the National Carbide Co., the Pittsburgh Metallurgical Co., and the Pennsylvania Salt Co. Payroll deductions will be made by each of these companies for the benefit of their employees.

The initial meeting for the organization of the United Fund Drive was held at the Calvert

High School on Oct. 22, 1953. At this meeting directors were elected as follows:

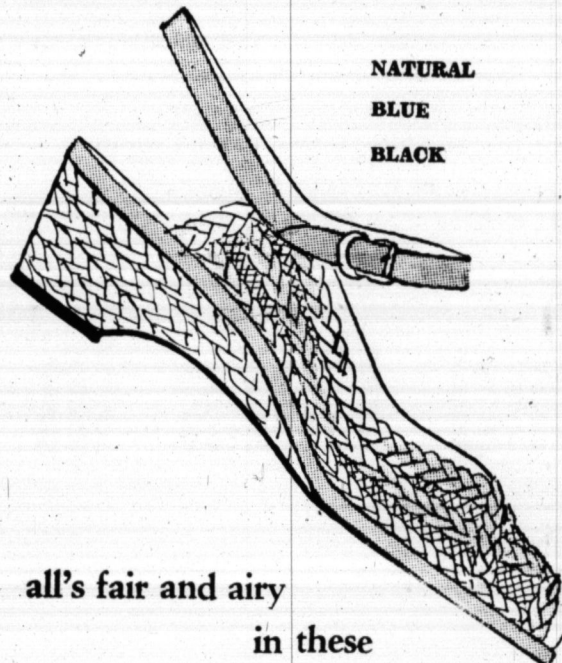

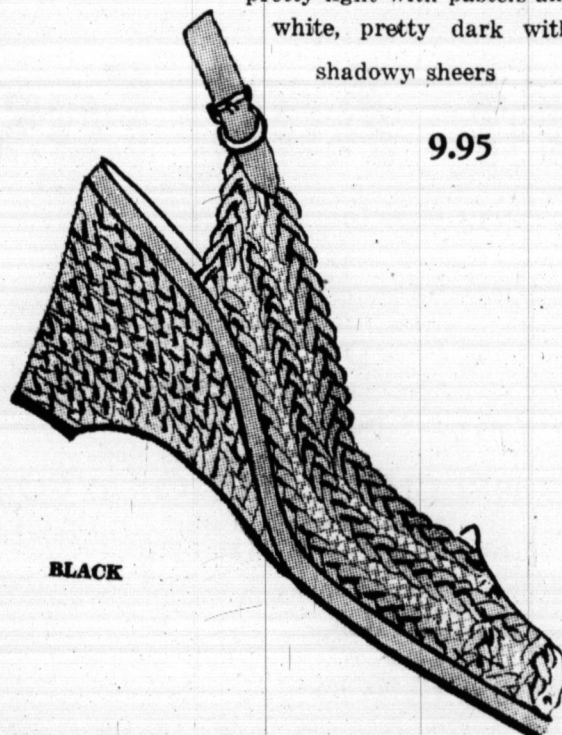

Stewed Chicken With Gravy

Broadcast: January 30, 1964

3 1/2 lb. cut-up stewing chicken 2 teaspoons salt

1 cup water 1/2 cup flour

1/2 cup finely cut onion 1/2 cup fat

Put chicken, water, onion, salt and pepper into large saucepan. Cover tightly and heat to boiling. Then cook over low heat until chicken is tender, about 1 1/2 hours. Remove chicken to warm platter and keep hot. There should be 2 cups broth left in pan. If not, add water. Put flour into a small bowl. Stir in milk gradually until smooth. Stir milk mixture into broth. Cook and stir over low heat until gravy thickens. Do not boil. Serve hot with the chicken. Makes 4 servings.

The resolution urges adequate funds for TVA programs and calls its program "an outstanding example of a unified, carefully integrated program of conservation and resource development."

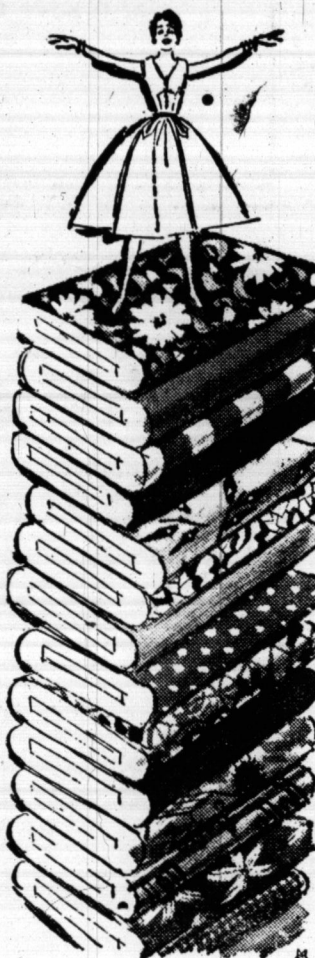

County Received \$202,415 for Public Assistance in '53

Frankfort — A total of \$202,415 was paid to residents of Marshall County in public assistance during 1953 according to a report released by Commissioner of Economic Security Vego E. Barnes.
Three types of aid — old age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the needy blind — are administered through the agency. Total payments in the county distributed among the three types of aid were:
Old age assistance, \$149,075; dependent children, \$50,984, and needy blind, \$1,756.
Public assistance payments for the entire year totaled \$39,217, 165, a \$4,000,000 increase over 1952.
Each year since the three programs were placed under one agency, there has been a constant increase and more than \$177,000,000 has been spent during the time. The increases have been effected due to efforts by the Federal Congress and the Kentucky General Assembly to meet the rising cost of living.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Scripture: John 10.
Devotional Reading: Ezekiel 34:11-16.
All People
Lesson for February 25, 1954
IN BOMBAY, India there is one of the most exclusive religions in the world, the religion of the Parses. There are more Parses in Bombay than there are Parses in the whole world. If you aren't a Parsee born you can never get in. Even if you marry a Parsee it does you no good; you are an outsider the rest of your life. That is precisely the opposite of the Christian religion. Billy Graham preaches to thousands of people night after night and he invites every one of those people in the great tabernacles and auditoriums to become a Christian. The congregations are not screened. No one has to pass an intelligence test or an FBI screening or a financial credit rating, or any sort of previous sifting whatever. Billy Sunday did not know, of course, his audiences by name. All he knew is that they were people. And being a Bible Christian he knew that wherever people are, there God's invitation holds good.

All People Are Lost
Two things are quite clear from the New Testament. One is that all people are lost. The other is that God does not want any one to stay lost. Jesus spoke of himself as the Shepherd and of people as lost sheep. To be "lost" does not mean to be hopelessly accursed. Any one who has ever seen a lost sheep knows what a ferocious sight it is, bedraggled, bewildered, not likely ever to get home unless some one shows it the way. Lost cats need nobody's sympathy; they will find their way back all right. But we are not lost cats or homing pigeons, we are lost sheep. That is a picture-way of saying that unless God sets us on the right track and leads us home, we are all of us more likely to go wrong than to go right. A lost sheep has no pride.

God Invites All
God never meant heaven to be exclusive. He never meant us to be snobbish about our religion. There are some mistakes here, commonly made, which need clearing up. One is that because God wants all men to be saved, he is going to save everybody regardless. Now if all we knew of the New Testament were this parable of the sheep, we might suppose God would work it that way and bring all people to his eternal home regardless of how they felt about it, as a shepherd does with his sheep or a cowhand with his little doggie. But the rest of the gospel shows us that God deals with us as free men. Heaven is not a sack into which God dumps everybody sooner or later, with their leave or without it. Heaven has a door, and the name of the door is Jesus Christ. You can put that in different ways too. Christ is the only door to the Christian life. He is the only door to the kingdom of God. If we wish to belong to God's kingdom we cannot turn away from Christ, we must come to God through him. But another mistake is to suppose that God has a private list of those he really does not want to come in to "the marriage supper" as Jesus put it once. His invitation is to all, really to all; but he never forces any one to accept.

The Church for All
A common sight, and a sad sight too, is a "class church." It doesn't make any difference what class it may be; it may be entirely of country people, or entirely of city people; it can be made up of high-brows or the uneducated; it is a class church if the people in it just don't want to have others in it whose circumstances are different from theirs. If all men are lost and if God's desire is that all shall be saved, no church should be more exclusive than God is. God does not draw color lines or class lines or money lines. The ideal church, the one that reflects the facts of Christ's love and the calling of God, is one in which no human being who loves the Lord Jesus and gives his heart to him can feel strange or out of place. There is no use saying, "We only want our kind of people," if Christ lived and died for all people. For that means all kinds of people!

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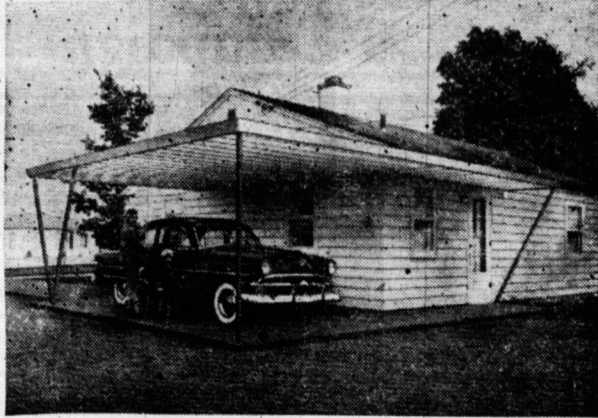

EARLY SPRING FORAGE AND SUMMER GRASS UNDER DROUGHT CONDITIONS



Seedings for early spring pasture should be made on many Kentucky farms this year to make up for the damage done to permanent pastures in 1953. Livestock should be off of damaged permanent pasture until it has recovered or been re-established. Seedings should therefore be made for spring grazing if weather is favorable. Seed is sown at about 3 bushels an acre will usually make more early grazing than any spring-sown crop. Rape sown with the oats would extend the grazing season, especially for sheep and hogs. Spring seedings should be used in place of permanent pastures as grazing is satisfactory.

RE-ESTABLISHING PERMANENT PASTURE

Dead or severely damaged permanent pastures may be disked or plowed and sown with oats for early grazing as an intermediate step in their restoration as permanent pasture. In most cases, these fields should be sown back into permanent pasture this spring. With the exception of Kentucky bluegrass, most of these sods are actually in bad condition as they appear to be. Kentucky bluegrass, even though it appears to be in bad condition, may gradually recover—especially if top-dressed with fertilizer. Red clover, Korean lespedeza, alfalfa, and white clover are suitable for sowing in these bluegrass sods. Sod that are to be seeded to grass this spring should be disked or plowed early enough for the soil to become firm before seeding. Fertilizer should be applied ahead of seeding and worked into the soil.

For more information on early spring forage and the re-establishment of permanent pasture during drought, see your County Agent. The University of Kentucky College of Agriculture has supplied him with special information on practices to be followed during drought periods.

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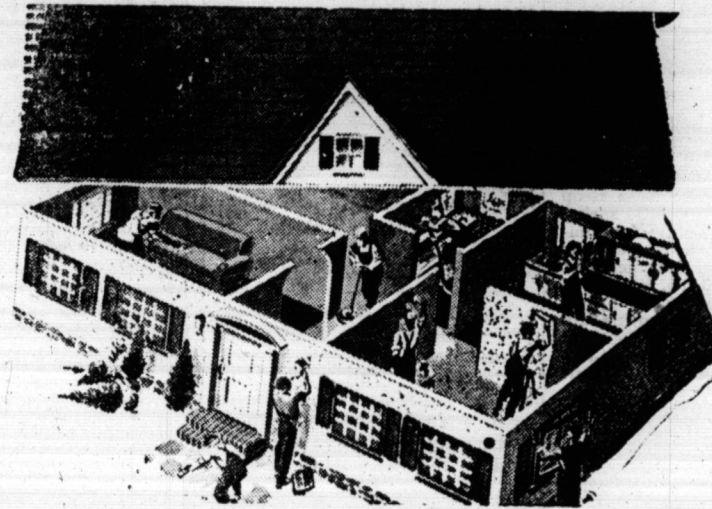
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
