Two Men Wreck Stolen Car Here

A Federal Bureau of Investigation agent has taken charge of Joe Franklin Merrell, 21, of Hollow Rock, Tenn., who, with another young man, crashed in a stolen car about midnight last Saturday near Benton.

The other man, Lloyd Ray Bertram of Paris, Tenn., received multiple injuries in the crash and was held in Riverside Hospital in Paducah for federal authorities, awaiting outcome of his injuries.

Bertram was driving the 1953 Chrysler when he failed to make the S-curve two miles north of Benton on the Benton-Paducah highway.

Bertram first was brought to McClain Clinic here in a Linn ambulance, and later taken to Paducah.

Policeman Charles Carroll followed the ambulance to the clinic and when the policeman became suspicious Merrell ran away. He was soon caught by Carroll near the railroad tracks and was placed in the Benton jail. He admitted to Carroll and other witnesses that the car was stolen in Paris, Tenn.

Merrell stayed in jail here until the FBI agent removed him on Tuesday.

Merrell said he was in Paris Sunday afternoon and became acquainted with Bertram in a pool hall. After drinking a few beers the pair decided to hitchhike to Chicago. On their way out of town they noticed the Chrysler parked near a lumber yard, with the keys in it, and decided to take it.

Policeman Bobby McCrady accompanied Bertram in the ambulance to Riverside Hospital. The Chrysler was demolished.

A trailer stopped at the Henson home and a woman and child entered the house and asked for food for the child. Mrs. Henson took the child to the kitchen.

A few seconds later, Mrs. Henson looked around and saw that the Gipsy woman was holding a handkerchief to her husband's face.

"What are you doing to my husband," Mrs. Henson cried.

"Just talking to him," replied the Gipsy.

Mrs. Henson ordered the Gipsy and child to leave, and then discovered that the Gipsy woman had attempted to chloroform her husband by holding the handkerchief over his nose.

It took her almost an hour to revive completely her husband. By then she also had discovered that the Gipsy had stolen her husband's wallet. The Gipsy dropped the wallet in fleeing, however.

The Hensons have no nearby neighbors and telephones in the community are scarce, so she never was able to obtain help during her harrowing experience and the Gipsies disappeared into the wild blue yonder.

Burglars Elude Police After 4 Break-ins Here

No arrests have been made in the four burglaries in Benton last Thursday night and break-in at Calvert City on Wednesday night of last week.

Fingerprints were taken but proved of little help to law enforcement officers.

Butler's Grocery was entered through a side door and the thieves took from \$18 to \$20 in cash and some cigarettes. Shirts in the clothing section were rumpled and a sack containing a number of shirts was found on the floor, indicating the burglars might have been frightened away.

Slegd's Texaco Service was entered by prizing open the front door. John Slegd reported \$42.63 was taken from the cash register.

Tanner's IGA Market also was entered by prizing open the front door. Bill Tanner reported \$13.48 and some cigarettes were stolen.

Meadow Bros. Locker Plant also was broken into but apparently nothing was taken.

All of the break-ins were thought to have taken place between midnight and daylight.

On the previous night, the Western Auto Store at Calvert City was broken into and three outboard motors and three shotguns were stolen. Wayne Littlejohn, owner, valued stolen merchandise at \$900. The burglars entered the store by breaking the lock on the front door. The store was burglarized last year and several shotguns were stolen at that time.





GM Builds First U.S. Gas Turbine Car



XP-21 Firebird, first gas turbine automobile in the United States, has been announced by General Motors. The car, which is being developed at GM's proving grounds near Milford, Mich., and Phoenix, Ariz., is a two-seater with a streamlined body and a large tail cone for exhaust gas. Its kerosene burning engine, mounted at the rear of the driver's compartment, drives two mechanically independent gas turbines, a gasifier section and a power turbine. The power turbines drive the car's rear wheels via a two-speed transmission.

Electric Co-ops Paying Off Loans

Electric cooperatives in Kentucky are paying off loans in advance of scheduled loan repayment dates and boosted to more than two million dollars the amount which Kentucky co-ops have paid in principal before such payments were due. Such payments, made in advance, may be used as a cushion of credit which the co-ops can apply against future interest or principal payments if they so desire. Smith pointed out that Kentucky co-ops are not only more than two million dollars ahead of their loan repayments, collectively speaking, but that not one of the state's twenty-seven electric co-ops is delinquent.

International Union
Sunday School Lesson
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Scripture: John 15:1-16
Devotional Reading: Acts 2:1-4, 22-32

Guiding Spirit
Lesson for March 26, 1954

"WHAT kind of evidence could
convince you that God ex-
ists?" The question was put to a
famous agnostic who answered in
a popular magazine last fall. He
writes: "I think that if I heard a
voice from the sky predicting all
that was going to happen to me
during the next 24 hours, including
events that would have seemed
highly improbable, and if all these
events then pro-
ceeded to happen,
I might perhaps
be convinced at
least of the exist-
ence of some su-
perhuman intelli-
gence." This ag-
nostic, who has a
brilliant mind and
knows a great deal
about many things,
Dr. Foreman
has managed to lay bare a consid-
erable ignorance about religion on
his part. If this is what he insists
on before he will believe in God,
he will never get it. If we all
waited for the kind of thing he
wants to hear, no one would be
able to believe in God.

The Spirit, Does Guide, But...
To begin with, it is most unlik-
ely that God will reveal his plans
in detail to this gentleman. He has
never done it yet, not to prophets
and not to apostles, saints or
martyrs. It one of the greatest of
these who said we walk by faith
and not by sight. So it is not like-
ly that God will give an elaborate
set of predictions to a man who
does not want to believe in the
first place. In the second place, the
demand made by the agnostic as-
sumes that the future is just as
fixed as the past, that there is no
such thing as freedom. Not even
God can predict one day's events
in advance if there is any real
freedom in the person to whom he
makes the prediction. (This is a
different thing from saying God
cannot know in advance—that is
another proposition. And yet, and
yet—the same Christian church
which would with one voice deny
that God promises to any man in-
fallible knowledge in advance or
even one day's happenings, has
affirmed from the very beginning
that God does guide his people by
His Holy Spirit. We believe that
Jesus' promise that the Spirit
would guide his people into "all
truth," has been fulfilled. It may
be a mistake (though this writer
thinks not) to suppose that the
Holy Spirit has more than we think
to do with men's discoveries in
science, in geography and inven-
tion; it is certainly no mistake to
suppose that the Spirit guides men
and women in their daily lives and
problems. The Spirit does guide
us, but not as a voice from
between the clouds and the moon.
How long is it since anybody in
your church heard, with his ears,
a voice out of the sky? Yet God's
voice is heard every day by Chris-
tians, the "still small voice," the
voice that makes no sound, the
"sound of gentle stillness" which is
the literal translation of "still
small voice."

Spirit of Truth
The most serious practical prob-
lem connected with the guidance of
the Spirit of God in our daily lives
is this, first of all: How can we
tell the Spirit's "leading" from no-
tions of our own? When we have
an impulse to do or to say some-
thing, to go or to wait, is this God
that gives us the impulse, or is it
only ourselves, or (chilling
thought) could it even be an evil
spirit? Now we must remember
that God can and does speak to us
in quite "ordinary" ways. When
we are really hungry, we look for
food. We don't need any voice
from the sky. But in the "natural"
instinct of hunger, God who made
us is saying to us, "Eat if you
want to live." Admitting all this,
is there any good way of telling
when the voice is God's and when
it is not? Yes. One test is this: Is
it the voice of truth? Does it push
you toward reality or away from
it? ... What would you say to a
man who told you that God had
commanded him to marry five
wives?

The Spirit of Jesus
The Holy Spirit and the Spirit
of Jesus are not two Spirits but
one. This gives us further insight
into how we may identify the true
divine Spirit, as different from
our own. If ever we are tempted to
justify something we want to do,
by saying it is God's will, let us
stop and think first: Is this what
Jesus would do? We know enough
about Jesus to know what sort of
person he was. We know how he
lived. We can be quite certain that
the Holy Spirit will never lead a
man to do an un-Christlike thing.
