In his autobiography in the April 17 issue of The Saturday Evening Post, the Veep reveals that as soon as he was old enough to assert himself, he let it be known firmly that his official name henceforth was Alben William Barkley. "Just imagine," he comments, "going through a Kentucky childhood with the name of Willie and later trying to get into politics!" In later years, Barkley says, he often considered introducing

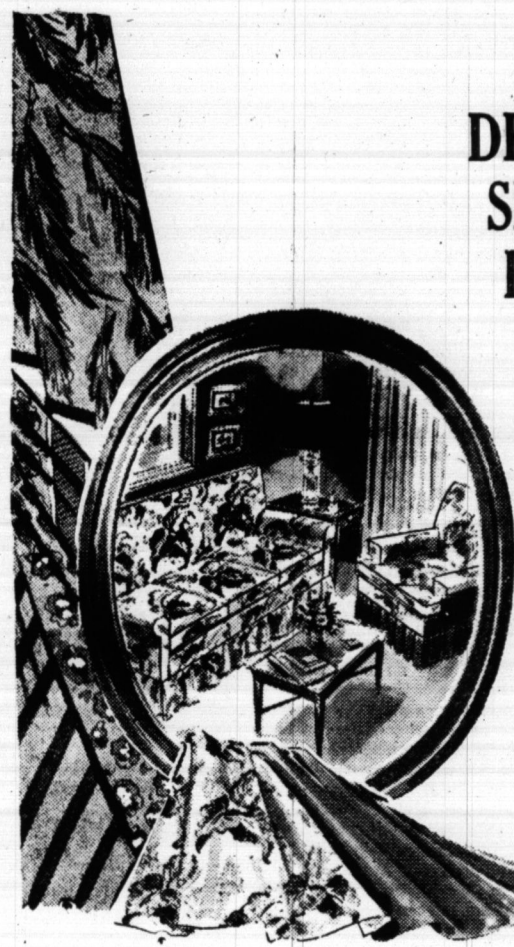

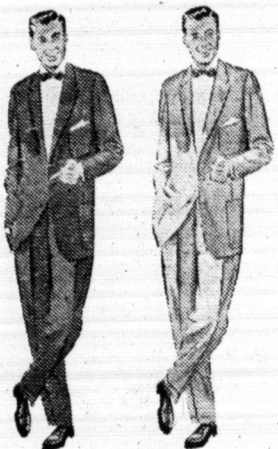

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Union
Sunday School Lessons
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: I Kings 11:1-12:24
Devotional Reading: Psalm 1.

Revolution

Lesson for April 25, 1954

VERY few people in America can logically say they believe that revolution by force is invariably wrong. On the contrary, some of the most distinguished and respected Americans, both men and women, are proud of the letters "S. A. R." and "D. A. R." Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution. If revolution was always wrong, then our country started on the wrong track to begin with, and we should be still a part of the British Empire. (The question might be asked, whether that Empire would have gone as far as it did and been as strong as it was, if it had not learned the lessons which only the American Revolution gave it. But that is another story.) The Bible tells the story of a revolution which had the full approval of a prophet of God. In fact, one of the prophets gave the chief revolutionists the idea.



Preacher Meets Rebel
Prophets in ancient times were something like preachers of these times, with two important differences. Prophet and preacher both speak for God to men. But the modern preacher has a church; the prophets had no established church, no chapel. They could not so much as rent a school-room or a theatre as preachers sometimes have to do. The prophets had to say their say wherever and whenever they could. There was no "regular eleven o'clock service." The other difference was that while the modern preacher likes to have a large church full of people to preach to, the prophet of olden times did not always (perhaps not usually) try for large crowds, but rather picked their listeners very carefully. They would be content with an audience of one, provided the one man was the right man. So the prophet Ahijah met a young man named Jeroboam alone one day, and gave him the idea that changed the lives of a whole nation. Tearing his long cloak into a dozen strips—"Is the man crazy?" Jeroboam must have thought, for the cloak was brand new), he invited the younger man to take ten of the pieces. The ten strips were ten "tribes" of Israel, and putting them into Jeroboam's hand meant that he was to be the leader of the revolution and secession which would tear those tribes away from the then united nation. The preacher, in short, was inviting and inciting rebellion and revolution.

When Is Revolution Necessary?
It is not the first time that preachers have been on the side of the revolutionist. In the American revolution, some churches, among them the Presbyterian, were so active in promoting that revolution that when British soldiers searched the houses of citizens suspected of revolutionary tendencies, if they found in the house a copy of the Presbyterian hymn book or catechism, the evidence was considered sufficient to make arrests on the spot. This raises a serious question. Why is it that churches and preachers, which are generally conservative and teach and preach patriotism as a Christian attitude—why is it that they have ever supported revolution, even by violence? Over in England a famous convention of preachers and other religious leaders in the year 1648 wrote it into their creed that "it is the duty of people to pray for magistrates (they meant the government in all its branches), to honour their persons, to obey their lawful commands, and to be subject to their authority . . ." Yet in the very next year, 1649, some of those same religious men took off the head of King Charles I. How can men who believe that obeying laws and authority is a Christian duty, also become revolutionists?

For the People
Revolution is not something for every day or every generation. It is a desperate last resort. But as in the days of Ahijah, so since then it is true that a government which ceases to be of the people, for the people and by the people, has forfeited its right to respect. The reader of I Kings will discover a gem of wisdom in what the old counselors said to the young Rehoboam: "If you will be a servant to this people today and serve them . . . then they will be your servants forever." Rehoboam turned his back on this wisdom, looked on his royal power as a means of tyranny; and so Jeroboam's revolution had an easy victory.

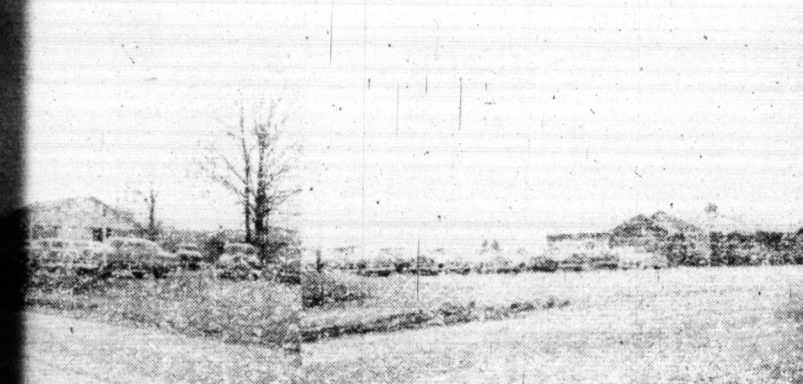

"Reports are far from complete," he said, "but preliminary reports reaching me from several counties raise the question of whether we will receive enough funds to carry out the program we anticipated."

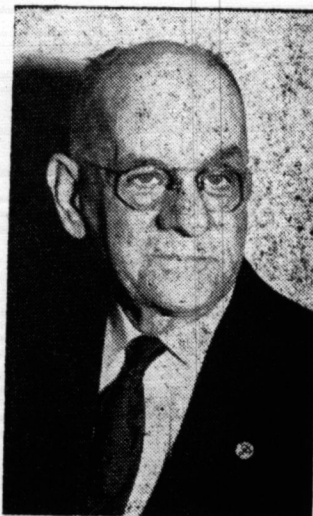

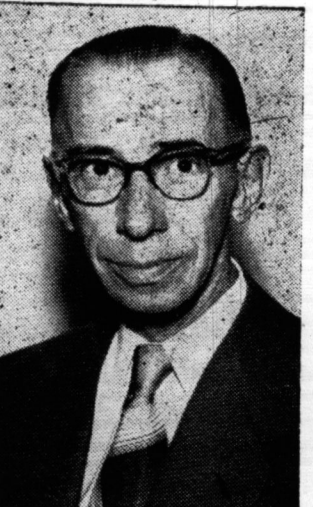

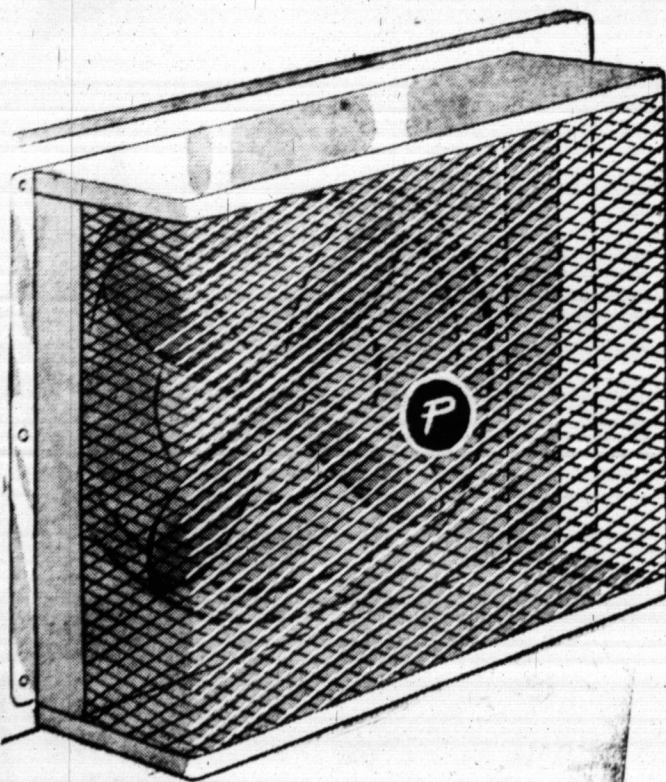

Kentucky Traffic Accidents in 1953 Killed 864 Persons

Kentucky automobile accidents took 864 lives during 1953 and cost an estimated \$2 million dollars, Charles B. Jones, executive secretary of the Governor's Committee for Highway Safety, reported last week.

He said the death figure compares with 797 for 1952, and is based on final calculations by state police. He said the monetary loss was estimated on a formula used by the National Safety Council, and included wage loss, overhead cost of insurance, medical expenses and property damage.

Traffic deaths totaled 105 in Kentucky by the end of March this year, compared with 185 for the same period, Jones said.

TOURIST BUSINESS GROWS

Frankfort—Kentucky's travel industry amounted to \$462,079,550 during 1953, according to a report made to Governor Wetherby by Mack Slisk, director of the division of publicity. This represents an increase of \$68,275,495 over the 1952 travel industry figure.

Goodrich Employees Turn Down Unions

Production and maintenance officials, who conducted the election, said only 12 of 53 voters were cast for either of the competing unions, who sought to be recognized as bargaining agents for the workers.

The final results showed 11 for the CIO United Gas, Coke and Chemical Workers of America, one for the International Association of Machinists, AFL, and 41 for no union representation. The \$6,000,000 Goodrich plant has been in operation 14 months. It manufactures vinyl chloride monomer, used in making vinyl plastics.

The election result means that the workers remain non-union for a year. At the end of that time, either or both unions may ask another election.

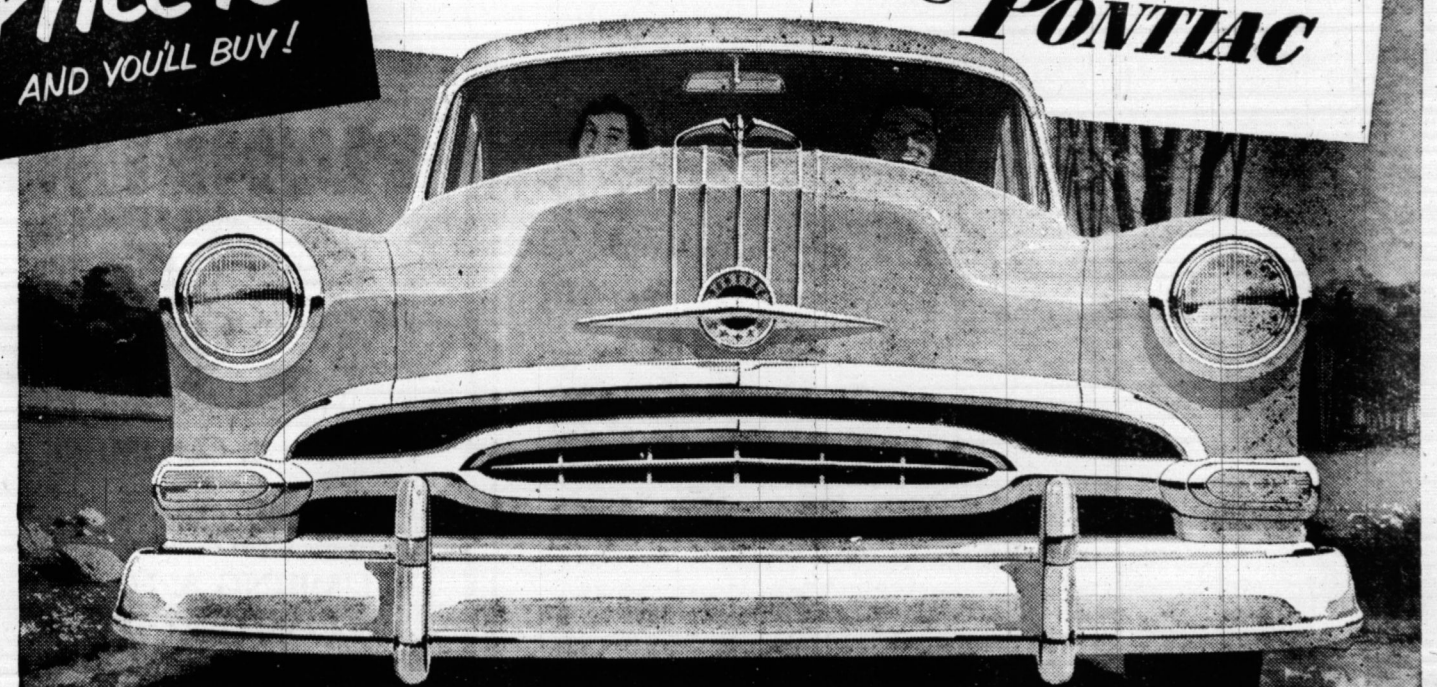

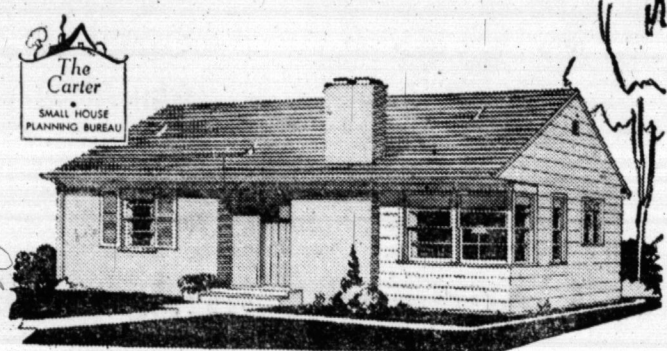

THE CARTER is a compact five-room house with three bed-rooms, kitchen dining space and eight closets. All of the bedrooms have closets; there is a coat closet in the living room; a linen cabinet and general closet in the hall and a kitchen broom closet.

The center bedroom can be converted into a workroom or play room by adding a door from the kitchen. All the rooms open into the central hall, insuring free circulation. The fireplace in front of the Carter forms one side of the entrance recess. The wide eave overhang protects both the entrance door and the corner windows. Between the fireplace and the corner a handy cabinet for magazines or other items, is built-in to window sill height.

The Carter's plans call for brick or stone veneer on the front, up to and including the chimney. The balance of the house is planned for frame with siding finish. Because of its straight wall lines, this plan is also adaptable to concrete block construction.

The Carter is 36 feet by 28 feet with an area of 1,030 square feet and a volume of 21,321 cubic feet.

Want to be Healthy? Eat a Big Breakfast

"Eating a good breakfast each day is good insurance toward more vim, vigor and vitality and good health," Dr. S. L. Henson, director, Marshall County Health Department, says.

"Far too many of us regard breakfast as unimportant," Dr. Henson adds, "and says that we don't have time or just can't eat so early in the morning."

Lunch and dinner can not make up for the absence of a nourishing breakfast. One-fourth to one-third of daily food needs should be obtained through breakfast menu.

Citrus fruits with vitamin C help to resist infection and build sound teeth and healthy gums. Protein needed for energy, growth and muscle repair is found in meats, eggs and cereals.

Enriched bread and cereal and vitamin B and the added milk is a source of calcium protein and riboflavin. Butter and margarine, sources of vitamin A, provide fuel and help eyesight, particularly at night.

People who eat good breakfasts, therefore, are more productive, quicker in reactions and do not tire easily, Dr. Henson says. A good breakfast helps

also to stave off a mid-morning slump.

By allowing a little more time each morning, and by doing a few chores the night before such as setting the table, preparing fruit juices or putting utensils and ingredients in handy locations—time may be saved, and energy gained. "Try breakfast menus that are appealing if you think you can't eat breakfast; start by eating a little and then the first thing you know you've acquired a habit that will mean much to-day and even more in later years," concludes Dr. Henson.

Farmers Purchase 16,089 Tons of Hay In Drought Program

Frankfort—Joe McCord, state hay administrator, Kentucky Department of Agriculture, has announced that 16,089 tons of hay have been purchased by Kentucky farmers as of March 31, under provisions of the federal-state drought relief program.

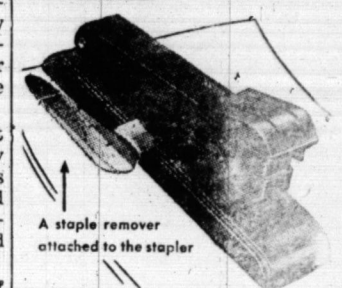
Farmers in the 80 drought designated counties of Kentucky are eligible for benefits in this program. They are reimbursed for 50 percent of the transportation charges on hay purchased to feed foundation herds.

McCord revealed that as of March 31, \$103,560 has been paid from federal funds to defray shipping costs of the Kentucky Hay Program. He stated that average federal payment per ton amounted to \$6.86. An additional 6,756 tons have been delivered to Kentucky farmers but the freight bills have not as yet been submitted to McCord's office for payment.

The Kentucky Hay Program will be in effect through April 30, 1954. Farmers and dealers are permitted until May 7 to file claim for freight reimbursement. Farmers are reminded that hay must be delivered to their farms on or before April 30 in order for them to receive

freight rate reductions.

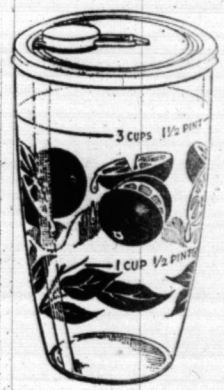

Soil Conservation Notes

Robert McKendree, south of Benton, is seeding six acres of pasture this spring. The required amounts of lime, phosphate, potash, and nitrogen will be applied. The Agricultural Conservation Program will share 50 percent of the cost of establishing the six acres.

Lex Byers, east of Hardin, says "I was one of the first farmers in my community to use lime. We hauled it by wagon and team from the railroad at Hardin."

Byers is still using lime. But he also applies the other plant food nutrients necessary for plant growth.

Homer Chester, Eura Mathis, Sam Gold, J. M. Solomon, Ren-ice Rudolph, supervisors of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District, held their monthly business meeting last week.

Among the items discussed was the small watershed bill, which has been passed by the House and is now before the Senate. This bill provides for federal funds to be used in watershed protection.

B. M. Copeland, Tatumville, completed a large stock water and fish pond last week. Approximately 9,000 cubic yards of earth were required to build the water impounding dam. The maximum depth of water will be six feet.

Ishmael Reed, Fairdealing, built a 7,000 foot diversion ditch last month. Hill water will be diverted from several acres of bottom land by the ditch.

The ditch was constructed in three hours with farm tractor and disc plow. The Soil Conservation Service helped Reed stake and build.

Edgar Karnes, Tatumville, cleared the brush from four acres of idle land last winter. Preparation of the seed bed has been started by plowing this spring.

Karnes will disc the land during the summer to kill out wild growth. By mid-August the seed bed will be packed and good condition for the seeding of

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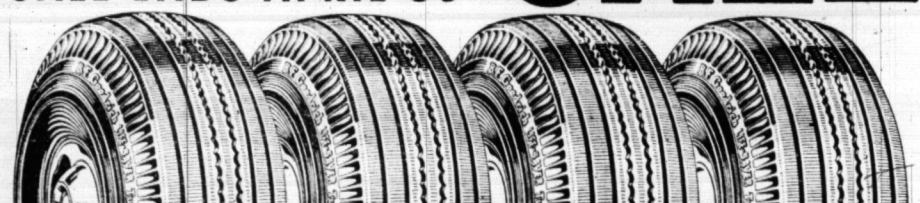

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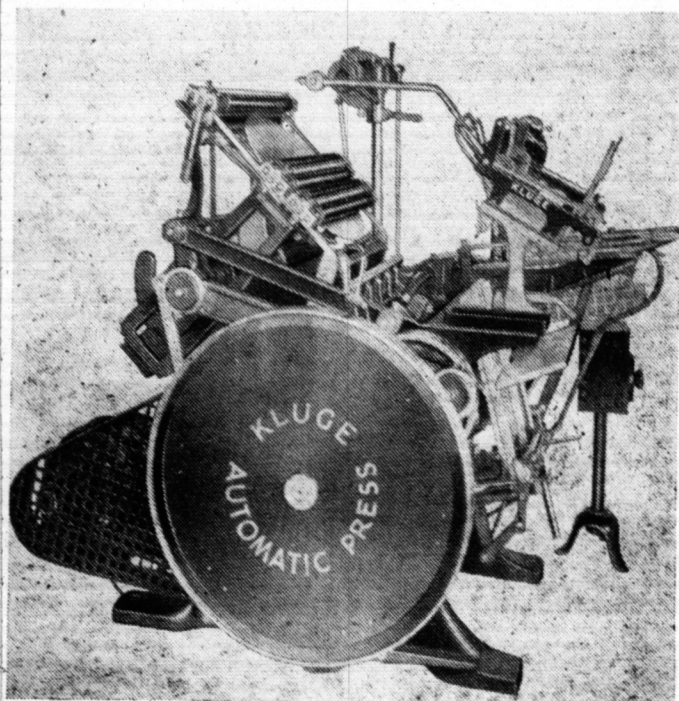
