MSU president search to continue

After nearly seven hours of closed-door discussions, the Murray State Board of Regents decided to continue the presidential search despite having the three finalists in town this week to meet with campus constituents.

"The board felt like they needed to continue to look for a candidate," Board of Regents chairman Don Sparks said. "The search will be continued and the pool expanded if the search firm comes up with some viable candidates."

The regents voted 11-0 to continue the search after coming out of closed session about 2 a.m. today. They had expected to hire a president Friday night and have someone officially in office this summer, but now they are looking toward late summer to possibly bring additional candidates.

While more candidates could

be included in the process, Sparks said the three already brought on campus won't be eliminated.

The 11-member board hosted the third finalist for dinner Friday and then began its closed session about 8:15 p.m., during which they evaluated the candidates with Korn/Ferry Inc. search consultant John Kuhnle. As regents took periodic breaks, they commented generally about how difficult a decision the presidential selection was turning out to be.

The board has served as the search committee since Dr. King Alexander announced in October he was leaving at the beginning of the year to take the helm at California State University-Long Beach. Since then, his father and former MSU president, Dr. Kern Alexander, has served in the interim. Sparks said the elder Alexander has agreed to stay on board until Aug. 1, but the regents likely

will have to appoint another interim to start the new school when they meet May 19.

Earlier in the day, as the third on-campus interview was well underway with Randy Dunn, state superintendent of education in Illinois, the two earlier candidates seemed to be the front runners, although Sparks wouldn't comment early this morning on whether that's how the private discussions played out among the regents.

The faculty members, who met for more than an hour Friday after their afternoon forum with Dunn, were fairly equally split between MSU's Associate Provost Tim Todd and University of Houston-Victoria President Tim Hudson. Specifically, a ballot among the faculty had 43 first-place votes for Hudson and 36 for Todd.

The two candidates were also close in second-place votes in the poll that requested ranking of the three finalists as

Hudson has 25 and Todd had 24. Dunn was least preferred candidate with 43 third-place votes.

After spending two decades at larger University of Southern Mississippi before leaving for Victoria, Texas, in September 2004, Hudson was attracted to the size at Murray State that allows for a friendly environment yet a wide array of student activities, including athletics, student government, fraternities, sororities and residential colleges.

During their meeting Friday afternoon, faculty members expressed concerns about information related to Hudson about the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accreditation at Southern Mississippi, not long before his departure as well as a situation involving post-tenure evaluations

CCHS seniors are NWS-trained weather spotters

Calloway County High School seniors Matthew Freeman and Talon Kirtley have an interest outside of the classroom that many others might not realize. The two students are weather spotters for the National Weather Service.

Freeman is based out of the Paducah office and Kirtley is associated with the Memphis office.

Kirtley, 18, has been involved with the process since 2000, although his father, Jimmy, has been a weather spotter for some time. Freeman, 17, became a weather spotter in 2003.

In order to become weather spotters the two young men attended a free course sponsored by the NWS. The course, which runs approximately five hours, teaches those attending such aspects as: what to watch for when spotting severe weather; what severe weather will look like; how to report severe weather conditions to authorities; and safety issues in various situations.

They said there are no pre-requirements and anyone interested in becoming a weather spotter can take the course. Kirtley said there was also lecture time from officials at the National Weather Service and Power Point presentations that made up a large portion of the class time. The two students also attend a refresher course once per year.

Kirtley said he has always been interested in the weather, but it was his father who got him interested in becoming a spotter for the NWS. Freeman said he became interested after he joined an Internet forum where he learned about amateur radios and later weather spotting.

With Freeman covering portions of the northern part of Calloway County and Kirtley working the southern portion of the county, the two youths are constantly keeping a watchful eye to the sky.

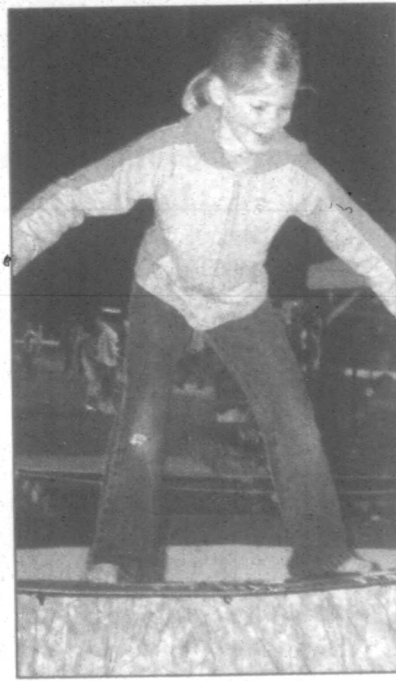
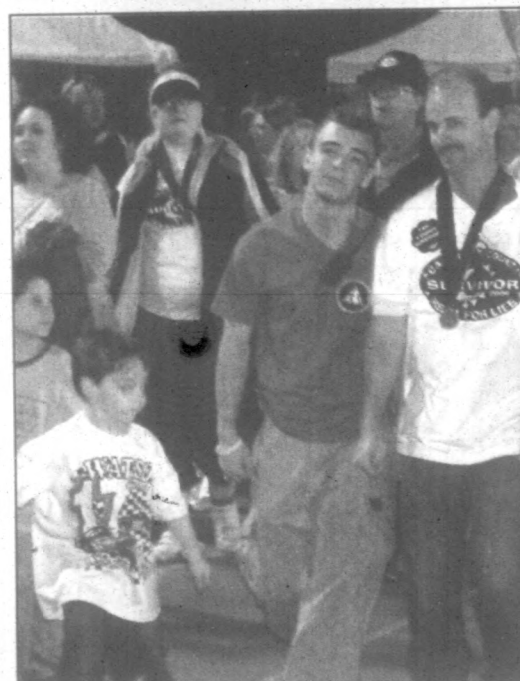
"I am allowed to go mobile whenever needed," Freeman said. "That allows me, when needed, to follow a storm and give updates." Kirtley agreed that he can also go mobile when necessary.

When reporting from the field, the men noted they are able to provide updates via radio transmissions whereby anyone listening with police scanners or weather radios can listen and be aware of possible severe

Tenn. teen convicted of killing bus driver

DOVER, Tenn. (AP) — A 16-year-old boy was convicted of murder Friday and sentenced to life in prison for shooting his school bus driver after she reported him for using smokeless tobacco on the bus.

Jason Clinard was 14 when he killed Joyce Gregory in front of his home in March 2005, but prosecutors tried him as an adult.

He will have to serve at least 51 years in prison before being eligible for parole.

"I feel justice was served today," said Joyce Gail Wyatt, the mother of the slain bus driver. "I asked God to handle it, and I think he did."

During the trial, Clinard's defense attorney acknowledged that he shot the 47-year-old bus driver, but he asked the jury to consider the lesser charge of manslaughter. He said Clinard had been depressed and suicidal and was hearing voices.

Prosecutors argued that Clinard planned the killing. His football coach, Myles Holliday, testified that he heard the teenager say he hated Gregory. When the driver opened the bus door to pick him up that day, he shot her six times, prosecutors said.

Clinard did not testify during the trial, which started Monday in this small town about 65 miles northwest of Nashville.

The jury began deliberating Thursday afternoon and returned a verdict before noon Friday.

Defense attorney Worth Lovett said he would file a motion for a new trial. He said Clinard was "heartbroken" after the verdict and asked him how long it would be before he was eligible for parole.

"I'm disappointed," Lovett said. "What good does it do

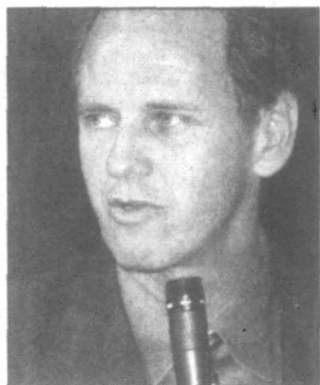
among faculty members there. Faculty Regent Terry Strieter said those situations came to light after Hudson off-campus interview last month. But Strieter also told faculty members he got satisfactory answers after the search consultant looked into the matters.

Some faculty members said they liked the way Hudson seemed to understand quality academic programs and extended campus as well as demonstrated a passion for international education. Yet others were put off by a seeming lack of passion for actually wanting the job.

A Western Kentucky University graduate, Todd considers Kern Alexander his mentor, but he said during a forum earlier this week that he didn't necessarily support his tactics in addressing concerns over the state budget, especially in the early stages with the governor's proposed spending plan.

Todd touted himself as a relationship builder, hoping to use skills he also has taught as a tenured organizational communication professor. He obviously needed less courtship with the campus, as he called many faculty, staff, students and community members by name.

During their meeting Friday afternoon, a couple faculty members said Todd impressed them — somewhat unexpectedly — with his interaction in his on-campus interview Wednesday.

One faculty member called him a brilliant, quick study who is a problem solver. With his existing ties in Murray and Frankfort, faculty seemed comfortable with having Todd lobby for their interests in the community and the statehouse.

The concerns expressed with Todd as president stem from his connection with the Alexanders — MSU's two immediate past presidents — and his limited teaching and publishing experience.

Earlier in the day the staff held a similar poll, although there was basically no discussion. But the staff overwhelmingly preferred Todd with 48 people considering him the best candidate. Dunn was the second-most preferred with 33 second-place votes. Thirty-three people considered Hudson the third choice.

Since September 2004, Dunn has served as Illinois' chief education officer for elementary and secondary education.

Gov. Rod Blagojevich appointed as the interim superintendent in 2004 and the temporary title was removed about 11 months later. Before the statewide title, Dunn was chairman of Southern Illinois University's educational administration and higher education department and had worked in several Illinois school districts.

During the forums on campus Friday, Dunn, who said he would not be available to officially take office at MSU until January because of his current job commitment, presented himself as an advocate-type leader. He talked about building on the university's growing national reputation and recruiting and retaining more minority faculty and students.

Addressing concerns that more and more students are coming to college in need of remedial education, especially in science and math, Dunn stressed the importance of partnering with local school districts.

100,000 crowd Churchill downs

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Elaine Sellers clutched her carry-on luggage and stood a little uncomfortably in the small grassy area just outside the first turn at Churchill Downs.

Wearing a black T-shirt and sweatpants, Sellers hadn't thought twice about her outfit when she and husband Rick decided to head straight to the track rather than their hotel room after their plane from Chicago arrived a little early on Friday morning.

The Sellers expected a decent crowd at Churchill for the Kentucky Oaks — a \$500,000-added Grade I stakes race for 3-year-old fillies — but they hadn't expected more than 100,000 people to cram the grandstand and the infield, many of them already dressed in their Derby best.

"I didn't think I'd be underdressed," Elaine said with a laugh. "But I only brought one hat, and I'm saving it for the Derby."

As the Sellers quickly found out, Oaks Day is no longer the Derby's sleepy cousin. Over the last 20 years, the day has taken on a following all its own — you could call it Derby-lite, a slightly kinder, slightly gentler alternative to the rowdiness of Derby Day.

"I actually prefer the Oaks," Rhonda Simpson said. "It's just a little more relaxed and friendlier."

A Louisville native, Simpson said she and a group of friends started buying tickets to the Oaks instead of the Derby because it was a little less crowded.

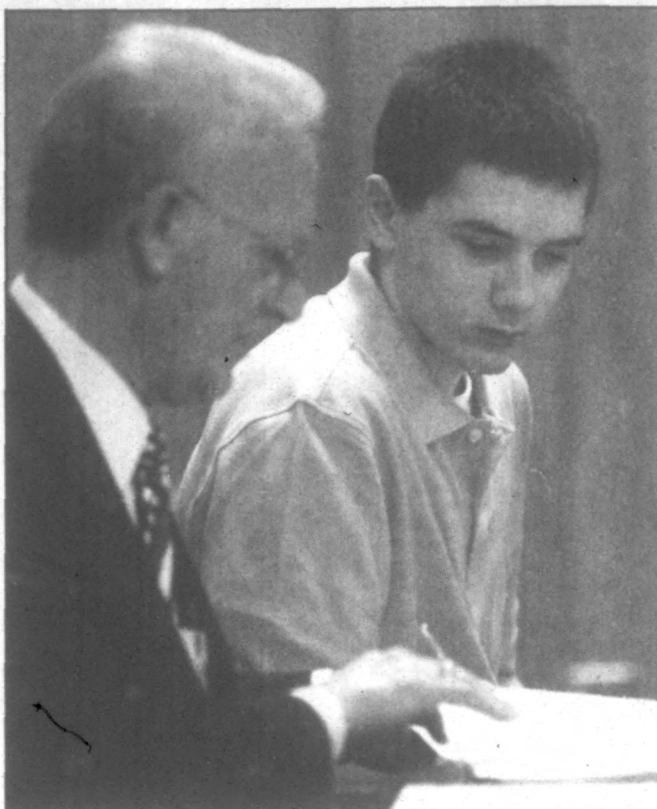

the state for him to spend years in prison? It wastes another life in addition to the life already wasted."

District Attorney Dan Alsobrooks said the verdict sent a message that school violence would not be tolerated.

"The verdict was in keeping with the facts of the case and the severity of what happened. This was Stewart County's Columbine," Alsobrooks said, referring to the fatal attacks at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colo., in 1999.

Prosecutors said Clinard planned the shooting because he was angry at Gregory for reporting him for using smoke-

less tobacco. He had also been in trouble for fighting on the bus and was suspended from school in February 2005 because of the two incidents.

The defense attorney said Clinard has expressed remorse for the shooting.

"He told me he prays often that he can go back and do that day over again," Lovett said. "There was no doubt in his mind that he had done the wrong thing and he was going to pay for it."

But Gregory's mother said she was not convinced Clinard was truly sorry.

"I never saw the look I was looking for," Wyatt said. "It bothers me that he showed no remorse."

Bud Wyatt, the bus driver's father, had more sympathy for the teenager who killed his daughter. He said he realized an example had to be made of Clinard, but he thought the verdict was "too rough."

Japanese plan \$49 million piston plant in Bardstown

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — A Japanese company will open a \$49 million piston-ring plant in central Kentucky, creating about 150 jobs.

Gov. Ernie Fletcher, accompanied by representatives from Nippon Piston Ring Co., announced the new plant at a press conference in the Capitol on Friday. The new plant, NPR Manufacturing Kentucky, is expected to open in Bardstown in October 2007, said

company president Yasuyoshi Egami.

The plant will produce steel piston rings for automobile engines. Toyota will be one of its primary customers.

The Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority has preliminarily approved Nippon Piston Ring Co. for up to \$4 million in tax benefits over 15 years, under the Kentucky Rural Economic Development Act.

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Mother of slain bus driver happy with 16-year-old killer's sentence

DOVER, Tenn. (AP) - With 16-year-old Jason Clinard sentenced to life in prison for killing her daughter, Joyce Gail Wyatt feels justice has been served.

But the boy's demeanor during the trial and after the verdict was read Friday left her wanting more.

"I never saw the look I was looking for," Wyatt said outside the courthouse. "It bothers me that he showed no remorse."

Clinard, a thin boy with short brown hair, looked stoical and almost relaxed as the jury returned its verdict.

But defense attorney Worth Lovett said Clinard deeply regrets shooting and killing school bus driver Joyce Gregory as she stopped to pick him up for school in March 2005.

"He told me he prays often that he can go back and do that day over again," Lovett said. "There was no doubt in his mind that he had done the wrong thing and he was going to pay for it."

Gregory, 47, had reported the 14-year-old for using smokeless tobacco on the bus, and, according to testimony, he hated her for it.

But Wyatt, the bus driver's father, expressed sympathy for the teenager, saying he realized an example had to be made of Clinard, but he thought the verdict was "too rough."

Lovett said he would file a motion for a new trial. He said Clinard was "heartbroken" after the verdict and asked when he would be eligible for parole. It will be 51 years.

weather conditions.

Both Freeman and Kirtley reported they can sign themselves out of school if weather conditions reach a point where spotters are needed. "We can step away from school when necessary. We are always prepared to go if needed," Both Kirtley and Freeman have radio equipment at hand or mounted in their vehicles. "Cell phone service can be spotty in stormy weather," Freeman explained.

He said he has seen considerable amounts of large hail, the most recent just over spring break. Kirtley said he had also seen lots of large hail and at one time witnessed a funnel

cloud. "The key is to stay out from under a storm, keep a right angle exit available and don't try to outrun a storm," Freeman added.

Kirtley said the two men mostly watch for situations that can result in damage to property or life such as hail, funnel clouds and dangerous winds.

"The National Weather Service needs actual visual observations from its spotters. Most of the time it's a common sense approach to reporting," he said.

"For instance, in reporting hail," Kirtley explained, "the services no long use such things as marble references. The size of hail is now described in coin references. It can be penny,

dime, nickel or quarter size. Then there are other references for larger hail that falls."

Freeman said the two work with law enforcement and public safety officials in a sense, but not directly.

"This can be a lot of fun and it can be interesting, but most of all you have to be serious. Extreme weather conditions can come up quickly. When storms threaten, residents need to always use caution and listen to the news or a NOAA weather radio. They need to heed severe storm warnings," Kirtley said.

He added that he would advise everyone to have a weather radio for their homes.

14-year-old suffocated by deputies at camp for teens

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - A 14-year-old boy who was roughed up by guards at a Panama City juvenile boot camp in a videotaped altercation died because the sheriff's officials suffocated him, Hillsborough County's medical examiner said Friday.

The findings of Dr. Vernard Adams's autopsy on Martin Lee Anderson conflict with the results of the initial one by Dr. Charles Siebert, the medical examiner for Bay County. He ruled the boy died of a natural death from complications of sickle cell trait, a usually benign blood disorder many blacks have.

"Martin Anderson's death was caused by suffocation due to actions of the guards at the boot camp," Adams wrote in a statement. He said the suffocation was caused by hands blocking the boy's mouth, as well as the "forced inhalation of ammonia fumes" that caused his vocal cords to spasm, blocking his upper airway.

The new findings were announced as part of an investigation by Hillsborough County State Attorney Mark Ober. Gov. Jeb Bush appointed him in February to investigate the death after Siebert's findings were disputed.

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Pumping gas and hot air

The free market will take care of the gas crisis. People are already taking steps to reduce their fuel consumption, curtailing unnecessary travel, driving slower, car pooling — all things that help reduce demand for gasoline at a time when the law of supply and demand decrees higher prices at the pump.

Nothing, however, is taking care of the gasbag crisis — the hemming and hawing of politicians doing their darnedest to pump votes out of the gas price hike.

would be willing to long forego a great source of tax revenue?

Despite the spurious claims of price gouging by the wicked oil barons or OPEC or your corner gas station, the reason for the present high price of gasoline is simply this: there are too many people consuming gas supplies and too little gas to meet the need. That's called the law of supply and demand, and no matter how hard the Marxists running the national Democrat party try, it's a law they can't repeal.

Last week I pointed out the profit EXXON made on each gallon of gas it sells amounts to about 10 cents. No matter how much gas they sell, and no matter how high the price at the pump, they make the same 10 cents. Government taxes take more than four times EXXON's first quarter profit, which amounted to more than \$8 billion because it sold a lot more gas around the world. Their profit at the pump, however, remained at 10 cents per gallon.

The reason why prices are going to stay high for the foreseeable future is the ever-increasing worldwide demand for crude oil. China and India, for example, are gobbling up massive amounts of the stuff, and are now competing with the U.S. to obtain more and more supplies of crude at our expense.

Once you understand these immutable facts of economics, it's easy to understand how asinine or just plain cynical is the reaction we are getting from Capitol Hill. Everybody is trying either to mine votes out of this issue or figure out how to stay out of the way of angry voters.

Almost to a man, the Democrats are marching to the tune of the old Communist hymn, "The Internationale," tossing out solutions from the playbook of Karl Marx. Take Sen. Charles Schumer's demand that Uncle Sam take a sledge hammer and break up the oil companies. Aside from the fact that there's not a thing in the U.S. Constitution that would allow the government to commandeer a whole industry and shape it as it wants it to be, Schumer's contention that it would result in lower prices is wishful thinking.

Asserting that he wants to enhance competition — leading to lower prices as the smaller companies compete at the pump by staging price wars — is sheer demagoguery and meant more to score political points than to solve the problem.

Almost as silly was the GOP plan, now tossed out, to give every American \$100 to ease our pain we're feeling at the gas pump. I'd be willing to send them \$100 if they'd just shut up.

Finally, if you are looking for someone to blame, look at Senator Schumer and his Democrat colleagues and their envirocrazy allies — this problem could have been solved years ago and we could be awash in gasoline had they not refused to allow drilling in ANWAR, in offshore areas, and by using draconian environmental regulations preventing the building of refineries for the past three decades.



Receiving honors is receiving obligations

High school and college commencements have already begun, cause for celebrations and congratulations for thousands of students and their long-suffering parents.

But preceding the season of graduations is another celebratory season, that of honors ceremonies.

Last month, we attended an induction banquet for members of Phi Kappa Phi honor society at Morehead State University in Kentucky. Last week we attended the Honors Day Convocation here at Wofford College (at which about a dozen of my seminar students received awards).

This week we are attending the Top Ten Banquet in Paris, Tenn., honoring high achievers in the county's high schools and middle schools. Over the years, we have attended several hundred honor ceremonies of assorted types at assorted educational institutions.

Sometimes, as we hear accomplishment cited and watch certificates being handed out, we ask ourselves, "Is getting awards and recognitions while so young a good thing? Will the recipients take their talents and awards for granted as they enter the wider world? Are they peaking too early in the lives?"

But there is no empirical evidence, in students I have watched grow up and engage in the real world, that they have been spoiled by success. They have simply made remarkable

records for themselves in their coursework and in their activities, records worthy of milestone-type praise along their way.

But another question I ponder at these ceremonies is this: "Can these touted students use their awarded abilities for the betterment of the human race? Will these young leaders accept responsibilities that are required of leaders?"

We feel, rather strongly, that receiving academic and service honors in school days carries with it an authentic obligation for their society and for others.

Honors go to students who dare to think and to take risks, students who cherish creativity and curiosity and contrariness, imagination and initiative and intellect, students who are clearly at the head of their class, students who form what Thomas Jefferson and John Adams called a "natural aristocracy."

While believing passionately that "all men are created equal," Jefferson favored a system of education in which the best and brightest rose to the top, training to become elite leaders who with their virtues would replace the Founding Fathers and renew the Republic generation after generation.

But Jefferson lived to see his natural aristocracy slipping away. Jacksonian democracy expanded the middle class at the expense of the educated class, and James Fenimore Cooper fretted over that. Asked, "What then do you deem our greatest error—our weakest point?", Cooper replied: "Provincialisms, with their train of narrow prejudices, and a disposition to set up mediocrity as perfection." In

France, Alexis de Tocqueville made the same point: "A middling standard is fixed in America for human knowledge."

The idea of a "common man" leaves little room for uncommon ones. The danger for a democracy is in reducing its people to some lowest common denominator. People are alike in birth and in death, in their legal and human rights, in their political rights, and in their rights to equal opportunities. Thank God for that.

But they are not alike in their interests, in their abilities, or in their intelligence. We need uncommon leaders to lift the fates and visions of the common people; we need meritorious leaders to wage war on mediocrity.

American culture has been gobbled up by mounting waves of cultural mediocrity, the kudzu of the mind. Getting and spending and self-gratification are the driving forces of our times, and swept by those irresistible forces, the cultural refinements of civilization have been diminished.

From whence will come leaders able to color outside the lines of race, of poverty, of sickness, of crime, and of energy and environment? Who will color into our society symphony orchestras, art galleries, poetry, books, operas, bilingualism, and meaningful conversations? Such creative honors students are harder and harder to find, because we settle invisibly and comfortably for "a middling standard".

Honor entails obligation. You can't frame your duty and hang it on the wall. You have to enact it, live it, and breathe it. We need to replenish the leadership blood of the nation.

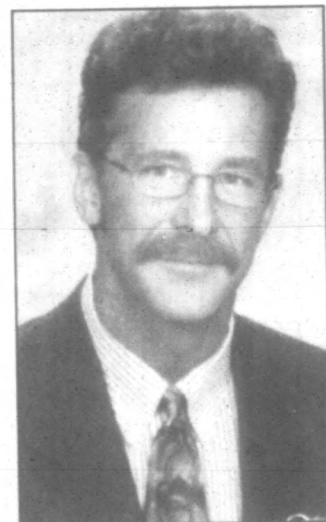

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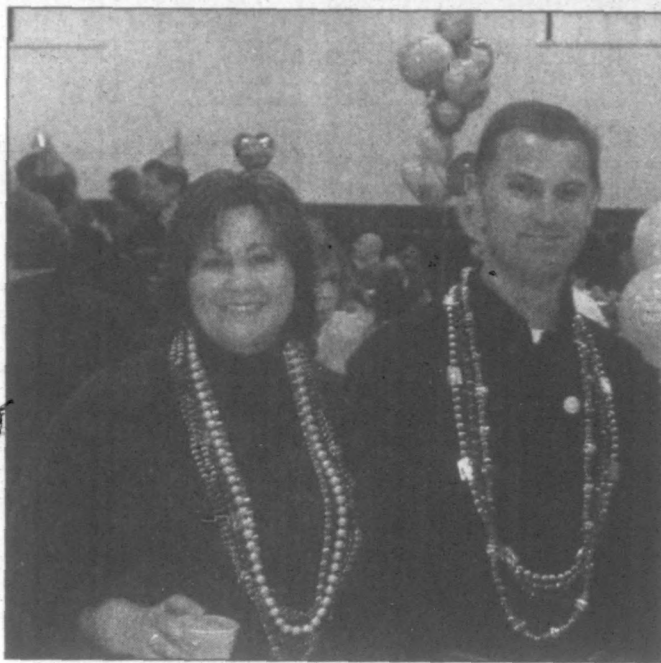

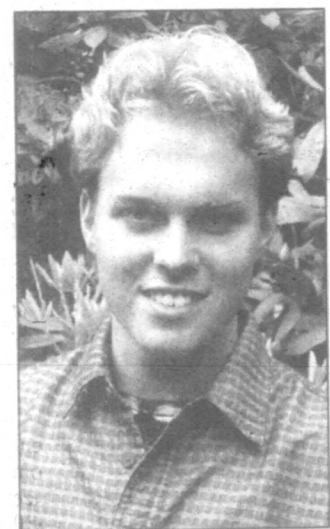

Emily Gann, a senior from Marshall County High School was also selected to receive a \$625 scholarship from the First District Woman's Clubs.

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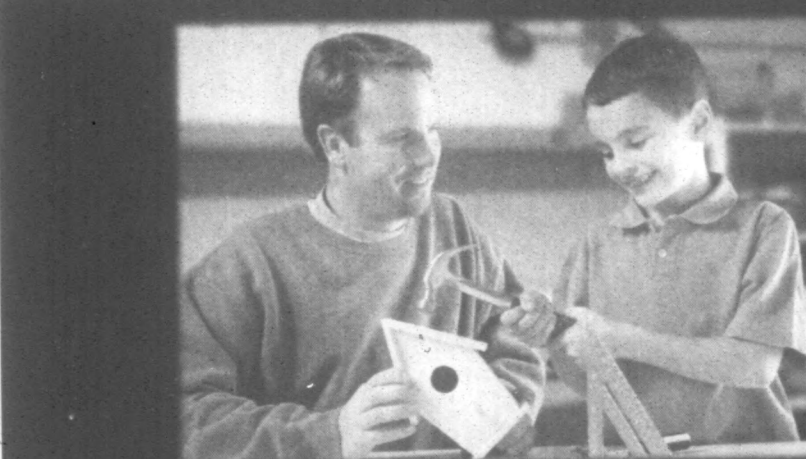
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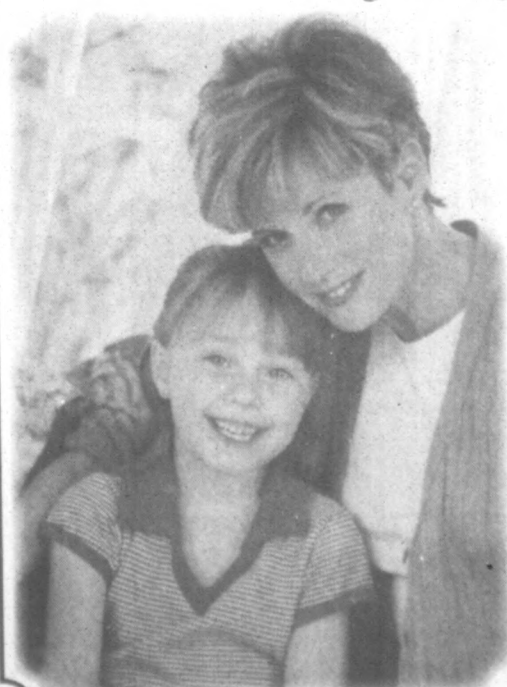
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Microsoft delays new Windows again

For those of us anxiously awaiting the release of the new Microsoft Windows Vista operating system it seems that we are going to have yet another delay. Microsoft is delaying the release of the new version of Windows by at least three more months. It also appears that the Server version is being pushed out even further.

Reuters News Service gave the following news release on May 2, 2006: "Microsoft Corp.'s (MSFT.O: Quote, Profile, Research) long-awaited release of the upgrade to its flagship Windows operating system will likely be delayed again by at least three months, research group Gartner Inc. (IT.N: Quote, Profile, Research) said on Tuesday.

"The research note, released to clients on Monday, said the new Windows Vista operating system is too complex to be able to meet Microsoft's targeted November release for volume license customers and January launch for retail consumers.

"A Microsoft spokeswoman said the company disagreed with the Gartner report and it was still on track to meet its launch dates.

"Vista is the first major overhaul of its operating system, which sits on 90 percent of the world's computers and accounts for nearly a third of Microsoft's total revenue, since Microsoft rolled out Windows XP nearly five years ago.

"Microsoft originally targeted a 2005 launch for the new Windows, and then pushed the release out to 2006 before announcing in March that Vista would again be delayed to improve the product's quality.

"Gartner targets a Windows Vista release in the April-June quarter of 2007, nine to 12 months after Microsoft conducts a second major test, or "beta," release for Vista during the current quarter.

"Microsoft still wants to get it out as soon as possible, but slipping from January to March is nowhere near as bad as slipping from shipping before the holidays to after the holidays," a group of Gartner analysts wrote in the report.

"Gartner said Windows XP took five months to go from a second test release to the start of production, but the magnitude of technological improvement in Vista is closer to Windows 2000, which took 16 months between the second test and production.

"Once production starts, it usually takes between six to eight weeks for PC manufacturers to load the operating system onto new computers, Gartner said."

What does this mean for us? More security patches for XP and probably a service pack 3 being issued before we see the new version of windows. For the Computer manufacturers it means that there will be no operating system to take full use of the new dual core processors and the multicore (4) processors that are supposed to be out by Christmas.

Stumbo goes to court over purged voter rolls

FRANKFORT, Ky. (AP) — The attorney general is asking a Franklin County judge to restore the names of about 8,000 people who were purged from voter rolls in Kentucky because they appeared to be registered to vote in other states as well.

Assistant Attorney General Robert Jones said he is concerned that legitimate voters may have been disqualified in the process, and that's why he filed a lawsuit on Friday.

Jones hopes a judge will order the names restored before the May 16 primary election.

"That's our goal," he said. "In fact, that's why we have had to move very quickly filing this lawsuit."

Jones asked for a hearing to be scheduled next week on the issue.

Les Fugate, spokesman for Secretary of State Trey Grayson, said his office compared lists of voters registered in Kentucky, Tennessee and South Carolina. Only those whose names and Social Security numbers matched voters in the other states were purged, he said.

"The state board of elections took great pains to make sure this process was accurate and appropriate," Fugate said. "Any voter who is inadvertently deleted from the rolls is protected by statute and with proper recourse will have the opportunity to vote on election day."

Grayson announced the massive purge on April 24, saying it was done to prevent the possibility of election fraud by people who may try to vote in more than one state for national-level candidates.

Kentucky worked with South Carolina and Tennessee to compare voter databases.

gallon in about three days. Even so, I've always eaten food, which I consider healthy. I'm a diehard outdoorsman. I've always been sorta skinny with a light bone structure. I now weigh about what I did as a teenager. Am I a freak?

DEAR READER: Far from it. You are enjoying the consequences of a healthful lifestyle. Keep up the good work.

My definition of a health freak includes the typical oldie who smokes, is sedentary and puts up with progressive weight gain. This ain't you.

DEAR DR. GOTT: As I age, numerous "skin tags" have appeared on my body. My medical insurance does not cover their removal, and I cannot afford to do so. Is there an over-the-counter remedy I could use to get rid of them?

Since I have had skin cancer, I see my dermatologist about every six months.

DEAR READER: The fact that you have suffered from skin cancer is reason enough to have periodic check-ups by a dermatologist, whether or not

you have harmless skin tags that affect us oldies. I am unaware of any creams or lotions to treat this common disorder. Biopsies may be necessary. I urge you to meet with your dermatologist to explore options. If you have a suspicious lesion, for example, it should be biopsied or removed; at the same time, the skin tags could be taken care of. You and the specialist can work out a coding strategy that your insurance company should honor.

To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "What You Should Know: Skin Cancer."

DEAR DR. GOTT: How much of a health hazard is asbestos? All of our floors are asbestos squares, which we have covered with rugs, except for two closets and the kitchen, and that room is a laminate floor. I have heard asbestos can cause cancer: true or false? If it ever cracks under the carpets, is it serious?

DEAR READER: Asbestos fibers, when inhaled, may lead to serious lung scarring and, eventually, to lung cancer; however, old houses with asbestos flooring are not a health risk unless the tiles are disrupted and release fibers into the air. Such free-floating contaminants can then be inhaled.

If you choose to have your flooring replaced, the work should be carried out by experienced experts who will wear protective clothing and employ methods to prevent the asbestos fibers from becoming airborne.

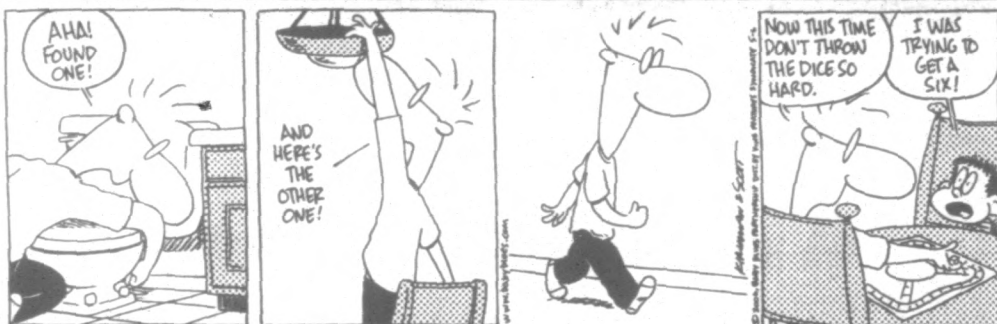

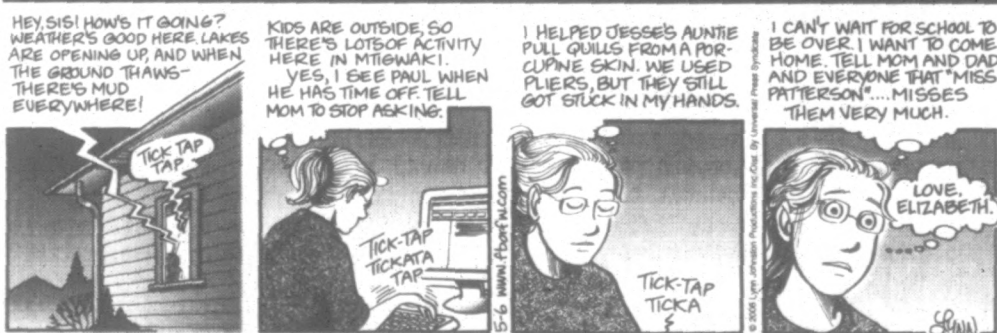

Although bridge is primarily a game of percentages, it nevertheless offers plenty of opportunity for ingenuity. For example, take this case where South got to four spades on the bidding shown. West led the ace and another club, declarer ruffing high when East continued the suit at trick three.

Having lost the first two tricks, and with the ace of hearts also a certain loser, declarer had to try to find

a way to avoid losing any diamonds. This seemed an impossible task, for while one diamond loser could eventually be discarded on a high heart, there seemed to be no way to avoid the other one.

Declarer considered the possibility of leading a heart toward dummy, hoping West would make the mistake of rising with the ace if he had it. But South dismissed this thought because he felt certain East had the ace of hearts for his vulnerable overall once West had shown up with the ace of clubs.

South therefore concluded that his only possible chance for the contract was to lay a trap for East. Accordingly, at trick four he crossed to the queen of spades and returned the deuce of hearts!

It was very difficult for East to imagine that South would make this play without holding the jack of hearts, so, afraid that the jack might be singleton, he rushed up with the ace. South later discarded both his diamond losers on the K-Q of hearts and wound up making four spades.

You could argue, quite justifiably, that East made a poor defensive play, but even if the play had failed, you would still have to give South an A for effort.

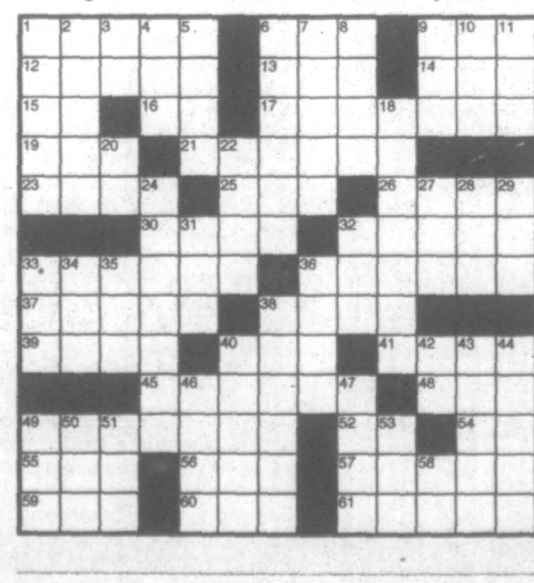

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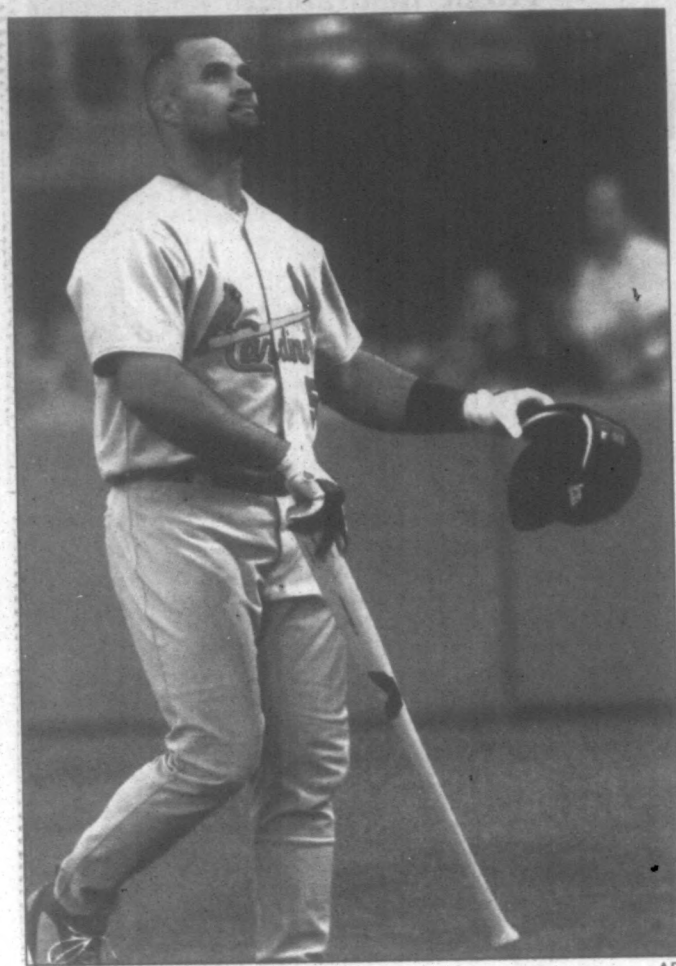

Pujols' homer highlights St. Louis win

MIAMI (AP) — Some of the lights went out Friday night at Dolphin Stadium, forcing a delay in the fourth inning of the Florida Marlins' game against the St. Louis Cardinals.

The power outage didn't last long — not with Albert Pujols around.

Pujols hit his 16th home run to spark a seven-run fifth inning, and the Cardinals beat Florida 7-2 to snap a four-game losing streak, their longest since the 2004 World Series.

Playing in his team's 30th game, Pujols tied Cy Williams of the 1923 Philadelphia Phillies for the fewest games needed to reach 16 homers.

Imagine Pujols' pace if he was healthy. He sat out Tuesday's game because of a stiff back, and fouled a ball off his left ankle Thursday.

"I feel a little sore," he said. "There are some things I can't do playing defense. Hopefully it's getting better. I've played hurt before. I've just got to play smart and not push it."

Jeff Suppan (3-2) won his third consecutive start, allowing five hits and two runs in 8 1-3 innings. After St. Louis gave him a lead, he retired 10 in a row.

"He was a master," manager Tony La Russa said. "He made so many great pitches."

The Cardinals, who matched a franchise record for April victories with 17, had been winless in May. They snapped an even

longer streak: 13 consecutive losses on Cinco de Mayo since winning on May 5, 1992.

"I was unaware of that. Thirteen? Wow," Suppan said, tongue in cheek. "I'm happy to be a part of this."

The game was halted for 18 minutes in the fourth inning when the lights malfunctioned. Unfortunately for the Marlins, power was restored, and they lost their eighth home game in a row.

Sergio Mitre (1-4) shut out the Cardinals for four innings, but retired only one more batter while giving up all seven runs in the fifth.

"A terrible job," said Mitre, who lost his fourth consecutive decision. "One inning will kill you."

David Eckstein walked and John Rodriguez singled to start the fifth, and Pujols hit the first pitch into the right-field stands to break a scoreless tie.

"It's exciting when they have to come in to him," Suppan said. "Watching him is so impressive."

The Marlins unraveled from there. Jim Edmonds and Scott Rolen singled, and both advanced on an error by center fielder Reggie Abercrombie. Following a groundout, Gary Bennett hit a two-run single through the drawn-in infield.

Aaron Miles reached on a bunt single, and an errant throw by catcher Matt Treanor put runners at second and third. Suppan singled home a run, prompting boos from the crowd of 13,266, and Eckstein's sacrifice fly put the Cardinals ahead 7-0.

Baseball will mark balls for Bonds' quest

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Baseball is using specially marked balls for Barry Bonds' at-bats now that he is closing in on Babe Ruth.

Bonds has 712 home runs, two shy of tying Ruth for second place on the career list. The marked balls were first put into play during the San Francisco slugger's at-bats Friday night, when he and the Giants lost 8-3 to the Philadelphia Phillies.

Originally, the commissioner's office did not plan to mark any balls while Bonds is chasing Ruth. But Bob DuPuy, baseball's chief operating officer, decided late Thursday it was best to authenticate any potentially historic home run balls hit by Bonds, spokesman Pat Courtney said.

That way, the fans who might catch No. 713, No. 714 and No. 715 will be able to prove they have the real thing, avoiding multiple claims of ownership. Baseball's decision was first reported by ESPN.com.

Sutton pleads no contest

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma State men's basketball coach Eddie Sutton pleaded no contest Friday to drunken driving charges stemming from an accident in which his SUV swerved, collided with another vehicle and then hit a tree.

Sutton was charged with misdemeanor aggravated drunken driving, speeding and driving on the wrong side of the road after the Feb. 10 crash.

Sutton, wearing a gray suit and a tie, said "Yes, sir" when asked by Special Judge Michael Stano if he understood the charges against him and again if he understood that entering a plea would forfeit his rights to a trial.

When asked for his plea, he said deliberately, "No contest." Stano accepted Sutton's plea, which was part of an agreement with prosecutors.

Prosecutors recommended a one-year deferred sentence for Sutton and asked he be required to pay a \$500 fine plus about \$900 in other fees, including court costs. Sutton already has completed an alcohol treatment program that also was part of the deal, a prosecutor said.

He also will be required to attend a victim impact panel and may be asked to pay restitution, depending on the outcome of an Aug. 8 hearing.

Payne County District Attorney Rob Hudson said the punishment was typical for defendants with no prior criminal record and added that the counseling and treatment Sutton continues to receive were important parts of the agreement.

"I recognize the importance of accepting

responsibility for one's own actions. That is what I'm doing today," Sutton said in a statement. "Alcoholism is a terrible disease and I cannot stress its seriousness. I remain grateful no one was injured in the accident."

"I accept the consequences and I am ready to move ahead."

The accident occurred while he was on his way to the airport to catch a team flight for a trip to play Texas A&M. The woman in the other vehicle, Teresa Barnard, was not hurt. Sutton was cut and bruised but escaped serious injury. Barnard attended the hearing.

Court records showed his blood alcohol level was 0.22, almost three times the legal limit.

Since the accident, the 70-year-old Sutton has undergone surgery to relieve back and hip pain brought on by a pair of spills two years ago and he also went through a five-week inpatient alcohol treatment program.

Winner may depend on start

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Dan Hendricks easily maneuvered his wheelchair outside Barn 42 at Churchill Downs for a final chat on the day before the Kentucky Derby.

Since being paralyzed from the waist down in a motocross accident two years ago, the 47-year-old trainer has found it challenging to do his job. But in the same way Hendricks has learned to adapt, he hopes jockey Alex Solis can give his Derby favorite, Brother Derek, a smooth ride in a contentious field of 20 talented 3-year-olds.

The biggest question surrounding Saturday's \$2 million Kentucky Derby is how the race will unfold when the starting gate springs open: Will speed rule or ruin favorites Brother Derek, Barbaro and Lawyer Ron?

"We won't be out there first, we'll be out there right behind the speed and, hopefully, it's a nice clean trip and not too rough," Hendricks said Friday.

"I'd have to imagine we'd take the lead just past the quarter pole," he added. "Usually horses in front by the eighth pole win it."

Of course, every other Derby trainer has his own winning scenario, but Brother Derek is the horse to beat.

A winner in his three starts this year, Brother Derek is the 3-1 morning line favorite despite challengers that

include Lawyer Ron, winner of six in a row, unbeaten Barbaro and a trio of horses trained by three-time Derby winner Bob Baffert — Bob and John, Point Determined and Sinister Minister.

Michael Matz, a three-time Olympian in equestrian who survived a plane crash 17 years ago, trains Barbaro. Standing on the other end of Barn 42, he, too, had a winning ride in mind for jockey Edgar Prado.

"The ideal setup is the speed horses go out there, and

like Dan's horse, I should be in the second group," he said. "Hopefully, we'll be in good striking range when they turn for the corner down the stretch — and may the best horse win."

A case could be made for just about every horse in the field. The key to the 132nd Derby, though, could be the first quarter mile. Start too fast, and there's not enough energy for a finishing kick. Hang back too far, and the stretch might set up for horses who love to

come from behind.

Sinister Minister is a given to set the pace following his wire-to-wire romp in the Blue Grass Stakes three weeks ago. Sharp Humor and Keyed Entry, who also love the lead, should be out front, too.

The three favorites all have similar styles, preferring to run on or just off the lead. But with a huge field, Brother Derek, Barbaro and Lawyer Ron may be farther behind than usual.

And that's where the intrigue comes in. Who moves first? Who follows? And what about the closers like A.P. Warrior, Jazil and Steppenwolf?

"Roll the dice," two-time Derby winning jockey Chris McCarron said.

Last year, 50-1 long shot Giacomo won with a dramatic finishing kick. Just the opposite happened four years ago when War Emblem went wire-to-wire.

A few other Derby winning trainers are back — Shirreffs, who trains Giacomo, will send out A.P. Warrior. Barclay Tagg, who won the 2003 Derby with Funny Cide, trains Showing Up, unraced last year and 3-for-3 this year.

"There's only one Derby and he's only 3 years old once," Tagg said.

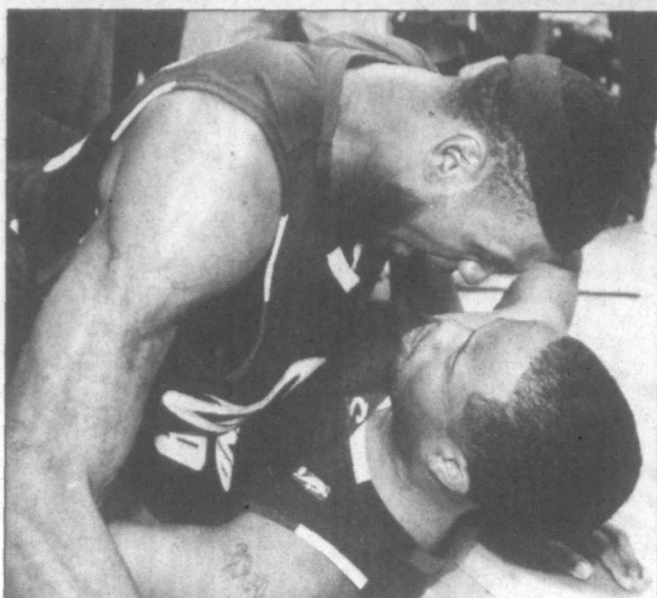
Barbaro and Showing Up are both owned by Gretchen and Roy Jackson's Lael Stable in Pennsylvania.

Cavs advance on buzzer-beater

WASHINGTON (AP) — It was Damon Jones' turn to hit the game-winning shot, and it put the Cleveland Cavaliers into the second round of the playoffs for the first time in 13 years.

Jones' 17-foot baseline jumper with 4.8 seconds remaining in overtime gave the Cavaliers a 114-113 victory over the Washington Wizards on Friday night, Cleveland's third one-point victory in a series that ended with the visitors celebrating in a pile near midcourt and left the home team stunned into silence.

LeBron James, who made the winning shots in Games 3 and 5, scored 32 points as his first playoff series ended in success. He outdueled Gilbert Arenas, who scored 36 points and sent the game to overtime with a long 3-pointer — then missed two free

throws in overtime that gave Cleveland the chance to win.

Cavaliers won two road games in a playoff series for the first time in franchise history and won a playoff series for the first time since 1993, when

James was 8 years old. They will have little time to celebrate. They open the second round at Detroit on Sunday.

The last two games of the series went to overtime, and Game 6 was tight once the

Cavaliers overcame the Wizards' 14-point first-quarter lead. For 24 minutes — from early in the second quarter to early in the fourth — neither team led by more than five points.

Jones was a marginal player in the series, and he was on the court for only the final sequence of Game 6. His line: 1-for-1 with 2 points in 14 seconds of play.

James shot 15-for-25 and had seven rebounds, seven assists and five turnovers.

He had a pair of key blocks and persevered after getting knocked woozy in a collision with Wizards center Brendan Haywood early in the fourth quarter.

Donyell Marshall scored a season-high 28 points, and Flip Murray had 21 for the Cavaliers.

Antonio Daniels scored 22 for the Wizards. Caron Butler had 18 points and 20 rebounds. Antawn Jamison was in foul trouble much of the night and finished with 15 points.

The Wizards blew a seven-point lead with 4:48 to play in regulation and needed Arenas' 30-footer with 2.3 seconds to play to send the game to overtime.

ATLANTA (AP) — Billy Payne, who ran the Atlanta Olympics a decade ago, is replacing Hootie Johnson as chairman of Augusta National Golf Club, home of the Masters.

The 75-year-old Johnson had served in the role since 1998, most prominently

turning back demands that women be allowed to join the club.

Johnson also ordered two major overhauls of the course, adding 460 yards — making it the second-longest test in major championship history — to counter rapidly improving equipment and longer-hitting players.

A South Carolina native and member of the club since 1968, Johnson is relinquishing his title on May 21 and moving into the role of chairman emeritus. Payne will become the sixth

chairman in club history.

"The tournament is successful by any measure and will continue to grow," Johnson said in a statement. "I know I leave the championship in very capable hands."

The 58-year-old Payne has headed the Masters media committee since 2000.

"It's an honor to be the new chairman of Augusta National Golf Club and the Masters tournament," he said in the statement. "Hootie did a wonderful job as chairman, and I will endeavor to maintain the customs and traditions of our club as established by (co-founders) Clifford Roberts and Bobby Jones."

Payne was not immediately available for further comment.

The major crappie run is over, but many of these great fish hang around to eat as much as possible and rebuild their body strength. They probably can be caught in those same areas throughout the month of June.

Bill and Joe were quick to catch on to the light bite as we traveled the bays casting and catching big crappie and bluegill.

It was definitely a light bite. They had to be on guard at all times.

Some of the bluegill are really huge. They are almost as much fun as the crappie!

We fished a couple of days and ended with a good selection of great-eating fish.

I assure you that both Joe and Bill are avid and excellent anglers. We had a great time together!

I suggested that they hook up with me in July — when the mayflies are hatching — if they really want to catch some fish! Thanks, Joe and Bill.

We had a nasty day of weather last Saturday. I advised the guys that we really didn't have the weather that allows for good fishing. But they had traveled some distance and wanted to go out anyway.

I eventually gave in to their wishes. We wanted to see if we could possibly get to Anderson Bay in order to fish the south bank. We were in sight of the bay when a giant wave came completely over my boat and us!

That was it! We turned around and changed our minds. The wave was so huge that it went right over our heads!

A piece of trash landed under my left eyelid. I had to seek relief at Murray-Calloway County Hospital that evening. Joe Crawford was the man in the emergency room who flushed the trash out of my eye very efficiently.

I met with a good friend, Eric Sorrells, on Monday. We traveled to some of the larger bays to look for the remaining crappie population. The winds were calm — it was a perfect morning!

Knowing that it wouldn't last, we didn't waste any time. We continued to cast the roadrunner jigs along the shelves of old ridges and creek channels, looking for the crappie.

The crappie were there in small groups, but they were very hungry and were really smacking the jigs hard. Eric had fished with me last year, and we really smoked the bass on a couple of trips!

We traveled a little ways so we could get the strikes from some real slab crappie and big bluegill that were along the ledges of the old road beds in the bays. It was loads of fun!

Eric is an avid angler. He is eager to learn some new tricks that will pay off in more strikes!

Kentucky Lake is in very good shape. The rains have come in abundance, which has kept the waters in the high 60s.

It seems as if the reproduc-

tion process of all species is in order and going well.

Each step depends on another, coming around to complete the continuation of all of our native species. Hopefully, the possession limit and creel limit of the big shellcrackers will help save the population in Kentucky Lake.

The daily limit is 20 shellcrackers per licensed angler. That limit is due to the fact that so many thousands were taken by persons who gilled these fish at night from shallow-running, battery-powered boats and bright lights. The limit was established to protect the species.

Both species of crappie seem to have done well at spawning, so hopefully next year there will be more to catch. Our white strippers, yellow strippers and rockfish strippers and hybrids will soon complete their spawning and begin to look for the shad baitfish.

The shad baitfish is their major food source, but it's not the only one. Soon, we will see schools of tiny baitfish on the surface.

They will be traveling about, trying to survive the onslaught of the many predator species that eat them.

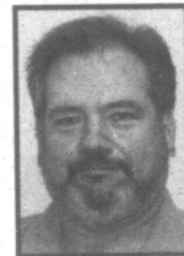
School will soon be out for the summer. I am suggesting that you take your young anglers out. Remember how much fun you had out on the lake!

Local hunter spends last day on the mountain

The day had been long on hope but short on promise as gusts of wind wracked the tops of the trees. The rain had returned although the sun had managed to peek through the clouds, but for the briefest of moments.

The scene was reminiscent of two years ago, when I had spent the last Sunday of the Alabama spring turkey season in an adjacent field, enduring frequent downpours and a cold wind.

That cold wind was nothing compared to that of the Chairman when I missed our departure time by five hours just because three long-bearded turkeys had remained in the field throughout the rainstorms.

There were no gobblers in my field today, only a hen or two. It was 11 a.m. and the time had come to go home. I folded and packed the ground blind that had kept me dry throughout the morning's showers, gathered the gear and retrieved a lonely pair of decoys. With the gear strapped to the four-wheeler, I paused to snap a few photos before pattering across the field.

Although it had rained, the river had yet to rise. I could cross at the usual crossing point just as I had done the day before, and be back at the truck in minutes. But instead, I turned the opposite way and took the long way home.

I would love to have taken several of the various roads that fanned out across the valley or "cove" as the locals say. Although a regular visitor to these parts for several years, there were still roads I had yet to travel just as there were

trails I had ridden in years past and yearned to do so again. But to do so would take hours that I did not have, especially since the rain had returned.

For a little way, I retraced the path I had taken more than a dozen years ago, bouncing along in the guide's truck as we climbed higher and higher up the mountain in the early darkness along what came to be called the "Skidder" road. I spent two days hunting deer high on that mountainside on our first trip ever to the Paint Rock Valley Lodge.

Dropping off to one side of the narrow finger of mountain that extended toward the river, I passed the cedar thickets and pine groves that were always magnets for deer and turkey. I had worked a turkey here on opening day three or four years ago, then lost him when he spooked at the slightest of movement.

The road turns here, running parallel to the river past old home-places that are revealed only by an occasional clump of lilies or yucca plants. The road turns toward the river and falls down a steep slope near a small clearing.

Another road forks right and continues along the mountainside toward a deep ravine called Anderson's Hollow. One rainy morning several years ago, I hiked around the head of the ravine from the opposite side, climbing higher and higher on the sheer, canyon-like walls.

At the head of the hollow were a roaring waterfall and a dozen or so metal barrel hoops from a local moonshine operation now long forgotten. There was no trail at this height, but I was lured onward by the sound of a gobbler that stayed just out of sight. I can still taste the relief when I finally struck the familiar trail that led to the road at the fork.

Bob Myer's field is at the base of the mountain. It is surrounded on three sides by the sheer heights of Anderson's Hollow. For years, I have chased

birds and deer in and around this field. Two seasons ago, I took three Dixie gobblers from the backside of this field in what was a most remarkable season. One had three beards and now stands mounted on a limb above my recliner.

On the opposite side of the field is Money Hill — named for a person, not the currency. On a warm Sunday morning eight years ago, I climbed part of the way up Money Hill and came back down with my first wild turkey — a 25-pound behemoth of a bird — and was forever hooked on hunting the big toms.

I have spent many days since on Money Hill, including a morning spent with the gentleman who helped reintroduce the wild turkey to Alabama and knew more about how to hunt them than any man I've known.

Beyond Money Hill, the Hurricane Fork of the Paint Rock River must be crossed. For years, there was only two ways to cross the Hurricane here: By fording the river itself or traversing a seriously rickety swinging bridge.

The swinging bridge was there in case the river was too high to cross at the ford. I was caught on the wrong side of the river once during deer season and had to cross on the swinging bridge, after which I vowed to camp on the mountainside until the waters receded rather than face that ordeal suspended between two trees ever again.

Both ford and bridge have been replaced by a row of large, steel culverts and a concrete deck that makes crossing the fork almost routine. From the river, a dirt road winds through a pasture, to the paved road, and to civilization.

On the other side of the road looms Garrett Mountain with a high, jagged peak I christened "El Capitan." From the road I can see the long finger that extends downward from Skyline Mountain and the three deep cuts, where water

cascading from the summit carved Anderson's Hollow.

I can see the "Aunt Janey High-bank" where the Hurricane Fork cuts hard into the mountainside. On top of the finger is the Skidder Road and beyond that lies the vast Henshaw Cove.

I have old friends among these rocks and trees and twists of the river. The mountains are full of fascinating things: Strange rocks, ancient trees, caves and seemingly bottomless pits.

Perhaps most amazing is that people actually lived among the jagged rocks on those steep hillsides, carving out what had to be a hard, hard life among the limestone and thorns but living free in a way we will never know.

Once when I thought I had crossed the last fence and was standing on a hillside so remote that it had possibly known no other footprint than mine, I looked down and saw that the pile of rocks where I stood had been hand-placed to form a levee to divert the torrents of water that flow from the mountain.

Rounding a curve on the main road, the Paint Rock Valley Lodge comes into view. Formerly, a Western Union satellite uplink station, the most notable landmark, is still the 50-foot diameter dish pointed skyward on an immense pedestal.

Near the road, a flashing sign beckons as it has for more than a dozen years, welcoming scores of deer and turkey hunters. Today, the flashing sign still welcomes a church group from Huntsville that left more than an hour ago. The gate is already locked; the Lodge is closed.

Sometime this week, the Nature Conservancy will become the proud owner of Money Hill, Anderson's Hollow, the Bob Myers field, the Skidder Road, the Cove and all the pines and cedars and jagged, broken rocks that make up what has been my world

in Alabama.

I had hoped to leave with one last beast of a Dixie gobbler, but I did not. I had even hoped for a rainbow during a brief interlude of sunshine to take as an omen of sorts, but happy endings are hard to come by these days.

I pass the old church and cross the Estill Fork of the river on the one-lane Freedom Bridge. From there, the road

rises sharply to the town of Estillfork — now nothing more than an empty store and post office and a one-truck garage that houses part of the volunteer fire department.

Berkeley Breathed, creator of the Bloom County comic strip once said: "A comic strip is no more eternal than a ripe melon."

Well Mr. Breathed, neither is a mountain.
