At Sharpe, the Rev. John

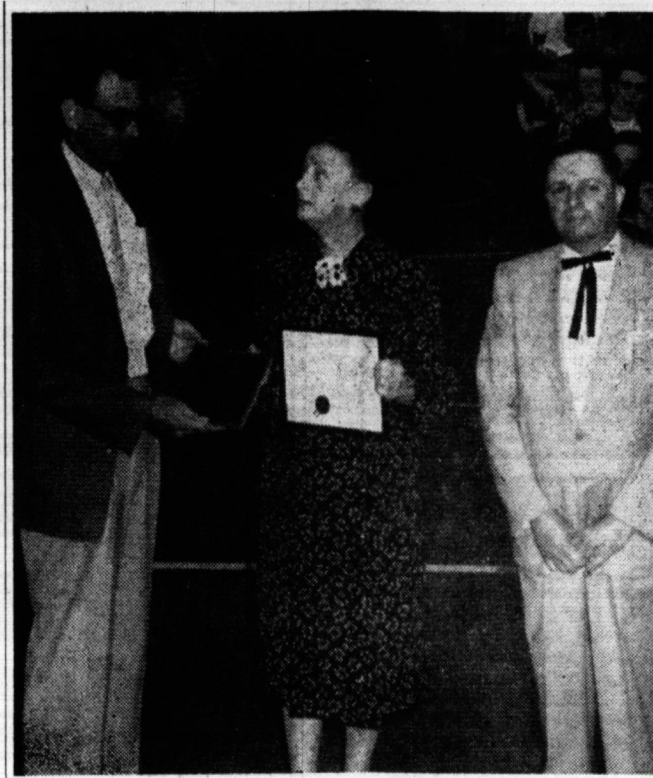

Talk of New Benton Postoffice is Revived

Talk of a new postoffice building for Benton was revived this week after news was received here that Congress had approved the lease-purchase bill for the Postoffice Department.

The bill allows rental funds

to be used to pay off construction costs of postoffices. In 10 to 25 years, the buildings erected under the plan would pay themselves out and then become the property of the federal government.

Benton has been "standing in line" for years now awaiting some federal action on a much-needed postoffice building here. A \$223,000 structure presumably is "in the working" for Benton.

Several years ago, the federal government inspected sites here for a new postoffice building but the Postoffice Department was hit by an economy wave and nothing ever was done.

At present, Benton's postoffice is housed in a small brick building which is approximately 17 years old. The government rents the building.

Homemakers Week To be Held May 2-8

Home Demonstration Week, May 2-8, will focus attention on the national program of rural education carried on through the agricultural extension services of land grant colleges and local county governments. First established in 1914, the program is participated in by three million women in 62,000 communities.

In Kentucky, 106 counties appropriated funds for home demonstration work last year. Home agents were assisted by six supervisors and nine specialists in various fields of home economics from the University of Kentucky, and by 38,995 volunteer leaders.

In all, 35,405 meetings were attended by 788,083 women and girls. As a result, 120,864 families reported making changes in

Cafeteria Only Will be Built Now

The Board of Education of the Benton Independent School District, at a meeting held Monday night, rejected all bids on the proposed new cafeteria-gymnasium-classroom building.

John Cassidy and Co. of Paducah was low bidder on the general contract with a bid of \$170,867. Miller-Johnson Co. had the low bid of \$25,387.50 on the plumbing and heating.

Both bids amounted to \$196,254.50, which was \$46,254.50 more than the school district had available to spend on the project. The school district only had about \$150,000 available for the building.

Nearly every school district in the nation has had a similar problem in recent years — a problem of construction costs exceeding finances available.

The Benton School Board Monday night decided to revise its plans and build only the cafeteria now. Bids on the cafeteria building will be sought as soon as plans have been revised.

Board members decided the cafeteria was urgently needed and that funds now available should be used to construct a building in which to feed the students.

They reasoned that construction of the gymnasium and classrooms could wait until more funds are available.

The board decided to attach the new cafeteria to the present high school building, instead of erecting it across the street originally planned for the cafeteria - gymnasium - classroom structure.

After the cafeteria is constructed, the school board will wait to see what its financial outlook is before building the gymnasium-classroom structure.

In all probability, this will be a separate building and will be erected across Maple street from the present school. The school board recently purchased the land across the street from the high school and had planned to construct the cafeteria, gymnasium and classrooms all in one building on the site.

When bids exceeded funds available for the building, the board had to change its plans.

So now, the cafeteria will be built first and will be erected on the present school grounds to connect with the present high school.

Another building to house the gymnasium and classrooms will be erected when sufficient funds are available, and this building probably will be erected across Maple street from the high school.

Board members felt that the present gymnasium could be used another year or so, but that a cafeteria was urgently needed now.

Soil Conservation Notes

By HERBERT ANDERSON
Gordon Chester, vocational agriculture teacher at Sharpe, took his boys on a field trip last Monday.

Robert Rives and I, with the help of some of the boys, showed the class how to survey contour and terrace lines.

Gaylon Riley, Wayne Wilson, Jimmy Young, and Jimmy Story have entered the 4-H Club Water Management Contest. Gaylon and Wayne are learning how to survey terraces and the other two are competing in the contour cultivation contest.

The Soil Conservation Service is giving them their training. Terrell Allen, Sharpe, a co-operator of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District, has dug a large farm pond this week.

Allen has most of his farm in grass. At the present he has 85 hogs. He also has a Grade A dairy. The new pond will provide plenty of water for all his livestock.

Coleman Jones, Hardin, has done some land clearing and started the preparation of the seedbed for grass seeding in August.

About two-thirds of his farm is upland on which orchard trees will be planted. The soil will be nailed down with grass before the trees are planted.

Clayton Lyles, southwest of Benton, is planning now to sow all the land capability class number four land on his farm to permanent meadow.

Although this land can be cultivated, it is best suited for meadow or pasture. A large sod waterway will be established down through the meadow.

Charles J. Oliver, Sharpe, has four acres of alfalfa and three acres of Kenland red clover which he plans to cut for hay.

These crops were sown last fall and Oliver says, "I didn't think it would ever come up, but you see I have a very good stand now."

R. S. Shemwell, W. L. Frazier, and Walter House, plan now to plant their corn on the contour this spring.

Annexation Move At Calvert Voided By Appeals Court

An ordinance attempting to annex some territory to Calvert city was declared invalid last week by the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

The court said the ordinance was adopted at a City Council meeting held without written notice being given councilmen. Law governing sixth class cities, such as Calvert City was at that time, requires that written notice be issued before such a special meeting, the court said. Calvert City recently was made a fifth class city.

The appellate court reversed a decision of Marshall Circuit Court which upheld the ordinance. The appeal was taken by some property owners.

City Hearing Can Child's Schooling

With a hearing loss, a child's school performance and academic progress may be affected. Often the loss of hearing is just in one ear, or only part of the hearing may be affected. It is very difficult to detect hearing losses by just talking to a child. Dr. Henson went on to say, "Many schools and P-TA's throughout the state have launched hearing detection programs with the assistance of local health departments. Protecting children against communicable diseases is one way to prevent hearing losses. Consult your family physician if your child has an earache, a 'stopped up' ear or a buzzing in an ear. And, also see your physician for severe colds, for nose and throat infections and for enlarged tonsils and adenoids that may lead to hearing difficulty. Pamphlets entitled 'Earaches' and 'A Health Program for Parents' are available from the Marshall County Health Department.

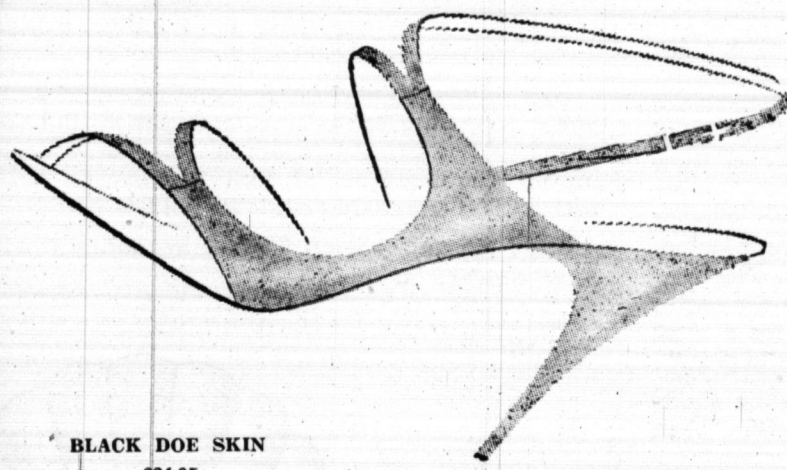

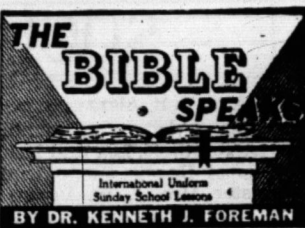

Leader Who Failed

Lesson for May 9, 1954

IT IS said that at the time of the French Revolution there was one day a tremendous uproar in the streets, of Paris, and an elderly gentleman who had not kept up with the news, inquired what it was. "It sounds like a revolt," said he. "Not a revolt, Sir," was the reply. "—a revolution." A revolt is a revolution that doesn't "click"; a revolution is a revolt that succeeds. Yet the success of a revolution is not to be measured by what it accomplishes there and then. Only as the years go on can any man assess a new movement, political or any other sort. What Dr. Foreman happened to Jeroboam's revolution, the one the prophet Ahijah had approved and authorized?



Success in the First Chapter

If Jeroboam had had any ghost writers and if they had written up the story of his political coup, they could have made it sound like a tremendous success. Jeroboam himself was young, able, and with immense political sagacity. He was a good organizer, and he was a popular man. As a labor leader under King Solomon he knew how to deal with people and as a political exile in Egypt for many years what he had not learned about the ins and outs of international politics was probably not worth learning. He had succeeded in drawing out of the original united Kingdom of Solomon ten out of the twelve tribes that composed it. Population, wealth, opportunity — everything was in his favor, plus the basic fact that a prophet of God was behind the movement to begin with. With God and the people on his side, how could Jeroboam lose?

Failure in the Last Chapter

When Jeroboam was some years older, a son of his lay very sick, and the king thought again of the prophet Ahijah who had once been his friend. Ahijah could surely tell him whether the child would live. But Jeroboam's queen, at Ahijah's door, met with no welcome. Quite the contrary: the old prophet cursed King Jeroboam and all his house. The revolution which had begun with the blessing of God upon it, ended by incurring the anger of God. The king who had begun with such overwhelming success ended as a failure. If the secession of the ten tribes had proved to be a failure, it was not that there was anything sinful in the idea itself, but that the revolution had been in Jeroboam's hands not a means of helping the people but of doing them harm.

... Who Made Israel to Sin?

More than one writer in later times used the same standard formula for this Jeroboam. He is called "Jeroboam the son of Nebat, who made Israel to sin." That is a terrible tag to hang on a man; that he is the cause of a nation's sin. But it was true of this man. What in particular had Jeroboam done, as King of Israel, to "make Israel to sin"? His great sins were two, but they were part of the same policy. It will be remembered that this was shortly after the time of Solomon, and the great temple which Solomon built was still the center of the religious life of all the twelve tribes. When Jeroboam engineered his revolution, he felt it to be a dangerous thing for the temple to be in the hands of the Kingdom of Judah up there in Jerusalem. So he organized two other religious centers, at convenient locations, Bethel in the south, Dan in the north; and in these newly appointed "shrine cities" he set up gold-plated calves and other animals as the gods of his people. In two ways among others, this was ruinous to right religion, and led to the decay of the nation.

God Is Not Mocked

First this involved the sin of making religion a department of the government. As King, Jeroboam attempted to dictate (and only too successfully) where and how his people should worship. Wilson Greatest President That Served Under, Barkley Says

Wilson was the statesman and the president under whom served, Alben W. Barkley in the May 1

issue of The Saturday Evening Post.

In the third installment of his autobiography, "That Reminds Me," Barkley also pays a surprising tribute to the late Senator Robert A. Taft, saying: "While I disagreed frequently with Bob Taft's political ideas, he was a man of great ability, integrity and patriotism, whose personal friendship I valued."

Barkley, whose background includes 40 years as congressman, senator and vice president, finds that the social significance of the Wilson era was overshadowed by the outbreak of World War I.

In the prewar years, he says,

the Wilson administration gave the country the most far-reaching social and economic reforms of any administration in our history up to that time.

"Woodrow Wilson's entrance into the White House was a breath of fresh air in the then stale atmosphere of American politics," Barkley writes. "He succeeded President Taft, an amiable but indecisive chief executive, though a great lawyer and later an outstanding Chief Justice."

Of President Taft's son, who became known as "Mr. Republican," Barkley observes that nothing was more indicative of the Senators devotion to his party and his country than the course he followed after he lost the nomination to President Eisenhower.

"Not only did the campaign for the election of the man who had captured the prize he himself had sought for so many years," Barkley continues, "but as majority leader of the Senate before his tragic death in 1953, he became the administration's loyal and most effective lieutenant on Capitol Hill."
