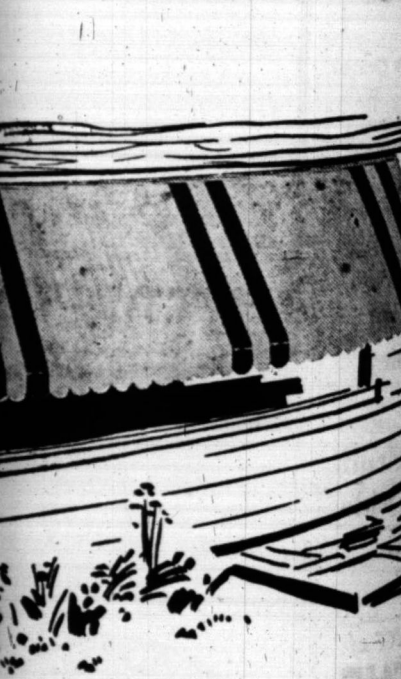

Chemical Week in County Scheduled for May 17-22

Chemical Week in Marshall County has been proclaimed by Mayor H. V. Duckett of Calvert City and County Judge Artelle Halton for the week of May 17-22.

Governor Wetherby also has proclaimed May 17-22 as Chemical Progress Week throughout Kentucky.

The proclamation of Duckett and Halton urged all civic and fraternal groups, all education and scientific bodies, all news disseminating media, all chambers of commerce and all other groups to encourage and promote the celebrations of Chemical Progress Week and to do everything in their power to bring home to each citizen the importance of the chemical industry to their daily living.

A new giant chemical manufacturing center has been built at Calvert City in the last few years and industry has poured millions of dollars into the various plants there. For that reason, if none other, Marshall County should be particularly interested in Chemical Progress Week.

Because of this chemical center, Marshall County is enjoying a high level of prosperity and products manufactured in our county are used throughout the world.

What is this chemical business? It might well be described as the heart of all industry for, without it and its multitude of contributions, few products which we consider necessary to our existence would be available. Consider, for a moment, how chemistry touches our lives from the summons of our alarm clock in the morning to the moment we switch off our bed light and adjust the controls of our electric blanket.

Shaving cream and face cream are mixtures of chemicals. The bristles of the shaving brush are synthetic and the sharpness of the blade is made possible by alloying metals produced by electro-chemical methods. The water with which we wash is purified by chlorination. The soap although made from fats, will not become rancid because it contains a chemical antioxidant. Socks, shirts, suits and dresses are often woven from a laboratory-developed fiber. The buttons on our clothes are made of a durable plastic.

Driver is Sought in Car Death

Willie C. Redden, 50, was killed last Sunday night when struck by an automobile near Hardin.

Mr. Redden's body was found early Monday morning by two unidentified men at a spot about 1,500 feet south of the four-way intersection at Hardin.

He had left his home in the Union Hill community on Benton Route 1 Sunday afternoon and was last seen alive at 5 p.m. in Hardin.

Deputy Coroner Otto Cann said Redden obviously was the victim of a hit and run driver. Law enforcement officers of this county are conducting an intensive investigation of the death. Officers have some clues as to what type of automobile struck and killed Mr. Redden.

George Little reports army worms in small grain. They are doing severe damage to red clover seeded this spring. He is spot spraying by hand for their control.

Wavel Joseph, Hoy Thompson, and Pat Brown are making plans to make their trench silos permanent by concreting the sides and bottom. This should make more pleasant feeding of silage to livestock.

Sudan grass can be seeded as soon as the ground dries out. This can be used for silage, hay or pasture. For hay or silage soybeans may be planted with the sudan. Piper sudan is lower in Prussic acid and is more drought resistant.

Soybeans or cow peas for hay may be seeded now. This will mean harvesting in August. Soybeans for seed or oil should not be seeded until the first half of June.

Soil Conservation Notes

John L. Reeder, west of New Harmony, plans to pipe water from a spring to his house. The spring never goes dry.

His house is 1600 feet from the spring. There is a difference of 21 feet in elevation between the two. The water will flow by gravity to the house.

D. A. Lovett, south of Fair-dealing, cut two acres of sericea for hay last summer.

"Our stock really like the hay," Mrs. Lovett reported.

"We made one mistake in cutting the sericea," she continued. "My husband cut it one morning and intended to bale it the afternoon of the same day.

But the baler could not get here until the next day. Some of the leaves shattered off as a result."

Seven-year average results on a large number of Illinois farms show that conservation practices increased corn yields seven bushels per acre, soybean yields 2.7 bushels, oat yields 6.9 bushels, and wheat yields 3.4 bushels.

E. L. Sauer, Soil Conservation Service economist at the University of Illinois, says the practices responsible for the increases were contour cultivation, strip-cropping and terracing.

They also reduced soil and water loss and generally reduced or

did not increase farm operating costs.

Sam Gold, a supervisor of the Marshall County Soil Conservation District, lost some of his finest poplar trees last year. He believes the dry weather was the cause of their death.

In his 60 acres of woodland, Gold has a lot of sweet gum, red oak and white oak in addition to the poplar. This valuable woodland is protected from fire and grazing.

Reuben Redden, Benton, has done three acres of land clearing. He is changing the land use from idle to pasture.

Roy Filbeck, Vanzora, sowed five acres of pasture this spring. The grass and clover were sown from idle to pasture.

"I have a fine stand of grass, and the rye is nearly as high as my head," Filbeck said.

The reason for this success is the fertilizer, which was applied. On the five acres he put 500 pounds of 62 per cent phosphate, 500 pounds of 60 per cent potash, and 500 pounds of 33 per cent ammonium nitrate.

Strawberry Crop In Ky. Will be Only 55 Pct. of Normal

Frankfort — Advance indications point to a commercial strawberry crop in Kentucky of no more than 55 per cent of normal, M. J. Vinson, director of the division of markets, in the State Department of Agriculture, reported.

A survey made by field men of the department in the eight commercial producing areas of the state brought forth an estimate of 1,790 acres of berries—little above one-half the average acreage of the past four years. However, last year's average was only approximately 62 per cent of the normal production with a total of 2,955 acres being harvested for commercial purposes.

He attributed the marked decline to severe drought conditions during the last two growing seasons and the shortage in labor supply.

Vinson estimated the 1954 crop at 65,000 crates—with an expected yield of 25 crates an acre, compared with 40 crates last year and a four-year average of 60 crates.

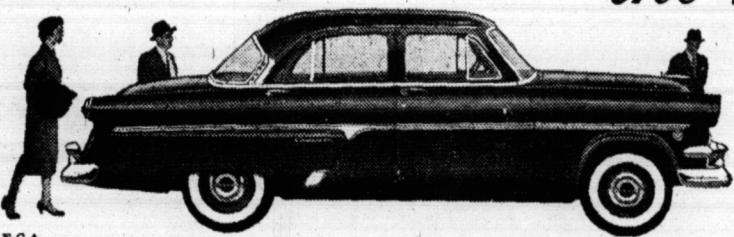

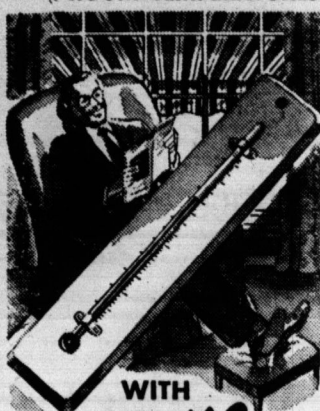
