**Christian County So Instructs Her
Delegation to the Two Con-
ventions.**

The Democratic Convention called for the purpose of selecting and instructing delegates to the Superior Court Convention at Bowling Green on June 11, and the Louisville Convention on May 28, which will name the next Appellate Clerk, met at the Court House Saturday afternoon.

Dr. J. L. Dullin, Chairman of the County Democratic Committee, took the chair and stated the object of the meeting.

Col. M. D. Brown was, upon motion, elected permanent Chairman, and Frank Bell Secretary.

Mr. C. M. Meacham moved the appointment of a committee of three each on credentials and resolutions. This motion prevailed and the chair appointed on credentials, Hunter Wood, Dr. Rodman and Dr. Stone. On resolutions, C. M. Meacham, V. A. Garnett and J. D. Hays. The report of the committee on credentials was unanimously adopted.

The report of the committee on

resolutions was read by the chairman and upon motion was adopted.

It was moved to amend the resolutions so as to instruct the delegates to support the following resolutions. The amendment was carried.

The resolutions reported by the committees and adopted by the convention are as follows.

The Democratic party of Christian county, in Convention assembled do resolve:

That we cordially indorse the candidacy of Capt. Thos. G. Moore, for Clerk of the Court of Appeals, and we instruct our delegates to be appointed by this Convention to cast the vote of Christian county as a unit for him as long as his name is before the polls.

We also instruct our delegates to vote, which meets at Louisville, May 28th, and request they use all honorable means to secure his nomination.

HORRIBLE DEATH.

A Long Island Man Enveloped in
Quicksand While Digging a Well.
Worcester, N. Y. May 10. Well.

WOODSIDE, L. A., May 18.—(Valley News.) S. Parsells who was a night dispatcher at the Los Angeles city hall, was killed by a terrible death Saturday evening in this village. Parsells recently built a house at Woodside for himself and family and had a driven well in the yard, from which the water supply for the house was obtained. In order to secure a greater force of water, Parsells decided to add a section of pipe to that through which the water was drawn from the ground. About 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon he began to dig a hole two feet in diameter around the well-pipe. He had dug down about fifteen feet, and was near

the end of the pipe, when he felt him self sinking and at once shouted to his son, who was above, to throw a rope to him. He had struck quicksand, and before a rope could be thrown he was sinking deeper and deeper. He waited the aid of his son, but he never came. His son quickly called help and in a few minutes half the male population of the town was on the spot. A rope was finally thrown down to the sinking man, who placed it around his body, but all the efforts of those above to pull him out failed. He sank deeper and deeper, until he sank until his head only could be seen. Dr. Wood obtained a long rubber tube, one end of which he managed to insert into the man's mouth, and the other, which air was pumped to keep him alive while a dozen men were digging around him, and after some time he was pulled out. The unfortunate man died from exhaustion. It was 10:30 before his body was lifted out of the sand. The man who was digging came near sinking into the quicksands and meeting a similar fate.
