Soil Conservation Notes

C. C. Littlejohn, south of Calvert City, dug a farm pond week before last. Good farm ponds provide not only water for livestock and fish, but are a means of flood prevention. They hold the water on the land where it falls.

Robert Burd, Vanzora; Leonard Miller, Fairdealing; and Roy Gregory, Briensburg, plowed Kentucky 31 fescue sods this spring. Corn and tobacco will be planted in these fields.

Fescue is an excellent grass to use in a crop rotation of one year row crop followed by small grain and three to six years of grass.

The length of the rotation depends on the capability of the land and the needs of the farmer. Class two capability land needs at least a three year rotation; class three land, a four year; and class four, a five or preferably six year rotation.

All land used for crop rotations needs to be terraced, farmed on the contour with the terraces, and have plenty of sod waterways.

Land in capability class four and six which is used for pasture does not need to be terraced. The grass-legume cover provides adequate protection

against erosion.

John Collier, Fairdealing, and Roy Gregory, Briensburg, dug farm ponds last week. These ponds will furnish adequate stock water and make possible more even distribution of grazing on the farm.

Help in saving the soil and water on our farm is available to you throughout your Marshall County Soil Conservation District.

L. J. Rickman, Sharpe, has sown a field of sudan grass for his dairy cows. Extra grazing is usually always needed during the driest summer months.

Rickman applied 200 pounds

of nitrate, phosphate, and potash, and the amount of fertilizer has been received from the Land Conservation Service. These maps will be available without cost to a soils conservation district. Permanent will not be corner but

Workshop Slated on Conservation Teaching

A workshop in "Techniques of Teaching Conservation" will be held June 24 to July 10 at the Murray State College.

The purpose of the workshop is to develop objectives and techniques for integrating conservation emphasis in each grade and subject in the public school curriculum, rather than developing a special course in conservation education.

The plan for the workshop is laid upon the successful pilot effort implemented at the Murray State College Training School during the past two and one-half years. Dr. Ralph H. Woods, president of Murray State College, believes that what the Training School faculty has done should be passed on to other faculties throughout the state.

The course offered will be Education G 282. Three hours credit will be given. The classes will meet Monday through Saturday, an average of three and one-half hours each day. Some field trips will require the whole day. Some time may be spent at nearby Camp Curry.

The class is open to graduate students and undergraduates with at least two years of college work.

Field trips by busses will be to observe geological formations and minerals, soil conditions, water resources, forests, and wildlife.

The costs will be registration and course fees \$15; room and board for two and one-half weeks at \$8.70 will be \$24.25. The total cost will be \$39.25. Students will be housed in Wells Hall (for women) and Swann Dorm and Ordway Hall (for men).

Assisting the Training School will be representatives of Soil Conservation Service, U. S. Wildlife Service, Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals, Kentucky Division of Forestry, TVA Division of Forestry, Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission, U. S. Forest Service, and Kentucky Division of Soil and Water Resources.

Presidents' Homes Museums

The homes of at least 24 United States presidents have become public museums and memorials.

Theodore Roosevelt's birthplace in New York City is a museum, and Sagamore Hill, his Long Island residence at Oyster Bay, became a national shrine last year.

Hyde Park, near Poughkeepsie, N. Y., residence of Franklin D. Roosevelt, has been a national historic site since 1944.

Visitors to New York State may also see Lindenwald, the home of Martin Van Buren, at Stockport, N. Y., as well as the cottage at Wilton where Ulysses S. Grant died.

At Quincy, Mass., the Adams mansion has been preserved as a national memorial to John Quincy Adams and his son, John Quincy Adams. John Adams' birthplace nearby also is open.

Thousands of Visitors

At Hillsborough, N. H., is the homestead where Franklin Pierce spent his early years. In Plymouth, Vt., thousands visit the combination store, Post Office, and cottage where Calvin Coolidge was born and where he was sworn in as President by his father.

Near Lancaster, Pa., stands Wheatland, the home of James Buchanan, now a museum. The cabin in which he was born may be seen at Chambersburg, Pa. At Caldwell, N. J., the birthplace of Grover Cleveland has been presented to the State.

Virginia is famous for George Washington's Mount Vernon on the Potomac and Thomas Jefferson's Monticello near Charlottesville. Near the latter James Monroe's Ash Lawn, although privately owned, is open to the public. Visitors are also admitted to Woodrow Wilson's birthplace at Staunton, Va.

Tennessee boasts the homes of three presidents, all museums. Andrew Jackson's mansion, The Hermitage, is near Nashville. The James K. Polk home at Columbia is preserved by a memorial association.

Mr. and Mrs. Chalmers Etheridge have gone to Cincinnati, Ohio, where both are employed. They have been gone several weeks.

The O. C. Lockers and the G. T. Fisers of Route 7 were shoppers in town Saturday.

Andrew Johnson's home, tailor shop and grave at Greeneville, are a national monument.

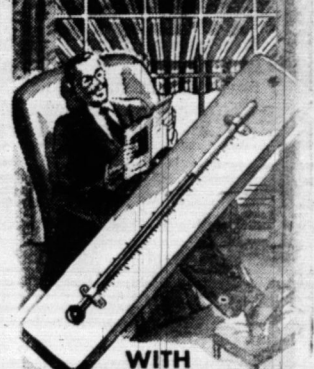
Now A State Park

In Ohio, Grant's birthplace near Cincinnati is now a state park. The Rutherford B. Hayes estate, Spiegel Grove, a State park at Fremont, includes the President's tomb and a museum. The house, open occasionally, remains a family residence. James A. Garfield's home at Newton, Ohio, and Warren G. Harding's house at Marion, O., welcome visitors.

Benjamin Harrison's home is one of the sights in Indianapolis. The only home Abraham Lincoln ever owned, at Springfield, Ill., is constantly thronged by visitors, as is the Hodgenville, Ky., log cabin believed to have been Lincoln's birthplace.

Herbert Hoover's birthplace at West Branch, Iowa, was bought as a memorial, while President Eisenhower's family home in Abilene, Kan., has already been opened to visitors as part of the Eisenhower Foundation's museum.
