## Henry Lovett is New Circuit Judge

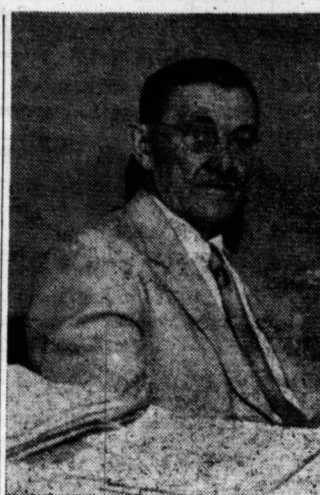
H. H. Lovett Sr., veteran Benton attorney, Wednesday was appointed by Governor Wetherby to be circuit judge of the new judicial district embracing Marshall, Calloway and Livingston counties.

James Lassiter of Murray was appointed to the post of commonwealth's attorney at the same time by the governor.

The appointments were necessary due to the judicial redistricting act voted by the last General Assembly.

The two men are expected to take the oaths of their offices immediately and will participate in the new Marshall Circuit Court term which starts July 5.

Mr. Lovett is a native of Marshall County and has been active in school, government and church affairs all of his life. He served as commonwealth's attorney from 1928 to 1934; as

county judge from 1922 to 1926 and as circuit court clerk from 1916 to 1922.

## Blanket Tax Raise Reduced

The State Tax Commission on Tuesday revised the property assessment blanket raises for Marshall County.

The raise of 70 per cent on town lots was reduced to 50 per cent.

The 30 per cent levy on livestock was eliminated completely.

The 30 per cent levy on inventories was reduced to 15 per cent.

The commission did NOT change the 20 per cent increase on farm lands.

Other increases which were NOT changed were the 30 per cent levies on professional tools and business furniture, drilling, mining and construction equipment, manufacturing machinery, farm tractors and other farm machinery.

The revision of the increases resulted from a protest made by Marshall County officials and citizens to the Tax Commission on June 17.

County Attorney H. H. Lovett Jr. said that assessments in Marshall County were considerably above last year despite the fact there had been a 20 per cent decrease in real estate values. He said he was in favor of equal assessments but was opposed to the blanket raise.

Lovett and County Judge Artelle Halton both told the commission that the practice of putting fewer federal stamps on deeds than is required by law distorted sales data.

Mayor H. V. Duckett of Calvert City said homes in the new residential section of his town were listed at from 30 to 35 per cent of their sale value. He said that he feels a blanket raise is penalizing those who listed their property at or above the state average at 31 per cent.

Shelby McCallum, Milburn Jones and Joe Asher also appeared before the state commission.

In Frankfort Monday, Governor Wetherby announced that he had decided to go ahead with his policy.

The governor pointed out that the Tax Commission action boosting assessments does not necessarily mean an increase in local taxes. It was pointed out to the taxpayers that:

1. Under law, local tax rates cannot be fixed by local school boards and county fiscal courts until the Tax Commission has finally certified the county's assessment.

2. This means that within the next nine days — between now and July 1 — fiscal courts and school boards in the 71 counties must meet and set the tax rates to be charged on 1954 tax bills on the new, higher assessments.

3. The fiscal court, or the school board, or both, in any county where a blanket raise has been ordered, may reduce their tax rates so that no more taxes will be paid locally than would have been paid on the original assessment.

## Dog Vaccination Clinics Scheduled in County

Kentucky's 1954 rabies-control law went into effect last week and the state ordered all health departments to set up rabies vaccination clinics for dogs.

The new law requires vaccination of all dogs six months old or older by July 1. The law also sets up procedures for licensing and controlling dogs. Licenses are to be issued by a dog warden to be employed by Fiscal Court. None has been appointed in Marshall County so far. The license fee is \$1.50.

Each dog owner who does not comply with the rabies vaccination law is subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 for each offense.

Rabies vaccination clinics will be held in Marshall County through the co-operative efforts of the county health department and the Extension Service. Dr. L. C. Sutherland, new veter-

## New Methodist Pastor is Native of Graves County

The Rev. V. H. Burnette, new pastor of Benton's First Methodist Church, is back on his old stamping grounds. He was born at Mayfield and has spent much of his ministry in Western Kentucky.

Mr. Burnette was graduated from Mayfield High School and attended Emory University, Atlanta, Ga. He was admitted to 1931 and served the Lowes Circuit in the Memphis Conference in 1931-32 and the Mayfield Circuit in 1933.

His first full time pastorate was at the Calvert City Methodist Church, which he served

He then served the Lone Oak church three years, the Kevill church four years, the Halls, Tenn. church three years, the Aldersgate Church at Paducah three years and the Trinity church at Jackson, Tenn., for six years.

He came to Benton from Trinity Church at Jackson.

Mr. and Mrs. Burnette are the parents of nine children—four sons and five daughters.

Three of the sons are now in the Armed Forces. Kelly, who spent 13 months in Korea, now is at Fort Knox, Ky.; Bill is in the Air Force at Eglin Field, Fla., and Wells is stationed at Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, Texas. Two of the sons, Kelly and Bill, are married.

The fourth son, Kenton, is a minister and was admitted this month to the Memphis Conference. He is a graduate of Lambuth College and is taking his theological work at Emory University.

Of the five daughters, one is married, one is in nursing training at Methodist Hospital in Memphis and three live at home with the parents. The three living at home are Shannon, 14, Sara, 10, and Rachael, 8.

When Brother Burnette has any spare time, he indulges in his favorite hobby of oil painting.

Hospital attendants said Mr. Poe suffered a crushed face, crushed knees and internal injuries.

Mr. Poe is a brother of Ervin Poe, Palma merchant.

## Co-operation Of the Public Is Requested

City Council of Benton has acted to solve some of the problems at the City Dump.

A bulldozer last week covered up all the old garbage and trash at the dump, and cut a new ditch approximately 3 feet wide and 4 feet deep into which the garbage and trash will be dumped.

As soon as the new ditch is filled, it will be covered with dirt by a bulldozer and another new ditch opened. In this manner, the City Council hopes to keep the City Dump in a sanitary condition.

City Council also has established dumping hours from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. No dumping will be permitted except during those hours. The new hours start Monday morning, June 28.

A gate will be erected at the entrance to the City Dump and will be kept locked except during dumping hours.

R. D. West, custodian of the dump, will be on duty every day to supervise the dumping of garbage and trash. Paper and other burnable trash are placed in one part of the ditch and set fire. The garbage, cans, etc., are placed in another part of the ditch.

The City Council asks the co-operation of all citizens in using the dumping grounds, and especially in observing the hours of 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Councilmen also ask haulers of truckloads of waste materials and trash NOT to overload their trucks so that cans and other waste materials will NOT fall on the streets en route to the dumping grounds.

Citizens living on Walnut Street in Cole's Addition say that cans and other materials fall from overloaded trucks and create a nuisance. They say they have to clean up their street frequently after waste materials fall from overloaded trucks.

## New Law Involving All Ky. Motorists Goes into Effect

Frankfort—A new law that affects the 700,000 motorists in Kentucky went into effect last week.

The new law requires every person applying for license plates to prove first that he has paid all State and County taxes on his automobile and on other personal property. In addition, city residents must prove they have paid city taxes on their personal property.

For example, most people pay their personal-property taxes between August 1 and December 31 each year. Persons who apply for 1954 tags between now and the end of 1954 must submit to their county clerk their 1953 tax receipts before a tag will be issued.

What to do when your new-car dealers send over bills of sale and applications for tags for new-car purchasers? Shall the clerk require each of these new-car buyers to prove he paid his taxes the year before? That's the new law.

How about the fellow who lives in one county, but applies for a license tag in another county?

It was pointed out that another new law requires motorists to license their cars in the county of their residence, where the vehicle is principally used.

#### Here Lies Israel

Lesson for June 27, 1954

IN THE graveyard of nations  
there lie many whose very  
names are strange to us. But  
among all the unfamiliar names  
—Phus, Lydis, Elam and many  
another—there is one we all  
know: Israel. It was a going na-  
tion for about 200 years. Seen  
through the eyes of other nations  
it was "small pot-  
atoes" as we know  
from inscriptions  
which have been  
dug up in recent  
years by the ar-  
chaeologists' spades; it covered  
no more of the  
earth's surface  
than New Jersey  
does. But in its  
own eyes it was im-  
portant; what nation is not?

When Israel  
was just a little older than the  
United States is now, it crashed  
to nothing, and since that time  
has been only an unfragrant mem-  
ory, a dead nation. The writer of  
II Kings 17 wrote its obituary  
The Nation Forgot God.

What killed Israel? The nation  
did not die of old age, for 200  
years is not a very long time for  
a nation to exist and prosper.  
Something killed that country. It  
might be said that it committed  
suicide—but what was the name  
of the poison which it swallowed?  
In one word, it was sin. But that  
does not tell us much. It is like  
giving "disease" on a death cer-  
tificate as the cause of death.

What disease? What sin? Look-  
ing over the record as II Kings  
17 sums it up, we can see that se-  
rious sin which was the root of  
most others: forgetting God. The  
nation forgot what God had done  
for them in times past; they for-  
got that he is a God of righteous-  
ness, they supposed he did not  
specially care what they did so  
long as their rites were paid up  
and they had a good record of at-  
tendance at public worship. They  
had reminders of "God" all over  
the place, but these were idols,  
images of beasts. They used the  
word "God" without realizing

either the goodness, the great-  
ness or the holiness of the only true  
God.

Can God Be Despised?

High-lighted in the sad obituary  
of a dead-and-gone nation is the  
fact that as a nation they despised  
the law of God. How is it possible  
to despise the Almighty? Nations  
and individuals show their real  
contempt for God by paying no  
attention to what he has said.  
Millions of people in America to-  
day act just as if the Ten Com-  
mandments (for example) were  
only a set of by-laws for fanatical  
churchmen, or—worse still—as if  
they were an out-dated set of rules  
from a primitive civilization. To  
judge from what you may read in  
any newspaper, would the Man  
from Mars suppose that Ameri-  
cans, as a people, are living by  
any Law of Love? If all the church  
members in our country were  
practicing Christians, would this  
country be what it is? A nation's  
sins both by the actual sins of  
the sinful and by the consent of  
those who know better but do  
nothing about it. Now you can  
despise God and his laws for a  
while; but his laws are not arbi-  
trary; they are not like basketball  
rules that can be changed every  
season. The roads that lead away  
from God and his laws may be  
wide, but they are short. They  
come to a very dead end. It is pos-  
sible to despise God; but it is not  
safe.

Paradox and Parallel

A nation can be simply peppered  
with religion and yet lose the salt  
of morality. In ancient Israel  
the name of God was everywhere;  
religious observances were going  
on "under every green tree" as  
the prophets said. But the more re-  
ligion they had, the less morality.  
Israel died of a kind of moral dry-  
rot, in the midst of sinners with-  
out number. Dr. H. P. Van Dusen  
has recently made thinking Chris-  
tians sit up and take startled  
notice with these two sets of facts.  
On the one hand, since World War  
II church membership has in-  
creased till today it is at an all-  
time high. Church attendance is  
also at an all-time high. Religious  
reading is popular. Young peo-  
ple are interested in religion more  
than for years past. But on the  
other hand, alcoholism has in-  
creased enormously; divorce has  
shot up; juvenile delinquency has  
multiplied; drug addiction has in-  
creased; sexual morality is sink-  
ing to a lower level. Can it be that  
America as in Israel we fall  
to gear our religion into our be-  
havior? Can it be that perhaps  
for all our "religion" we really  
have made an idol of the Dollar?

## Church Will Celebrate Its Birthday

Life does not often begin with the signing of a will, but that is what happened with the Christian Churches of Kentucky. This body, which is the second largest religious group in Kentucky, counts its birthday from the signing of the Last Will and Testament of the Springfield Presbytery, June 28, 1804.

The Christian churches will combine their birthday celebration with their annual convention. The convention is set for June 25-28 at Paris. The closing day will be spent at the Cane Ridge Meeting House, eight miles east of Paris. Other sessions are to be at First Christian Church of Paris.

It was at the Cane Ridge Meeting House that a group of dissenting Presbyterians signed the Last Will and Testament. Three years earlier a great revival had been held at Cane Ridge. Ministers of many denominations preached so effectively that more than 3,000 converts were reported.

Many of the frontiersmen, impatient with denominationalism, were more dissatisfied after the revival. They said, "We got along together during the revival. Why can't we continue working together?" Such sentiment gave birth to the Last Will and Testament, which begins, "We will not this body die, be dissolved, and sink into union with the body of Christ at large."

Barton W. Stone, one of the signers of the Last Will and Testament, quickly became the leader of a movement which instead of bringing unity resulted in the formation of another church—a church dedicated to furthering unity. Later this group merged with the Disciples of Christ group then led by Alexander Campbell.

The new group took the Disciples name. It now has congregations in all parts of the world. The American congregations have a membership just short of two million. The Disciples of Christ is the largest religious body found on American soil.

In Kentucky there are 702 Christian churches with a membership of approximately 140,000.

## It's Easy to End The Annoyance Of Squeaking Floors; Here's How

It's usually easy, according to Home Modernizing magazine, to end the annoyance of floor squeaks caused by loose boards rubbing against each other or against the subflooring or joists. The photos show four possible remedies.



Driving nails at an angle through the loose board into subflooring often does the trick. To avoid marks, use a piece of metal as shown.



It's sometimes better to attack squeak from below. Loose bridging between joists may be the cause. Remail if necessary.



If subfloor board has worked loose, drive short screws up through it to pull it tight to the finish flooring.



If a joist has sagged slightly, drive a shln between the joist and the subfloor to take up slack and end squeaking.

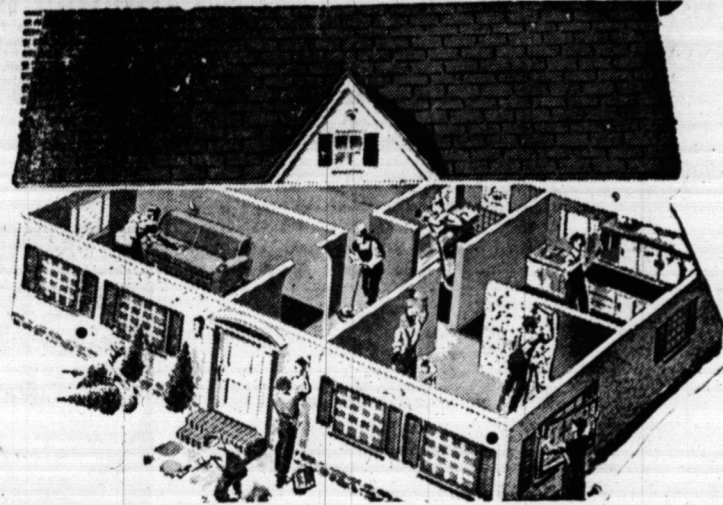
