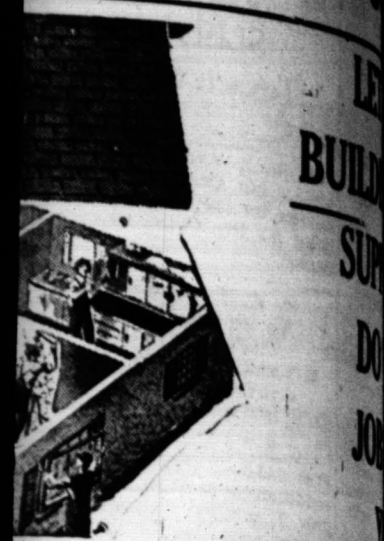

## Residence Robbed of \$1,948.37

The residence of Earl St. Marie, owner of the Crown Furniture Co., was burglarized of \$1,948.37 Tuesday night.

Of the amount taken, \$250 was in cash, \$525 in matured savings bonds and the remainder in customer's checks.

The cash and checks were taken from a strong box kept in a desk in the living room.

The house was ransacked by the burglars, and they had gathered all the silverware but in their haste they fled without taking it.

The burglars entered the house, which is separated from the furniture store only by a driveway, by jimmying a window in the living room.

Mr. and Mrs. St. Marie returned to their home at 9:40 Tuesday night and noticed a 1946 or 1947 Pontiac with Alabama license in the driveway.

Mr. St. Marie went immediately to the store, and Mrs. St. Marie started to unlock the front door and enter the house.

She heard noises in the house and was afraid to enter. About that time, two men fled from the rear of the house, entered the Pontiac and drove toward Paducah.

Mr. St. Marie phoned Sheriff Billy Watkins, who lives on the Paducah road. The sheriff left his home immediately and watched for the car on the highway, but never saw it. Officers think the burglars might have turned off at the Briensburg road.

Mr. St. Marie also phoned city police and State Troopers. The officers took fingerprints and are checking some clues.

Three men were believed involved in the burglary.

## Marshall's Tax Rate Unchanged By Fiscal Court

Fiscal Court, in session Wednesday at the courthouse here, fixed the county tax rate at the same figures as last year—70 cents on the hundred dollar valuation.

Of this 70 cents, 50 cents goes to the county general fund and

20 cents for road and bridge bond purposes.

Fiscal court also fixed a tax rate of 20 cents per hundred dollar valuation on bank shares—also the same tax as for the fiscal year which ended June 30.

**Fiscal Year Begins**  
The county's new fiscal year begins today (Thursday) July 1, and it was necessary that Fiscal Court set the tax rate by July 1.

The court discussed at length the equalization of property assessments but took no final action in the matter. The group was in session from 10 a. m. to noon and from 1 to 3 p. m.

Members of the court are Ray Lovett, G. T. Fiser, Aaron Barnfield, Raymond Powell and Louie Filbeck.

**State's Blanket Raise**  
The State Tax Commission's blanket raise on property assessments in Marshall County is as follows:

Town lots, 50 percent raise; farm lands, 20 percent raise; farm machinery, 30 percent raise, manufacturing machinery, construction equipment and professional tools, 30 percent raise.

The state's 30 percent blanket raise on livestock in this county was eliminated. The State also reduced from 30 to 15 percent the increase levy on inventories.

With the county tax rate and the final figures of the State Tax Commission it is fairly easy for a farmer or a city dweller to determine his tax bill for the 1954-55 fiscal year.

After a much-needed rest, the Courier staff will be back on the job ready to serve the readers and advertisers with renewed energy. Happy Fourth of July to everyone.

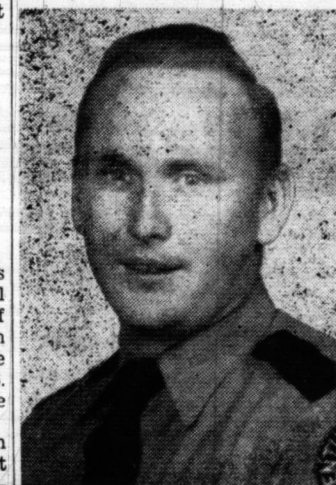
## Solon Henson And Bess Washburn Are Wed in Mississippi

## How to Grow

Lesson for July 4, 1954

If a Christian is not a growing Christian, is he a Christian at all? Whatever a person may think about that, one thing is certain: if a Christian is not growing, he is not like Jesus. For the next three months the Bible lessons studied in all the churches that sponsor this series will be on the general subject of "Growth in Christian Living." Can this be studied? Doesn't growth come naturally or not at all? For answer to that question, consider the Lord Jesus Dr. Foreman himself. It is said of him that he "increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." If Jesus is our Example in growth as well as in other ways, then we can learn much about Christian growth from him.



**4 Time for Struggle**  
The Greek language in which Luke wrote, has words for everything. Many times we can see what Luke meant by carefully looking into the Greek words he used, which are sometimes more precise than our English words usually are. In Luke 2:40 it is written that Jesus the boy "grew." In Luke 2:52 it is said that he "increased." Now those are two different Greek words. In the original manuscript, and they do not mean just the same thing at all. The first is the ordinary everyday word for "grow." Plants grow, animals grow, the little boy Jesus grows. The same word is used for all kinds of living things. Now a little boy, say five years old, no more tries to grow than an oyster does. He will grow, all right. Nothing can stop him if he gets plenty of food and sunshine. When he goes to school he does not have to study hard, he "picks up" things as we say. But there comes a time in every boy's life, and it must have come in Jesus' life when this "pick up" word is not enough. "Increase" is a different word entirely. It means literally to cut one's way forward. It is the word which was used to describe what a road-building crew did in chopping out a trail through the forest. It is a word for effort, struggle, hard work. The time came for Jesus, as it does for all growing persons, when he could no longer grow without putting out his own vigorous strength.

**Good Animal?**  
An angry woman came into a teacher's room one day and complained about the way her poor little boy (a rascal if ever there was one) had been treated. "I want you to understand," she said, "that I don't care if he is a scholar or not. All I want is for him to be a good animal." If the teacher had not been young and shy, he would have said to the woman, "Madam, that's just the trouble. He is a good animal; we should like to have him develop into something else besides." If all you want is a good animal, take your boy home; he has graduated! Of course the lady was partly right. We human beings are animals, and as such ought to develop physically to the best of our capacity. We have to work at it. God will not send it free, not even to Christians.

**The All-Round Life**  
Jesus cut his way forward not only physically, but mentally (wisdom), spiritually (in favor with God) and socially (favor with man). There comes a time in life when if we are going to learn something (say the Greek language, or the guitar) we just have to get down and dig. The growing Christian will grow in mind as well as in body. Ignorance is not a Christian ideal. The same is true socially. Our Lord was popular, in the good sense. People loved him. But Luke suggests that this was not something that just came to him, he had to work at this too. Some persons are born more sociable by nature than others; but even the shy ones, the awkward ones, can learn the fine art of getting along with other persons—if they try. If they never try, this side of their natures, of their lives, will be stunted. Even the spiritual life does not grow without effort. We grow through those old-fashioned but never out-dated ways, which Jesus used and which we can use too: prayer, study of God's word, and service in His name. We never grow spiritually by magic, never by "wish-fulfilling," only by working with God.

## County Motorists Warned

Sheriff Billy Watkins says that there has been an increase recently of speeding and reckless driving on the rural roads of Marshall County.  
Motorists should drive slower over gravel roads, Watkins said, as a matter of safety first and also to show courtesy to the neighbors by keeping down dust in the dry summer months.  
Sheriff Watkins urges drivers in this county to become safety conscious. He outlined the following 10 points as helpful to all motorists:  
1. Accidents don't just "happen." They occur because we do not exercise the necessary preparedness before hand.  
2. Accidents are not caused within themselves—accidents are effects of care-less-ness. They're the "payoff" for our negligence and failure to think in the right direction and act beforehand.  
3. How much time do you spend each day studying ways and means of preventing accidents? Put down the minutes in this space. So there you are. Why so many accidents.  
4. The way to avoid accidents is to discourage the things that cause them; namely, care-less-ness; thoughtless; negligence; recklessness. Make those unpopular and accidents no longer occur—because the CAUSE is gone.  
5. Study ways to prevent accidents—5 minutes each day.  
6. Inspect your home, farm, factory, or place of business regularly; making notation of all things that might be an accident hazard.  
7. Make speedy repairs where you find a danger or potential accident hazard.  
8. If employed, report accident hazards to your employer.  
9. Have your car inspected for safety regularly by mechanics who KNOW HOW.  
10. DRIVE SAFE and make the highways and always SAFE EVERYWHERE.
