## Gun Shot Victim, 69, Is Buried

Funeral services were held last Sunday afternoon at Union Ridge Baptist Church for Manie S. Ross, 69 years old. The Revs. J. H. Thurman and Otis Jones officiated.

Burial, by Filbeck-Cann, was in the church cemetery. Masonic services were held at the graveside by Alford Lodge No. 925. Members of the lodge were pallbearers.

Mr. Ross was found shot to death in a chair in his front yard on the Benton-Murray road last Friday afternoon about 5:30 o'clock. A pistol lay near the chair. One bullet from the pistol had entered his mouth and came out the back of his head.

A passing motorist noticed the body slumped in the chair. Mrs. Ross said she heard the shot while she was milking. Mr. Ross had been in poor health for some time.

He was a member of the Union Ridge Baptist Church and Alford Lodge.

Survivors, besides the wife, are three daughters, Mrs. A. L. Henderson and Mrs. Mary Louise Neimel of Benton and Mrs. Frances Morgan of Dearborn, Mich., and one son, Leroy Ross of Gary, Ind.

Other survivors are four sisters, Mrs. Eura Davenport and Alford Lodge.

Mrs. Java Cathey of Paducah, and Mrs. Irlsie Viles of Dearborn, Mich., two half sisters, Mrs. Minnie Henton of Livermore, Ky., and Mrs. May Clark of Murray; six grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

## Primary Election is August 7

Marshall County is all set for the primary election which will be held on Saturday, Aug. 7.

Both Democrat and Republican parties will pick nominees in the primary for the United States Senate.

On the Republican ticket are John Sherman Cooper of Somerset, who is seeking re-election to the U. S. Senate; C. Tom Hawkins of Elkhorn City, and Willard Gilmour Jones of Covington.

On the Democratic ticket are Alben W. Barkley of Paducah, former vice president of the United States; Jess Nichols Ryan Ceell of Louisville, James Logan Belk of Frankfort and Edward J. Hussey of Louisville.

There will be two sets of ballots—one for Democratic voters and one for Republican voters. All registered voters of either party are eligible to cast ballots.

The ballots have been printed and will be distributed to the polling precincts next week.

Election officials who served in 1953 will serve again this year at the precincts in Marshall County.

Polls will open at 6 a.m. and will close at 5 p.m.

Purpose of the primary is for the Republican voters to decide whom they wish as their candidate for the U. S. Senate in the November general election and for the Democrats to do likewise.

Except from a legal standpoint, that purpose already has been accomplished. There is little doubt that Cooper will be the GOP nominee and that Barkley will be the choice of the Democrats.

In November, the voters will decide whether they want Republican Cooper as their United States Senator or Democrat Barkley.

Both Barkley and Cooper have campaigned vigorously all over Kentucky and doubtless will increase the tempo of their drives between now and November.

The race is being watched closely by political observers all over the United States as both candidates are tremendously popular with the voters and both also are popular in Washington.

The race also may provide political observers with some sort of gauge to measure the strength and popularity of the Eisenhower administration.

## Charles Downing Arrested After Three-Year Hunt

Charles R. Downing, 31, sought for nearly three years by Marshall County peace officers, was arrested last Monday night at Fort Wayne, Ind., by police of that city and FBI officers.

Downing was indicted here on Oct. 29, 1951, for murder in connection with the disappearance of his 13-month-old stepdaughter, Nancy Jo Clover.

Downing, a former resident of Gilbertsville Route 1, was working in Fort Wayne as a salesman under the name of Jack Williams when arrested. Downing has refused to comment on the murder charge since his arrest and also has refused to waive extradition.

Sheriff Billy Watkins and County Attorney H. H. Lovett Jr. left Benton late Monday to seek to return Downing to this county. The officers stopped in Frankfort Tuesday to obtain extradition papers from the governor of Kentucky.

They appeared Wednesday before the governor of Indiana, and were to go from the governor's office to Fort Wayne to pick up Downing and return him here.

The officers were accompanied by Volney Brien, who was sheriff at the time of the child's disappearance.

The child was taken to the office of Dr. G. C. McClain, Benton physician, on the night of February 18, 1951, and the physician said it was badly bruised about the head, chest and body. He gave it only two hours to live.

He ordered the baby hospitalized and made arrangements for its admittance at Murray Hospital but it was never taken there. Later checks showed that the child was not admitted to any hospital in this area.

Fort Wayne Police Captain Mitchell Cleveland quoted Mrs. Downing as saying the child died of pneumonia the day of the doctor's examination and was buried in a country church yard near Paducah. She did not name the church.

Efforts to locate the missing child were started in May, 1951, after the mother of Mrs. Downing, who lives in Cuba, Mo., reported that mail addressed to her daughter had been returned to her unclaimed.

Among the unclaimed envelopes were some insurance checks made payable to the Clover children by their own father, who was killed in an accident in Missouri, she said. She reported that the youngest child had been seriously ill and asked the American Red Cross to help her locate the family.

Volney Brien was notified of the case by Mrs. H. B. Holland, Benton Red Cross worker, and he started an investigation.

Brien said he got his first real clue in the case on August 28, 1951, when a Missouri state policeman called Dr. McClain to confirm that the Downing child had been beaten to death.

Dr. McClain referred the call to Brien, who then learned for the first time that something was known about the case in Missouri.

After checking all local hospitals to determine whether the

child had been admitted, Brien learned that Downing's parents lived in Alton, Ill., so he called one of them by long distance telephone.

The parent reported that Downing and his wife came to Alton on Feb. 18 or 19 and told them that the baby had died the day before and had been buried in Marshall County.

Then it was learned that the Downings had told their Marshall County neighbors the baby had died while they were in Alton and had been buried there.

Some of the neighbors thought the missing child was afflicted, Brien said. They reported that it "cried an awful lot." Some suspected that it had had polio.

Suspicions of foul play in the case were heightened when it was learned that the Downings had departed in the night and left behind some valuable farm equipment, including a tractor. They did not tell anyone they were planning to leave and left no forwarding address.

Mrs. Downing, the former Mrs. Wanda Clover, had two other children by her first husband. One was five and the other three years of age. She and Downing were married in 1950 and moved to Marshall County from a Cuba, Mo. They lived in the Tiptonville section between Gilbertsville and Briensburg.

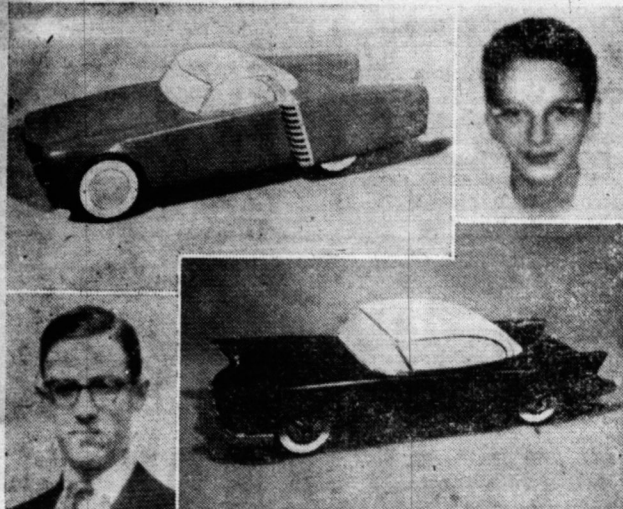

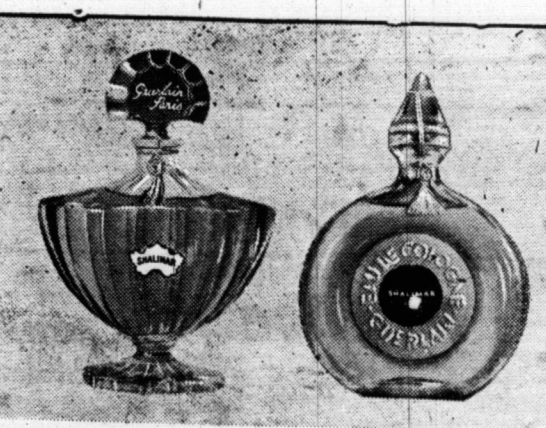

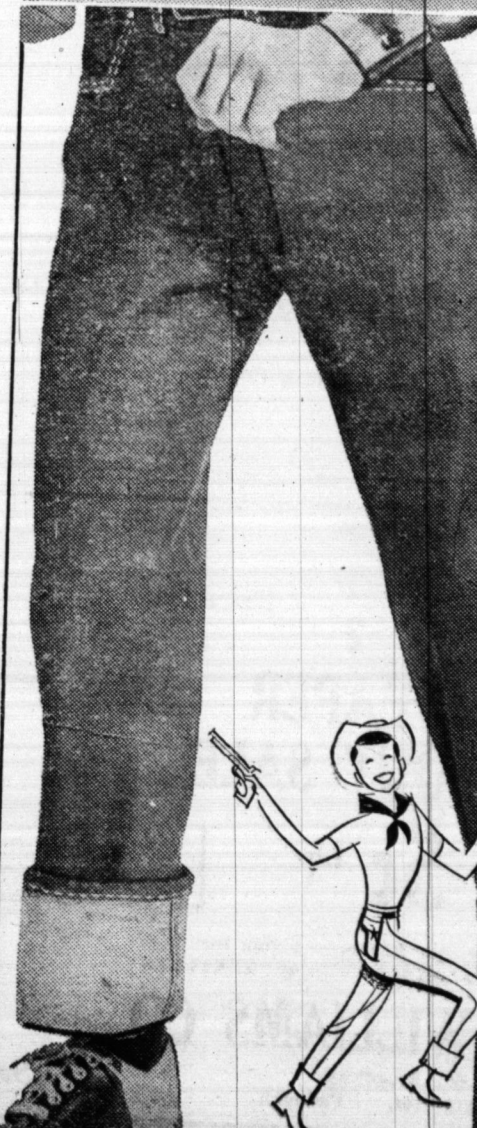

## The Farm Front-

J. HOMER MILLER  
County Farm Agent

The rains came last week. Very little in some parts of the county and almost a flood in other parts. The rainfall in Benton was 1.1 inches. One fifth inch fell during a 40-day period from June 9. Much of the corn will not produce grain. Pastures are about all burned up.

Trench silos will be used on many farms to salvage corn stalks and fodder. James Gibson, Robert Turner, Barnett McGregor and many others are constructing silos. Silage can be used to replace much of the hay and pasture that has been ruined.

Seed small grains, rye, oats

barley as soon as possible for fall pasture and grain next spring. Tobacco fields, corn fields where silage is cut and small grain fields may be used. Early seeding means more pasture this fall and winter.

Millet may be planted now and harvested this fall. Curt Castleberry has planted 100 pounds since the rain.

The annual Princeton experiment field day will be held Friday, August 6. If you do not have transportation contact this office. It should be a day well spent.

A. B. Vanover and Ishmeul Reed have constructed pole barns the past few weeks. Pole barns are economical to construct and are efficient to use. Other barns in the county are planned.

Joe Faughn is constructing a Grade A dairy barn. The Marshall County Farm Bureau started the new cattle barns on the fair grounds last Saturday. The poles have been set. The public will be invited to help with construction at a later date.

Hoy Thompson has the best garden I have seen this year. It was mulched with straw and has been irrigated. He has plenty of beans, tomatoes and cucumbers.

There is still time to plant beans, corn and many other garden seed. Plant now for a fall garden.

Don't forget the annual Farm Bureau picnic at the City Park in Benton, Saturday, July 31.

The extension advisory committee will hold its summer meeting in the courthouse Tuesday night, August 3. All members are urged to attend.

bound trains at 8:20 a.m., 3:08 p.m. and 7 p.m. There were north bound trains at 12:31 p.m. and 7:33 p.m.

Apparently, two telephone systems operated in the County. The newspaper listed its two phone numbers as Cumberland 12, and Marshall County 5. The phones in those days were fastened to the wall and you turned a hand crank to get the operator.

**ALL OF THE NEWS** was flavored with editorial opinion and a lot of flowery adjectives. This dispatch from the Flat Woods correspondent is a good example:

"Last Monday morning, Mr. W. R. Butler sent out to Benton after Mr. Bill Fleming, the artist to come out and make pictures of his new residence while it was so beautifully decorated with the untimely snow. Being induced by the picturesque scene of the snow, T. J. Baker, Jim Darnall and Jake Darnall all had views made of their residences."

Another example: "Last Sunday, being the first Sunday in May, was the time for the annual picnic at Almo for Benton folks. The following spent a most enjoyable day in genuine outdoor pleasure: Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Nelson, Mr. and Mrs. Coy Reeder, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Wolfe, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Johnson, Mrs. Jane Holland, Ophus Castleberry, Mrs. H. D. Maddox and Miss Willie Mae Maddox."

## HEALTH HORIZONS

Failing Eyesight After Fifty

As we get to fifty and beyond, most of us note that our vision is not so keen as it once was. Eyesight, the most precious of our senses, seems also to be the most vulnerable to the ravages of time. Perhaps the earlier changes in vision are more annoying than worrisome. But with increasing years, many people become haunted by the fear that their failing sight may end in blindness.

This is an unnecessary fear in a vast number of cases, according to Dr. Arthur J. Bedell of Albany, N. Y. One of the most frequent causes of failing sight in people over fifty is a condition called "senile macular degeneration," he says—and this definitely does not lead to blindness.

### Early Signs

"An afflicted person first notices that reading, writing and other near use of the eyes is more difficult and that a change of glasses does not help," writes Dr. Bedell. "Often one eye is involved weeks or even months before the other, and unless the patient is a keen observer the disease may be far advanced by the time he seeks help because a similar change has started in the second eye. . . . The most significant symptom is a dark spot before the eye or eyes, which increases in size."

This "degeneration" is, unfortunately, simply a penalty of age. It can't be "cured," as an infection might be, with any of the wonder drugs. "After the sight is once reduced, it is never restored," says Dr. Bedell. Early treatment with a drug such as potassium iodide may, however, "retard the destructive process." It is helpful,



too, to keep the general health at a high level.

### Seek the Right Help

Since this condition is somewhat difficult to diagnose, the elderly person with eye symptoms should go to a real eye specialist, an ophthalmologist. This does not mean an optician or an optometrist, who are experts in making and fitting glasses but are not trained in diseases of the eyes. Non-specialists may not recognize the disease, and can mistake it for a malignancy requiring drastic surgery. So, if you do not know a good ophthalmologist, ask your family doctor to help you find one. Peace of mind alone may be adequate repayment for your time and trouble in obtaining an accurate diagnosis.

## Farm Work Dangerous

Working on a farm is the most dangerous occupation a man can engage in, according to statistics compiled by the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

The number of deaths of farm workers due to accidents is greater than in any other industry, and serious accidents are nearly 35 times as many as the fatalities.

The shocking records show the following number of fatal accidents in 1953: Agriculture, 3,800; construction, 2,500; manufacturing, 2,400; trade and transportation, 1,400 each; oil and gas wells, 900; and public utilities, 300.

Seven hundred of the fatal farm accidents involved wheel tractors, and one-third of them involved persons under 20 years of age. One case out of every 10 was a child under 5 years.

The 11th National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, is sponsored by the National Safety Council and the United States Department of Agriculture for the

purpose of emphasizing the importance of safety consciousness among farmers and their families.

## County Gets Road Help From State

Frankfort—The State Department of Highways gave Marshall County maintenance help on 158.3 miles of rural highways during the fiscal year ending June 30, according to a report by George H. Halley, director of the State's Division of Rural Highways.

The figure includes all mileage obligated for assistance under Kentucky's program of helping to build and maintain county roads. For this purpose, a fund of \$5,000,000 from the general highway fund is set up each year and projects are decided upon by representatives of the State Department of Highways and county fiscal courts.

The program is entirely separate from the work of the Department of Rural Highways which builds highways from a fund provided by a two-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax for rural road purposes.

Mileage involved in Marshall County was under constant patrol by grading equipment which graded a total of 1069.3 miles. There were 155.8 miles patched, 32 miles ditched and 93 structures repaired. Structures include bridges and culverts.

## Soil Conservation Notes

By HERBERT ANDERSON  
Renloe Rudolph, Eura Mathis and Homer Chester, supervisors of the Marshall County Soil Conservation district, attended the area meeting of district supervisors July 15, in the Kentucky Woodlands National Wildlife Refuge located in Trigg County.

### Corn Ruined by Dry Weather Should be Used for Silage

Corn fields ruined by hot dry weather can still be used for cattle feed this winter, according to J. Homer Miller, county agent.

Since very little corn can be harvested on such fields there are at least three ways some benefits can be derived from the cornstalks and fodder.

One would be to pasture the fields with livestock, another would be to cut and shock the crop and the third and best would be to use it for silage.

Trench silos may be dug on most farms with good success and at a reasonable cost. This way the entire stalk will be eaten by the cattle. Silage will replace hay at the rate of about two pounds silage to one pound hay. The size of the silo depends on the number of cattle to be fed and the number of days to be used.

Supervisors were also present from Calloway, Graves, Hickman, Fulton, McCracken, Livingston, Lyon, Trigg, Caldwell and Crittenden counties. There are five supervisors in each local county district.

R. G. Norman harvested over 1100 bales of grass-legume hay last spring from a field seeded the past fall. The field is in a rotation which includes corn.

The Hope-Alken bill now before Congress provides for the establishment of watershed protection programs on small watersheds throughout the county. If the bill passes, the Clark River watershed will be eligible to apply for this assistance. If it is approved, there would be some clearing of the main channel in addition to the protection of the watershed.

E. W. Burkhardt, Oak Level; Sam Fooks, Mt. Moriah; Hatler Morgan, Benton; and Eura Dakley, south of Benton, have staked ponds so far this month.

Joe L. Filbeck, Brewers; Joe Hill, Briensburg; Herman English, Scale; and Irwan (Bill) York, Scale, have staked and dug farm ponds this month.

Everett Hill, Hardin, dug a new drainage ditch last week. A bulldozer cleared the timber from the old ditch and enlarged it to a bottom width of twelve feet.

Most bottom land in the county is now dry enough to dig drainage ditches. A good outlet is needed. The A.C.P. payment is 12 cents a cubic yard for earth moved.

The Soil Conservation Service makes surveys of ponds, open ditches, and other moving practices for the farmer without charge.

## Here's How You Can Make Perfect Iced Tea for Family

Here are some tips on making perfect iced tea.

Number one requisite is to have all utensils super clean. Wash with a solution of baking soda and water—three tablespoons soda to each quart of water. Baking soda eliminates possibilities of any "off odors."

If you make iced tea in a saucepan you can make large quantities and keep for an afternoon and evening refresher.

Premeasure five tablespoons loose tea or 15 tea bags. Bring two quarts fresh cold water to a full boiling roll in a saucepan. Remove from heat, and immediately add tea. Brew uncovered five minutes. Stir and strain into pitcher. Cool at room temperature. Makes about 10 servings.

Serve with lemon slices and no-calorie sweetening tablets. It is not necessary to refrigerate iced tea. Refrigeration may cause clouding. This, however, does not harm the flavor or quality of iced tea. A little boiling water will restore its crystal, amber color.

## BENTON SOLDIER HURT IN ACCIDENT AT FORT KNOX

Pvt. Billy R. Lovett of Benton was accidentally wounded in the shoulder by a rifle bullet at Fort Knox, Ky., on July 16th. The accident happened as soldiers were stacking their rifles after practice.
