There were no entries for the title of king, but last year's king, Dennis Henson, placed the crown upon the head of Miss Schmidt after she had been chosen queen.

Downing Case Still Unsolved

Mrs. Wanda Downing is being held in the Marshall County jail in connection with the disappearance of her 13-month-old daughter, Nancy Jo Clover.

Her husband, Charles Ray Downing, is being held in the McCracken County jail in connection with the same case.

Mr. and Mrs. Downing were returned last Thursday night, July 29, from Fort Wayne, Ind., where they were apprehended after a three-year search.

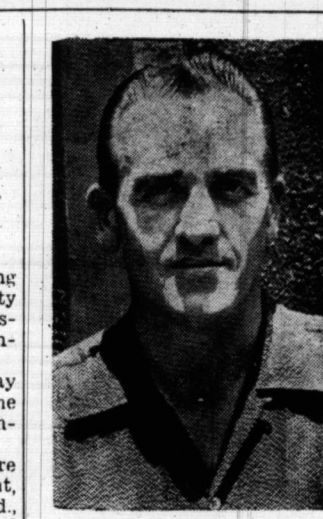
The child, seriously ill, was brought to a Benton physician's office in 1951 and the doctor advised the parents to put the child in a hospital. Since that time, the child has never been seen by authorities.

Downing is under indictment for murder and his wife is under indictment for aiding and abetting in the child's death. Downing has retained a Fort Wayne attorney, and Mrs. Downing has retained the Benton law firm of Prince, Asher, Cox and Prince.

County authorities have questioned Mr. and Mrs. Downing since their return from Indiana but no new clues have been found in the case. What happened to the child is as much a mystery to authorities as it ever was.

Mrs. Downing has stuck to her story that the child died of pneumonia and was buried in a cemetery near Paducah. She says, however, she does not remember where the cemetery is located.

Trials of Mr. and Mrs. Downing are scheduled for the October term of Marshall Circuit Court.

Construction May Start This Year

Site for the new Marshall County Health Center was selected Wednesday by state officials.

The location chosen is on county-owned land near the county garage in West Benton.

The site was picked by Paul Hackney, Louisville, of the Kentucky State Board of Health; William Judy, Frankfort, of the State Property and Buildings Commission; and Potter Smith, architect of Paducah. Mr. Smith will draw plans for the building.

Cost of the Health Center, which will be a one-story brick structure will be \$40,000. Citizens of Marshall County raised \$10,000 for the project; the state government provided \$10,000 and the federal government is providing \$20,000 under the Hill-Burton act.

Mr. Hackney said that if Marshall County Fiscal Court approved the site selected, plans could be drawn and bids on construction asked within 60 days. Actual work on the project could begin late this year.

Fiscal court is expected to act on the matter very shortly.

Citizens Seek Black Top for Oak Level Road

A group of Marshall County citizens went to Frankfort this week and urged the State Highway Commission to blacktop the Oak Level Road.

The group had an audience with Highway Commissioner Bill Curlin, who told them no funds were available for the work this year but voiced hope that the road might be blacktopped next year.

The group was led by State Senator Wayne Freeman of Mayfield and State Representative Shelby McCallum of Benton.

There is a surplus of dairy products and this is one way to help relieve that situation.

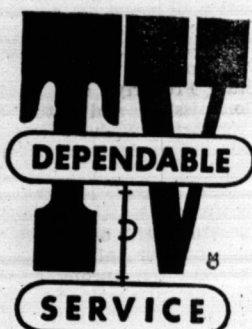

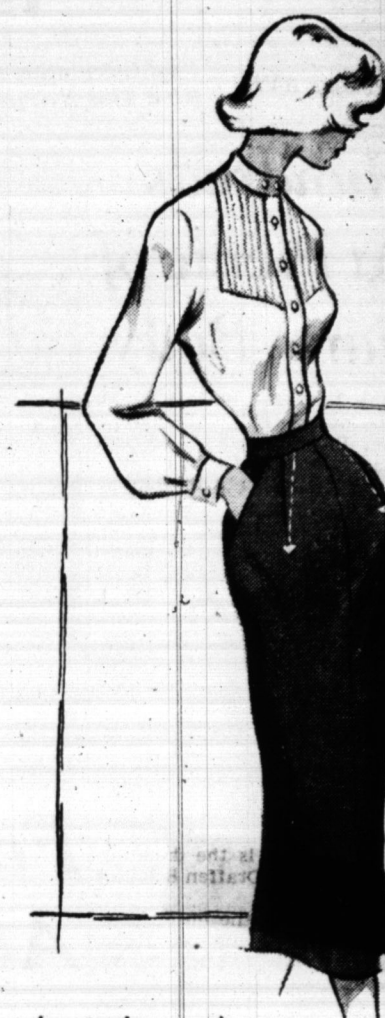

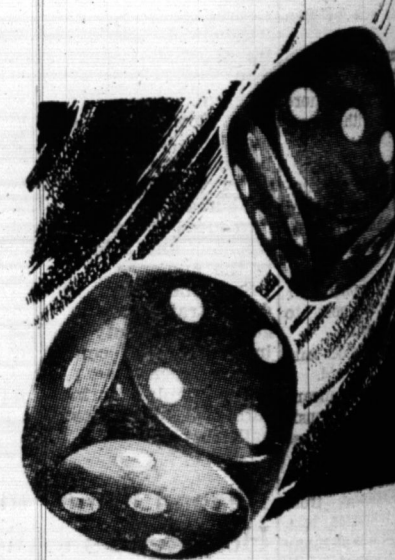

The Farm FRONT--

By J. HOMER MILLER
County Farm Agent

Raymond Riley has one of the nicest prospects for a good crop I have seen in the county. He has eight acres of dark tobacco that is far above average. The two acres of variety demonstration is excellent. He has 200 acres of corn.

"I believe there are 100 acres that will make 75 bushels per acre. The other 100 acres are later but look good. Proper fertilization certainly pays dividends," Mr. Riley says.

Clip pastures now to control weeds and to rid the pasture of undesirable growth. This will increase grazing if proper rains come.

Harold Bailey has cut his sudan grass for hay. It is hard to cure but makes good quality grass hay.

The Farm Bureau picnic was a big success. A good program and a good attendance. One thousand pounds of mutton were consumed along with other food.

Rainfall for the months of July totaled 1.4 inches. Total for seven months was 21.4 inches. It is not necessarily how much it rains but when it rains.

You can still plant sweet corn, bunch beans, greens, chinese cabbage, radishes and lettuce. This may reduce the grocery bill.

Things to think about: If I were to visit four farms per day per week it would take two years to visit the 1981 farms.

If I were to talk with each person in the county at the rate of eight per day, five days per week, it would require almost eight years to talk with the 16,000 people. Individual contact takes time.

However if a man and a woman from each farm in the county could attend a meeting, only 100 meetings would be required with an average attendance of 40 persons per meeting. Group meetings save time and more can receive information.

Last year the agents and leaders held 537 meetings with a total attendance of almost 25,000 people. Did you attend one or more meetings?

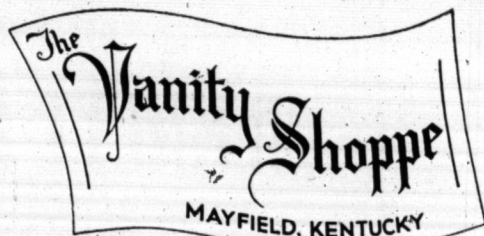

Cooper Explains Status of Postoffices

Washington—Senator Cooper said last week that "Kentucky will receive its fair share of the allocation of funds under the lease-purchase program" for building postoffices.

The Kentucky Republican noted that some 70 post offices in Kentucky are eligible for construction, when funds are appropriated, at an estimated cost of more than \$17,000,000.

"Let me emphasize that no action of any kind was taken during the past 16 years, when taxes were at their highest level in our history, to appropriate money for this work," Cooper declared.

Misinformation Cited
He said that there has been a good deal of misinformation and misinterpretation on the subject and that people were entitled to the facts without the political misrepresentation that frequently has surrounded the question.

Cooper explained the background that led Congress to pass the lease-purchase bill.

"The present law, enacted in 1913 and since repeatedly exacted, makes eligible for construction of a building any post office that has an annual business of \$10,000 or more," he said. "This is merely an authorization. In order to build a post office, an appropriation must also be approved by Congress."

Last Money Given in '38
The last appropriation to be approved under the existing law was in 1938 and without such appropriations no construction can be undertaken," Cooper said.

At present, there are 5,361 post offices and other federal public buildings which have been declared eligible for construction.

at an estimated cost of \$2,300,000.

"The present administration felt that some action should be taken in order to provide some government buildings which are critically needed," Cooper said.

The lease-purchase bill was passed as a result. Cooper called it a new approach designed to save as much as possible for the taxpayer.

Rent Pays Costs
"Basically, the lease-purchase bill provides that the Government may contract with private concerns for the lease of newly constructed buildings at a rate which, in the long run, will pay for the cost of construction," the Kentuckian said.

"The construction money is not provided by the Government, but by private investors. The Government only pays rent. At the end of the lease period, title will pass to the Federal Government. The lease-purchase bill runs for a three-year period and covers various types of federal buildings, not post offices alone."

Cooper said that for the fiscal year beginning last July 1, the Post Office Department has available \$3,000,000 of rental funds to commit under the lease-purchase program and the General Services Administration has \$5,000,000.

Good Beginning Claimed
He said that this is the first money made available since 1938 that can be used for the eventual acquisition of post offices alone, it would be necessary to appropriate \$2,300,000, he said.

"Such a high appropriation is not possible at this time, nor would building facilities be available to undertake construction on all offices immediately," he said. "The amounts provided will, however, make a good beginning and will resume work that has been halted for 16 years."

The lease-purchase bill lays down specific restrictions for acquiring post offices. Private money must be available because the Government itself

will not do the building or financing, but will only lease the structure on a long-term basis.

Need to be Proved

The law also requires the establishment of need and the showing that other facilities are not available. The Post Office Department and the General Services Administration will set up a system of priorities.

Cooper said first consideration will be given to areas where the Federal Government already owns land, thus reducing costs and making possible a greater number of buildings with the limited funds.

"Several weeks will probably pass before the policies have been completely determined and the necessary funds made to establish priority and need," Cooper said. "Then actual plans will have to be drawn. Finally, local financing must be worked out and the lease-purchase agree-

ments concluded.
"President Eisenhower and his Administration have been very helpful to us in Kentucky and have promised to co-operate with me in every way possible."

National cash awards in the Nationwide Crochet Contest amount to over \$2500, including \$500 for the grand national champion, the contestant whose piece is judged superior to all others. In addition to cash awards, the grand national champion and the top winners in the men only group and the teen-age girl champion will receive all-expense trips to New York City.

Rules for the contest are simple. To be eligible, a piece must be crocheted of mercerized cotton in any size thread up to and including size 100, and must have been completed since January 1, 1954, though not necessarily started this year.

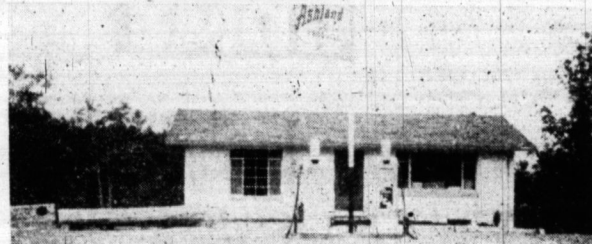
New Income Tax Law is Explained

Frankfort - The new Kentucky income tax law may save you some money next year.

Besides requiring employers to withhold tax from salaries paid employees, the new law allows an individual to take advantage of certain deductions and credits which were not permitted before. This means in many cases that an individual who earned the same income in 1954 as in 1953 will pay less state income tax on the 1954 income.

Some of the new deductions and credits which will be permitted when the 1954 return is filed are:

1. Credit may be claimed for any dependent who is claimed on your federal income tax return.
2. Extra credits may be claimed for persons over 65 years of age or blind.
3. Same treatment of gains and losses from the sale of capital assets as allowed on federal return.
4. If deductions are itemized, these will be permitted:
 - A. Seven cents a gallon Kentucky gasoline tax.
 - B. Three per cent usage tax on automobiles.
 - C. Kentucky income tax paid during the year.
 - D. Higher limit on deductible charitable contributions.
 - E. Higher limit on medical expenses; if taxpayer is over 65, all of his medical expenses are deductible.
 - F. City occupational taxes if paid to city outside Kentucky.

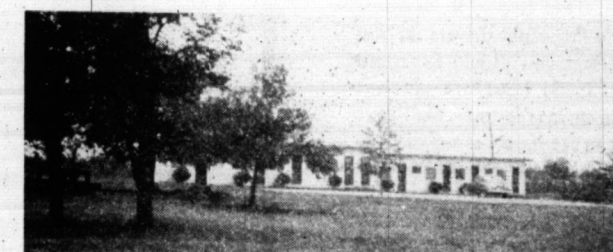

Farm Facts FOR KENTUCKY FOLKS

DAIRY REFERENDUM. August 21 is an important date on the Kentucky dairy farmer's calendar. This is the date of the referendum to determine whether they want to authorize a small "set-aside" from the sale of their milk and cream to finance a promotional program designed to increase the demand for dairy products.

From income from dairying in Kentucky ranks second only to tobacco but, in view of the mounting dairy surplus, farmers are faced with one of three alternatives — receiving lower

prices, reducing production or increasing consumption.

Consumption of dairy products in the United States has dropped from the equivalent of 824 pounds of milk per capita in 1939 to 759 in 1953 even though medical science continues to show the need for more milk in our diets. Constructive advertising should quickly regain this loss and create a shortage where there is now a surplus.

"MORE AND MORE ALFALFA" in Kentucky will be the goal of the agricultural committee of the Kentucky Bankers Association in 1955. Their 255 member banks throughout the state will lend their support to county agricultural workers in an effort to increase the alfalfa acreage on land adapted to that crop.

Although alfalfa is one of the most dependable forage crops. Its acreage in Kentucky has decreased during recent years.

The important factors in succeeding with alfalfa are (1) sow only on well drained soil — especially one with an open subsoil (2) use an abundance of lime, phosphate and potash and (3) use certified seed of an adapted variety. In football terms, alfalfa might be called a "triple-threat crop"—it is fine for hay, silage and pasture. In addition it is a great soil building crop when properly fertilized.

Hollis Franklin, Crittenden County banker, suggests this slogan for the alfalfa program. What do you think of it? "Improve your land, Help your livestock thrive, Grow alfalfa in '55."

SEEDING TIME IS HERE AGAIN. August is one of the best months for sowing alfalfa, red and crimson clover and most of the grasses. The time is almost here, too, for barley, oats and rye—all of which when seeded early give a lot of pasture in the cool fall months, provided, of course, we have enough fertility and rainfall. New varieties are important. Try to remember these names: At-

lantic alfalfa; Kenland red clover; Balbo rye; Atlantic, Forked and Pulwin oats; and Vigo wheat. They are the important varieties of fall seeded crops.

FARMERS HAVE TWO GREAT FEARS—one, the fear of individual crop failure due to adversities not under their control—the other, fear of collective over-production, with resulting ruinous prices. Most farmers are willing and anxious to adjust their production goals to consumptive needs as an insurance against over-production. That is why farmers have always cooperated with federal crop control programs.

They returned by way of Omaha, where they visited Boy's Town, and Abilene, Kan., the home of President Eisenhower.

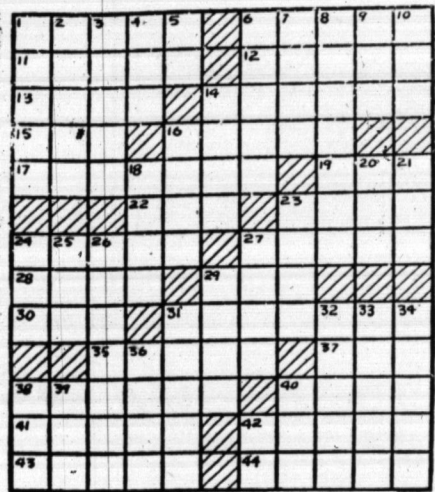
