Final plans for the Marshall County Fair, Sept. 1-4, were made Tuesday night at a meeting of fair executives and committee members at the Community Building here.

The four-day spectacle will be opened as usual, with a big School Day program. A parade of school children and floats will start at 12:30 p. m. on Wednesday. At 1:30, in front of the fairgrounds grandstand, the pupils will stage a program.

Homer Chester of the same community has the best burley field I have seen in a long time. The field was tested for soil needs and the fertilizer used that was needed for maximum growth.

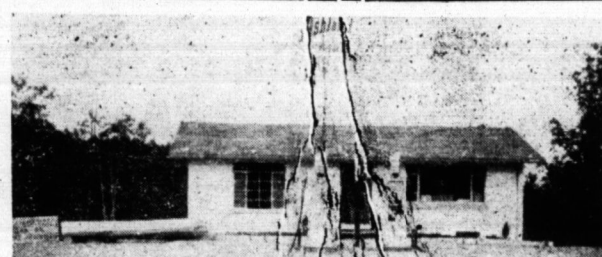

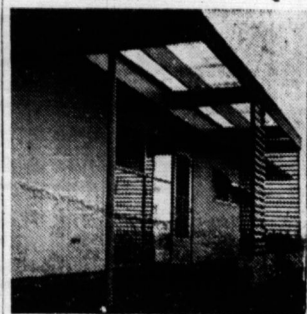
