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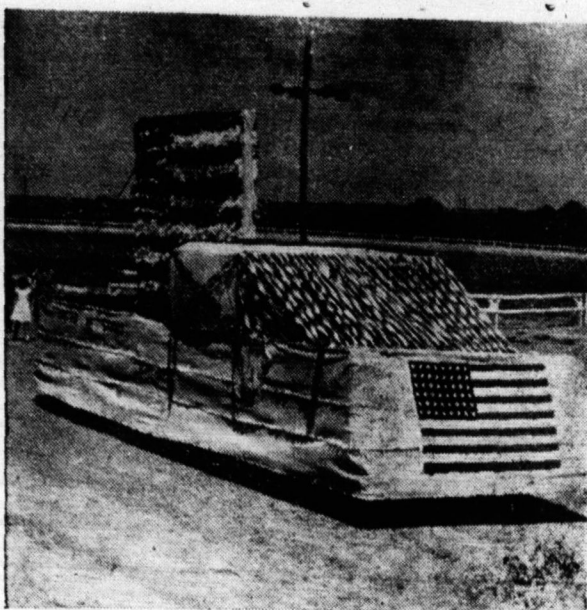

The appointment was made by Circuit Judge H. H. Lovett Sr.

Mrs. Holland will serve until the November 1955 election. Under Kentucky law, Judge Lovett explained, an appointee to county office can serve only until the next election at which county or state officers are selected. There will be no county or state officials chosen at this November's election. Hence, Mrs. Holland's appointment is until the November 1955 election.

In November 1955, a successor will be elected by the voters to fill Mr. Holland's unexpired term. His term in office would have ended on Jan. 1, 1958.

In paying tribute to Mr. Holland, Judge Lovett said:

"Brien Holland was the best circuit clerk I ever knew. I was as closely associated with him as any man in Marshall County, and I never saw him sacrifice a single principle for political expediency. He was devoted to his work, and was an outstanding public official."

Mr. Holland served as circuit clerk for 26 years.

## GI Home Repair Loans Easier

Veterans should find it easier to get supplemental loans for major alterations, repairs and improvements to their GI homes as a result of the Housing Act of 1954 and new Veterans Administration streamlined procedures, VA has announced.

The Housing Act, which became law on August 2, 1954, makes it possible for World War II and post-Korea veterans to take advantage of any unused home loan entitlement for home improvement loans.

They further encourage lenders to make more such loans, VA now will allow supervised lenders holding GI home loans to complete home improvement loans to their veteran-borrowers without getting clearance in advance from VA.

VA emphasized that under the Housing Act which amends the GI Bill, a supplemental loan may be guaranteed or insured by VA only if it covers repairs necessary for the protection of the property or will substantially improve the basic livability or utility of the property.

VA estimates that more than 3,000,000 of the 3,351,000 veterans who have obtained GI home loans have some loan guaranty entitlement left. Under the GI Bill, veterans have a maximum guaranty entitlement of 60 per cent of a GI home loan. But the guaranty cannot exceed \$7,500.

## Farmers More Fertilizer Conscious Than Previously

In recent years farmers of this and other counties have become fertilizer conscious. They have been using more fertilizer under their hay, pasture and row crops than ever before.

In order for them to know what elements are deficient in their soil it is necessary for them to have the soil in question tested. Anyone who wants a test made can bring the sample to the county agents' office and he will have the test run and will make recommendations as to the kind and amount of fertilizer to use.

A fee of 65 cents per sample is charged for the test. This fee pays the laboratory technician who runs the test.

If farmers are to get the best results from the soil-testing program and from fertilizing according to the recommendations made, soil samples must be taken properly and delivered in good shape. The sample is best taken from the field when the soil is dry enough to plow. When the ground is wet it is much harder to mix the soil so the portion sent to the laboratory is representative.

If the sample is not dry when taken it should be air dried and all lumps crushed before the sample is sent in.

The three tools most commonly used for taking soil samples are soil sampling tubes, augers, and spades. A clean bucket should be at hand for mixing the sample. A good auger or spade can be found on almost every farm and these are good tools for sampling if used properly.

erly. A sample can be taken more quickly and easily when a soil-sampling tube or auger is used rather than a spade, and usually it will be more likely to represent the area.

When using an auger or soil sampling tube make a boring 6 inches deep, or no deeper than the soil is plowed, and pull up the soil. When a spade is used dig a V-shaped hole 6 inches deep or deeper and cut a thin slice from the side of the hole.

The boring or slice of soil removed should consist of a sample extending from the surface to a depth of 6 inches or plow layer depth. Any grass or trash should be removed from the surface before boring is made or before the slice is collected with the spade.

If a field is uniform in soil-type, fertility, slope, and crop growth, and if fertilizer and lime treatment have been the same over the entire field, one composite sample of 10 or more samplings is sufficient.

If the field varies in soil-type, fertility or slope, or if crop growth varies in different parts of the field or if fertilizer and lime treatment have varied during recent years a composite sample of 10 or more borings should be taken from each area.

A fruit jar or a heavy paper sack are good to send the sample in to be tested. Place about a pint of the soil in the container and mark clearly with the field name or number and the farmer's name and address.

Before limestone and fertilizer recommendations can be properly made, past cropping history, soil treatments and future cropping plans must be known by the county agent.

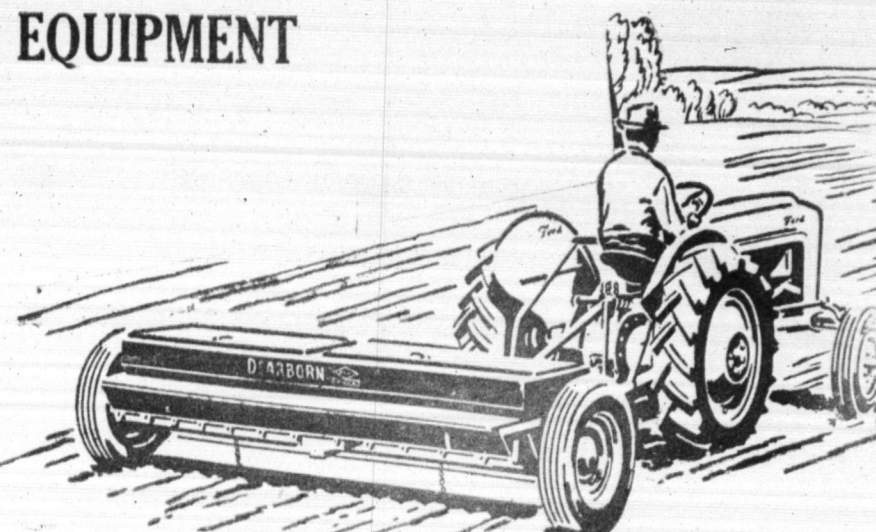

## Cover Crops Are Very Important

All farmers are to seed cover crops on all land that was in row crops, on lespedeza fields, on drought-damaged pastures, and on all tobacco land. Any field without prospect of winter cover at seeding time should be considered for cover crops.

Since tobacco land is usually the most fertile soil on the farm, and usually is fertilized heavier than other soils, it is highly important that it be seeded to a cover crop. What is seeded and the rate of seeding will be determined by the use to be made of the cover crop.

If harvested for grain, seeding will be lighter than for grazing or for a green manure crop. If the small grains, where pasture is desired, rye heads the list. If the crop is to be turned under for tobacco the following year, wheat or barley is preferred, with the addition of vetch or crimson clover.

Usually thorough disking of the soil after the tobacco crop is harvested is sufficient preparation to make a good seed bed. Seeding may be done any time after the crop is harvested, starting in late August with rye and barley, the better the stand and the greater the protection of the soil.

Where the crop is seeded for grain, 1 1/2 bushels of wheat, 2 bushels of barley or 1 1/2 bushels of rye are recommended. If the small grains are seeded for pasture or green manure crop, the seeding rate should be increased one and half times. If the small grain is seeded with vetch, three pecks to a bushel of grain should be seeded with 30 to 40 pounds of vetch.

Varieties of barley recommended by the college are Kenbar and Ky. No. 1. Wheat varieties are Vigo, Thorne and Clarkston. Only hairy or winter vetch is recommended for Kentucky, as this is the one variety that survives the state's winters. When crimson clover is used, it is important that new crop seed be sown.

Following corn crops, Balboa rye is the safest cover crop, and the best variety for this area.

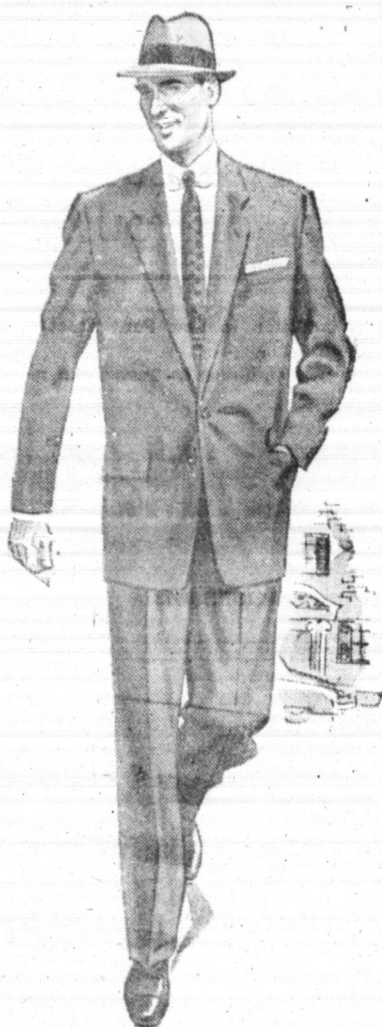

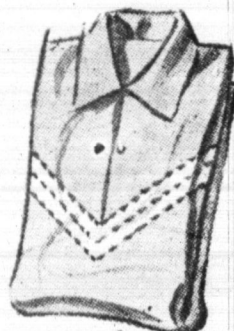

## Timely Tips on How To Conserve the Soil

Soil and water conservation practices are seasonal in nature. That is, each practice can best be established at certain times of the year.

August and September are the best months for doing a number of practices which will make Marshall County green.

There is a great need for sowing winter cover crops now. Thousands of acres of our farm land is in row crops. When those crops are harvested, the land will be left bare and unprotected. The winter rains will beat the soil to pieces and wash them away. Sow cover crops and keep your soil at home.

Corn stalks will save more soil when disced into the top inch or two of soil. After discing, why not also sow a winter cover crop for added protection? If you don't, you will lose more money than it will cost to sow the cover crop.

Grasses and legumes for pasture and hay can best be sown now on crop rotation land and on permanent pasture land.

Crop rotation land is either bottom land or upland which is capable of being used for growing row crops in rotation with grasses and legumes. For example, corn followed by three years in grass is a four year rotation. All crop rotation land needs to be protected with terraces, contour rows, diversion ditches, strip cropping, and sod waterways. These protective measures can be done now.

Permanent pasture land is land which is too steep or badly eroded to safely grow row crops. It is too steep or rolling to terrace or cultivate on the contour. The best and safest time use for this kind of land is pasture or meadow.

Preparation of the seedbed and the sowing of this land on the contour will save soil and moisture and help to get a good stand.

Sod waterways can be established better now than at any other time of the year. There is always some filling and shaping which can be done best when the ground is dry. By liming and fertilizing at two or three times the normal rate, the grass will grow enough before the heavy rains start to hold and prevent the formation of a gully.

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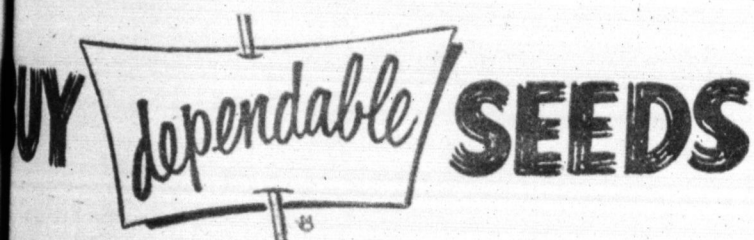

## farm facts FOR KENTUCKY FOLKS

SEPTEMBER IS small grain month. Doing a good job at the right time is the measure of a good farmer. Timeliness is particularly important in sowing small grains where winter pastures are wanted. An acre of rye seeded in early September is worth several acres seeded a month or more later. Winter oats and barley should be sown in early September if they are to furnish fall and winter grazing.

October seedings of these crops are risky from a winter killing standpoint, too. Commercial acreages of wheat should be delayed until after Oct. 12 because of damage by the Hessian fly, but when pasture and green manure are important, wheat can be seeded earlier than is usually recommended.

Remember these important varieties of small grain: Balbo rye; Kenbar barley; Atlantic Fulwin and Forked-deer oats; and Vigo wheat. Certified seed of these varieties are available and are among the season's best buy.

WINTER PASTURES. A few years ago I received a letter from a Kentucky farmer saying, "I am tired of putting up hay all summer long and putting down winter pastures so the cattle can harvest it themselves." He was of course referring to Ky. 31 Fescue. It is as a winter pasture that

Fescue excels. One of the best ways to handle it is to remove the livestock from at least some of the fields in September, fertilizing it well at that time, and letting it grow "accumulated" winter pasture to be grazed when other pastures are gone. Hundreds of herds of beef cattle in Kentucky will be carried through the winter on this system. It is one of the most economical ways of producing beef.

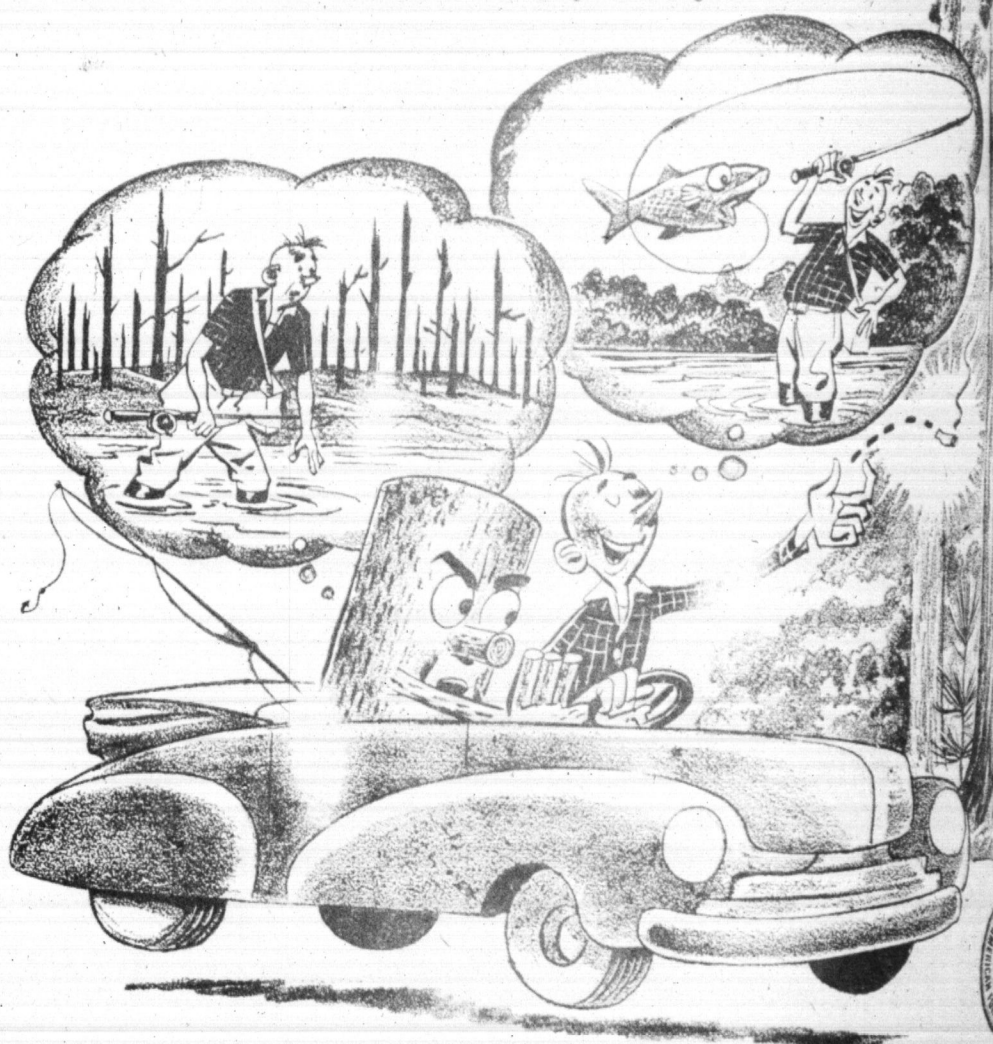
FOOD PRICES AND FARM INCOME. Food prices continue to go up while farm income and the farmers' share of the consumers' food dollars decline. That high support prices are the cause of high food prices. The fact is that the consumers are getting more and better food with the expenditure of the smallest percentage of their income than in any other period of our history.

Farm income dropped 13 percent in the past two years. Lower farm prices have not been reflected in lower living costs. The parity ratio of things farmers sell to things they buy dropped from 94 in July 1953 to 88 in July 1954. Farm mortgages are also increasing rapidly.

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## Food is Basic Resource of Any Nation; Preserve the Soil

Food is a basic resource of any nation. So it is that man or groups of men who in any period of the history of a nation control the supply and are in possession of the basic foods are supreme in power. A government is stable and supreme only if it has control or can take over the rationing of food.

In frontier countries where there is adequate food in the hands of those who produce it, plenty of good land, then the government cannot effectively control the food supply. Our "Land of the Free" tradition stems directly from plenty of good land. Soil conservation is our new frontier.

Farmers—our food producers—soil fertility. If this fertility is replaced our soil can remain strong. If it is not out people will suffer in many ways.

National governments need to have a definite, practical, adequately financed program to conserve our soil and water resources. State governments in turn must carry their respective part of the program.

Since laws were passed by each state to enable landowners to organize into local soil conservation districts as legal units of state government, a clear-cut program stressing the proper use and treatment of our land has emerged. Each local district is governed by five locally elected supervisors who serve without salary.

These men promote conservation among their neighbors, enlist the aid of all local, state and federal farm agencies to lend a hand in the common job, bring their communities together to consider common land problems, and to finally conduct the business of the district and govern it.

Kentucky has been a leader in organizing its conservative forces. The division of soil and water resources was organized to assist soil conservation districts organized under the Kentucky Soil Conservation District Law in carrying out the function, duties, and powers conferred upon them by such law.

The personnel of the division help district supervisors to plan and carry out educational and promotional activities that will tend to make landowners and the general public more aware of the need to use wisely the resources we have left. The division may also assist districts in acquiring heavy or specialized machinery by furnishing them financial assistance in the form of an amortized loan carrying a low rate of interest. This machinery is for use on farm land in the districts and on practices that tend to permit better land use and water control.
