Miller to Get Award For Service

County Agent Homer Miller will receive the Distinguished Service Award of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents next month.

Miller was notified of his selection for the honor last week. The award will be presented at the annual meeting of the organization Oct. 14 at Salt Lake City.

Miller is one of about 100 county agents in the nation selected for the award. He is the fourth agent from Western Kentucky to be selected. S. V. Foy of Caldwell County, John Watts of Fulton County and S. C. Bohanan of McCracken and Ballard, have received it in the past.

Under his leadership Marshall County agriculture has progressed greatly. In the last two years the Farm and Home Development Program here is one of the outstanding ones in the state.

Since Miller arrived in Marshall County, more than two million trees have been planted. That makes Marshall the second county in the state in number of trees set.

Since he has been in Marshall County he has emphasized pasture and livestock development as the best opportunity for profitable farming. The number of improved beef and dairy cattle has doubled and improved pasture seedling has increased from a few acres to more than 20,000 acres, with Kentucky 31 fescue and ladino clover predominating. Grade A dairying is now a quarter-million dollar business.

Marshall County Gets Bookmobile

Marshall County is going to have a Bookmobile.

The Bookmobile will be presented by Governor Wetherby to County School Superintendent Holland Rose Thursday, Sept. 16, at the State Fair in Louisville. The governor will present other Bookmobiles to other county superintendents at the same time.

The Bookmobile will be operated under supervision of the Marshall County Library Board, which is composed of Sunshine Coley, William Roy Draffen, Rolfe Lovett, Frances Greenfield and Mrs. Otis Faughn.

The mobile education unit will serve the school pupils of this county and also the adult citizens. Books will be deposited in each community for use by adults. All of this service will be free to the citizens. There will be no rental fees.

The Bookmobile comes equipped with several hundred library books. The State Library Commission has appropriated \$600 a year for the operation of each Bookmobile, and the Marshall County Board of Education has appropriated \$300 for the operation of its Bookmobile for the first year.

The traveling library will be brought to Marshall County soon after its presentation to Mr. Rose at Louisville.

Farmers Vote Against Dairy Promotion Proposal

Final results in the recent dairy referendum show that 3,855 farmers voted in favor and 4,332 voted against the compulsory 12-month set-aside for the promotion of dairy products. These certified figures were released by John Moser, chairman of the Kentucky Dairy Commission.

Other interesting observations of the recent vote, Moser said, were:

(1) More farmers voted than in any similar commodity referendum held previously.

(2) Farmers voted against the measure primarily because they felt that they had no opportunity to vote out the compulsory 12-month set-aside program after it had been tried for a reasonable length of time.

(3) 65 counties voted in favor of the referendum while only 6 counties were opposed. The total vote indicated the strong opposition lay in a very few counties. Seven counties had no votes; two had tie votes.

The dairy referendum was based on legislation passed in the 1954 General Assembly proposing to legalize the withdrawal of 2 cents per cwt. on milk and half a cent per pound on butterfat from dairy farmers' checks to finance a campaign to sell more dairy products.

According to Moser, this would have been done through a program of research, education, merchandising and advertising.

Moser further stated that in Kentucky the dairy industry has operated on a voluntary 60-day set-aside of 4 cents a cwt. on milk and one cent on butterfat, and will continue to operate on that basis unless the 12-month voluntary set-aside is adopted by surrounding states is adopted by the dairy farmers in Kentucky.

Election Board Appointed for This County

William S. Heath of Benton and Elvin Thompson were named election commissioners of Marshall County last week by the State Election Commission.

These two men and Sheriff Billy Watkins will serve as this county's election board. The sheriff in each county is chairman ex-officio of each board.

Appointed to one-year terms, running from Aug. 23, were a Democrat and a Republican in each county. The appointees were selected from a list of five names submitted by the Democratic and Republican chairmen of each county.

The State Election Commission is controlled, 2 to 1, by the Democrats.

Work to Start On Cafeteria at Benton's School

Construction is expected to begin immediately on the new cafeteria-classroom building to be erected at Benton High School. Bids on the project were opened at the school last Friday.

Hal Perry was low bidder on the general contract with a bid of \$66,500. R. R. McWaters offered a bid of \$57,000, only \$500 above Perry, and Roe Wilkins offered a bid of \$67,750.

Miller-Johnson Co. had the low bid of \$10,000 on the plumbing and heating contract. Next lowest bid was that of J. A. Hill Plumbing Co. of Benton at \$11,437. Other bidders included Ed Hannan of Paducah and the C. & H. Plumbing and Heating Co.

It was the second time Miller-Johnson had offered the low bid on the school project. Earlier this year, when bids were taken on the proposed larger Gymnasium-cafeteria and classroom building, Miller-Johnson was the low bidder. All of those bids were rejected because enough funds were not available to build the larger building now. So when new bids were asked on the smaller cafeteria-classroom building, Miller-Johnson was determined to be the low bidder again.

The new structure, under present plans, is expected to be completed and ready for occupancy by Jan. 1, 1955.

1/2 cup sugar	2 cups sliced canned or fresh apricots*

apricot nectar and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add salt, sugar, lemon
juice, and almond extract. Mix well. Add light cream. Chill until mix-

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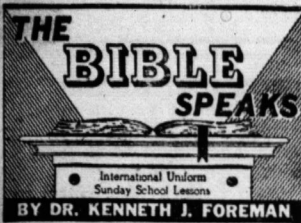

Growing in Love

Lesson for September 19, 1954

A great deal is said about "love" but not enough has been done about it. Jesus taught that Christians must love even their enemies. He and his great apostles Paul and John had much to say about love and forgiveness. Paul would hardly have given the warnings he gave against quarreling and strife if he had not thought that Christians need these warnings. Few words are used oftener in Christian sermons than "love"; few are more misunderstood. Few ideals are held up oftener by the church; few are violated more often by church members. Love is a clouded theme; some questions may help to clear it up.



Christian Love
The first question is: What is the difference between Christian love and what usually goes by that name? It should be plain to any one who can read the Bible that when Paul and John and Jesus speak of "love" and urge it as a duty of all of us, they are not thinking of romantic love as between men and women. That is a good, important, happy and sweet kind of love. No life is fully complete without it; but Christian love is a wider thing. All kinds of love except Christian love have limits. You love your family, your country, your friends, people you know and like. Jesus asks us to love even our enemies. A circle of love that will take in enemies must be something extraordinary, and so it is. Ordinary love, then, has limits; small or wide; Christian love knows no limits. Again, ordinary love is possessive; it wants the loved one for itself. Christian love is self-giving. Ordinary love is strictly human and can be found in those who do not know God. Christian love is divine; it is not only like God's love but is found only in the lives of those who have been touched by God's Spirit. Ordinary love is given to the lovable; the divine kind of love, the Christian kind.

Loving and Liking
Another question is: How can we love those we do not like? And can we like everybody? A clue to the answer is found in what we know of the love of God. Jesus very clearly suggests that we are to be Godlike in our love; indeed, our highest Christian growth comes right here, because when we are most truly filled with this kind of love we are most like God. But it is plain that God does not like every one he loves. We read that God loved us "while we were yet sinners." If we could say that God likes murderers, adulterers, traitors, thieves, foul-mouthed and cruel men, we should have to say that God shows very poor taste. But we are nowhere told that God likes sinners, that is to say that he enjoys their company, enjoys what they do and say. Far from it. If he liked them he would never change them. It is written, "Whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth" but it is just as true to say, "Whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth." Love, in the Christian, God-like meaning, is concern for the true welfare of the loved one. A father may love his son (and God does love his sons), even when he thoroughly disapproves what the son is doing. So we are not expected to like everybody, regardless; that would be rather silly. But as Christians we are expected to have concern for the true welfare of every one.

Can Love Be Perfect?
A third question is: Can our love ever be perfect? Here Christians differ in their understanding of what Jesus and Paul and John taught, and of what is possible for us. All Christians agree that only one life expressing perfect love, from beginning to end, has ever been seen—the life of our Lord. Some Christians believe that it is possible, sometimes, to act from a motive of unadulterated, unalloyed, unreserved, unqualified Christian love. Other Christians believe that this is never possible for a human being, even a Spirit-blessed Christian. Two things are certain at this point. One is that even if the motive is sometimes absolutely pure, human knowledge is never perfect. Our concern may be completely unselfish, but not completely wise. The other certainty is that even if the motive is never absolutely pure, nevertheless perfection is always the high goal.

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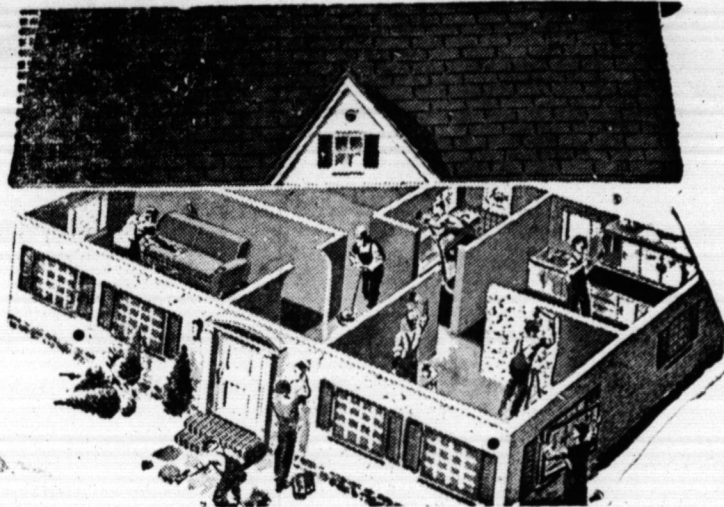

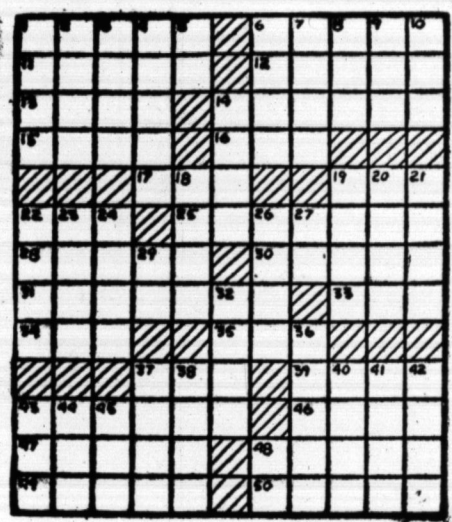

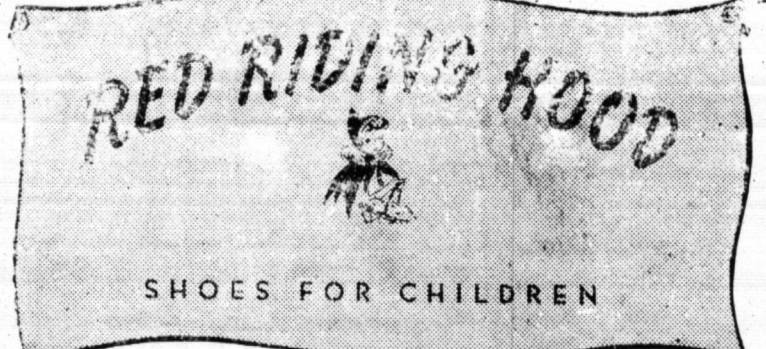
