KILLED.

Charles Adams, of Mayfield Meets Sudden Death.

Paducah, Ky., Dec. 11. While riding an Illinois Central freight train from Paducah to Mayfield, Charles Adams, 23 years old, of Mayfield, fell between two freight cars and was instantly killed just south of Florence station, Sunday night about 11 o'clock. The accident happened near Camp creek, where, in a rear end collision, Essie Williams, a colored brakeman, was killed Friday night. Adams was riding the same train, the second section of freight train No. 180, and was killed about the same hour as Williams.

Adams, with two companions, Ed Smith and Noblin Rozzell, started from Mayfield to Paducah Sunday night, but instead of waiting for the fast passenger train, they decided to ride the second section of freight train No. 180, which was in charge of Engineer J. W. Bobbitt and Conductor J. O. Maxwell.

The young men were riding in an empty coal car. While the train was pulling up the Florence hill, Adams attempted to cross from one car to another, and lost his hold. He fell between the two cars and his body was caught by the wheels.

BENTON STIRRED

Present Grand Jury Indicts Mrs. Ed. Griffith.

Benton, Ky., Dec. 13. Mrs. Lucy Griffith, one of Benton's most prominent women, was this morning indicted by the grand jury on a charge of having administered poison to her husband, Ed Griffith, last April. The indictment charges willful murder.

She was released at once upon a bond of \$4,000, to await her trial next June.

Ed Griffith died suddenly as a result of poison administered to him, it is alleged, in a small glass of whiskey at breakfast time. He was the son of Postmaster W. S. Griffith, and a prominent merchant of Benton.

His death caused a sensation that spread beyond the confines of Marshall county.

Mrs. Griffith was called before a grand jury sitting at Benton shortly after her husband's death, and there was a public opinion that she would be indicted at that time, but the grand jury failed to do so.

The grand jury that went into session a few days ago, however, digested into the noted case, and the result of its investigation this morning indicted Benton and Marshall county.

Mrs. Griffith is of a splendid family, and is prominent. She has many friends.

CALL MEETING

Fiscal Court Convened By Judge Monday 18th.

Patterson has issued a call for a meeting of the Calloway county fiscal court for next Monday, at which time the question of appropriating funds with which to construct the Jefferson Davis Highway through Calloway county will be considered. The surveys through the county have been completed, grades established and estimated cost made. The citizens along the two proposed routes are urged to attend this meeting and will be called upon to enlighten the court regarding the most feasible route to establish. The committees appointed at a recent meeting will be expected to make reports regarding funds subscribed by individuals, and a general discussion of good roads will be had.

STABLE BURNS

Two Horses Perish When McKeel's Barn Burns.

The large livery stable belonging to Clarence Phillips and located just north of Beale & Son's store, was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night at about 7 o'clock. The stable was conducted by W. H. McKeel, who sustained quite a loss including two head of horses.

The fire started in the second story in the hay and is supposed to have resulted from the carelessness of an individual who had been in the hay asleep for several hours before the fire was discovered.

The building was a total loss, with only \$1,500 insurance. Mr. McKeel carried \$2,000 insurance on his fixtures, feed and live stock, and while several of his vehicles were saved from the fire two head of horses and all his feed stuff, harness and other items were destroyed.

Disguised as a decrepit old laborer and walking with a stick, Gen. Bernardo Reyes, once commander in chief of the Mexican army, but now charged with inciting revolution in that country, arrived at Brownsville, Texas.

An appeal from the Persian people to the congress of the United States for aid and sympathy in their controversy with Russia was read in the house of representatives.

Albinus Nance, 63 years old, former governor of Nebraska, died in the Augustana hospital at Chicago of pneumonia. Nance was born in Stark county, Ill., and moved to Nebraska in 1871, after serving through the Civil war.

At Tripoli fourteen Arabs, convicted of treachery by court martial, were hanged by Italian soldiers in the market place at sunrise. They were captured October 23 when a number of supposedly non-combatants among the natives opened fire from ambush upon the Red Cross nurses and surgeons.

Representative Joseph E. Ransdell of Louisiana, of the house rivers and harbors committee, was re-elected unanimously president of the National Rivers and Harbors congress.

The first important step in the federal investigation of the McNamara dynamiting cases came when Orville McNamara, the informer, whose confession caused the downfall of John and James McNamara, was taken before the grand jury at Los Angeles to tell his story.

With his lungs pronounced dead, although his heart action is said to be normal, William Hubbard, aged 26, has been kept alive for a number of days at Tulsa, Okla., by constant use of a pulmonary pump.

After eight years' devious travel in the ways of grand juries and special pleas, the cases of ten Chicago meat packers indicted for alleged violation of the criminal provisions of the Sherman anti-trust law, are now being tried.

The Chinese regent, Prince Chun, father of the baby emperor, Pu Yi, abdicated. Hsu Shih Chang and Shih Hsu were appointed guardians of the 5-year-old emperor.

Vice-President Sherman is not a candidate for re-nomination for vice president, but there is much talk afoot that he may be nominated for governor by the Republicans of New York next year.

John D. Rockefeller has secured title to sixty-fifth and sixty-sixth streets from Avenue A to the East river, from the city of New York, and will transfer the property to the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research.

"The Gomez, whose rebellion at Juchitan resulted in a clash between President Madero and the governor of Oaxaca, was shot to death at Rincon Antonio. Eight of Gomez's partisans met a like fate.

The Fifteenth infantry has landed at Manila and was ordered to Fort William McKinley. It is believed their stay will be only temporary.

Senator Heyburn introduced a bill in the senate to repeal the Canadian reciprocity law enacted during the special session of congress. "The battle is over," he said, "but there may be some unexploded bombs lying around the field.

The international monetary commission decided not only to submit a report embodying recommendations based upon its investigations, but to present to congress the draft of a bill to carry out those recommendations.

Gen. Bernardo Reyes has returned to Mexico. Just where he is and just where he crossed the international boundary are not generally known, but that he is in Mexican territory is an official statement.

Suit was filed in the United States circuit court at Cincinnati, O., by District Attorney McPherson against the National Cash Register company of Dayton, O., charging it with conspiracy in restraint of trade.

A petition for the impeachment and expulsion from the house of representatives of Martin W. Littleton of New York was presented to Speaker Clark by Secretary Henry B. Martin of the Anti-Trust League.

Robert F. Bain, the first juror sworn in the McNamara case, had been bribed to vote for an acquittal even before he entered the jury box, developments now afoot.

The Gould board of directors of the Welsh railroad was ousted by the demand of New York financial interests, which have become heavy holders in its securities, which include the first refunding and extension mortgage bonds, amounting to \$2,000,000.

Six men were killed and seven seriously injured when express train No. 11 on the Pennsylvania railroad ran into freight wreck at Manassas, Va. In Los Angeles, Secretary of the National League of Women's Clubs is a final struggle with its opponents under the "Gentle Government" banner at the ballot box and was defeated.

Gen. Huang Sing, the self-styled commander-in-chief of the Chinese rebel forces, has returned to Shanghai and is making plans for an overland advance on Peking in the event hostilities are opened again.

The world's altitude record for dirigibles was made in France by the Ad. Raan, which ascended to a height of 7,053 feet. The former record of 5,085 feet was made in 1903 by the French dirigible Clement Bayard.

Assistant Attorney General Fowler announces that proceedings will be filed in Los Angeles against the Western Wholesale Plumbers' association within the next week, alleging a monopoly in restraint of trade.

Chairman Sulzer of the house committee on foreign affairs declared at the White House that congress would force the abrogation of the Russian treaty of 1912, under which American Jews traveling in Russia are discriminated against.

"Something over \$200,000 was raised," said Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor and custodian of the McNamara defense fund. "Approximately all was turned over to attorneys at Indianapolis and Los Angeles."

Speaker Clark of the house of representatives announced that he would take no action on the petition for the impeachment and expulsion from the house of representatives of Martin W. Littleton of New York.

A mob of 300 New York women, survivors of the Triangle Shirt Waist company fire, in which 146 girls lost their lives, attacked Isaac Harris and Max Blanck, proprietors of the waist company, when the men appeared in court to stand trial.

Another conservation movement was created when, at the National Irrigation congress, in Chicago, the delegates interested in drainage of swamp lands directed to form a separate organization to urge the federal government to care for the overflow lands of the country, as it is doing for the arid lands.

In a 200-page book published in New Orleans, Juan E. Paredes, former special minister of finance of Honduras, declares the state department at Washington encouraged the Bonilla revolution in Honduras last winter in an attempt to force the Honduran government to accept the Morgan loan agreement.

The supreme court of the United States took under consideration the application of counsel for the Chicago beef packers for a stay of their trial in the United States district court at Chicago on charges of criminal violation of the Sherman anti-trust law. A stay and bail was asked until the court could pass on the constitutionality of the Sherman anti-trust law as a criminal statute.

The will of Eugene F. Ware, the Kansas poet, "Ironquill," was filed in the Wyandotte county probate court. Mr. Ware provided that the entire estate, estimated at \$200,000, should be disposed of within ten years.

Judge Hazel, in the United States district court at Buffalo, N. Y., deferred sentence until December 22 in the case of the Standard Oil company of New York, found guilty of accepting concessions from railroads on shipments of oil from Olean, N. Y., to Burlington, Vt.

With magnificent ceremonies, set for the morning of November 22, the Orient can furnish King George and Queen Mary, who will be crowned emperor and empress of India during the Durbar, arrived at Delhi, India.

The first direct and uncensored news received at Peking from Sian Pu since the recent outbreak there was brought there by messenger. It consists of letters to the British and American legations and the director of posts. The letters say 8,000 Manchus were slain by Chinese, and that there was much looting.

An effort to bring about a voluntary dissolution of an alleged combination of dealers in hardware and plumbing supplies on the Pacific coast, through a civil suit, and the termination of the grand jury investigation of the matter at Los Angeles was begun in Washington.

Turkey, in response to Russia's action in Persia, is preparing to send the Sixth army corps toward the Persian frontier. Turkey has been long endeavoring to establish a hold on northwestern Persia, near Urmiah, in the province of Azerbaijan, because of a desire to share in the eventual partition of Persia, which Russia regards as a strategic menace.

A plea for the free use by all nations of the completed Panama canal is made by John Barrett, director general of the Pan American Union, in a statement published in the official bulletin of the Pan American Union.

Russia's advance guard arrived in Teheran, coincident with the resignation of the Persian cabinet. A company of Cossaks, ostensibly to protect the Russian legation, marched in without any warning.

The charges against Senator Lorimer of Illinois will be disposed of by the senate committee comparatively early in the session of congress if present expectations are realized.

Lee Smith, 45 years old; his son, Clifford A., and his mother, 75, died within a few hours of each other at their country home near Farmington, Mo.

Chinese rebels are reported to have captured the city of Canton, putting to death a foreign missionary who attempted to resist the looting of a foreigner's residence.

At 44 Alice Fairbanks, 10 years old, sister of Senator Vice-President Fairbanks, committed suicide at her home near Marysville, O., by drinking carbolic acid.



To Make Lamp Shades.

Any deft-fingered woman can make her own lampshades. She will save money thereby and her house will gain greatly by effective treatment of the lighting fixtures. Wire frames for lampshades can be bought in several sizes and shapes at many department stores, but if not procurable, one can usually get an address of some wire-worker from a florist and the frames can then be made to order. They are usually made with a four-inch ring and standard that fits in the ring of the lamp, whether it is for electricity or oil. In the case of a haggling lamp there is a copper bar across the top with a hole cut to allow the electric wires to go through. In ordering a lampshade frame, always carefully state the dimensions. Wipe the frame and then wind the wire with the exception of the standard wires, with white silk binding ribbon. The ribbon must be firmly sewed at both the beginning and end of each piece, so it will not slip.

Every lampshade should be lined with white India silk as the white reflects the light.

After the frame is wound the white lining must be put on. Cut a rough pattern by pinning a newspaper to the frame and then cutting it out, or pin the silk to the frame, a pin at the top and bottom of each wire support, and sew the silk on before cutting. This last method saves much material.

The silk must be drawn tight, and smooth and sewed down to the support where the seam has to be. Turn the edge back and sew in place, and sew raw edges. The extra silk at top and bottom must be turned back and sewed and then trimmed close.

After lining, the shade is ready for the outside covering. Place seams over wires, so they will not show. If fringe is used, sew on before the gimp. Gimp that is used for the panels is put on before the gimp at top and bottom. The extra covering material at top and bottom of the shade must be sewed back before it is covered with gimp.

Cretone shades are particularly well adapted for summer homes. In choosing the material for one be sure that the pattern is a good size for the shape chosen and that it will place well on the frame.

Revival of Rickrack.

In the general revival of things that are old it is not surprising to see smart frocks adorned with the rickrack trimming made with zigzag cotton braid, which school-girls of a generation or so ago used to turn out in endless quantities. Since heavy laces are fashionable, the braid chosen now is usually wide and heavy enough so that it can appropriately be worked up with the coarsest of threads. In sections of this trimming have been

Machine Hemstitching.

Hemstitching in this way: First, draw the number of threads desired, then baste the edge of the hem in the center of the drawn threads. Now, lengthen the stitch on the machine and stitch exactly on the edge of the hem, pulling the bastings out, and pull the edge of the hem to the bottom of the drawn thread. Hemstitching done in this way can hardly be distinguished from handwork.

NEEDLEWORK NOTES.

Small wire clips are useful to keep the dresses on paper dolls and prevent any embarrassing accidents when the dolls are visiting. The clips are designed to keep papers together and very likely a few may be obtained from father's desk.

When measuring off a section of linen on which you will make your napkins draw a thread instead of cutting into the goods. Thus the napkins will surely be square, and you will have threads which may be used on an empty spool, and saved for emergency. In mending worn spots it is far better to use these rawlings than threads of mere mending cotton, for the mending will be almost imperceptible.

When planning your holiday gifts don't forget the invalid. Make a bag of dainty flowered silk or cretonne running light wide satin ribbon in the top for a draw-string and lining it with delicately scented silk. Have the drawstring very long so it can be hung on the bedpost in easy reach of the invalid's hand, without the necessity of her raising herself in bed. In the bag is a small paper pad, pencil, handkerchief and anything she may need that otherwise would have to be handed to her by an attendant. Sometimes a little surprise can be slipped in the bag that will give much happiness and help to pass the weary hours of suffering.

Among the decorative articles made of beads and one you can make yourself as a holiday gift, none is prettier than the beaded frames. These are made on a groundwork of net. The beads are sewed on in any pretty design you may fancy, are lined with a bright colored satin and mounted on square, oblong or oval frames. An attractive square frame is made on silver net, with a border of tiny opal beads showing a vine design running through it. A conventional fleur-de-lis in silver and hot green beads decorates each corner. The whole is mounted over green satin.

For the Younger Set



The first is for a girl of 6 to 8 years; it is in natter blue de-laine. The bodice is cut Magyar, and has a yoke of piece lace over with a row of a piece lace each arm and in center front and back. The sleeves are drawn into deep wristbands of lace; a narrow fancy braid forms trimming. The material for skirt is arranged in three pieces, from the center. Material required—Three yards, five-six inches wide, one yard, lace eight inches wide.

The second costume is for a girl of 10 to 12 years; it is a style that can be carried out in cashmere or any the woven material.

The bodice fastens at left side of front with press studs, the buttons being put on for ornament. The collar and wristbands are faced with soft satin. The skirt has a panel front, but not back; it has a deep band of satin at foot, the left side of panel is trimmed with buttons.

Materials required—Four yards for skirt, three yards for bodice, and three yards for trimmings. The little tulle tie of tulle-colored linen is trimmed with bands of plaid cotton, of which there is an abundance, and has deep collar and waistband of plaid.

COLUMBIA RIVER PALISADES

Stream One of Most Picturesque in the World and Scenery Beg-gars Description.

Tacoma, Wash.—The Columbia river is one of the most picturesque in the world and the scenery along the banks beggars description. The Cape Horn Palisades shown in the accompanying illustration is a striking example of the character of scenery along this great river. The new line of the Northern Pacific Railroad to Portland has tunneled this immense mass of rock which stands like a great beacon on the banks of the river.

The great gorge of the Columbia is lined with towering palisades and great bluffs. Magnificent forests cover the banks of the river and

there are many waterfalls hundreds of feet in height. The Columbia is noted for its salmon fisheries, the annual production of this and other coast streams being more than 20,000,000 pounds. The dikes mark the head of navigation on the river, which is the great center of commerce for the northwest.

Finds \$500 Ring in a Cow.

Charlottesville, Va.—When Otto Rohndt, a German meat man, started to butcher a cow he did not realize that he was prospecting under his lucky star.
