## Accident Survey to Start Oct 24

October 24-30 has been set as a tentative date for the Home Accident Survey Week in Marshall County by Dr. S. L. Herndon, director of the Marshall County Health Department.

Governor Wetherby has proclaimed this week as Child Accident Prevention Week in Kentucky.

The Health Department plans to contact 53 organizations in the county. The home accident prevention program and survey has been explained to 40 organizations thus far.

Each organization has been asked to support the program, select a safety chairman and provide volunteers to work in the survey. Volunteers will survey in their own neighborhoods, asking about the home accidents in the past year.

Training sessions will be held in each community of the county for the volunteer interviewers. Training sessions will be the latter part of September and first part of October.

Purpose of the home accident prevention program is:

1. To reduce the number of deaths and injuries from accidents in and around the home.
2. To demonstrate that an educational program will cut down on the number of home accidents.

Purpose of the survey is:

1. To find the number and kinds of home accidents that have happened to the people in Marshall County in the past year. This information will help the Health Department in planning the prevention and educational program.
2. Provide information for statewide educational program.

## Four-Inch Rain Ends Drought In This County

Dry, parched fields in Marshall County were benefited by Monday's rainfall, one of the best this year.

County Agent Homer Miller reported his government rain gauge measured four and three-tenths inches of rain in a 24-hour period.

He said one inch of rain fell in 15 minutes, and two inches fell in an hour and 15 minutes. It was the largest 24-hour rainfall in more than three years, he said.

In only two months this year, January and April, did rain exceed the fall Monday. Total rainfall for the first eight months of the year amounted to 23.65 inches.

Lightning struck the Church Grove Methodist Church damaging the steeple and roof. The rainstorm caused other minor damage in the county.

The heavy rain broke a long hot, dry spell and was especially beneficial to grassland.

## Kiwanis Korner

By EARL J. ST. MARIE

The fifth Kiwanis objective for 1954 adopted by the International Board is:

EMPHASIZE WITH ACTION OUR WAY OF LIFE

If we take this seriously it will make some of us uncomfortable. For what it means is:

If we value the American-Canadian way of life, we should show that we do—and strive to deserve it by helping to safeguard our freedoms.

Too many citizens are found in the ranks of General Apathy and General Inertia.

And the surest way to destroy a self-governing nation is through the indifference of its citizens. Our two republics are the favored of the earth, with personal liberties and absence of government restrictions that are the envy of all peoples.

These priceless freedoms are our rich heritage. We have not earned them and we cannot keep them unless we are vigilant.

For our two nations with their fabulous resources are the last great prizes toward which the hungry eyes of conquest are turned by tyrants and dictators. How can we in the midst of our crowded daily lives keep ourselves and our fellow citizens continually aware of our blessings and the alertness needed to maintain them?

This is one of the responsibilities of Kiwanis and similar groups. The Objects of Kiwanis are to build better communities and to encourage good citizenship. Week by week our clubs through their widespread activities develop in our members the habits of volunteer service.

It is hoped that all Kiwanians are among the ten percent of adults in any community who assume the major obligation for better government, better schools and hospitals, support chest agencies, Red Cross and other volunteer undertakings that make the difference between an average community and one that is truly a fine place to live.

But a ten percent participation by citizens is not enough to assure a good government or good community either on the local or national level. Our task as Kiwanians is not only to demonstrate with generous service our gratitude for our way of life, but to draw into volunteer services more of our fellow citizens. There are too many taking a free ride, enjoying the privileges but assuming none of the obligations of self-government.

How does one go about it to emphasize with action our way of life?

Well, we can start each day with a prayer of thankfulness for our blessings and our nations, and a pledge to demonstrate that gratitude through service.

We can seek to make our homes spiritual fortresses of family life, where ideals are nourished, reverence is fostered and characters are built. Through the Minuteman program we can help our neighbors to better understand our way of life.

We can take a personal sustained interest in better schools, and an active participation in church life and worship.

Obviously we should vote and try to vote intelligently in every election, no matter how minor. But we must go farther than that and seek out capable and trustworthy citizens for public elections, help elect them and then support them. We can help to make democracy work better by stimulating good citizenship through the Ballot Bulletin.

We must be willing to give the time and energy necessary, and to accept public office ourselves if the need arises. We must offset the often malicious and wholly unwarranted attacks on good public servants by finding ways to honor and commend them.

We must take the time to study and understand public issues of both local and national import.

Insofar as we are able, we should support financially or with volunteer service or both all worthwhile undertakings for the good of the community.

The time has come, in republics such as ours, to adopt the principle that good citizenship obligates us to take a certain percentage of our time from our business or profession and devote it to good government and community activities.

Thus by giving ourselves in such ways as these can we hope to deserve our heritage of liberty, and answer without a sense of guilt our conscience when it asks: "What have you done for freedom today?"

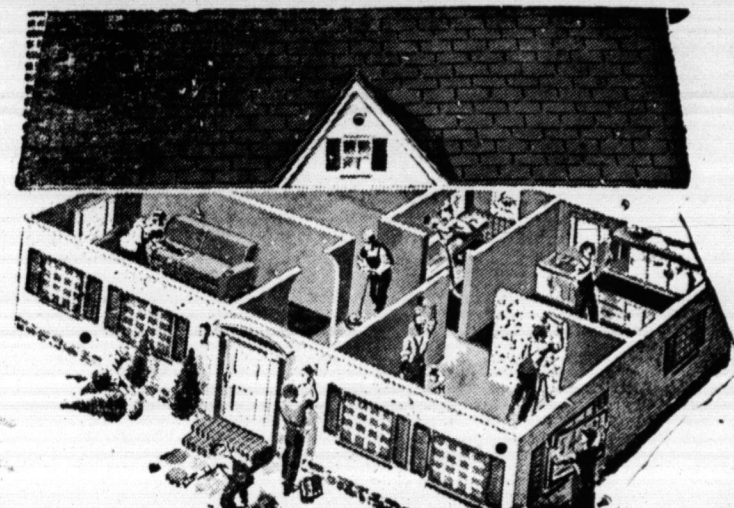

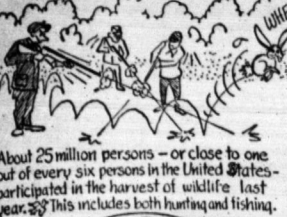

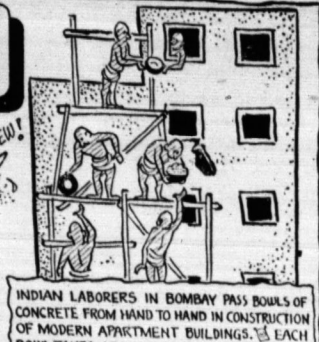

## Fairdealing Phone Service Staking Work Completed

Directors of the West Kentucky Rural Telephone Cooperative Corporation, Inc., met Sept. 16 to review the specifications of construction of rural telephone lines as drawn up by Johnson, Depp & Quisenberry, consulting engineers, and accepted by the directors.

W. L. Parr, general manager, announced that specifications for the central office equipment are being reviewed by REA engineers.

Luther Randsell, REA engineer, and George Hagan, consulting engineer, on Sept. 15 inspected the staking which has been completed in Section 1 — Fairdealing, Farmington, Se-dalia, and a portion of Lynn-ville. Section 2 — Cunningham, Lowes, Fancy Farm, and a portion of Wingo.

After surveying maps and field work, the engineers stated that

actual construction of lines would begin not later than Nov. 1.

Parr said that approximately 85 percent of the right-of-way easements have been secured and at the present time he has five men in the field securing final easements, collecting equities, securing new memberships and accompanying the staking crew.

Parr stated it was the policy of the cooperative not to enter upon any lands without written authorization from the landowner. At all times the staking and construction crews will be accompanied by a representative of the cooperative to negotiate with landowners and tenants with respect to right-of-way authorizations and easements and location of poles etc.

These employees will go over their respective exchange area between this date and the date of

actual construction to secure any additional applicants who desire service. The office will be unable to accept any new applications after the contract has been let and construction begun in that exchange area.

Paul T. Henson is working in this area, and E. T. Inman is the director. Either of these men will answer any questions with regard to the program. The cooperative has taken an option on the Hardin Telephone Company and hopes to bring that area into the program.

### Living Witness

Lesson for September 26, 1954

"AGAINST the Stream" is the title of a recent book by Karl Barth. The title means to suggest that Christian living has to be against the stream of a great deal of what the world thinks and admires. Many people think that Christian faith simply helps a man to do better what the world wants to do. Men want success, money, power, prestige; and "being a Christian" helps one to get these things faster. No, that is not it. When Christ comes into a life, that life will not have the same aims as before. The Christian does not swim with the world-stream, only faster. He has to swim upstream.

### Redeeming the World

What a Christian is and does, is determined both by the kind of world we see around us, and the kind of God we have above us and in us. If it were a different world, or a different God, our tasks would no doubt be different. As we look at the world, we can see two facts about it which are pretty unpleasant, but true. Poets and policemen know these things are true, even if a lot of us try to dodge the facts. One is: the world is flat and tasteless, especially (strange as it may seem) to the very persons who try their hardest to "get a kick" out of life. The other is: the world is decadent, which is a polite word for rotten. (The Bible word is corrupt, which means the same thing.) In such a world Christians are called on to be different. Jesus' words about salt and light will "always be remembered by Christians. They are expected to give taste and zest to a stale world; to keep a rotting world from decaying entirely." As light, they are to bring to the world what sunlight does, to dark cold places. Christians are to share in God's work of redeeming the world, just by being different from the world, not merely different, like sand in the soup, but savingly different, like salt.

### 'God's Attack on Man'

A crank-sided philosopher once called Christianity God's "attack on man." That is both a long way from the truth and close to it, depending on how you take it. It is a long way from the truth that God so loved the world that he gave his only Son; a long way from the prophet's saying that God desires not the death of the wicked, but rather that he shall turn from his way and live (Ezekiel 33:11). Christianity is all that happens when God comes to the rescue of man. On the other hand, there is something in man that God does have to attack. When a swimmer starts to drown, and the life-saver goes in after him, one of the first things the life-saver may have to do is to knock the fellow out. A drowning man will fight his rescuer and sometimes only a knock-out will save him. Now the world, that is to say the world outside of God, is a hostile world. It carries on a kind of war against God. It does not ask for help, it is proud, satisfied. It always associates God with what is unpleasant or cruel, such as death or disaster. God does have to attack man's pride, his self-satisfaction, his mental slandering of God himself. God does not need to be reconciled to man, but man does need to be reconciled to God. So the business of the Christian is to give testimony to this. As Paul puts it, the Christian is an ambassador for Christ, a messenger of reconciliation.

### When Love Controls

So the Christian is expected to be a living witness, both in what he is and in what he says. Could a real Christian be perfectly content with being "saved" himself, without worrying over other people in the least? If ever there had been a generation of such self-centered "Christians," our religion would have died out. One thing is certain: as a witness, no one is convincing if his attitude to his lost contemporaries is one of scorn. The effective witness, in word or in life, comes from the heart moved by the same compassion that only Jesus fully had, and only he can inspire. The growing Christians, the contagious Christians, the witnessing Christians, have always been those who could say as Paul did: The love of Christ controls us.

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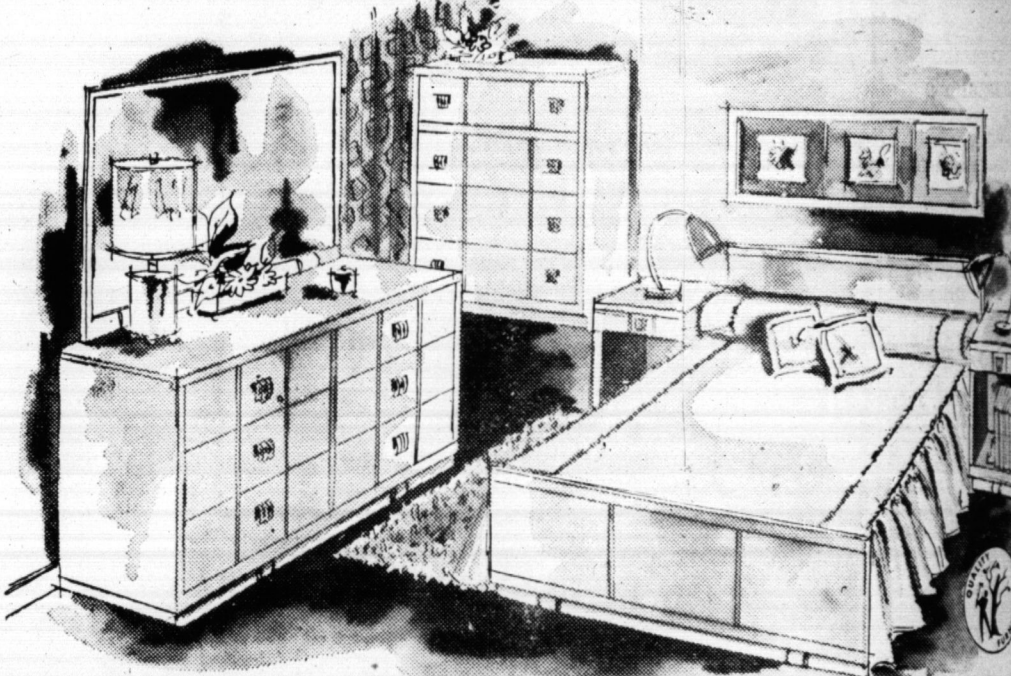

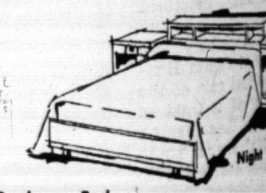

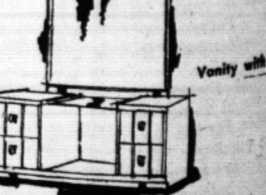
