Council Schedules Special Meeting On Natural Gas

Benton City Council members, in session Monday night, discussed the possibility of bringing natural gas into Benton.

Councilmen voted to hold a special meeting on Monday night, Oct. 18, at City Hall to discuss the matter further with representatives of Albert Switzer & Associates of Jackson, Miss. This is a private engineering firm.

The public is invited and urged to attend this Council meeting.

City officials have been pondering the problem of whether to sell a gas franchise to West Kentucky Gas Company or to install a municipally-owned gas system.

The West Kentucky Gas Co. has approached city officials on the matter of obtaining a franchise for distributing natural gas in Benton.

Councilmen have scheduled the Oct. 18 meeting for the purpose of discussing with the private engineering firm the cost of installing a municipally-owned gas system.

The engineering firm has offered to make a survey here to determine whether it would be profitable to install a municipal gas system.

Marion, Ky., a town about the size of Benton, recently installed a municipal gas system at a cost of approximately \$250,000.

Benton officials believe a gas system can be installed in Benton for approximately the same amount. The line would be laid into Benton from the Palma pumping station of the Texas Gas Transmission Co.

The City of Benton operates its own municipal electric power system, and it has proved to be a financial success.

City officials think that a municipally operated gas system might prove to be just as successful as the electric system.

Patrons are again urged to mail overseas Christmas parcels early. The period of from Oct. 15 to Nov. 15 is the proper time to mail overseas packages, according to Postmaster Mattie Lou Riley.

Packages mailed after Nov. 15 are not guaranteed to reach servicemen in time for Christmas.

Parcels addressed to Army or Fleet Post Offices may not exceed 70 pounds in weight or 100 inches in overall measurements. Air parcel post may not exceed two pounds in weight or 30 inches in width and girth combined.
