Alben W. Barkley, "Mr. Democrat" of Kentucky politics, ran true to form in Marshall County and won handily from his Republican opponent, John Sherman Cooper.

Fine Given In Shooting Case

J. T. Hooper was fined \$100 by a jury in Marshall Circuit Court last Friday on a charge of shooting Lawrence Collins.

Hooper had been indicted on a charge of shooting with intent to kill a felony.

The court instructed the jury on six possible verdicts, one of which was to declare the shooting case a misdemeanor and fine the defendant not less than \$50 nor more than \$500. It was this course that the jurors chose, and assessed the \$100 fine.

In an automobile damage suit, Carl B. Foster was awarded judgment of \$109.45 against Charles Henson. The judgment was for the entire amount asked by Foster.

Another auto damage suit was tried this week—that of Thomas A. Hendrickson versus Frank Edwin Woods. The jury was to report its verdict today (Thursday) in this case.

Court was not in session Tuesday, election day.

Ground Broken For New Plant

Ground breaking ceremonies were being held today (Thursday) at Calvert City for the new \$6,000,000 General Aniline & Film Corp. plant.

Most of the top officials of General Aniline were in Calvert City for the ceremonies, which started at 11 o'clock.

The day's ceremonies, aside from the official ground breaking, included a luncheon at Kentucky Dam Village auditorium, an afternoon tour of the Calvert City industrial area and the Kentucky Dam, and a banquet Thursday night at the Irvin Cobb Hotel in Paducah.

The ceremonies were under the sponsorship of the Calvert City Civic Club headed by Luther Draffen, in co-operation with the Paducah Association of Commerce.

Mr. Draffen was to preside at the luncheon at the dam. H. V. Duckett of Calvert City was to make the welcome address at the luncheon.

At the ground-breaking, Mr. Draffen was to welcome General Aniline to Calvert City. Winston Paul, board chairman of GAF, was to turn the first spadeful of soil starting construction of the plant.

The ground-breaking program included the names of many prominent Kentuckians and nationally known industrialists.

Among the Kentuckians on the program were Alben W. Barkley, John Sherman Cooper, Henry Ward, director of Kentucky State Park Commission, and Joe Taylor, director of the Kentucky Agricultural and Industrial Development Board.

Here for the ceremonies also were John A. Hill, president of Air Reduction Co., and other officials of that company; Carl Bode, president of National Carbide, and several Carbide officials; and high officials of Texas Gas Transmission Corp. and the Illinois Central Railroad.

Among the General Aniline officials here for the event were Winston Paul, board chairman, of New York; J. H. Hillbrink, executive vice president; J. C. Franklin, vice president in charge of operations; Dr. Hans

Benton's City Council has decided to abandon its plans to install a municipally-owned natural gas system and will sell a franchise for gas here.

Councilmen acted at their regular monthly meeting Monday night after hearing three executives of the West Kentucky Gas Co., which is interested in a franchise here, and an independent engineer, Lorin Allen of Memphis, whose firm was interested in installing a municipally-operated system here.

The decision to sell a franchise rather than to operate a municipal system came after many weeks of discussion by the councilmen and some personal surveys made by Mayor O'Daniel.

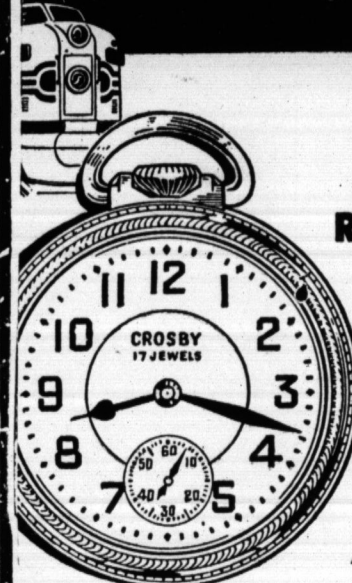

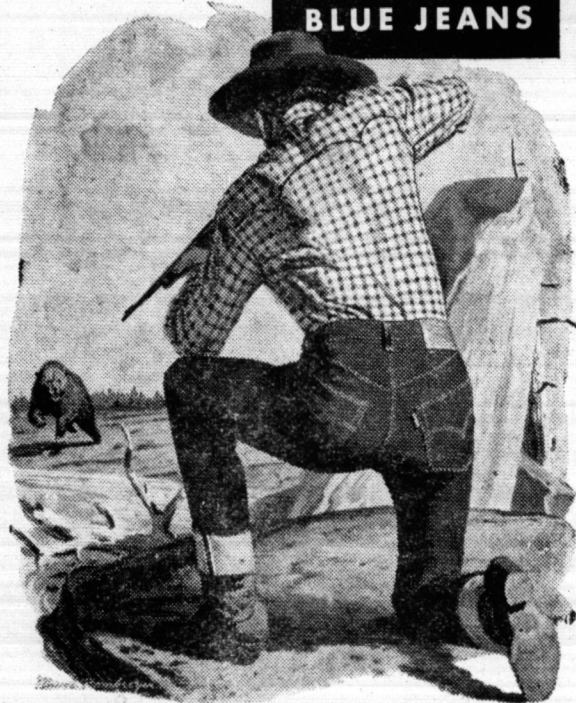

The Farm FRONT --

Farm County Agent

Hoy Thompson reports a good yield of corn. Some of the crop yielded over 40 bushels per acre. Bottom land paid off this year in increased yields.

Pat Brown has been feeding from his bunker silo for a number of days. The silage kept good and is furnishing quality feed at a minimum cost.

Pastures are the best they have been all year on many farms. One farmer stated he has had in the past 3 years. Much of the small grain that was seeded early should be grazed. It will furnish excellent grazing and it will not lower the yield very much.

Put farm tools away for the winter. More farm tools rust out than wear out. Better work can be done next spring if tools are not rusty.

Mulch strawberries in November. It will not take any more time or straw to do the job at the proper time. Use about 1 ton of straw per acre for best results.

Egg prices are low as we all know. Cull poultry close. Non-producing hens are not profitable and will not be. Get rid of them as soon as possible.

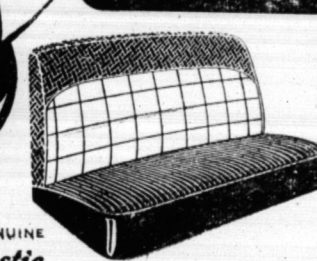

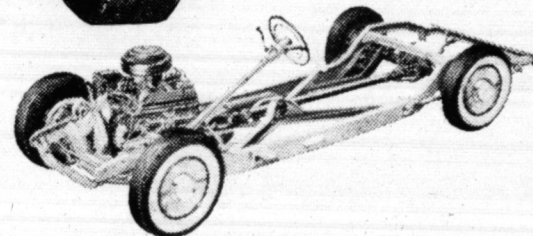

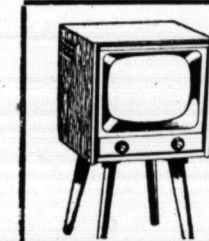

farm facts FOR KENTUCKY FOLKS

Thrift is one of the characters formerly attributed to successful farm families—one which has been virtually lost in recent years of easy income and "keeping up with the Joneses." It is a virtue which needs to be recultivated in these days of declining incomes and rising costs. Thrift refers to the old habit of "eat it up, wear it out, make it do, or do without." It's the custom of producing and saving; of spending only for needs and necessities.

On the farm thrift means living at home from the farm, with home grown meats, fruits, vegetables, milk, honey and the

like. It means care of machinery and tools; full utilization of manure, tobacco stalks and farm residues; prevention of erosion; timely repairs of all buildings and fences, and many other things of this nature. For the family it means pleasure and recreation at home and in the community and not on the streets and highways. A thrifty farmer is usually a successful farmer, a fine neighbor and a community asset.

Tobacco stalks are a farm by-product often wasted on Kentucky farms. They are very rich in easily soluble plant food. A ton of stalks contains the equivalent of about 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate, 160 pounds of sulphate of potash and 75 pounds of 20% super phosphate, all of which is quickly leached by rain. A thrifty farmer will keep tobacco stalks in the barn until spread on a growing crop such as pasture or small grain.

Farm Finances—Some of the difficulties of farm financing from both the borrowers and lenders viewpoints, were brought

out in a recent hearing of the House Committee on Agriculture. It showed that the capital investment per farm in a typical agricultural community had increased from \$6,400 in 1907 to \$23,000 in 1947 and that the non-real estate investment had risen from 27% of the total in 1907 to 35% in 1947 (most of the change, 23%, took place in the decade from '37 to '47).

During the 40-year period annual farm income increased nine times, but expenses increased 14 times. It would have required almost 10 years of adversity in the early nineteen hundreds to wipe out the farmer's capital investment but only 2 1-2 years to do so in the late forties. That's what is hurting farmers now, their capital investments are being threatened by bad seasons, low prices and high costs.

If you are interested in more recreation for your club or community, bring your husband or wife and enjoy yourself at these meetings as well as be instructed on conducting wholesome recreation.

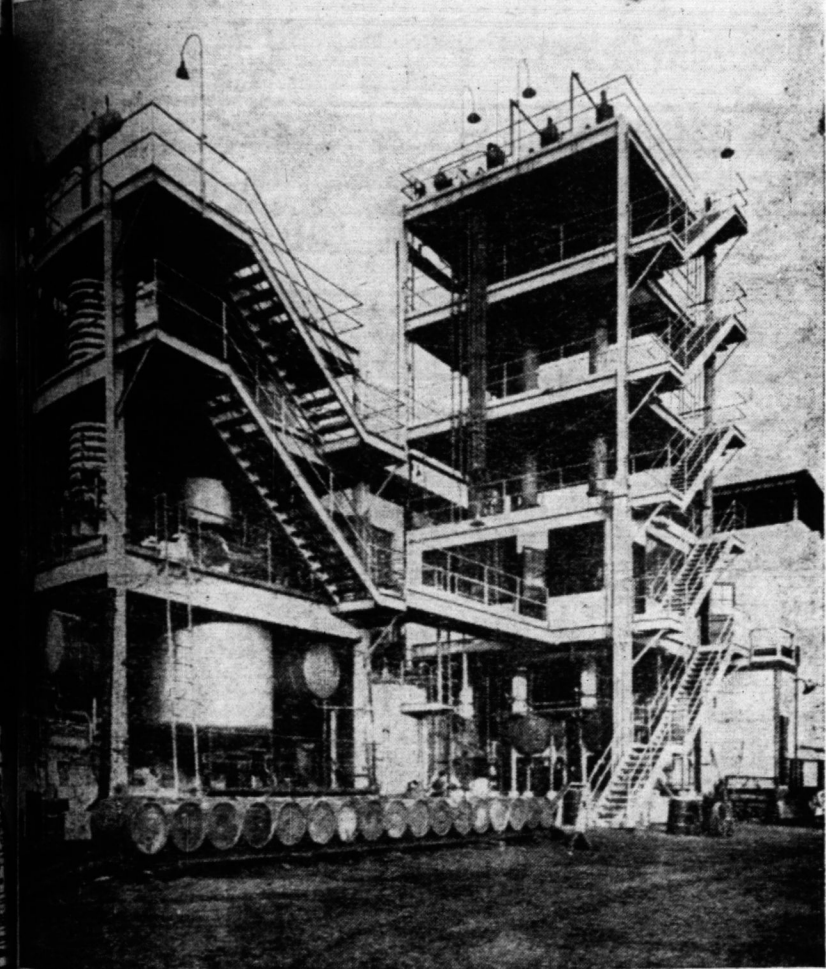

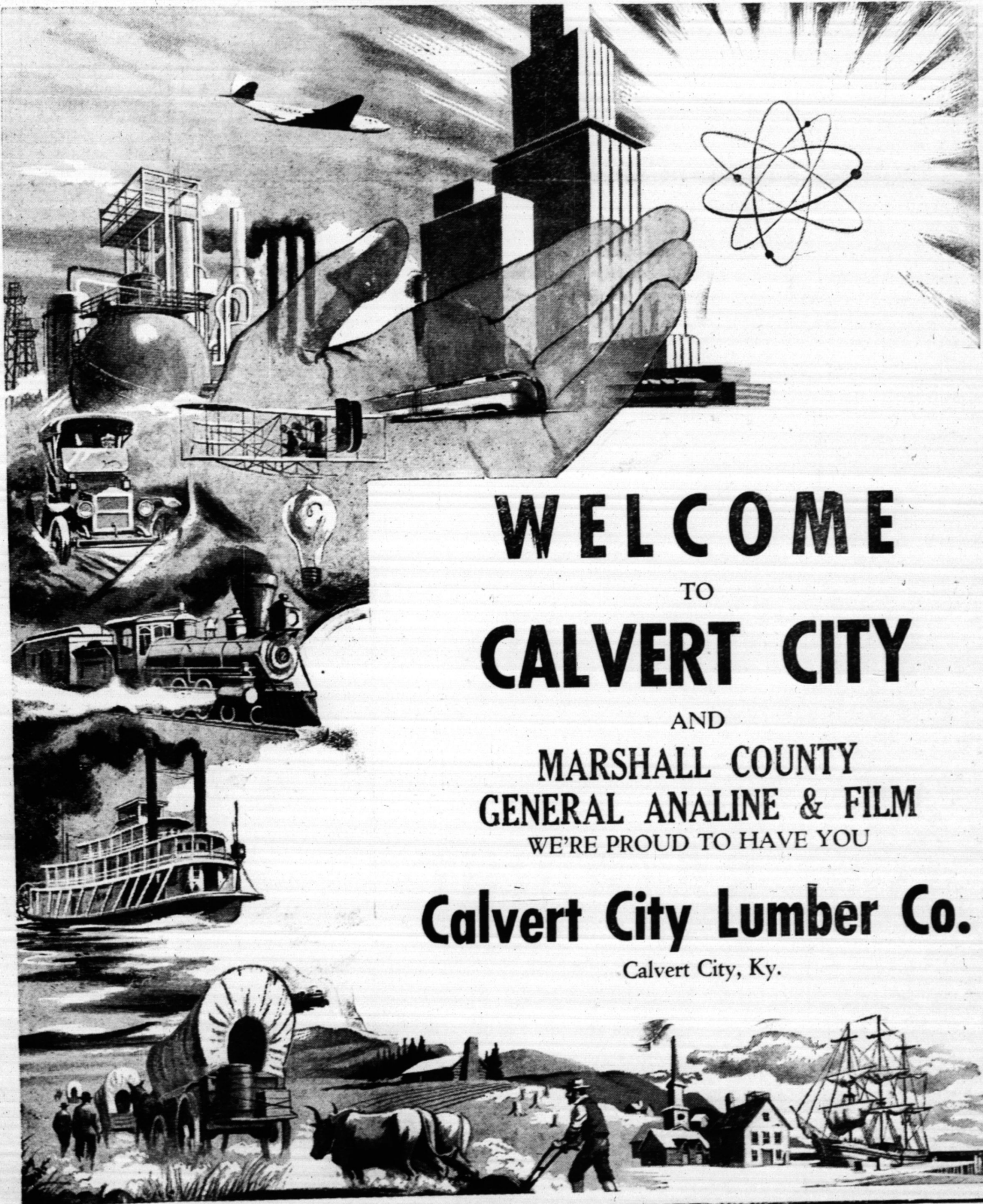

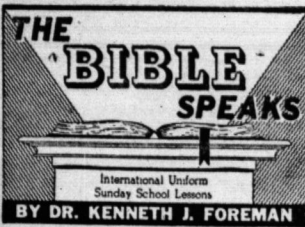

Devotional Reading: I Corinthians 9:22-27

First Conquest

Lesson for November 7, 1954

MR. ALLAN TROUT writes: "I started on the journey of life with the full intention to conquer the whole world... But 32 years of retrospection have taught me, if anything, that the only world I ever had a chance to conquer was that speck of it within my own carcass." Mr. Trout may be exaggerating a bit, but he is exaggerating in the direction of the truth. The sad fact is that he is not alone, by any means. Millions of young people today do not know this simple fact: that it is no use to hope to conquer the world if you do not first conquer yourself. This is a truth not discovered first in the 20th century; ten centuries before Christ there were wise men who knew it.



Self-Control Is Not Self-Repression

Many persons do not like even the notion of self-control because the word sounds harsh, negative, joyless and austere. The word conjures up a grim-faced Puritan who feels that anything pleasant must be sinful. (The real Puritans were a pretty jolly lot, as a matter of fact.) But self-control, about which the Proverbs (and the rest of the Bible too) speak, is not mere no-saying to yourself. There is, to be sure, a 'NO' in self-control. But when you drive a car, you steer it because you are going somewhere. You say NO to the ditch. No to the bridge abutment. No to the passing trucks. For a reason. You want to keep going. Steering is more than not going off the pavement; it is keeping moving in the direction of where you want to go. There may be a dozen wrong directions the car might take, if you removed your hands from the wheel. What you are doing is to keep on in the right direction. Human self-control is that sort of thing. You have more than one self, you have many. Some of them are good, some bad. The question simply is: Which one of your selves is going to take the wheel?

Weak Spots

The Proverbs point out some of the places in human make-up where character is the most likely to be weak. One of the commonly mentioned break-down spots is the tongue. Talking is so easy, and talking without thinking is so easy. As James says, it is easier to tame wild animals than to tame the tongue; indeed, no one has ever quite done it. And what trouble can be caused by one hasty, thoughtless or mean sentence! It takes time to do a mean thing. It calls for a little planning. One has to think it over, to decide not to do it. But saying a mean thing takes no time at all, it just slips out in a flash, there is no time to think and the friendship is broken. The good day is spoiled. Another weak spot where it is hard to get control of ourselves is the emotions. The book of Proverbs mentions especially and often the emotion of anger. The angry heart and mind are back of the angry word. Before the insult that leads to the fight, there is the simmering bitter mind that thinks of the angry word. And anger leads to fights and brawls and even murder.

Why Make It Harder?

If there were no such thing as 'hard liquor' as any kind of alcoholic beverages, if everybody stayed cold sober all the time, people would have a hard enough time getting control of themselves. The tongue of a preacher is hard to tame, just as much as the tongue of a truck-driver. The temper of a lady may show itself differently from the temper of a sergeant in the marines, but it's as hard to control and can do quite as much harm. But the whole problem of self-control is made more difficult by the use of liquor. The Proverbs know this, and say it. Now if you were a general, you would not dope your army with some serum that would make them stupid and sick. You would want them at their top form for every attack. So if you are interested in controlling yourself, you are being idiotic, you are working against yourself, if you make it harder by liquor-drinking. If it is easy to say the wrong thing when sober, it is twice as easy to slip up when the mind is clouded by alcohol.

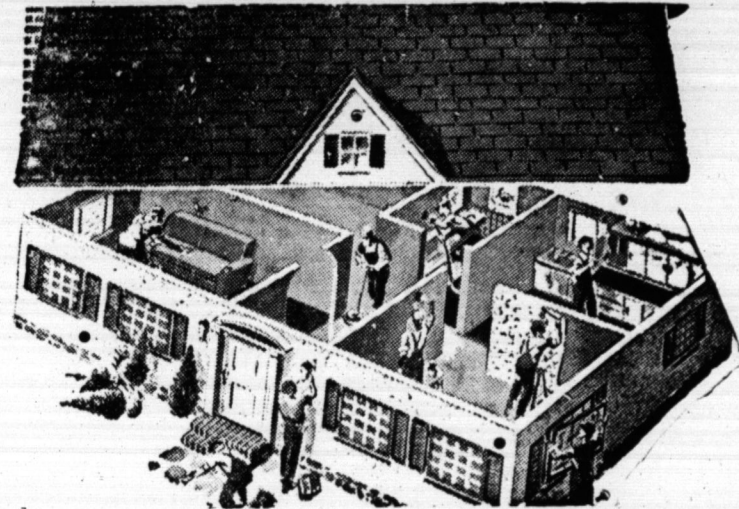

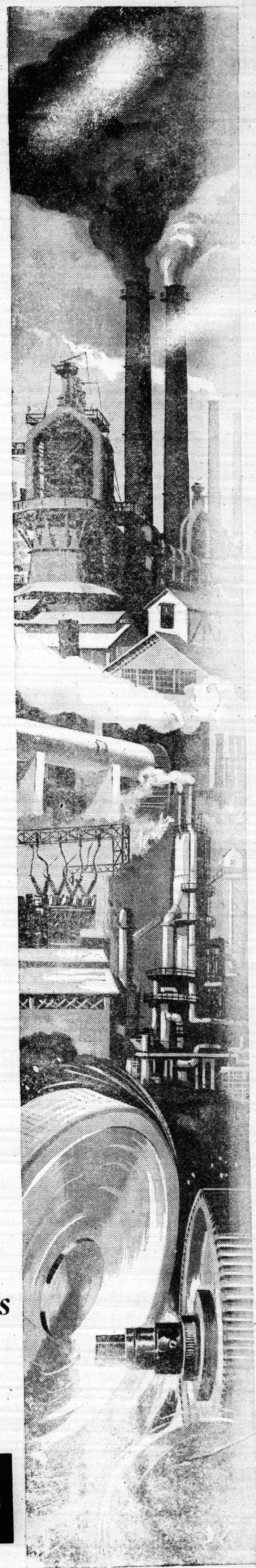

wherever the child might happen to be. Around a hot stove with vessels of hot food, don't place chairs or stools that would allow youngsters to climb up and so reach hot handles or pans. Keep pan handles turned away from the edge of the stove. Also keep hot irons, and pails or tubs of hot water out of the youngsters' way.

It's well to have safety hooks that don't come loose with a simple flip of the finger on a high chair—same for a crib, play pen or stroller.

Window screens and doors should fasten securely and unscreened windows should have bars if youngsters are in the crawling stage. Even a tiny child can push a loose screen out the window and so remove the only barrier to falling.

When there are small children of any age in the family, keep medicines, poisons, cleaning supplies, and matches out of their reach. And use safety matches.

Provide safe toys, observing the familiar rule against sharp points and paint that peels or licks off. Watch fragile toys that leave sharp edges when broken.

Keep sharp knives in enclosed racks placed high enough to tempt little hands, or in racks inside drawers.

See that fireplaces or radiant heaters have screens or stove guards.

Tape, glue, or sandpaper any splinters or protruding nails in boards, boxes, and wooden furniture around the house. Put scatter rugs away while children are small.

Those old-fashioned electric wall sockets with open ends, which attract young fingers, may be replaced by enclosed modern outlets for electrical wiring.

On gas kitchen stoves the safest kind of knobs are those with modern safety locks that have to be pushed in so the handle will turn.

Be careful with fluorescent light tubes. Bury the burned out ones promptly so there'll be no temptation for children to play with the tubes. Not only does the glass shatter easily but in some types there is danger from beryllium which coats the inside of the tube. If beryllium gets into cuts it prevents sores from healing.

And for better care of Mother and Dad, try furniture arrangement that allows them to reach children's bed or room in the middle of the night without stumbling over obstacles. Tiny baseboard lights that stay on through the night without shining in sleepers' eyes help prevent falling.

Farm Bureau Meeting At Louisville Nov. 14

Farm Bureaus from 112 Kentucky counties will send delegates to the 35th annual convention of the Kentucky Farm Bureau, scheduled for Louisville Nov. 14-17, according to J. E. Stanford, St. Matthews, Farm Bureau executive secretary. "We usually have an attendance of about 3,000 for the 3 1-2 day annual affair," Stanford said, "with a maximum of about 1,500 attending any one session of the meeting."

Stanford said highlights of the meeting will be addresses by Walter Randolph, Montgomery, Ala., vice president of the American Farm Bureau Federation; O. D. Brissenden, Chicago, special assistant to the president, Illinois Central Agricultural Association; and Miss Laura Lane, Philadelphia, associate editor of the Country Gentleman farm magazine. The convention starts Sunday, Nov. 14, with a vesper service and choral festival. On Monday, commodity conferences, including tobacco, dairy, livestock, poultry and commercial crops, are scheduled and Monday night the coronation of the Farm Bureau king and queen will be held. Tuesday night the state finals for the Talk Meet for rural young people and the famous Farm Bureau Square Dance are scheduled. The adoption of recommendations and resolutions to determine policy for the Farm Bureau in 1955 will be approved by the voting delegates during the business session on Wednesday, Nov. 17.

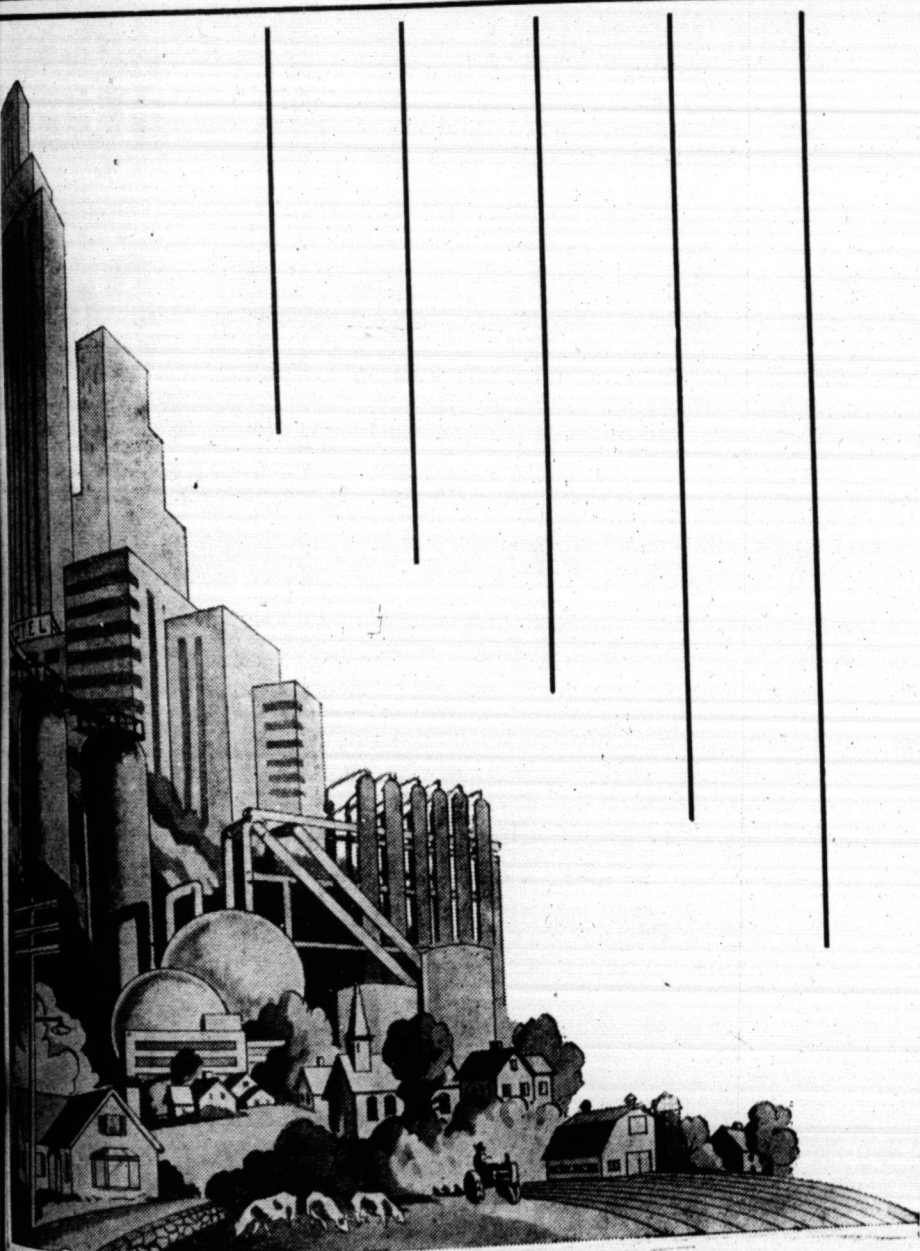



