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Soil Essay Contest is Being Held

Kentucky grade and high school students are eligible for \$3,225 in U. S. Savings Bonds in the eleventh annual Soil Conservation Essay Contest.

The competition was announced by Barry Bingham, president of the Courier-Journal, Wendell P. Butler, state superintendent of public instruction, and A. Threlkeld, president of the Kentucky Association of Soil Conservation Districts.

"How Water Conservation Benefits My Community" is the subject of this year's essay.

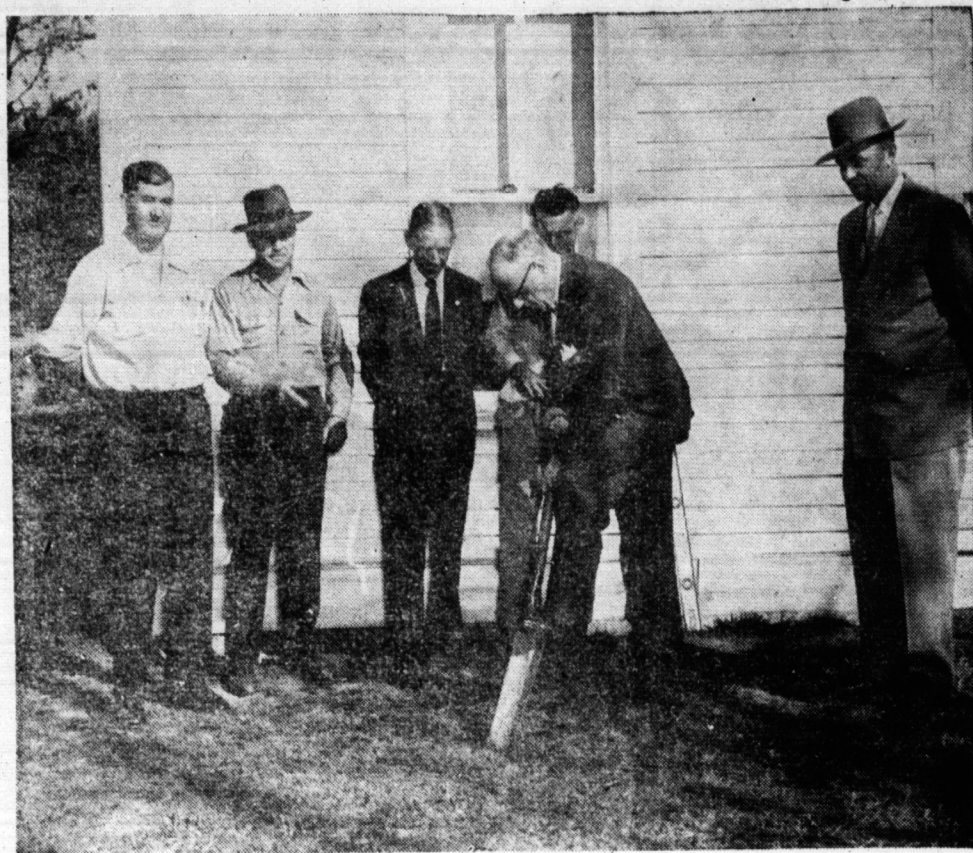
A \$100 Savings Bond will go to the student submitting the composition judged to be state winner. Second prize is a \$50 bond and third, a \$25 bond. Winners of the three top prizes and their families will receive also all-expense-paid trips to Louisville as guests of honor for the annual Farm Awards Luncheon next spring.

In addition to the state awards, a district prize of a \$25 bond will be given to the boy or girl who places first in each of the 122 soil conservation districts where at least five essays are submitted. These district essays will compete for the state awards.

As an added incentive a special certificate will be awarded to the writer of the best essay in each Kentucky school and to the runner-up in each soil conservation district.

Entries should be sent to the county or city school superintendents by Dec. 11, the contest deadline.

Complete contest information may be obtained from school principals, superintendents, soil conservation district supervisors, work unit and area conservationists or the promotion department of the Courier-Journal.

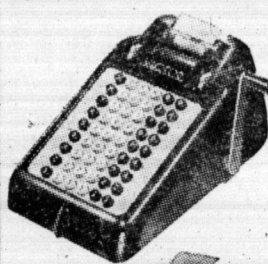

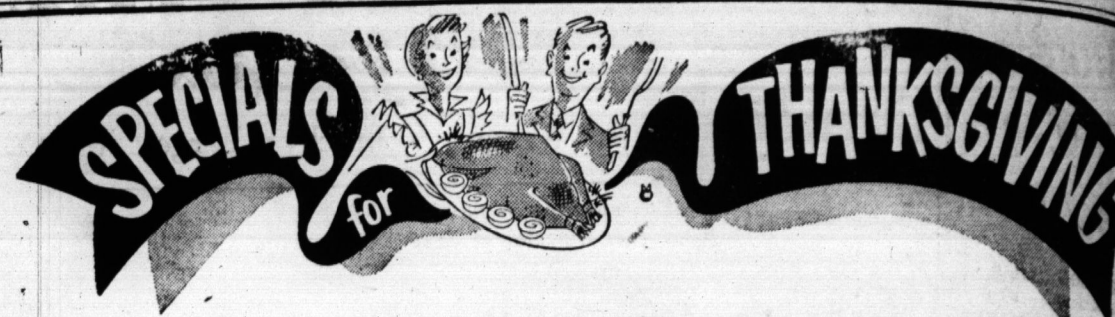

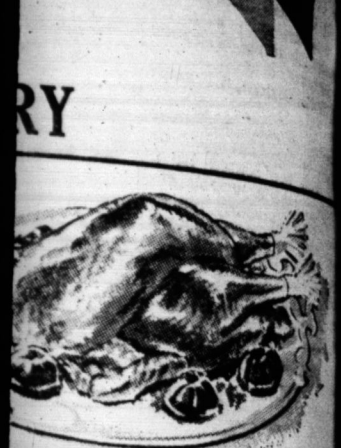

It's Time to Mail Xmas Packages to The Boys Overseas

Parcels for service men overseas should be in the mails NOW to insure delivery by Christmas. Seventy pounds is the limit for ordinary parcels.

Air mail parcels for service men overseas can not weigh over 2 pounds nor measure more than 30 inches in length and girth combined.

Christmas cards for service men overseas cost 3 cents each. You should ask your postmaster before you mail tobacco or cigarettes to service men overseas to determine if they can be sent.

All mail sent should have a complete address. That is, to street and house number or to rural route number.

All rural patrons have a box number in addition to their route number. If a rural patron does not know his box number he can find the number by asking his postman or postmaster.

The c-o Postmaster on overseas addresses should be omitted. For example address mail: A.P.O. 569 New York, N. Y.

'Safe Driving Day' In Kentucky Slated For December 15

Frankfort—Kentucky, in conjunction with other states, will observe "Safe-Driving Day" on Dec. 15, according to Charles Jones, executive secretary of the governor's coordinating highway safety committee.

Sponsored by the president's action committee for traffic safety, the day is set aside to impress upon motorists their personal responsibility for reducing accidents and effecting traffic safety.

Jones, who was appointed "S-D Day" state director by Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby, announced that his office is mailing kits to civic officials throughout Kentucky advising how they may participate locally in the program.

At the same time Jones called attention to the decrease in Kentucky traffic fatalities during the first ten months of 1954 as compared to 1953. There have been 595 fatalities in the state through November 1 of this year. Last year at the same time 677 fatalities were already recorded.

Jones attributed much of the success in lower fatalities to the joint effort of state and local officials, to the Kentucky Highway Lifesavers group organized recently to bring the problem of highway safety before the public and to the motorists themselves.

Ira Peters, 70, former resident of the Little Cypress community, died Monday at his home in Groves City, Ohio, where he had lived for several years.

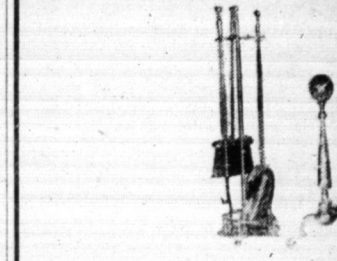

Tuberculosis X-ray Unit Soon to be Here

It is possible to have tuberculosis and not know it, according to Dr. S. L. Henson, Marshall County health officer. That is why he is urging every Marshall Countian over 15 years of age to get a chest X-ray while the State Department of Health's mobile X-ray unit is in town.

The unit will be parked on the Court House square, Dec. 7-8, from 9 to 12 and 1 to 3 o'clock. "Early diagnosis of tuberculosis makes it possible to start treatment early and thus curing the disease," Dr. Henson said. He added that persons who may be unaware that they have tuberculosis, often unknowingly are spreading it among their family, friends and associates.

Health authorities agree that every undiscovered case of tuberculosis is a danger to the entire community. Mass chest X-ray examinations, such as the one scheduled in Marshall County, often reveal tuberculosis before outward symptoms appear.

It is possible to have tuberculosis at any age, Dr. Henson points out. However, he adds, that the incidence in the five to fifteen age group is very low. That is why children are given X-rays only if they are known to have been in direct contact with persons having tuberculosis or if they are referred by a physician. The survey must include as many persons as possible of the older age groups, known to have average or high-

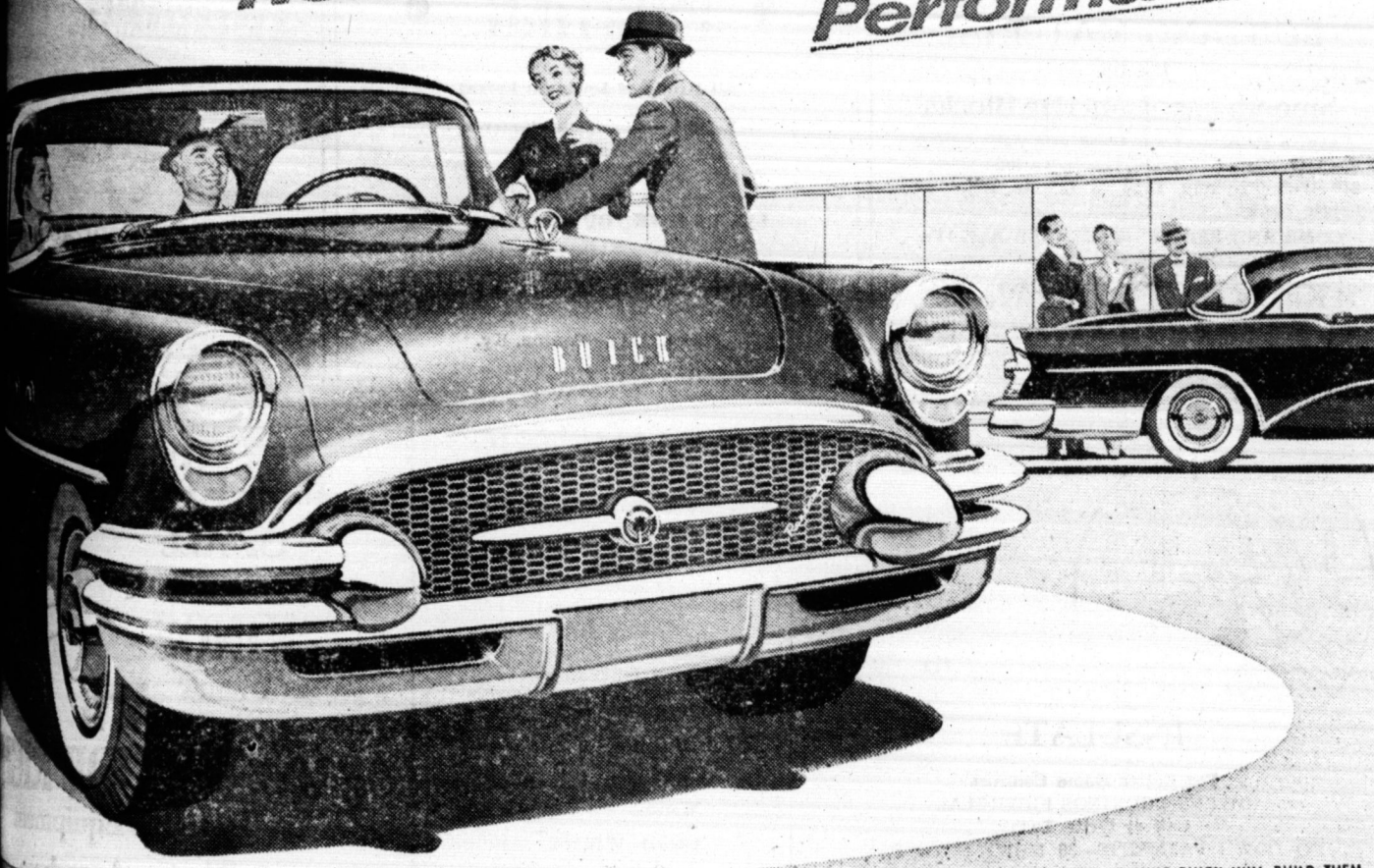

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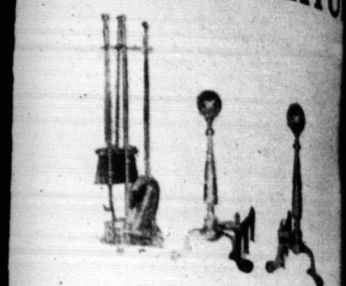
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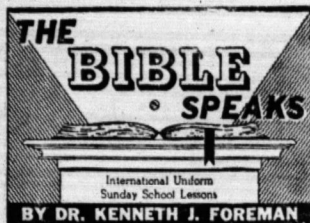

What We Owe God

Lesson for November 21, 1954

AT THANKSGIVING time some people thank God for the wrong things, or they may even not thank him at all. They may sit back looking at the festival turkey, and instead of being grateful to God are being rather proud of themselves. But even thankful hearts may sometimes be a shade wrong. On the one hand, some very high-minded Christians will tell you that it isn't the material blessings that count. It is the spiritual blessings for which we ought to be thankful. Well (as we shall see), if it were not for the material blessings there could be no spiritual blessings. On the other hand, as some people seem to look at it, what we are thankful for is "prosperity"—so that if we lost money last year, or barely scraped through, we don't really have anything to be thankful for. Such persons should be reminded that the Psalms of gratitude—and they are many—were not written by wealthy men for the most part but by rather poor ones on our standard. The 104th Psalm is a case in point.

The Gift of Existence
The first point that strikes the reader of this Psalm is that the poet is thinking much more about the world than about himself. He feels himself to be a part of the great world which God has made, so that he feels personally happy over blessings which he shares with all creation. How many persons, on the contrary, are never grateful to God unless for something done for themselves alone! This Psalmist not only feels himself akin to all other men but to animals as well, yes even inanimate things like clouds and wind, "messengers" of God, as he himself is. This Psalmist is singing with joy to God in gratitude for existence, not his own single sole existence but that of all creation. It is known that without the other creatures of God he himself could not be. Another Psalmist thinks of God as creating him "in the heart of the earth." He too was aware that we are related to this earth's crust, the very make-up of the soil determines the physical make-up of our bodies. This great Psalm rejoices not merely that "God made ME" but what is much more important, God in wisdom made ALL things.

The Gift of Subsistence
Our Psalmist goes further. He sings not only of God's Creation but of his Providence. Nothing could be without God, but also nothing could continue to be without him. He thinks of this in two ways. One is easy to understand—that is, God provides for each of his creatures whatever is necessary for that creature to live, and gives to each creature the impelling desire to keep itself alive. God feeds the lions; but he does not come down in a fiery cloud with lion-manna in his hand. Not at all; the lion goes after his prey. But while other men cover their heads in terror at the lion's roar, not so this poet; he rejoices that lions, like men, "seek their food from God." The other way in which God sustains his creatures—clouds, grass, goats, lions and poets—is more profound and not all can even think about it. But this poet's inspired mind penetrated deeply into the reality of things. He perceives that God's very being, and will, sustain and "keep in being" everything that is. God does not toss off a universe into space and let it spin as it will. He undergirds it at every point at every instant.

What We Owe God
People "exchange gifts" at Christmas time, but no one can exchange gifts with the Almighty. None may give him existence, not all creation can sustain his being, life—in beginning and continuance—flows from him to us, not from us to him. We can never repay the Creator of all. And yet we do owe God something—everything indeed, but something in particular. We surely owe him a thankful heart; not mere words of thanks, but a thankful heart, rejoicing in all the wonders of God. We also owe God at least the careful and wise use of his creation. Waste, such as erosion which we could prevent, or letting stock run down—all waste of natural strength, time or resources—this is a sin against the God who gives us all things.

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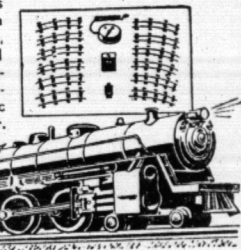

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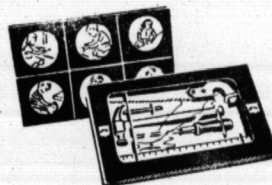
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Ky. Mother of 1955 Soon to be Selected

4. That she exemplify in her life and conduct the precepts of the Golden Rule.

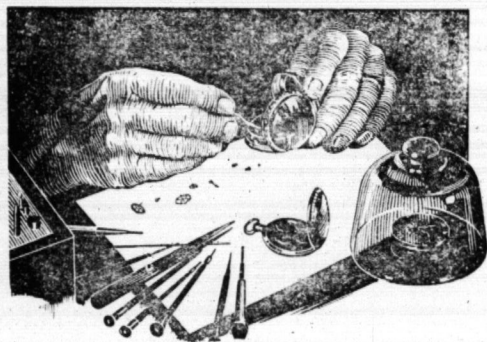
5. That she have a sense of responsibility in civic affairs, and that she be active in service for public benefit.

The Farm Front --

By J. HOMER MILLER
County Farm Agent

Corn harvest has about been completed. Weather has been favorable for harvest and seeding of small grains, and also for harvesting lespedeza seed. Save all the seed you can. They will be high again next spring.

Elbert Inman had an excellent corn yield again this year. From an acre plot, 115 bushels were harvested—highest yield ever to be recorded in the county. His entire crop averaged about 85 bushels per acre.

Strawberry plants will be scarce again next spring. One million Blakemore plants have been contracted for by the strawberry association. Place your order with Mr. Barger at Paducah. The plants will be placed in cold storage.

Found—one ladies wrist watch several weeks ago in this office. We would like to return it to its rightful owner. Come by and describe it if you have lost one.

The Bank of Marshall County is furnishing the Kentucky Farm Record Book again this year. They have ordered 200 books. You may get yours at this office. Records are going to be essential for all farmers. They

will be needed for filling out social security returns.

Don't burn your leaves. They will make good compost for the garden and flower beds. Make an enclosure 8 feet by 10 feet, put in 2 feet of leaves and scatter 6 pounds of 62 percent phosphate and 2 pounds of ammonia nitrate. Add 2 more feet of leaves and a similar amount of fertilizer.

Galen Hiett reports his entire row crop acreage seeded to a cover crop including truck patches and the garden. It is not too late to seed wheat and rye.
