12-Year-Old Boy Undergoes Surgery to Save His Eyesight

A 12-year-old Benton boy, Kenneth Drew, underwent the first of a series of eye operations in Paducah Monday to prevent blindness. The operation was performed by Dr. George H. Widener, eye specialist of Paducah. Kenneth has had eye trouble almost since infancy and several years ago lost the sight of his right eye. He gradually was losing the sight of his left eye. The Benton Kiwanis Club learned of the youth's condition and voted to sponsor proper medical care for him. Kenneth resides with his widowed mother in the basement apartment at the Henry Hawkins residence. Mrs. Audrey Drew, the mother, works as a housekeeper. The family did not have the necessary funds to obtain special surgical treatment for the youth, so the Kiwanis Club has undertaken the task of seeing that the boy gets proper medical care.

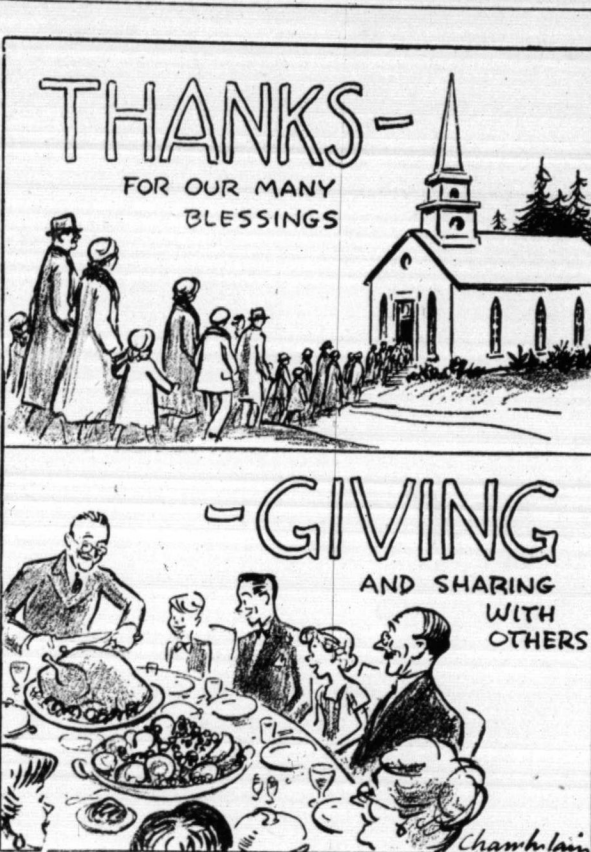
ROLIE MYERS SUFFERS HEART ATTACK AT HOME

State Farm Bureau Favors 90 Percent Price Supports

The Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation last week re-elected its three top officers.

They are Burl St. Clair, Falls of Rough, president; Jack Welch, Owensboro, first vice president, and Golladay LaMotte, Hopkinsville, second vice president.

The 600 delegates also approved a resolution favoring Government price supports on basic farm commodities at 90 per cent of parity.

By approving the parity resolution, just as they did last year, the delegates placed the federation at odds with the American Farm Bureau Federation, of which it is an affiliate.

The American Farm Bureau is credited with a major role in getting the 83rd Congress to pass a bill last year to reduce farm supports to 82 1-2 to 90 percent of parity. This flexible price support policy goes into effect next year.

Other resolutions approved would:

Assist the Kentucky Medical Foundation and similar groups in efforts to establish a "state medical training center," as the only feasible way of alleviating the shortage of physicians in Kentucky.

Have a merged city-county school system wherever practicable in Kentucky's counties.

Support the state's minimum foundation program providing equal educational facilities throughout Kentucky.

Back rigid enforcement of the present dog antitoxin law.

Recommend that TVA power be continued in its original form and expended to "its fullest capabilities."

Oppose any form of compulsory health insurance.

Five new directors were named. They are:

Laban Jackson, Shelby County; T. W. Greer, Lawrence; M. M. Pemberton, Whitley; Mrs. J. R. Winfrey, Wayne, and William Frey, Jefferson.

Incumbent directors re-elected include St. Clair, Welch and T. R. Bryant of the University of Kentucky Extension Service.

Other incumbents chosen: H. E. Luttrell, McCracken County; Lewis Allen, Warren; Ernest Harris, Oldham; Lewis Isom, Mercer; E. P. Hilton, Franklin, and Clyde Watts, Carroll.

Directors have 45 days in which to select a successor to J. E. Stanford, who has announced plans for resigning as executive secretary.

The Farm FRONT --

By J. HOMER MILLER
County Farm Agent

Sample your soil now so you
will know the kind and amount
of fertilizer to use next spring.
Fifty-four farmers had 169 sam-
ples tested this year. About 40
percent of the samples tested
did not need lime, phosphate or
potash.

Limestone used by farmers in-
creased from 6,500 tons in 1953
to 10,700 tons in 1954.

Families attending Farm and
Home Development classes have
increased to 30 families this fall.
This compares to 26 in 1952 and
27 in 1953. The next meeting

First of 3 Articles on How Farmer Can Obtain His Social Security

By LILBURN R. HALL

Editor's note: Mr. Hall is field representative for this area and works out of the district office at Paducah. This is the first of three articles designed to explain to farm families their rights under the Social Security law.

In Marshall County more than 2,000 farm families benefit from the extension of social security coverage to farm owners and operators.

A self-employed farmer who has a net profit of as much as \$400 or more (in a tax year ending after 1954 from the operation of a farm will receive credit for his earnings toward social security benefits for himself and family. Earnings of under \$400 a year are not creditable or taxable for social security purposes. As a self-employed person, the farm operator must report his own earnings and pay the tax of 3 percent on all earnings up to \$4200 a year. The tax may be as low as \$12 a year or as high as \$126.00, depending upon what he clears from his farm.

A simplified method is being designed for farmers to report

their earnings. For most farmers, the first report will not be due until the early part of 1955 and will cover their earnings for the calendar year 1954. The report should be sent to the Director of Internal Revenue along with an regular income tax return for the year.

The amount of the benefits to a farmer, like the amount of his taxes, is based upon his earnings. A farmer who earns an average of \$4200 a year (the maximum) would pay a higher tax and would get a higher social security retirement check than another farmer who earned only \$400 a year. Retirement payments to a farmer might be as low as \$30 a month or as high as \$108.50. Payments to the family, if 3 or more are eligible, might be as high as \$200 a month.

EXAMPLE: George operates a farm which will clear about \$1800 a year. He is now 60 years old and has a wife who is 50. Let's say that in January 1956 he makes his first social security report and pays the tax of \$54 on his farm net earnings of \$1800 for 1955, and continues this average until November

1959 when he reaches the age of 65 and retires.

George goes at once to make his claim with the Social Security Office. (Residents of Marshall County are served by the Paducah office.) He will receive a retirement check in the amount of \$68.50 a month, which begins the month he was 65 and will continue every month for the rest of his life as long as he is retired. ("Retired" means earning not over \$1200 a year.) George's wife will get payments when she reaches age 65 (a year later) in the amount of \$34.30, so that together they will get \$102.80 a month.

If George should die, his widow would get a lump sum payment of \$205.50 and her benefits would be increased to \$51.50 per month. If George is survived by minor children, the total family benefits might be as high as \$124 a month based on his average earnings of \$1800 a year.

A self-employed farmer will need a social security card (if he does not already have one) to identify his account with the Social Security Administration.

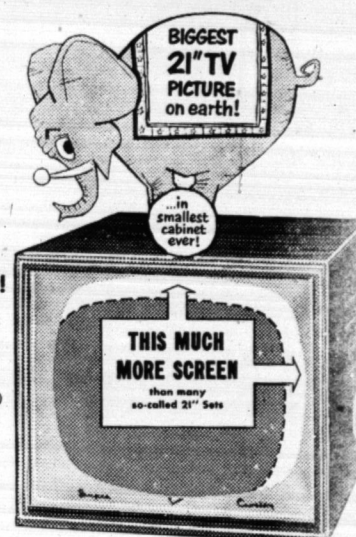

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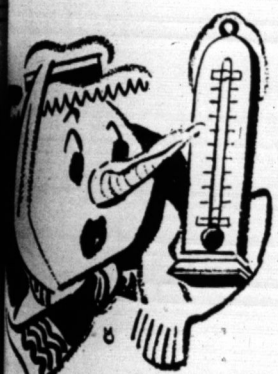

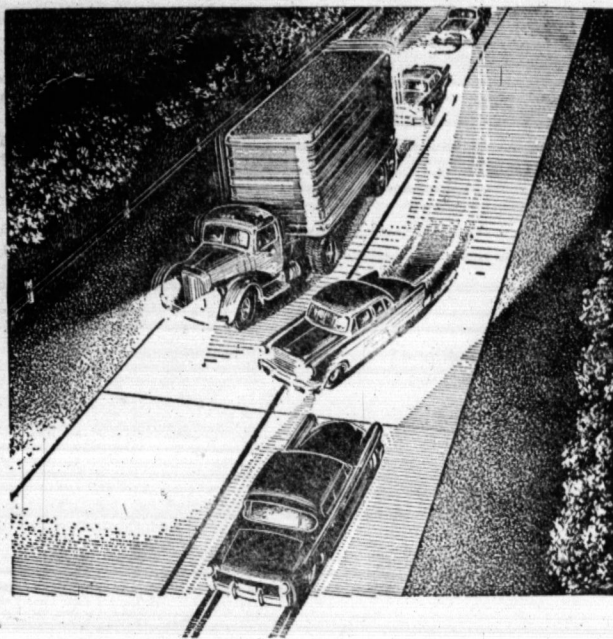

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

Scripture: Psalms 46: 1-3, 4-7, 8-10, 11-12, 13-14

Time of Trouble

Lesson for November 28, 1954

THERE is nothing modern about trouble. Nothing old-fashioned either. You can't be up-to-date in any century if you don't know about the troubles going round. If you met William Shakespeare and Julius Caesar and Buddha and Methuselah all at once, the one thing you could all talk about and understand would be trouble. Dr. Foreman stands one another perfectly (provided you spoke the same language) is Trouble.

Fears
"We have nothing to fear except fear itself," said a great American President. That is sometimes true, but only when there is nothing really to be afraid of. At any rate, ever since the human race began, people have been afraid both of what was likely to happen and what not likely to happen. They have been afraid of what was really there, and afraid of ghosts born of their own imaginations. Fear is not all bad; when it is no more than knowing the danger exists, it is a good thing. It is good to know that poisons hurt, that there is a ditch across the highway, that the curve ahead is a sharp one. A healthy fear of such things is good and keeps us alive. But there is fear which is paralysis, "butterflies in the stomach," first cousin to panic; and this kind of fear only adds to whatever danger or trouble there may be. Now we can read, in Psalm 46, that poet's pointed words about fear; and it is plain that men in his time had the same terrors as ourselves. One feels here the dread of violent change; and is not exactly that, under its current form of communism, what we are terrified of in our time? One feels in this Psalm also the dread of war; and in our times with the H-bomb and the C-bomb threatening us—not just the boys that go to war, but every man, woman and child on the planet—who can sleep with an easy mind? **Loneliness**

Another kind of trouble is loneliness. Psalm 142 brings this out; the writer felt that no one was on his side, no one even cared whether he lived or died. He speaks too of the worst kind of loneliness—or one of the most painful kinds—that is to say, being in prison. We should remember always that there are in this world today an estimated eighty million refugees, that is to say, people who have literally no home and are, perhaps for the rest of their lives, strangers in strange lands, people who live behind barbed wire, people nobody wants. We cannot forget the millions of others who would perhaps rather be refugees, if they dared, than live where and as they have to live, as slaves of some police state, under the lash of taskmasters from whom there is no appeal. But even if all the cruel governments in the world were abolished tonight; even if all the millions of refugees found home and shelter; there still would be as there have always been, millions who could echo the Psalmist's plaint, "No man cared for my soul." Loneliness—the first men knew it, on dark hunted nights in a wilderness they did not understand and could not yet control; the last men will know it, on a dark hunted day among the skyscrapers fleeing vainly from the invisible poisons of the radioactive air. And in between the first men and the last, where is the human being who has not at some time or other felt himself deserted and alone?

God Is Our Help in Trouble

The Psalm-writers knew all this; and yet they could sing. They sang because above all the troubles of time they kept touch with the eternal God. "He will help," they said. How does God help the believer in time of trouble? He does not always help by keeping an umbrella of miracle over the heads of the saints. Not even Jesus was without tears and death. Read these Psalms to see how God was their "help in ages past" as he is "for years to come." Men of faith, they were able to rise under their troubles, they found courage through contact with the God of all. They knew, as we sometimes forget, that God made this world, that it is still His, that above all earthly powers in His sovereign power; that in His own time, in His own way, His will be the victory.

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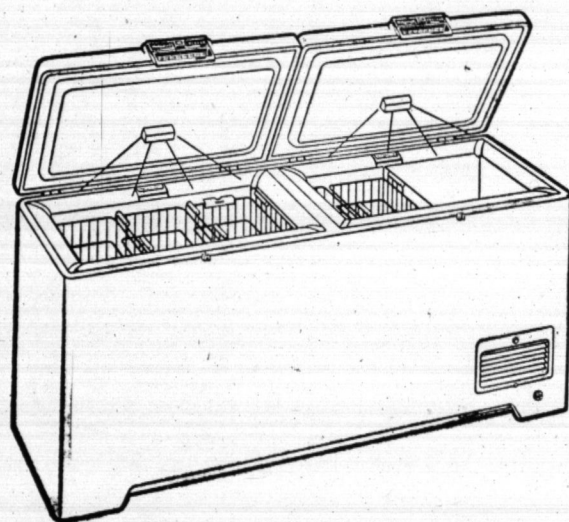
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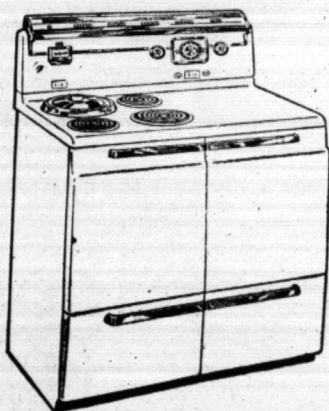
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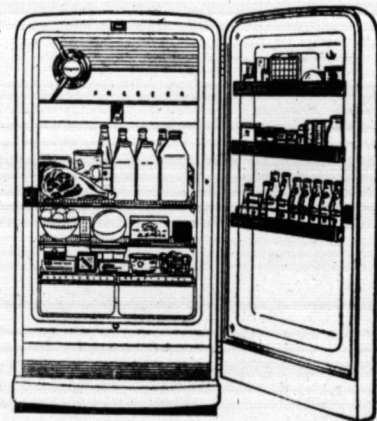
